Died In Burnsville; Dr. Montgomery Delivered Over 5,000 Babies

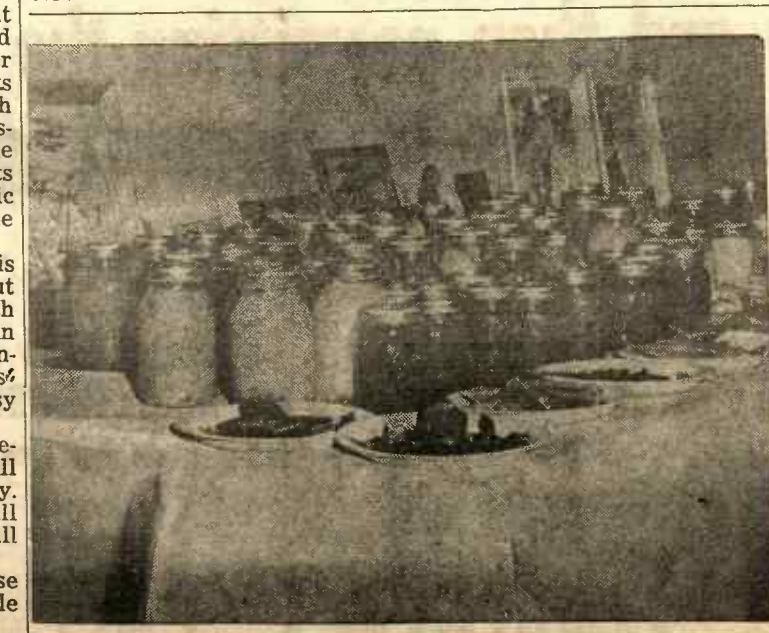
Tishomingo county's oldest practicing physician, Dr. Arlander Houston Montgomery, became a victim of death Wednesday morning at his home in Burnsville. Dr. Montgomery was 89 years old and had been practicing medicine for 55 years. During that time he delivered over 5,000 babies.

Dr. Montgomery was born in Alabama in 1874. He was a deacon in the Burnsville Baptist Church for 44 years. He was a 32nd degree Mason and was a Shriner. Funeral services will be held at 11 o'clock Friday morning from the Burnsville Baptist Church by Bro. Jim Hardwick of Burnsville, Bro. Clarence Palmer of Chalhybeate, Miss., and Bro. J. A. Blunt of Tishomingo. Burial will be in Elmwood cemetery in Tuscumbia, Ala.

Health Survey Announced

Will Be Conducted In County During Next Two Weeks

A household health survey will be conducted in Tishomingo County according to Dr. James W. Hunter, Director of the Tishomingo County Health Department.

The survey is part of a State-wide study being made by the Mississippi State Board of Health to determine the immunization levels of Mississippians, but more particularly the number of children under 5 years of age that are protected against polio, diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus, typhoid and small pox.

It is expected that the survey will be completed in the county during the next two weeks by a trained team of interviewers from the Mississippi State Board of Health that will call on various families in their homes.

Dr. Hunter urges the fullest cooperation of those persons and families that are visited by the team since it is highly essential that this information be complete and accurate.

The information obtained will be treated in a confidential manner and will be used for the planning and improvement of programs that will provide more and better health service to all the citizens of Mississippi.

Acquiring Of Property For Natchez Trace Started

This Week; 16 Miles Across County Will Be Bought And Given To Fed. Government

Acquisition of approximately 16 miles of right of way along the proposed route of the Natchez Trace Parkway, from the

Mississippi-Alabama state line, near Mingo, southwest to a point west of Dennis, near the Tishomingo-Prentiss county line is expected to begin this week, according to Roy C. Adams, Northern District Highway Commissioner.

As soon as the land for the right of way of this section has been acquired, title will be conveyed to the Federal Government.

Acquisition of right of way for the two remaining sections (unimproved) of the Parkway, in Northeast Mississippi, will begin as soon as right of way plans and appraisals are completed. The first of these two sections is a 10.3 mile strip from near the Tishomingo-Prentiss county line to Mississippi Highway No. 363, near Kirkville. The second section is a 15.8 mile strip from Mississippi Highway No. 363, near Kirkville, to U. S. Highway No. 45 north of Tupelo.

Mr. Adams added that this approximately 42 mile segment of the Natchez Trace Parkway, when completed, will join the portion of the Parkway from U. S. Highway No. 45 north of Tupelo to U. S. Highway No. 51 north of Jackson, which is now open to traffic.

