Tree
Seedlings
Available

Landowners Urged To
Place Orders Now

A Forester Larry Brewer
states that landowners in-
terested in planting pine tree
seedlings during the coming
season should place their
orders for them in the near
future. "The Mississippi
Forestry Commission does
not have as many seedlings
available this year as there
have been in recent years. Each
year for pine seedlings will
be on a first come, first
served basis," Mr. Brewer said.
According to the Forester,
the land in Tishomingo
County is better suited for
planting pine than for
cultivating cotton. Much of the
land not in production is
producing nothing of
marketable value; therefore it
is important that a land-
owner should have every acre
in production.

By planting these idle acres
with pine seedlings, the landown-
er will have his land producing
something which will increase in
value each year and which will
require the intensive care
now crop farming. It does
not have to be harvested at an
early time. A sale can be de-
ferred until market conditions
are favorable and it continues
to grow until the day that it is
needed." Forester Brewer
continued.

Orders for seedlings may be
placed with the Area Forester
for the County Agent. Each
landowner is entitled to
seedlings free by paying
a small delivery charge. Each
order of 1,000 seedlings will
cost \$4.50 plus the delivery
charge. Forester Brewer states
that by ordering now, a land-
owner may specify the month
of delivery.

Gospel Program Scheduled

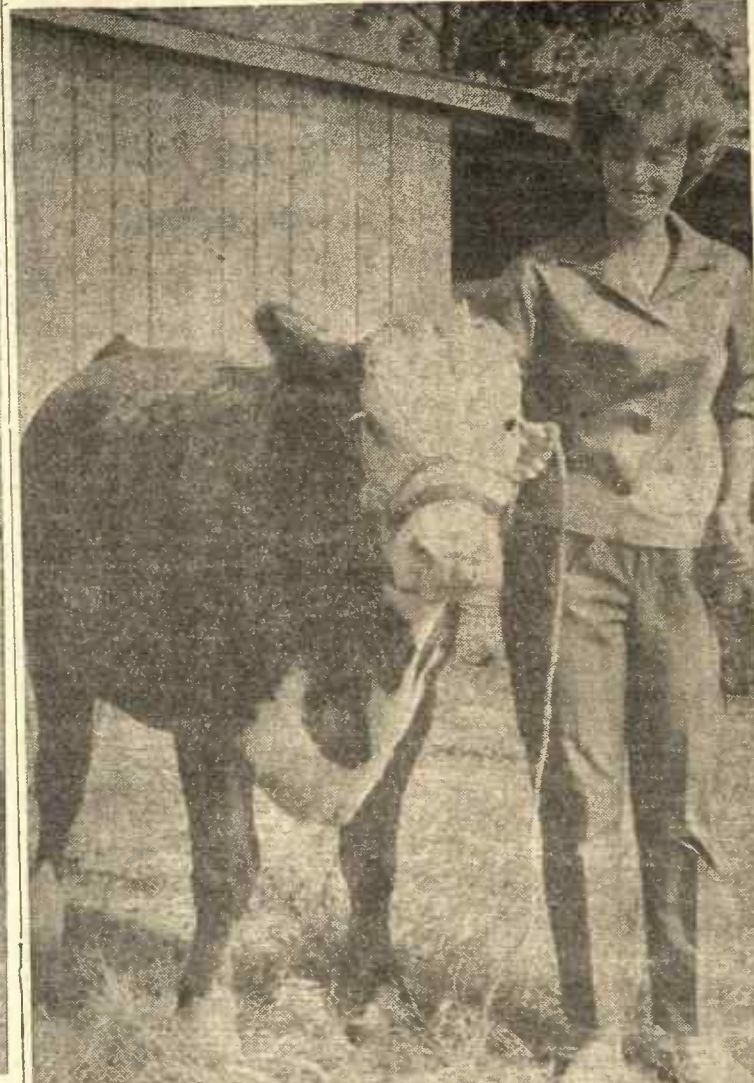
For October 12;

collapsed left lung in the mis-
hap.

Investigating officers said the

ton. The car, going west, struck
the bridge abutment on the
north side of the highway. The
impact demolished the car on
the side where the girl was rid-
ing.

Miss Lewis had been employ-
ed at Brown's Cafe in Fulton
about a week and formerly
worked at Itawamba Manufac-
turing Co., also in Fulton. She
was born in Dennis and was a
member of the Christian
Church.

Services for Miss Lewis were
held Monday afternoon at 2
o'clock at Friendship Baptist
Church near New Site in Prentiss
County. Burial was in the
church cemetery with McMil-
lan Funeral Home of Boone-
ville in charge.

County Agent's Notes by P. B. Stricklen MSU Extension Service

Cotton Quality To protect as much of that quality cotton as possible, complete harvesting as soon as possible.

