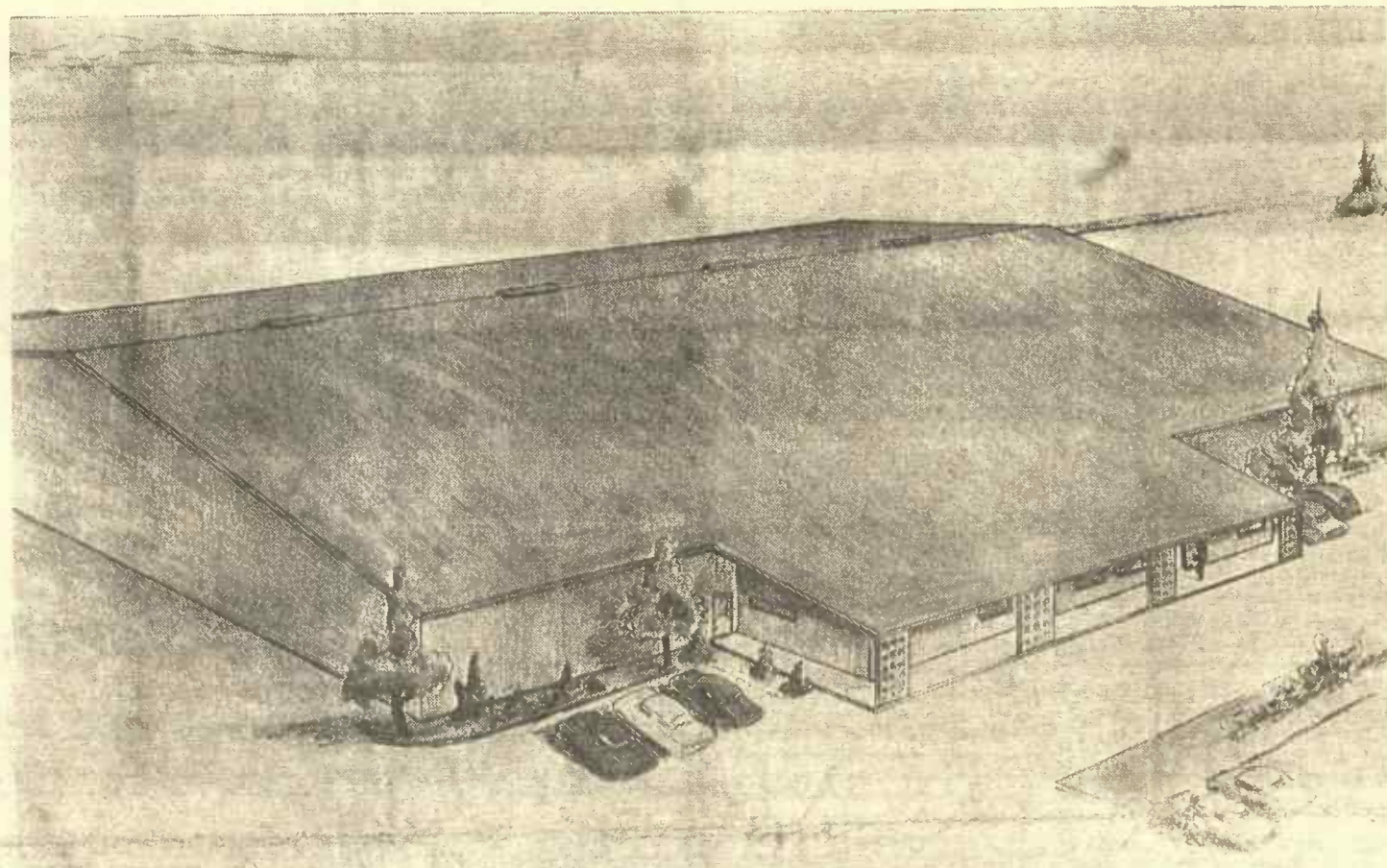
U. S. Senator John C. Stennis

water.

Only other occupant in the

wife to drive. He was uninjured
but was taken to Senter-Rat-
liff Clinic in Belmont, where
he was treated for extreme
shock.

The accident occurred on the
Belmont-Pogo road about 5 p.m.
The body of Mrs. Clement was
found about 7:15 after the 1963
Chevy she was driving was pulled
from the water. Grappling
hooks were used in recovering
the body.

