The newly-elected Chief states that the volunteer workers are in the process of raising funds to purchase new equipment by giving chances on a shotgun for each \$1.00 donation. New fire hose and nozzles have been ordered and two fire masks, equipped with air tanks, were recently purchased to enable the firemen to enter smoke-filled buildings.

Cotton Ginnings In County Show 57% Increase

Cotton ginnings in Tishomingo County this year showed an increase of 57% over last year. According to a report issued by the U. S. Department of Commerce, a total of 3,459 bales were ginned in 1963 compared to 5,386 in 1962.

The tabulation of individual reports from ginneries of cotton shows there were 10,064,632 bales of cotton ginned in the United States through October 31, from the crop of 1963. Cotton ginned this year in Alcorn County was 13,478 bales, compared to 8,629 last year. In Itawamba County, 7,247 bales were ginned this year in comparison to 4,848 in 1962. Prentiss County showed a large increase over last year's ginnings, by reporting a total of 17,416 bales in comparison to 12,144 last year.

Increases were also reported in Colbert and Franklin counties. Ala. 19,934 bales were ginned this year in Colbert County compared to 16,194 last year. A total of 11,448 bales were ginned in Franklin County in comparison with 7,354 in 1962.

Conalco Official Speaks

Before Lions And
Rotary Clubs, Gives
History Of Firm

G. Thomas Smith, general personnel manager of the Consolidated Aluminum Corporation, was guest speaker before the Iuka Lions club Monday night and the Iuka Rotary club Wednesday at noon.

Mr. Smith, whose company is building a new foil laminating plant in Iuka, gave a short history of his firm and stated that they were extremely pleased with their decision to come to Tishomingo county.

Consolidated Aluminum Corporation started its first plant in Jackson, Tennessee, in 1950. "At that time," he said, "assets of the company was only a very few million dollars. However, today, the firm counts its assets in the multi-millions."

The Jackson, Tennessee, plant started with 80 employees in 1950 with a payroll of \$346,000.00. Today, the speaker said, the company has 650 employees with an annual payroll of \$4,200,000.00. Where the Jackson plant started out with 80 people, it now employs 475.

Consolidated Aluminum Corporation operates a plant in Elizabeth, New Jersey, and just recently opened a new plant at New Johnsonville, Tennessee.

Mr. Smith emphasized the fact that his company employs only local male people with the exception of key managerial personnel which is held to an absolute minimum. Mr. Smith further stated that his company was a firm believer in the individual and gave all employees an opportunity to advance and grow with the company.

To illustrate his company's interest in individuals with initiative, Mr. Smith used the Jackson, Tennessee, plant as an example. He said that 11 of the major administrative and technical department heads have advanced through the various stages of growth and promotion. Thirty-one of the 32 production foremen in the Jackson plant have been promoted from the ranks of the hourly paid employees, and two production superintendents and the maintenance superintendent have been promoted from hourly paid jobs.

Mr. Smith further stated that Consolidated Aluminum Corporation believed in joint community efforts for the betterment of educational, social, religious and economic conditions in the areas where they operate plants.

In commenting on the new Tishomingo county plant, Mr. Smith said that the probable expansions in the future will naturally bring about higher employment.

Civic Leaders In Three Districts Cooperating To Bring More Jobs

\$150 Will Be Given Away To 3 Lucky Voters

At a meeting Friday night in the Tishomingo County Electric Power office, plans were made to get as many voters as possible out to the polls for the industrial bond election that will be held on Tuesday, December 3. The election will be held at all voting precincts in the first three Supervisor's districts.

At stake is a \$750,000.00 industry that will employ all male labor. A bond issue in the amount of \$150,000.00 is to be voted on, this amount of money to be used to construct a building that will house a plant for

the Consolidated Aluminum Corporation. Community and civic leaders from the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd districts met with the Iuka Chamber of Commerce and presidents of RCDC clubs in the area.

As an inducement to voters to go to the polls and to encourage a better turnout, \$150.00 will be given in each district.

All that will be necessary to become eligible to win \$50.00 is to go to the polls and vote. While the voter is at the polls he or she will be given an opportunity to register for the prize money. When the polls close, all registration cards for each district will be collected at one central point in that district for the drawing. Any person properly registered will not have to be present to win.

Drawing for the \$50.00 prize in the First district will be held at the mayor's office in Iuka. All the registration cards at all the voting precincts in that district will be put in one box and the lucky winner will be drawn from that box. All persons who vote in the bond election in the First District and register at their voting precinct will have their cards in the same box for the drawing.

Drawing for the \$50.00 prize in the Second District will be held at the mayor's office in Burnsville. All registration cards at all the voting precincts in that district will be put in one box and the lucky winner will be drawn from that box. All persons who vote in the bond election in the Second District and register at their voting precinct will have their cards in the same box for the drawing.

