Disastrous Fire Destroys Businesses In Belmont

**Monday Blaze Burns Dollar
Store, Deaton Cotton Classing
Office And Automatic Washateria**
**Fire Depts. From Blue Bell, Red Bay and
Tishomingo Assist In Subduing Inferno**

It was Black Monday in Bel-
mont this week when three busi-
nesses in two buildings were
completely destroyed by fire.
Suffering total destruction were
the Belmont Dollar Store, own-
ed and operated by Vardon Par-
due; the Belmont Washateria,
owned by Ralph Bowen and J.
M. Page; and L. E. Deaton's
cotton classing office.

The cotton classing office
was situated in a frame build-

ing attached to the rear of the
Belmont Dollar Store which was
a masonry constructed building.
These buildings were owned by
L. E. Deaton. Other building
housing the Washateria was own-
ed by Mrs. Harry Manning.

The fire was discovered a-
bout 1 p.m., Monday, in the
frame cotton classing office,
and at the time of discovery,
was burning fiercely. The
flames spread into the dollar
store and on to the Washateria
building.

Fire departments from Red
Bay and Tishomingo answered
the call for help by the Bel-
mont fire department and with
excellent cooperation had the
fire under control within slight-
ly more than an hour. By 2:30,
all fire was completely out.

Other buildings and busi-
nesses damaged by the fire was
the Sparks Grocery & Market,
Griffin's Home and Auto Sup-
ply and the C & P Auto Supply
store. Others in the block that
were endangered were the War-
ren Piano House, Murphy Shoe
Shop and Hobson Tiffin Store.

Fire fighting equipment and
young men from the Belmont
Blue Bell plant were highly
praised for their wonderful
work in subduing the flames.
Belmont citizens express their
appreciation to Blue Bell and
to the fire departments from
Tishomingo and Red Bay for
their help and cooperation.

Cause of and how the fire
started is not known. Total
damage has been estimated up
to \$100,000.00.

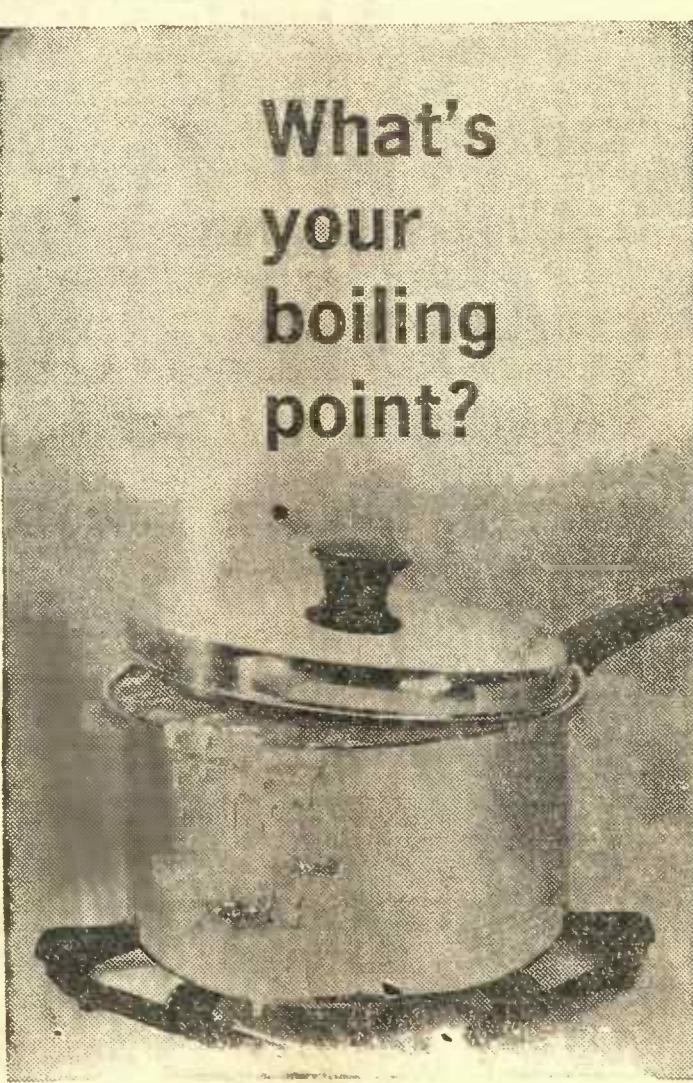

Sensing The News

Arrogant Foreign-Aiders
The refusal of the U. S. Senate to make deep cuts in the \$4.2 billion foreign aid authorization, let alone scrap the entire fantastic giveaway program, is a measure of how entrenched the "liberals" are in the upper house. On November 1 the Senate even refused to cut the authorization by the relatively small sum of \$385 million.