Mrs. Clement, who was 20,
was born in Booneville. She
had been married only seven
months.

Industry In Iuka Will Be Result Of Bond Issue In First Three Districts

Election Will Be Held December 3

Announcement is made that a new industry
will locate in Iuka. The new industry is Con-
solidated Aluminum Corporation with headquarters
in Jackson, Tennessee. The announcement is made
jointly by Governor Ross Barnett, William D. Mil-
ler, president of the company, and the Tishomingo
County Board of Supervisors.

Consolidated Aluminum Corporation produces
industrial laminated aluminum foil products and
operates plants in Jackson, Tenn., and recently
opened a new aluminum reduction plant in New
Johnsonville, Tenn.

Mr. Miller, president of Conalco, said the Iuka
plant will be situated on a 22-acre site in the Iuka
industrial park adjacent to the Southern railway.
The building will be a 30,000 square foot structure
with plans for expansion. Initial operating employ-
ment will be about 50 men, Mr. Miller indicated.

Conalco, a major producer of plain foil, also
operates the National Foil Division at Elizabeth, N.
J., where laminated, embossed, and colored foil is
produced for converter customers. The new plant
in Iuka will permit greatly expanded production of
high quality laminated foil for industrial use, Mr.
Miller noted.

Bond Issue Election

The Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors
announce that a bond issue election for Super-
visor's districts 1, 2, and 3 will be held Tuesday, De-
cember 3, at all voting precincts in those districts.

Amount of the Bond issue will be \$150,000.00
and will be used to construct the building for Con-
solidated Aluminum Corporation. An agreement
has been entered into between the Board of Super-
visors and the company to the effect that the com-
pany will pay rent or lease money in a sufficient
amount to pay for the building within a given length
of time. The bond issue will be held under the
Balance Agriculture with Industry Act and will not
cause an increase in taxes.

Members of the Board of Supervisors pointed
out that Consolidated Aluminum Corporation has a

AAA-1 financial rating with
Dun & Bradstreet and that the
firm is worldwide in its opera-
tions with plants in Switzerland
and Germany.

ty together more readily
on individual basis.

Long other reasons pointed
out as the need for farmers to
be able to communicate easier
at delay and without the
need of having to go through
distance operators to con-
tact the county agent and
farm agencies.

The Chambers of Commerce,
in their requests to the Com-
mission, stated that religious ac-
tivities of the county could and
would be greatly improved
when various churches and con-
gregations could communicate
with one another without the
need to use long-distance
phone.

It was also pointed out that
long-distance operators who
serve the county are all located
in Corinth, a city far-removed
in terms of miles from the
county, and that information on
calls is frequently lacking be-
cause of the lack of knowledge
on the part of the operators
concerning the county and its
people.

Telephone service in Tisho-
mingo county is divided into
three major groups, or ex-
changes. The exchanges are lo-
cated at Iuka, Belmont and
Tishomingo with Burnsville be-
ing tied into the Iuka exchange.
The Tishomingo exchange is
owned and operated by Mid-
South Telephone Co. The Iuka
and Belmont exchanges are
owned by Southern Bell. No
personnel is used in the ex-
changes at Iuka and Belmont,
only a service-repairman is sta-
tioned at Iuka.

The need, as pointed out to
The Commission, is for a pat-
ron of any of the telephone ex-
changes to be able to dial any
other patron on any other ex-
change at any point or location
in the county that has a tele-
phone without having to go
through the long-distance op-
erator in Corinth.

Paul B. Johnson Elected Governor Of Mississippi

**Carroll Gartin Is Easy Winner
Over Republican Stanford Morse**

Lt. Governor Paul B. John-
son was elected Governor of
Mississippi in Tuesday's Gen-
eral Election by a large margin.
This was Johnson's fourth try
for the governorship. He de-
feated his opponent Republican
Rubel Phillips by a better than
5 to 3 lead in the first two-
party struggle since the Recon-
struction Era.

Governor-Elect Paul Johnson
says his victory over his Repub-
lican opponent is evidence of
Mississippians' loyalty to a one-
party system. Mr. Johnson will
be inaugurated in January as
the state's 53rd Governor.

Carroll Gartin of Laurel, the

Democratic candidate for Lt.
Governor, was an easy winner
over his Republican opponent,
State Senator Stanford Morse
Jr. of Gulfport.

