Imaginary Cold War 'Pause'
In urging that the United States and the Soviet Union jointly send an expedition to the moon, President Kennedy declared that "we may have reached a pause in the cold war." But neither the specific proposal nor the general description of our situation is in

accord with the realities. Both statements by the President are likely to mislead and confuse the U. S. public.

Even if it were practical for the U. S. and Russia to launch a joint moon exploration program (and this would involve sharing of the most important national secrets involving rocket motors and space vehicle guidance systems—defense information, in other words), it still would have no bearing on

the facts of life on this planet. The struggle between freedom and communist tyranny is on earth, not in space. The need is for the Soviet Union to recognize the rights of free nations to join in international ventures in the heavens above. The Soviet Union could lavish money and cooperation on space probes with the USA and still threaten freedom-loving everywhere on earth. Thus, it was cruel of the President to suggest that the path to peace cuts through interplanetary space.

As for there being a pause in the cold war, not a scrap of solid evidence supports Mr. Kennedy's contention. The test of peaceful intentions is what Nikita Khrushchev does, not what he says. The words voiced by Russian leaders are soft these days. But the actions of the Soviet Union have not changed a whit since Stalin's time.

If the Soviets want to demonstrate a sincere desire to be friendly, they should remove their troops from Cuba. If they want to end the cold war, they should withdraw their troops from Eastern Europe. Russia has no business in Eastern Europe, and the people of the captive nations don't want them on their soil. Russia might begin by tearing down the Berlin wall or by halting subversion on the African con-

tinued. Indeed Russia cannot possibly begin to demonstrate peaceful intentions until it gives the Communist Party USA orders to halt its activities and to disband. Yet Soviet subversion and political agitation continues. Only this summer, Soviet citizens were discovered to be engaged in espionage work in the United States. Communist cadres are promoting a soft U. S. policy toward Cuba. In Latin America, communist bands are bombing U. S. owned plants in Venezuela. Communists also are seeking to return to power in Guatemala.

Everywhere one looks on this globe, the Soviet Union is waging the cold war with all-out intensity. Yet Mr. Kennedy says that we may have reached a "pause" in the cold war. This is an insult to the intelligence of the American people.

It appears that the United States is about to give away of its security in exchange for some soft words from the Soviet Union—a tragic exchange on our part. The tragedy is compounded by the fact that the real road to world peace—and peace in freedom is our enduring national goal—can only be achieved by a combination of U. S. military strength, vigorous defense of our capitalist economic system, and a spirit of firmness.

If the Russians see the Kennedy administration eager to jump at negotiations and willing to accept any offer, any scrap of paper or promise, then it will play this sucker for everything that it is worth. For a brief while, the American people may bask in the warm glow of what they will be told by the White House is the atmosphere of peace. Such an imaginary atmosphere existed in Europe after Neville Chamberlain returned from appeasing Hitler at Munich and promised "peace in our time." The result was World War II and terrible suffering for the British people.

Mr. Kennedy's too easy promise of a "pause" in the cold war is comparable with Chamberlain's statement. It too could cost the American people heavily in suffering.

most difficulty?" The ACT Program has also been responsive to such questions.

The ACT Program is meant to be particularly useful to college officials charged with the responsibility of admissions, loan awards, advanced placement and student counseling.

Grass-Legume Pasture Better Than Grass Alone

It is generally recognized that livestock does better on grass-legume pastures than on grass alone. This is partly because of the nutrient quality of the legumes. Another reason is that legumes, if well nodulated, supply nitrogen for better growth of the grass. Growing legumes in a pasture improves the feeding quality and also increases the yield.

Growing white clover (La-Si) in Coastal bermuda can extend the period for grazing and provide high quality forage. Louisiana Si Clover also adds nitrogen to the land and this nitrogen, in turn, benefits the Coastal bermuda grass.

HOME AGENT NOTES

You'll find many new features in kitchen ranges that you will want to investigate, especially if you are planning to buy a stove any time soon.

Many of the ranges have a built-in look. You will find

ranges that can be hung on the wall, set on a cabinet, set in a cabinet, or set on their own "feet."

You will find ranges with either single or double, eye-level ovens. The ovens have various types of doors. Some swing up and out of the way; some are hinged to the right or left. The glass on the oven doors is etched or tinted.

Some have both an eye-level oven and a conventional low oven. One low conventional oven has a skylight for peeping.

The ovens of the new ranges are easier to clean. One range has a coating of Teflon on the oven lining. Another has foil oven liners that you can discard.

Broilers have been improved. A power rack on one range raises or lowers the broiler pan. Removable guards help contain spatters. You will also find broilers on which you can dial the degree of doneness for the food—rare, medium or well done.

As you investigate surface units, you will find split level units—units that can be lowered to 32 to 34 inches and units that cycle on and off during cooking. Small pots and pans can be used efficiently on thermostatically controlled surface units with new heat patterns. One range has a 4-inch surface unit.

Two of the new ranges have a warming shelf. One of these has a heating element complete with switch and thermostat.

Don't Burn Those Leaves
As you rake leaves from your lawn, don't burn them. Instead put them in a compost pile.

A compost pile is one of the cheapest sources of organic matter for your soil.

You need more than just a pile of leaves. You need to use alternate layers of material,

manure and soil, with alternate sprinklings of superphosphate, lime and other plant foods, or one of the commercially prepared "compost hasteners."