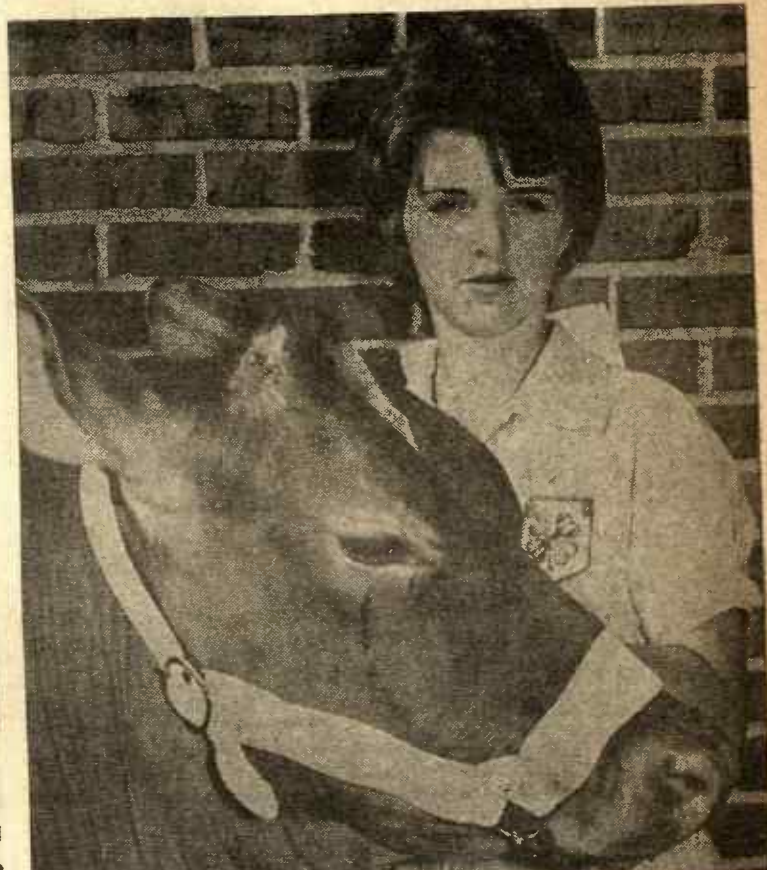
Mr. I. V. Ross will be in charge of right of way acquisition for the Mississippi State Highway Department on this 42 mile section of the Parkway, Mr. Adams said.

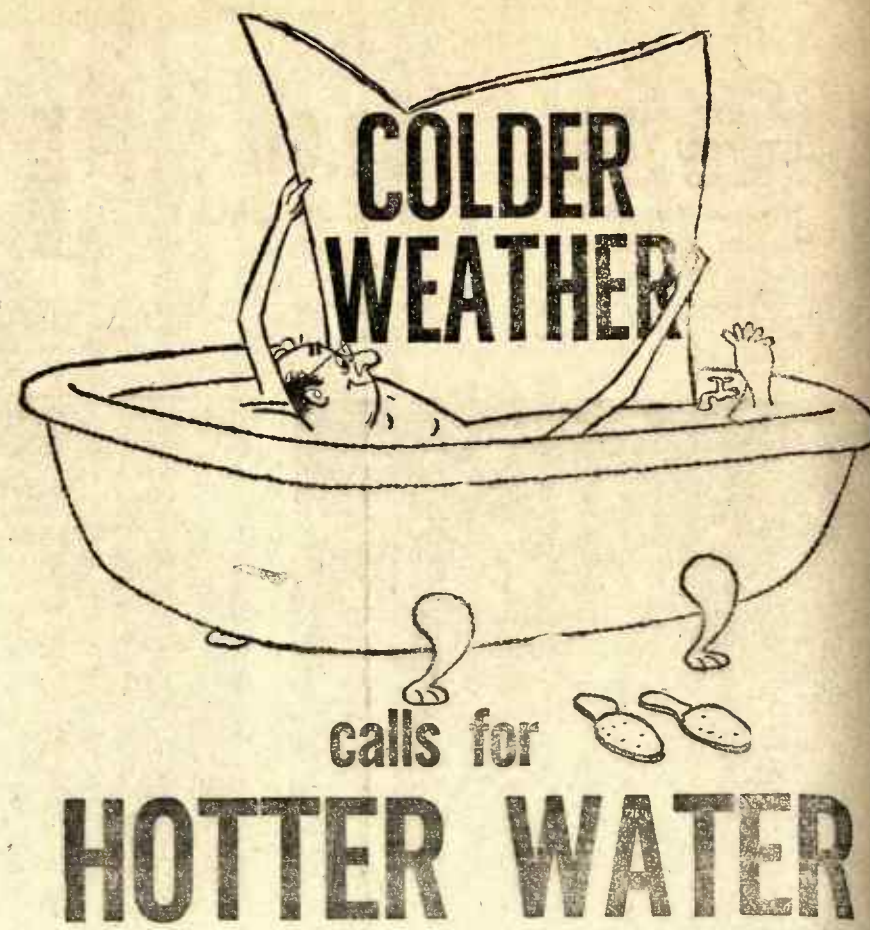
Mrs. Brewer, age 76, died Thursday, October 8, at Tishomingo County Hospital. She was a member of Mt. Moriah Church.