Reports late Wednesday af-
ternoon with 1,685 of the state's
1,875 precincts complete, plus
a few scattered incomplete re-
turns, Johnson had 192,625
votes to 118,147 for Phillips.
The Republican candidate trailed
in his home Alcorn County
and barely led in the Kosuth
precinct where he was born and
reared.

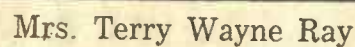
With 1,666 precincts counted,
Lt. Governor-Elect Carroll Gar-
tin, Johnson's running mate on
the Democratic ticket, led his
opponent Senator Morse 217,875
to 75,943 votes.

Up until this year, general
elections have been merely the
confirmation of the results of
earlier Democratic primaries.
But this year a two-party con-
test was necessary.

All county, county district,
state and state district officials,
being legally elected, tallied the
largest votes received in gen-
eral elections.



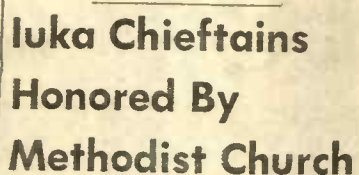

The young people of the church, with their guests, were served a sandwich plate with ice cream and cake.

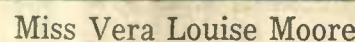

HOME AGENT NOTES

Fakes and swindles in the health field continue to rob the American public of at least \$1

billion a year.

Those people in the "senior citizen" age group are the ones who quite often fall for the medical fakes. It is easy to believe if you are sick, frightened or alone.

The severe pain of arthritis and rheumatism makes the sufferer an easy target for the charlatan. Early treatment by a competent doctor is a "must" for arthritis — it can help prevent crippling.

And the doctor will also prescribe the most effective pain relievers. But no drugs as yet can truthfully be labeled as a cure.

Beware of weasel-worded promotions that don't actually promise a cure, but nevertheless imply it.

Surgery, x-ray and radiation cure many cases of cancer when they are diagnosed and treated in the early stages. Beware of unproved remedies. Loss of time can be fatal.

There are many kinds of heart disease. Proper diagnosis is essential to proper treatment. There is no single treatment.

One good rule for helping to prevent a "heart attack" is: avoid overweight. Your doctor will help you choose a diet suited to your needs.

For Best Vacuum Cleaning

Be sure you read the instruction book that came with your vacuum cleaner to find out when the bag should be emptied. Some instructions will tell you to empty the bag after each use; while others, the disposable type, direct emptying only very few weeks.

You must keep the bag emptied as regularly as the instructions say in order to maintain good suction.

Pins, bobbypins and other such objects may damage the hose or motor of your cleaner, so try not to pick them up with

the cleaner.

Keep the brush free and clean of such things as strings, lint and hair.

The cleaner will not operate correctly if there are holes in the hose or bag.

Food Notes

Darkened bones sometimes develop in young frozen poultry as a result of the effect of freezing on the hemoglobin in the bone marrow.

This darkening detracts from appearance, but does not affect the flavor or keeping quality.

Did you know that within the past 25 years, beef eaten in the United States has gone from person annually?

A new freezer-dry processing method promises meats and other perishable foods that will store on the pantry shelf without refrigeration for two years.

Nuts are one of the few foods that may be refrozen with safety and no noticeable deterioration.

Q—In the case of a serviceman's death while he is on active duty, what are the limits of the death gratuity payment and who receives it?

A—The benefit is a sum equal to six months pay of the deceased. However, it shall not be less than \$800, nor more than \$3,000. It is paid to the surviving spouse, child or children, unless the serviceman has designated his parents, brothers or sisters.

Dairy Management

Do not let dairy animals, either cows or heifers, graze fields where cotton poisons were used.

Do not feed dairy animals hay or silage harvested from crops where any of these chemicals were used: aldrin, BHC, chlordane, DDT, dieldrin, endrin, heptachlor, strobane or toxaphene.

If you buy grain, hay or forage, check to see that it originates from a clean source regarding insecticide use.

For lice control on dairy cattle, use only the recommended materials. These are 50 percent methoxychlor as a dust or 5 percent malathion as a dust. Or for spraying, use pyrethrins plus piperonyl butoxide or cyodrin.

Do not sell milk from mastitis-treated cows for 72 hours or six milkings after treatment.

Keep milk good. Keep it free from foreign matter. Good tasting, pure, safe and clean milk makes a mighty good drink!