Cotton is at its highest quality when the boll first fluffs out. Chances of deterioration are greater the longer it is allowed to remain on the stalk in fields.

Mechanical harvesters work best when 70 to 75 percent of the cotton is open, but if hand

labor can be had at reasonable prices, it will pay to go ahead and get as much cotton out of the field this way as possible.

Storing Seed Cotton Seed cotton containing seed moisture of 10 percent or less can be safely stored. Cotton should be harvested from well defoliated fields. It may be stored in trailers or housed. Seed cotton stored with a seed moisture of 10 to 14 percent may or may not keep when stored. It depends on the trash content and other factors. Seed cotton stored with seed moisture of 14 percent or higher definitely stands a chance of losing a grade in color.

Moving this cotton by air when placing it in storage helps if cotton is damp & trashy then passing it through a drier and cleaning machine before storage will help in some instances. Use of trailers with open mesh sides in beneficial. Bins in buildings can also be arranged the same way.

Coastal Bermuda Pick an area now where you want to plant Coastal Bermuda late in the winter or in early spring. Prepare a good seedbed and leave the land fallow until time to plant. If the land needs lime, apply it before plowing and disking. Hold the

fertilizer until planting time.

Frosted Sorghum Do not worry about Prussic acid being present in Silage made from grain sorghum that was frosted on. Even if the acid was present, it will disappear when put in the silo.

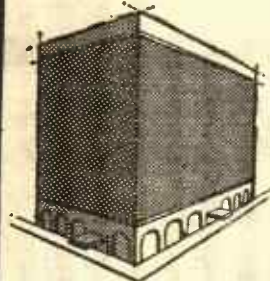

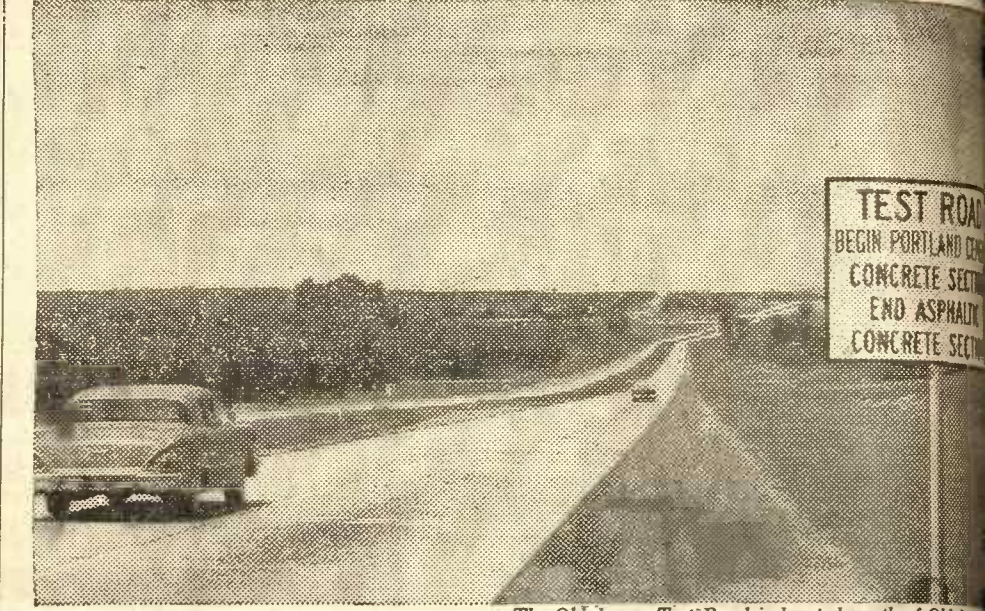

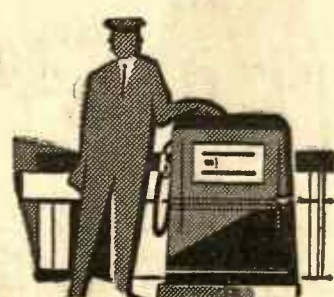

AUTO OWNERS:

1964 Automobile License Plates will be on sale at the Sheriff's Office during the month of October, but should not be placed on the vehicle until November 1.

You are required to have the following information when you buy a Tag: Make, Year Model, Body Type, Motor Or Serial Number, And from whom the Automobile was purchased. In order to receive the proper Tax Exemptions in the State of Mississippi, it is necessary for you to have a Mississippi License Plate for your Automobile.

If you are a resident citizen of Mississippi even though you work in an adjoining state, you are required by law to purchase Mississippi Tags as Mississippi has a reciprocal agreement with adjoining States for the owner of motor vehicles in either State to purchase License Plates in the State where they live and then permitting the owner to use the automobile in commuting to and from work.

If you do not have the required information in regard to the description of your Automobile, the clerks in the Sheriff's Office will be glad to help you in any way they can to secure sufficient information to purchase a Tag.