This senatorial indifference to waste should shock the American people. At the grassroots, there is mounting opposition to giveaways, but the message hasn't reached the Senate as yet. Indeed the general public would be shocked into much more vigorous outcry if it had all the evidence of foreign aid arrogance that is available.

One of the statements that Americans should be familiar with is that of Teodoro Moscoso, coordinator of the New Frontier's pet program—the Alliance For Progress. Mr. Moscoso recently told an AFL-CIO ad-

ience that the action of the House of Representatives in cutting foreign aid funds had "a bad psychological effect" in Latin America. "I think our image could be restored," he added, "if the Senate gives us back a substantial amount of the cut."

This certainly is one of the more outrageous comments to be made by a Kennedy administration official in recent months. Imagine the audacity of saying that our national "image" could be "restored" by dumping bigger sums of money in Latin America. In other words, U. S. will be pleasantly regarded so long as we hand over the bribes.

It is disgraceful that the United States, through the agency of the Kennedy administration, should be trying to win respect by buying smiles south of the border. Obviously, this is one of the biggest sucker games in history. Each year, the Latins and other foreign aid recipients can jack up the price of approving our "image." If more money isn't forthcoming, then the handout-grabbers can say that no one will respect Uncle Sam. In this situation, however, the image is of Uncle Sucker.

Not only are Kennedy administration officials proposing ways and means for exporting our national substance, but foreigners are coming to the USA to tell us what we should give and what should be our reasons for giving. Interference in the affairs of the United States seems to know no bounds these days.

Take the case of William Clark of the Overseas Development Institute in England. Mr. Clark recently spoke in Chicago at the ninth conference of the U. S. National Commission for UNESCO. His suggestion

was that foreign aid might be more successful if it were not "diverted by other objectives." He specified that the object of aid "should be to speed development, not to promote our trade, not to cement our alliances, not even to win the cold war."

That's a nice suggestion, isn't it? Imagine that: the United States is to give billions of dollars to faraway countries and completely ignore its own needs, namely its trade, alliances, and strategic interests. Certainly, the only possible justification for foreign aid is that it helps the winning of the cold war. If that isn't accepted as an aim, then there isn't one bit of validity behind the demands for foreign aid.

As a matter of fact, the Kennedy administration doesn't use foreign aid to help the struggle against communism. The New Frontier is so busy trying to give money and food to Yugoslavia, Egypt, Algeria and other pro-communist and neutralist nations that it doesn't even think about trying to halt the Red tide.

The tragic thing about the UNESCO conference is that no American spokesman, if the absence of news reports to this effect indicate the situation, stood up to tell off Mr. Clark. Apparently everyone who heard him thought it fine the U. S. taxpayers should give away billions each year simply because faraway nations want our money.

If one reads the foreign aid debates in Congress, one finds

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out that "liberals" believe that remote nations have a permanent claim on the American budget. We are, according to the New Frontiersmen, morally obligated to help every beggar nation make a go of it, no matter how much the beggar states of Afro-Asia and Latin America insult the American people and Republic.

It is time that Americans wake up, tear down the image of Uncle Sucker, and make Uncle Sam appear once again on the world scene as a symbol of a nation that is hard-headed, not soft-headed.

IN THE NEWS

Every few months Congress passes a bill which places a new and higher ceiling on the national debt. With the establishment of each new ceiling, Members sit back and entertain themselves in a shooting match. Oh, no, not at each other—at the debt ceiling.

With occupants of the White House providing cherry encouragement, the solons open their heavy artillery and shoot out the ceiling with booming shells. "Shootin' the ceiling" is just about the greatest sport under the Capitol Dome. All Members of Congress are eligible. No hunting license is required. There is no bag limit. And the season is always open.

For the second time this year—maybe the third, we cannot be sure as it happens so often—there has been a vote in the House of Representatives to raise the debt ceiling, "debt limit" some call it. As in similar instances last year, the year before, and the year before that, when the roll was called the "yays" outnumbered the "nays." So up goes the ceiling, up goes the spending and up goes inflation, too! Mind you now, this is spending over and above all sources of federal revenue.