Coastal Bermuda

Best stands of Coastal are had on land that is prepared early and rain settled.

Right now is a good time to make seedbeds for setting Coastal later in the winter or next spring. Prepare the land now, then disk now and then until time to plant. Use chemicals for getting rid of weeds on this land.

Although much winter - set Coastal was killed last year by the extremely cold weather, winter setting is still recommended, especially in the southern half of the state. Spring setting is excellent state-wide.

On old Coastal, where farmers do not want to dig sprigs, it is recommended that white clover be sown and fertilized with 80 pounds each of phosphate and potash per acre.

If you only have a partial stand on Coastal areas set last year, don't plow it up and plant to some other crop. Leave it and disk next spring, and if desired, set more Coastal. You'll be surprised at how fast Coastal will spread, even if the stand does look thin.

Safety Notes

Aspirin can cause more trouble than it cures if you leave it about the house within reach of small children.

An overdose of this seemingly mild drug kills more children than all other poisonous substances combined.

Never refer to flavored aspirins as candy or the like. Treat it as medicine. Keep all medicine locked out of reach of small children.

Health And Safety Tips About Leukemia

Leukemia has become one of the most dread words in the English language in recent decades. Leukemia — cancer of the blood manufacturing organs — is incurable, and it is increasing. It is usually thought of as a disease of children, but it affects even more adults.

Leukemia today still cannot be cured, but it can be attacked much more effectively and directly, says Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association.

With modern drug therapy, more than two-thirds of the acute attacks of leukemia now can be slowed down. The chances of giving many active and comfortable years to the sufferers have been greatly increased.

In addition to new drugs, physicians also sometimes use blood transfusions and x-ray therapy in treating leukemia. The best results usually are obtained in management of the acute phase of the disease in children. There has been relative little improvement in the over-all rate in adult patients.

Researchers are, of course, seeking other more effective methods of treatment for both the acute and chronic types of the disease. One line of investigation is replacement of the patient's diseased blood marrow with healthy marrow from a donor. This approach thus far has sharp limitations. There is no proof yet that marrow transplants will last.

Leukemia is not contagious like measles, but it has occurred in small "clusters" in various parts of the country. Eight cases were recorded in one relatively small suburban area near Chicago.

Researchers are cautiously optimistic in the outlook for finding the answer to leukemia. limited, but much has been learned about the disease and its course.

The life of a 52-year-old Alcorn County man, Murray Drewery of Corinth, was claimed Saturday afternoon near the Elks Club on Pickwick Lake in Tishomingo County. The drowning victim reportedly fell from a boat about 2 p.m.

Relatives said he was with two friends at the lake. He reportedly took a boat out on the lake by himself about 1 p.m., and it capsized shortly afterwards. Drewery hung on the boat, and was pulled under the water.

The body was found about 2:30 when the area was searched with drag lines. Aiding in the recovery of the body was State Highway Patrolmen, Sheriff Clarence Pace and his officers.

Mr. Drewery was the owner and operator of a motel and truck stop.

Survivors include his widow, two daughters, a sister, and two grandchildren.

\$49,000.00 Paid To Farmers

By Government During ASCS Program In County

E. N. Allen, ASCS Office Manager, announces that 603 Tishomingo county farmers have participated in the 1963 Agricultural Conservation Program. Government assistance to this group of farmers has amounted to approximately \$49,000.00, leaving only \$7,293.76 available funds yet to be used in the program.

Persons interested in carrying out some type conservation on their farm may receive assistance by doing one of the following: (1) Applying agricultural limestone on pasture or corn and cotton land; (2) Sowing a cover crop of oats, hairy vetch or AW peas; (3) Planting pine tree seedlings on gullied land; (4) Improving timber stand by deadening scrub hardwood where there is a stand of pine seedlings; (5) digging a stock pond; or (6) cutting ditches so that this land may be put into cultivation.

"If you are in need of places to store your corn and soybeans, then let your ASCS program buy you a storage bin," Mr. Allen says. The farmer pays 15% down on these bins, the balance to be paid in four equal installments, spread out over 5 years at a low rate of 4% interest.

Another service offered by the ASCS program is that of placing soybeans in the loan and getting price support. The price support rate for the 1963 crop of soybeans is \$2.24 per bushel.

Mr. Allen reminds all farmers to look over their needs and let the ASCS Program assist them.
