A short program on Baptist and Holy Communion was delivered by Joe Carpenter of the Snowdown Church. The meeting was closed with the MYF benediction.

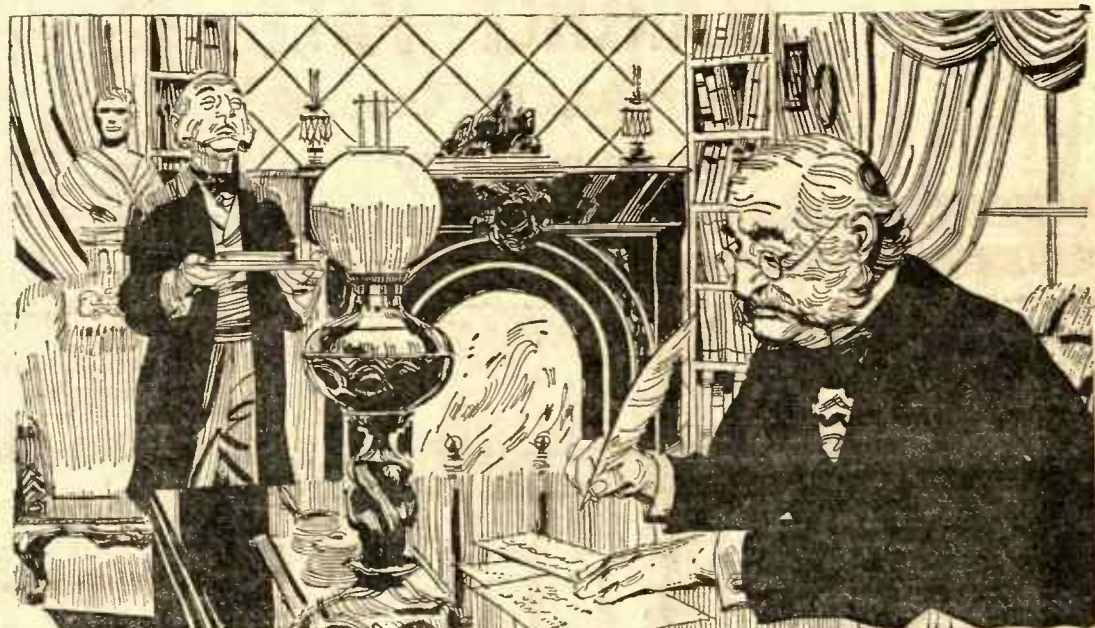

Delicious refreshments were served by the hostess. The pledge was led by Anne Glover.

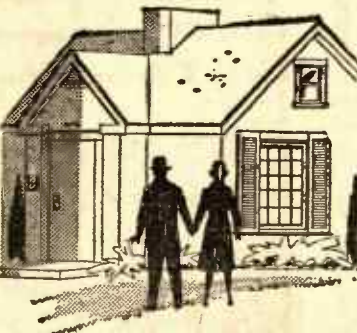

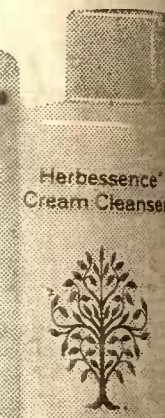
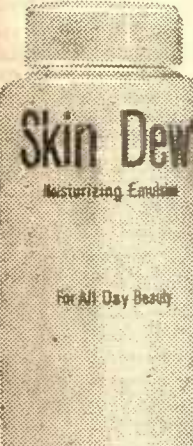

HOME AGENT NOTES

By Mrs. Dianne F. Crubaugh
Tishomingo County Home Demonstration Agent

Did you realize that the word "macaroni" on the label of a package assures you that the product meets certain food standards and contains certain products?

These standards have been set by law under the Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act. Macaroni comes under a general category that includes both macaroni and noodle products.

The difference between the two products is eggs. Macaroni products may or may not contain egg whites. Every noodle product must contain whole eggs or egg yolks in a specified amount, or it can't be called a noodle.

In order to be labeled "Macaroni" the product must be of the class of food, each of which is prepared by drying formed units of dough made from, semolina, durum flour, farina, flour or any combination of two or more of these with water.

In addition, macaroni may contain one or more optional ingredients. Some such ingredients must be declared on the label and others may not. Salt and gum gluten do not have to be named on the label, but disodium phosphate, a harmless chemical used to cut down cooking time, onions, celery, garlic or bay leaves must be named on the label.