Just a few months ago Congress passed a bill raising the debt ceiling to \$309-billion. Spending has been so out of control during this short period that President Kennedy asked the Congress to up the ceiling again, this time to \$315-billion. On last Thursday the House obliged. The Senate will undoubtedly do likewise.

So for the second time in a period of four months your nation's Congress and your Administration have put their stamp of approval on federal spending beyond federal income.

In keeping with this unsound fiscal policy, the House of Representatives voted about six weeks ago to reduce federal taxes, one of the prime objectives of the Kennedy Administration. But the tax reduction was not to be accompanied by a comparable reduction in spending.

It was evident that tons of pressure would be required to push the bill through the House. So, the efficient White House staff muscled enough thrust to get the job done. An assist was provided by the President himself when he gave a promise to spend less. Many Congressmen also promised to appropriate less.

The promises, however, were

short lived. Here we are already raising the debt ceiling preparatory to spending more, considerably more than the intake.

As we have often observed, there is nothing so ineffective as the so-called National Debt Limit. Time and again, under both Republican and Democratic Administrations, it has been raised, lifted, elevated, heightened or just completely shot from its mooring.

Of the scores of bills considered in Congress over the years to raise the ceiling, not one—no, not one—has been defeated.

As movable as a gypsy, the Statutory Ceiling is an ineffective method of controlling federal expenditures and the national debt. It is making no contribution whatever to sound fiscal policies. There is only one way to reestablish such a policy in Washington and that is for the President to provide the leadership and the Congress have the courage to limit federal expenditures to federal income. And a good place to start would be to kill off the pending federal pay raise bill which, among other raises, would fix the salaries of Supreme Court Judges (including Chief Justice Warren) at \$45,000; Cabinet Officers at \$35,000; Senators and Representatives at \$32,500; heads of Independent Agencies at \$28,000; and so on down the line. Estimated cost of the bill is \$1.8-billion every dime of which would have to be borrowed, then added to the national debt.

We are indeed a strong nation but we are not strong enough to withstand forever current spending practices of our federal government. There will be a day of reckoning.

Bulls Tested In Feedlots Prove Value As Sires

Bulls that gained well in feedlot performance tests produced better calves than non-tested bulls in extensive tests made by the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station.

J. C. Taylor, Mississippi State University animal husbandman, compared three performance tested bulls with three purebred bulls selected for type alone with no regard for gaining ability.

The bulls were mated to cows of similar age and genetic background. Calves were not creep fed. Cows were rotated from pasture to pasture during the grazing season to eliminate difference due to forage. These precautions were taken so that any difference in the performance of calves would be a direct reflection of the effect of the sires. The first five steers born in each bull unit were selected to be fattened in the feedlot.

At weaning, calves from the performance tested bulls had a daily gain advantage of .07 pound over the other and were 16 pounds heavier. In the feedlot, calves from tested bulls gained 34 pound per day faster than the other group and were 65 pounds heavier at the end of the feeding period.

When the steers were sold there was an average advantage

of \$29 per steer for those sired by tested bulls.

"Profits from beef cattle can be increased by selecting performance tested bulls that have superior gaining ability," Mr. Taylor said. "The fact that a bull has been performance tested does not always mean he will sire fast-gaining calves. The bull should be above average in his gaining ability before being considered as a herd sire. Also this does not mean that a non-tested bull will not sire fast gaining calves. The fact that there is no previous knowledge of the bull's gaining ability simply increases the gamble."

How long has it been since you had a booster shot of tetanus? Or did you have a series of shots needed to establish immunity to this disease?

Tetanus, formerly called lockjaw, is a completely preventable disease each year. It is caused by a bacterium that enters the body through a wound or a cut. All these deaths are preventable.

Read labels before you wash the garment and follow instructions. You may need to change your laundering methods. Just because a shirt is white and cotton, don't think you can use bleach in the water. Cotton with a resin finish has a new character, and often should not be bleached. Read the label.

Proper washing is a money-saver because the garment looks good longer. You must learn as much as possible about fibers and finishes of garments to insure full life of the article.