Drawing for the \$50.00 in the Third district will be held at the Midway school. All the registration cards at all the voting precincts in that district will be put in one box and the lucky winner will be drawn from that box. All persons who vote in the bond election in the Third district and register at their voting precinct will have their cards in the same box for the drawing.

High enthusiasm was expressed at Friday night's meeting over acquiring a fine company such as the Consolidated Aluminum Corporation. It was pointed out that the \$150,000 bond issue is only a small portion of the total investment that will go into the plant which will be financed by the company. Also, it was pointed out that there will be no increase in taxes to repay the bonds since the Tishomingo county Board of Supervisors has an agreement with the Consolidated Aluminum Corporation whereby the company will pay rent, or lease money, in an amount sufficient to repay the bonds.

"All qualified voters in the First, Second and Third Districts should realize the wonderful opportunity they have to bring more industry and more jobs to our area and with this realization they should make every effort to go to the polls and vote. We urge all who can to plan now to go to the polls on Tuesday, December 3, and vote for more jobs for men," one speaker said.

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A RESOLUTION

The Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three of said County, took up for further consideration the matter of entering upon further industrial development for said Districts, and after a discussion of the subject, Supervisor H. M. Biggs offered and moved the adoption of the following resolution:

RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI, ACTING FOR AND ON BEHALF OF SUPERVISORS' DISTRICTS NOS. ONE, TWO AND THREE OF SAID COUNTY, TO ENTER UPON FURTHER INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT: TO ISSUE BONDS OF SAID SUPERVISORS' DISTRICTS NOS. ONE, TWO AND THREE IN THE AMOUNT OF ONE HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$150,000) FOR SAID PURPOSE; AND DIRECTING THE CALLING AND HOLDING OF AN ELECTION TO DETERMINE WHETHER OR NOT SAID DISTRICTS SHALL ENTER UPON SUCH INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AND ISSUE BONDS IN THE AMOUNT FOR THE PURPOSE AFORESAID.

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three of said County, finds and adjudicates that, under the Laws of the State of Mississippi, and particularly under the provisions of Chapter 241, Laws of Mississippi of 1944, as amended, the said Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three of said County, subject to the grant of permission and authority by and from the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board, and subject further to the approval of the proposition by the qualified electors of said Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three at an election held for that purpose, has the lawful power to issue the bonds of said Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three for the purpose of constructing a Factory Building 200 feet long and 60 feet wide, suitable for expansion owned by the said Districts; provided that the amount of such bonds issued by said Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three shall not exceed twenty per centum (20%) of the assessed value of all taxable property within said Districts; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three of said County has heretofore made application to the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board for a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity, as provided in the aforesaid Chapter 241, Laws of Mississippi of 1944, as amended and other applicable statutes in such cases made and provided; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three of said County, does now affirmatively find and adjudicate that all of the findings of fact as set forth in the aforesaid Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity are true and correct, and that it will be in the best interest of said Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three to provide for the constructing of a factory building 200 feet long and 60 feet wide suitable for expansion owned by the said Districts, and described in the aforesaid Certificate, and to issue the bonds of said Supervisors' Districts in the amount of One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000) for that purpose;

WHEREAS, Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three have heretofore issued bonds under the provisions of the aforesaid Chapter 241, Laws of Mississippi of 1944, as amended, of which Four Hundred and Ninety-Four Thousand Eight Hundred and Seventy-Five (\$494,875.00) Dollars now remain outstanding and unpaid; and

WHEREAS, the assessed valuation of all taxable property within said Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, as ascertained by the last completed assessment, is Three Million, Eight Hundred Three Thousand, Seven Hundred Seventy Eight dollars (\$3,803,778.00), and the amount of bonds hereinafter proposed to be issued by the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisors' Districts One, Two and Three of said County, when added to the aforesaid outstanding bonds, will not exceed twenty per centum (20%) of said assessed valuation; and

WHEREAS, Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, include the Town of Iuka, which has a population of more

than five hundred (500), as well as territory outside the corporate limits of the town of Iuka, and the proposed enterprise is located within one (1) mile of the corporate limits of said town of Iuka;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI, ACTING FOR AND ON BEHALF OF SUPERVISORS' DISTRICTS NOS. ONE, TWO AND THREE OF SAID COUNTY, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. THAT all of the findings of fact made and set forth in the preamble to this resolution shall be and the same are hereby declared to be true and correct.

SECTION 2. That it is hereby declared to be the intention of the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three of said County, to issue the bonds of said Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three in the principal amount of One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000) for the purpose of constructing a factory building 200 feet long and 60 feet wide, suitable for expansion owned by said Districts, as described and set forth in Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity No. 436 issued by the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board on the 7th day of November 1963.

SECTION 3. That a special election shall be and the same is hereby called and ordered to be held within said Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, on 3rd day of December, 1963, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of said Districts the proposition set forth in the form of notice of election as contained in Section 5 of this resolution.