Macaroni products come in many shapes, including stars, seashells and bowties. But spaghetti and vermicelli have their own forms and shapes, all carefully standardized. Macaroni is tube-shaped (hollow) and largest in size. Spaghetti is the middle-sized member of the family and is cord-shaped. Vermicelli is also cord-shaped and the smallest in diameter.

With all this legally established, you can be sure when you pick up macaroni in the supermarket that you are getting the same product you bought before under that name.

Sorting Laundry
Have some of your nylons changed color and become dingy? How you sort your clothing before laundering can have a lot to do with this. Try sorting your laundry this way:

Sort by degree and kind of soil. Don't put very soiled articles with lightly soiled ones.

Sort by colorfastness. If a garment fades in water, wash it separately. White nylons should be washed separately.

Sort by kind of fiber. Usually woolens, silks and man-made fibers, such as rayons, are not washed with cottons and linens. You need to adjust the temperature of the water, kind of detergent and length of washing to the different fabrics. Because nylon picks up color and soil so easily, wash together only those nylons of the same color and same degree of soil.

Ramie Tested As Fiber Crop; Not Recommended

Ramie is fiber-producing tropical plant occasionally considered as a possible crop for Mississippi. G. D. Green, Experiment Station agronomist at Mississippi State University, recently summarized the state's experience with ramie and concluded that prospects for this crop are not bright at present.

Considerable enthusiasm for the crop has arisen from time to time in various quarters, Mr. Green said. As early as 1890 the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station grew some ramie in tests. Delta Branch Station tried it in the 1940's and small areas were grown at the Central Station at Soso.