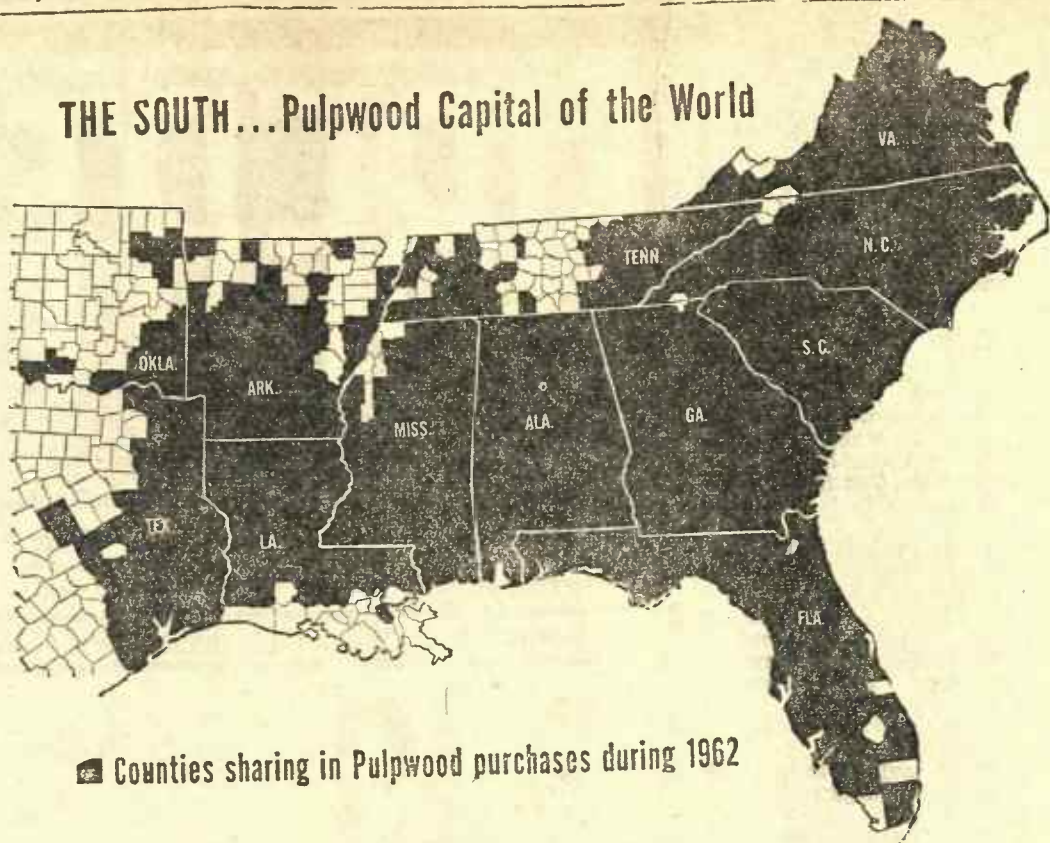
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THE SOUTH...Pulpwood Capital of the World

ATLANTA, GA.—Pulpwood, the raw material of the pulp and paper industry, was harvested in 90 per cent of the South's counties during 1962. On the accompanying map, prepared by the Southern Pulpwood Conservation Association, Atlanta, the blacked-out area covers those counties which shared in supplying \$500 million worth of wood to the South's pulp and paper mills. Pointing out that this indicates the extent of the pulp and paper industry's importance to communities throughout the region, SPCA General Manager H. J. Malsberger said also that the South produced 60 per cent of the nation's total harvest of pulpwood in 1962. "Production in this region," he added, "was greater than that of any single foreign country or of any area of comparable size in the world."

Feeder Pig Sale
What about feeder pig sales? What do they do? How do they contribute to the economic well-being of the state? First, they provide supplemental income for the producer of feeders. They give the producer a ready market for his pigs.

Then, the hog feeders have a dependable source of pigs that are inspected, vaccinated and sorted into uniform groups.

Mississippi's organized feeder pig sales are held each three months with from 500 to 1500 pigs in each sale. Locations of sales are Batesville, Booneville, Vicksburg, Laurel, McComb, Magee and Poplarville, Mississippi.

Soil Testing
The first step in deciding how you are going to spend your fertilizer dollars is to have a soil test. And now is the time to take soil samples!

By sampling now you avoid the January to March rush season and will get back recommendations in a minimum of time. Recommended lime should be put out in the fall and early winter while soil will hold up spreading equipment. Be sure to take a good sample.

ple. Divide your fields into uniform areas. If there are noticeable differences in soil color, soil texture, slope, degree of erosion, past history of lime and fertilizer treatments, sample these areas separately!