Ask at your home agent's office for more details on building a compost pile.

Broomsedge Removal

You can use fertilizer and lime and remove broomsedge from your pastures.

Use one of these methods of getting rid of broomsedge and replacing it with good grass and clover:

Topdress fertilizer this fall at a pretty high rate. A good application to start with is 500 pounds per acre of 0-20-20. Then, next spring, apply 50 to 60 pounds of nitrogen per acre. Graze heavily during the spring and clip all during the summer.

Or, topdress with fertilizer and renovate and plant oats or wheat with vetch and winter peas and clover.

Or, use a sod seeder and

plant small grain and put down fertilizer at time of planting.
Or, plow broomsedge area this fall and fallow during the winter and either plant to pasture next spring or temporary grazing for next spring.

Or, prepare land this fall and in the spring set Coastal Bermuda and fertilize at time of setting the Coastal.

Land should be limed when using any of these methods of ridding pastures of broomsedge.

Fire Prevention
After frost fire dangers increase tremendously. Now, while there is still time to protect your pastures, is the time to plow fire lanes.

Plow the fire lanes around any stacked hay, around barns and other farm buildings. Be sure that you construct fire lanes between your pastures and public roads and between your pastures and wooded areas.

Performance Testing
Want to wean heavier, higher grading calves that will bring in more dollars?

Large, growthy, straight, thick, heavy-muscled feeder calves are the kind that will net more for the producer.

Performance testing is making significant contributions toward producing more of this kind of calf.

Here are some suggestions:

Use better breeding and management... this means performance testing. Use performance tested bulls with good records both growth rate and grade. Try cow herd testing on the farm. In this, identify all brood cows, tototo and ear tag each calf and keep calving records. Weigh and grade calves when they are five to nine months of age.

Rank your cows on weight and grade of their calf. Save the heavy high grading calves for replacements and cull cows with light weight, off-quality calves.

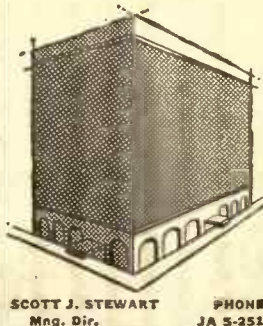

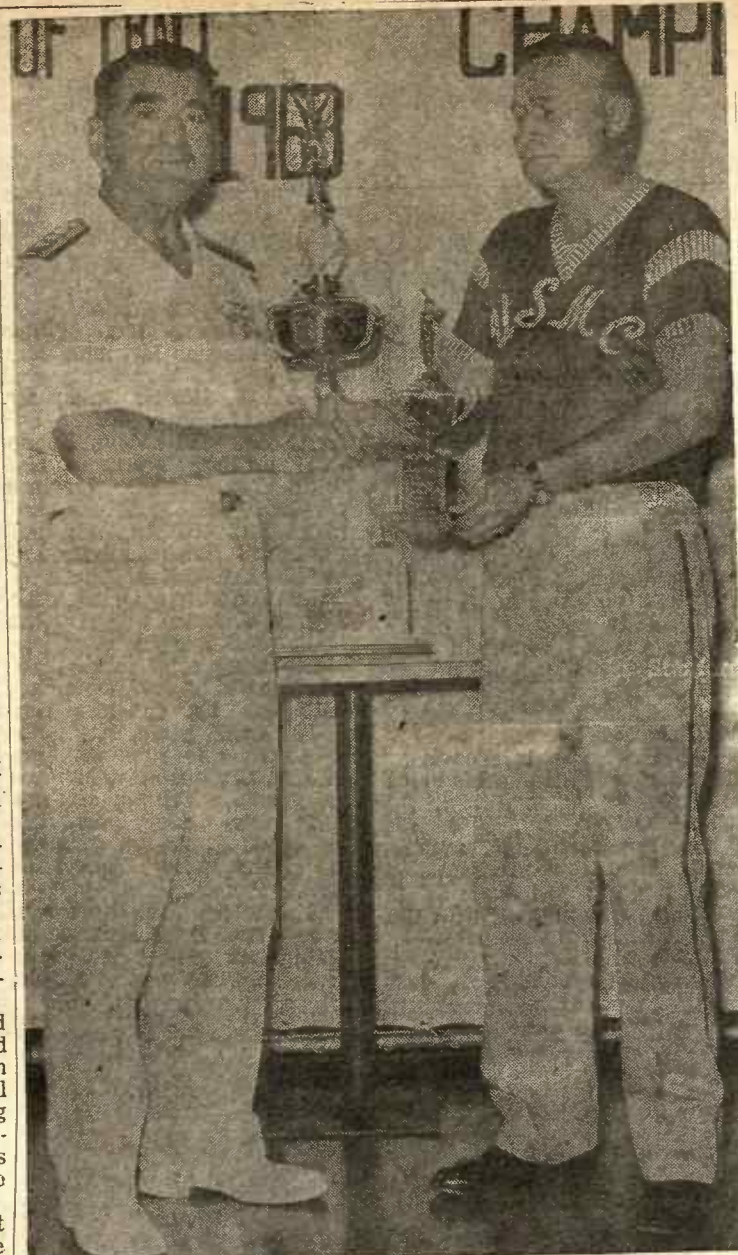