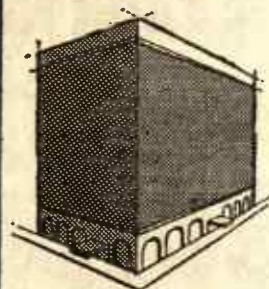

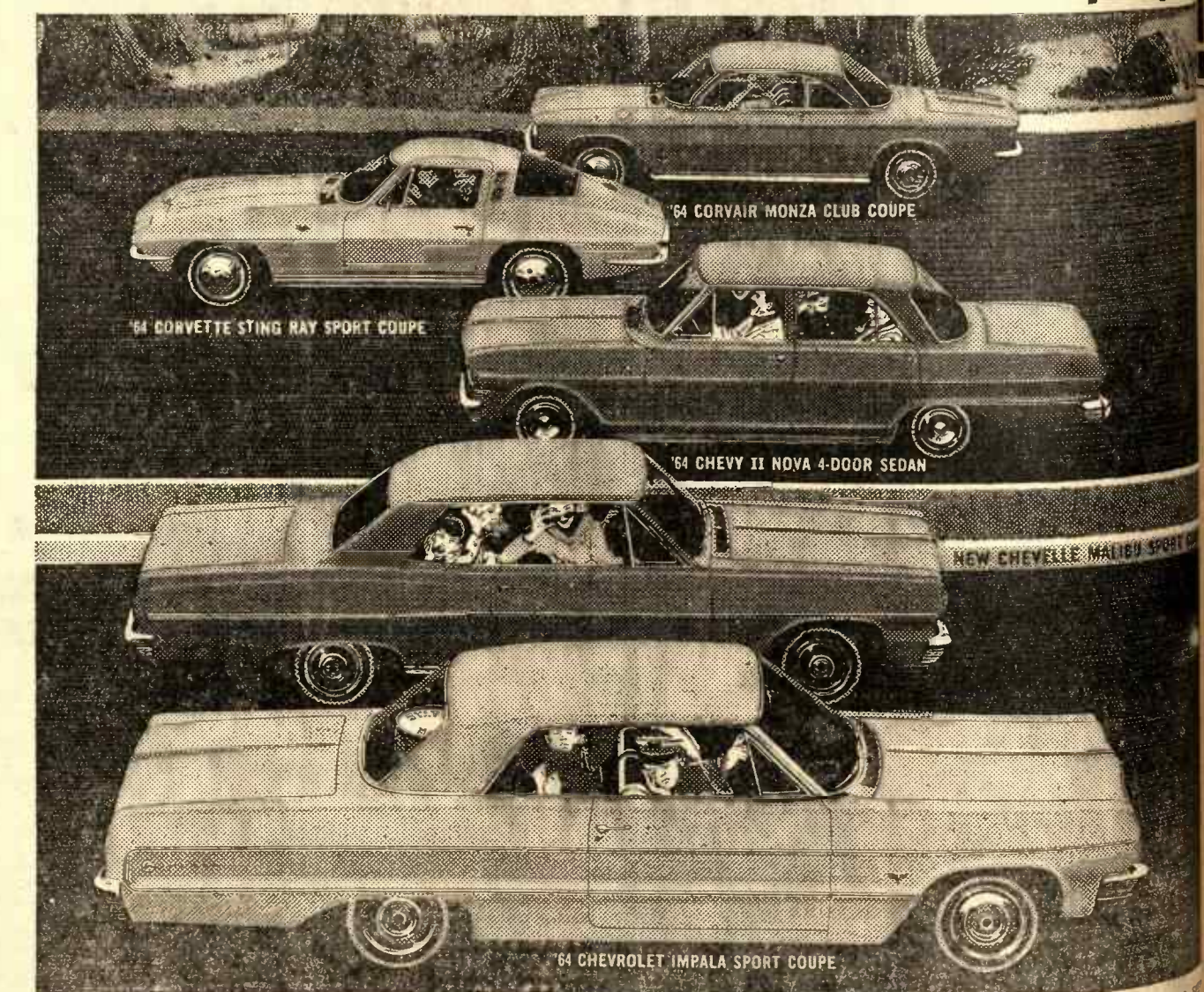

We have had a number of inquiries recently concerning the use of cotton seed in place of purchased protein supplement in the dairy ration since there may be quite a difference in the price of cotton seed as compared to cotton seed meal and some other high protein supplements.

Whole, gin-run, fuzzy cotton seed is a satisfactory protein supplement for cattle and crushing of the seed is not necessary. Cotton seed contains an average of 23 per cent crude protein. It is recommended that cotton seed not make up much more than one-third of the concentrate mixture. Where too much cotton seed is fed, the ration is less palatable and may cause digestive trouble due to its high oil content.

Results of experiments conducted by the Mississippi Experiment Station in 1953 indicate that seven pounds of whole cotton seed were equal to three pounds of cottonseed meal plus four pounds of ground shelled corn for milk production when fed as a part of a balance ration.

A very satisfactory ration for dairy cattle getting some oat grazing or good quality legume hay can be made as follows:

300 lbs. Ground Ear corn, 300 lbs. Wheat Bran, 400 lbs. Cotton Seed, 10 lbs. Dicalcium Phosphate or Steamed Bone Meal, and 10 lbs. Salt.

Beef Cattle Notes
Cattlemen should take a good look at their business now and get ready for winter.

A big cost item is winter feed. Hay is more readily available now than expected. But make sure that you have enough on hand.

Protein meal is high and is likely to remain high. Better figure on 100 pounds to 200 pounds for each brood cow, depending on your calving season.

It is not good business to carry a barren cow through the winter. Check your cows and the ones that are not pregnant should probably be culled from the herd.

Cows bred to calve in the spring can be successfully wintered on a daily ration of 20 pounds of grass hay and one pound of protein meal. Cows that calve in the fall will need at least one-fourth more roughage and an extra pound of meal daily.

Clover Planting
If you do not get your clover planted by the first part of November, save it until next October and plant the seed. Do not plant clover in the spring as spring plantings do not generally pay off as well as fall plantings.

It will pay to renovate heavy sods like common Bermuda, bahia and carpet grass so that clovers can come up and survive.

This renovation every three or four years not only opens up the sod for clover and legume growth but make for better from the grasses in the following year.

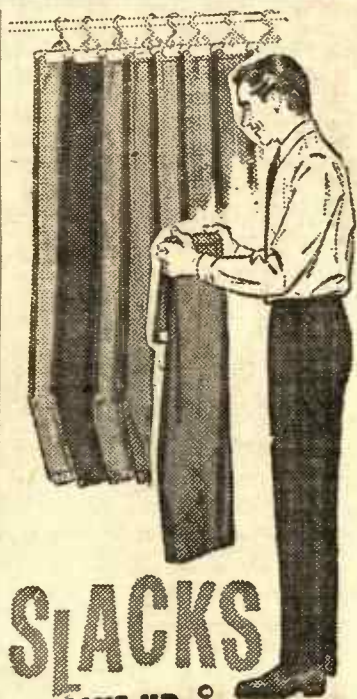