After the fields have been divided into uniform areas, take a sample from each. Take enough samples or sub-samples to adequately represent the area. . . . this means around three or four sub-samples per acre. Put the sub-sample into a clean pail; mix them thoroughly and fill soil sample box to send to soil testing laboratory.

When sampling an area, avoid unusual areas in the field like badly eroded spots, depressions, roadways, old fence rows and old hay stack sites. Sample these separately.

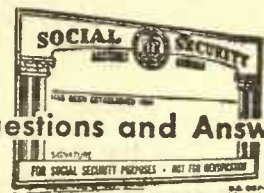
Sod Seeding
Now is an ideal time to sod seed clovers into heavy sods. It is also a good time to sod seed ryegrass and wheat.

When sod seeding, be sure to put down the regular rate of fertilizer. Failure to use adequate fertilizer is the reason for failure of many sod seeded areas.

Sod seeding will help greatly also in replacing broomsedge with good grass and clover. But remember, if land needs phosphate and potash, applying these materials is just as necessary as applying nitrogen on winter grazing.

Questions and Answers

Q—I intend to move to another State in the next few months. When should I report my change of address?

A—To avoid any delay in the receipt of your social security checks, notify the social security office before the middle of the month in which you expect to move, so your check will arrive on time next month at your new address. Be sure to notify the post office of your change of address also, so your check can be forwarded if your new address did not reach us in time.

Q—Is it true that disabled people who put in for social security get help in finding another job?

A—When you put in your claim for disability payments, we give your name to the State Vocational Rehabilitation folks. If there is any way they can help you train for another job, they will do so.

Q—I will be 65 January 31, 1964. Can I get a check for January? Can I find out how much I'll get now?

A—Yes, you can get paid for January if you have worked long enough. Since benefits can be paid anytime after 62, you should check with us to be sure you are not losing money for this year. We are always glad to give payment estimates at any time.

Health Facts About Diabetes

Almost everyone knows something about diabetes. And a lot of what we think we know isn't true.

The experts have estimated that there are more than 1,600,000 known diabetics in the United States, and that there are about 1,400,000 more Americans who have diabetes and don't know it. These figures are plus untold hundreds of thousands more who may develop diabetes if they don't follow a balanced diet, keep their weight down and have periodic physical examinations by their doctors to detect early changes in how their bodies use sugar.

What is diabetes? It is a disorder in which the body cannot make full use of some of the foods we eat—mainly the carbohydrates, or sugars and starches. The pancreas, a large gland lying behind the stomach, does not make available enough insulin to turn these foods into energy or to store them for future use.

Diabetes can be controlled by planned diet, exercises and, in

many cases, insulin or oral medication. Well-controlled by planned diet, exercises and, in many cases, insulin or oral medication. Well-controlled diabetes can lead active and useful lives.

Most likely candidates for diabetes are overweight persons past the age of 40, particularly those who are related to diabetics, and especially older women. But diabetes can hit anyone at any age.

Symptoms include increase in thirst, constant hunger, frequent urination, loss of weight, itching, easy tiring, changes in vision and slow healing of cuts and scratches.

To encourage Americans to find out whether they have diabetes, the week of Nov. 17-23 has been named Diabetes Week. To find out whether you have diabetes, visit your doctor and

ask to be given a test. Many communities will have special detection programs during the week. Call your county medical society or diabetes organization for information.

Q—I am a widow. My two children and I receive monthly social security benefits. My 17-year-old daughter will be married on October 20 of this year. When will her benefits end?

The Iuka Chapter of the Future Business Leaders of America met Friday, November 8. The purpose of the meeting was to elect officers for the year.

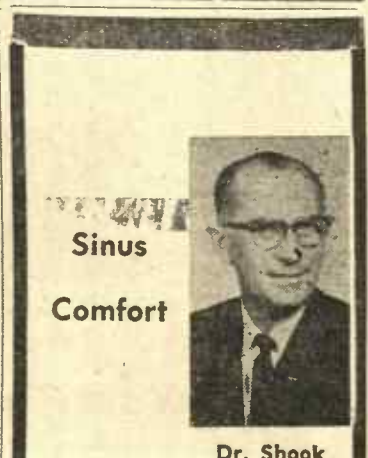