AUTO OWNERS:

1964 Automobile License Plates will be on sale at the Sheriff's Office during the month of October, but should not be placed on the vehicle until November 1.

You are required to have the following information when you buy a Tag: Make, Year Model, Body Type, Motor Or Serial Number, And from whom the Automobile was purchased. In order to receive the proper Tax Exemptions in the State of Mississippi, it is necessary for you to have a Mississippi License Plate for your Automobile.

If you are a resident citizen of Mississippi even though you work in an adjoining state, you are required by law to purchase Mississippi Tags as Mississippi has a reciprocal agreement with adjoining States for the owner of motor vehicles in either State to purchase License Plates in the State where they live and then permitting the owner to use the automobile in commuting to and from work.

If you do not have the required information in regard to the description of your Automobile, the clerks in the Sheriff's Office will be glad to help you in any way they can to secure sufficient information to purchase a Tag.

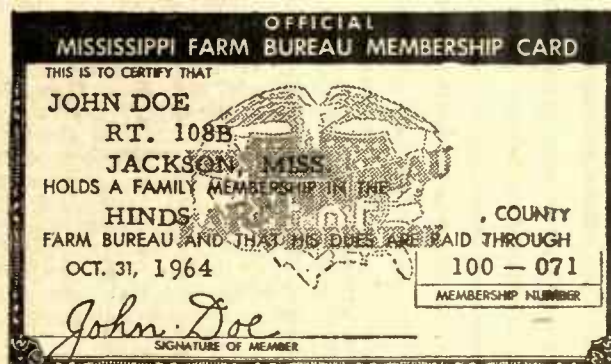

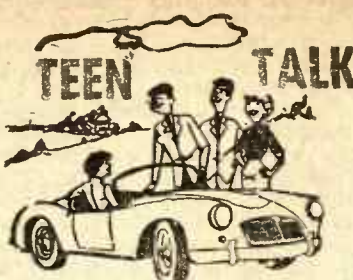

Cool nights and mornings remind us that colder weather isn't many weeks away. And thoughts of cold weather is likely to remind you of frozen water pipes, if you had trouble with them last winter.

Get busy now to avoid this costly and inconvenient problem of frozen pipes. Oil piping

exposed to freezing weather should be properly insulated.

Special wrappings, which come in different sizes to fit all pipes, are available. The insulating materials are fiberglass, felt or synthetic rubber.

You might want to consider, too, replacing outside faucets with the self-draining type that shuts off the water supply several inches back in the piping to prevent freezing.

October Plentiful Foods
Grapes, Rice and Cheese will be the most plentiful foods during October. Other plentiful foods include apples, cranberries, potatoes, and broiler-fryers.

Sweater Buying
You want your new sweater to look right and feel right. To be assured of proper fit, consider six major points: neckline, shoulders, armholes, closings, body and ribbing.

Does the neckline feel comfortable? Does it fit smoothly and stay in place?

Is the sweater wide enough across the back at the shoulders? Do the shoulders bind or sag?

Is there pull in the armholes under the arms? Are the sleeves the right length for you?

Look at the closing on cardigans. Do buttons and buttonholes lie flat? Does the closing gap or pull?

Considering the body of the sweater, does the sweater feel comfortable? Does it allow for movement without strain?

Does the ribbing on sleeves and bottom of the sweater fit

snugly? Does it have elasticity?

Prevent A Fire

If a fire starts... and let's remove all hazards and do everything we can to prevent fires during annual Fire Prevention Week, October 6-12.

But, if a fire starts, remember it's people and not possessions that count. Get everyone out of the house quickly. Don't waste precious time trying to save valuables. Don't stop to dress children.

Fire is fast and deadly. Treat any unusual smoke or gas odor as the signal to get out fast.

Try to keep the fire from spreading, but only if you can do so without risk to your life.

New Species May Replace Ryegrass On Winter Lawns

Ryegrass makes a fine green lawn in the winter but it gives trouble in the spring. It keeps on growing so vigorously that the permanent summer grasses have a hard time competing

with it. For this reason, turf grass research workers at the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station have been seeking a better winter lawn grass.

Eight cool season grasses were compared in the winter of 1961-62. Only four of them—three red fescue, Pennlawn, Illahee, and common; and chewing fescue—gave results comparable to ryegrass. None performed as well as ryegrass but the fescues did much less damage to the permanent sod. More extensive tests were made in the winter of 1962-63.

W. R. Thompson, Jr., agronomist engaged in turf grass research at the Station, summed up the two-year results as follows:

"During both years of tests, ryegrass produced a turf more quickly than other species tested. However, varieties of creeping red fescue produced turf that was only two to three weeks later than ryegrass. In the winter of 1962-63 when the low temperatures severely injured the ryegrass, Kentucky bluegrass and Illahee fescue survived with little injury. Kentucky bluegrass was slower in establishment than ryegrass or creeping red fescue and per-

isted later in the spring causing the permanent grass to lose quality.

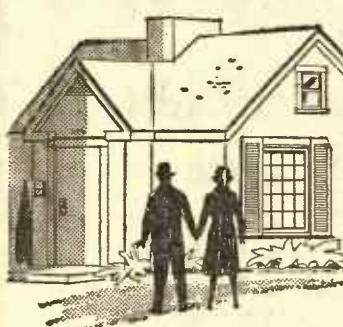
"Earlier stands can be obtained by preparing the permanent grass for overseeding. Mowing the permanent grass at a height 1/2 to 1/3 of the regular mowing height just prior to overseeding produced earlier stands of all species. This type of mowing is the most practical and economical seed-bed preparation method because very few homeowners have vertical mowing or top-dressing equipment."

Lawn overseeding studies will be continued and various seeding rates of the cool season grasses will be studied during 1963-64.

County Agent's Notes

Clover Fertilization

Topdress all clover and legume areas now with phosphate and potash. This will help give good spring growth. White clover needs 80 pounds of each acre each fall. Crimson clover, vetch and winter peas can get by on only 60 pounds of each per acre.

When applying fertilizer to heavy sod areas where clover is wanted, renovate the soil. Some areas may need reseeded with two or three pounds of white clover seed to the acre.

Crimson clover can be sown on high land sod. When fertilizer is applied, a light disking will pay to get a good stand. Sowing on top of the ground without disking or harrowing will get a stand, but it will be late.

Winter peas do better if disked in or put in with a sod seeder. You will get a better stand with 35 pounds of seed covered than you will with 50 or 60 pounds sown on top of the ground.

Cotton Quality

Colored pieces of clothing and bandanna handkerchief continue to cause a lot of headaches in cotton.

Where hand pickers are used, there is a tendency to leave jackets, shirts, bandannas etc.

on the cotton trailer. These get covered up with seed cotton. The gin thoroughly mixes them with cotton lint.

This colored cloth contaminates one or more bales of cotton and caused considerable losses at the textile mill. This old colored cloth is woven in with new fiber and affects the dyeing properties and other qualities of the new cloth.

Be sure to warn your picking crew and the machine crews as well of this hazard and try to prevent it occurring in Mississippi cotton.

Soybean Contest

Watch for announcement of a new soybean production contest. It will be introduced for the 1964 crop year. An announcement leaflet is being prepared and will be in the hand of your county agent in the near future.

Wintering Cattle

Make sure of your feed needs now before winter sets in. Remember, beef cattle need additional protein during the winter.

You can supply this with a protein meal, like cottonseed meal or soybean meal. Some producers feed the meal mixed with salt. The salt serves as an intake regulator and allows the mixture to be fed free choice.

Check with your county agent for proportion to use in preparing the salt-meal mixture.