The qualified electors voting at the aforesaid election and residing outside the corporate limits of the Town of Iuka shall vote separately from those residing within the town of Iuka, and the officers holding the election shall make separate returns of the results of the vote of those residing within the Town of Iuka and those residing outside the Town of Iuka.

SECTION 4. That the said special election shall be held at the polling places designated and set forth in the form of notice of election as contained in Section 5 of this resolution. The polling places for said election shall be opened at seven o'clock in the morning and shall be kept open until the hour of six o'clock in the evening on the aforesaid date, and all qualified electors of said Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three will be entitled to vote in said election. All qualified electors voting in said election shall vote at their usual voting precincts. The proposition submitted at said election shall be deemed to have been assented to, provided that the total number of votes cast on said proposition within the Town of Iuka shall be at least a majority of the total number of qualified electors residing within said town and provided, further, that at least two-thirds of those voting on said proposition shall vote in favor thereof, and provided that the total number of votes cast on said proposition by those residing within said Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three outside the Town of Iuka shall be at least a majority of the total number of qualified electors residing in said Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three and provided, further, that at least two-thirds of those voting on said proposition shall vote in favor thereof.

SECTION 5. That the Clerk of the Board shall cause notice of said election to be published once a week for at least three (3) consecutive weeks in The Vidette, a newspaper published in the Town of Iuka and qualified under Chapter 427, Laws of Mississippi of 1948. The first publication of said notice shall be made not less than twenty-one (21) days prior to the date fixed for said election and the last publication shall be made not more than seven (7) days prior to said date. Said notice shall be in substantially the following form, to-wit:

NOTICE OF BOND ELECTION SUPERVISORS' DISTRICTS NOS. ONE, TWO AND THREE, TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI
NOTICE is hereby given to the qualified electors of Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, that a special election will be held in said Districts on Tuesday the 3rd day of December 1963, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of said Districts the following proposition, to-wit:

PROPOSITION
Shall bonds of Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, be issued in the amount of One Hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000) to provide funds for the purpose

of constructing a factory building suitable for expansion owned by said Districts, as authorized by Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity No. 436, issued to said Supervisors' Districts by the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board on the 7th day of November 1963.

The said election will be held at the following polling places within said Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, to-wit:

ORDER OF THE MISSISSIPPI AGRICULTURAL AND INDUSTRIAL BOARD DIRECTING ISSUANCE TO SUPERVISORS' DISTRICTS NOS. ONE, TWO AND THREE, TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI, OF A CERTIFICATE OF PUBLIC CONVENIENCE AND NECESSITY, INVOLVING FULL FAITH AND CREDIT BONDS.

WHEREAS, on the 1st day of November, 1963, the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, filed with this Board its resolution dated the 21st day of October, 1963, recorded at Book 19, page 342 of the minutes of the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, praying the issuance of a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity authorizing the acquisition of an industrial enterprise, including a factory for the manufacturing, processing or assembling of aluminum products, and in order to finance the same, the issuance by the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three of full faith and credit bonds of said Districts in a principal amount not to exceed one hundred fifty thousand (\$150,000) dollars, as authorized by Chapter 2 of Title 33 of the Mississippi Code of 1942, as amended; and

WHEREAS, this Board has heard and taken oral and documentary evidence and has made due and full investigation of all matters in connection with said resolution and request, said Board does now find and determine:

(1) That there are sufficient natural resources readily and economically available for the operation of the aforesaid enterprise for at least twenty (20) years, but in no event less than the period of time for which any bonds will be issued, for acquiring or constructing said enterprise;

(2) That there is available within the area in a radius of twenty-five (25) miles from the site of the proposed industrial enterprise in Tishomingo County, Mississippi a labor supply sufficient to furnish at least one and one-half (1 1/2) workers between the ages of eighteen and fifty for each operative job in said enterprise;

(3) That there are adequate property values in said Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi and that the financial condition of said Supervisor's Districts is suitable so that the total bonded indebtedness of these Supervisor's Districts, solely for the purposes authorized by Chapter 2 of Title 33 of the Mississippi Code of 1942, as amended, including the full faith and credit bonds proposed to be issued as aforesaid shall not exceed twenty (20) per cent of the total assessed valuation of all property in said Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, all as shown by a current financial statement of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, duly certified by the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of said County and attached to said resolution.

CERTIFICATE OF PUBLIC CONVENIENCE AND NECESSITY

Authorizing the said Board of Supervisors, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, to acquire, to own, to let, to lease, or to rent, all subject to the limitations hereinafter set out, the industrial enterprise described above.

The Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board, acting pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 241, Laws of Mississippi of 1944, as amended, does hereby fix and determine that the rights, powers, and duties conferred by this Certificate shall be exercised in the manner hereinafter set out and subject to the provisions, restrictions, and limitations hereinafter set out.

HEREBY, said Board of Supervisors, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, is authorized and empowered:

(1) To enter upon an industrial enterprise for the manufacturing, processing or assembling of aluminum products, and in order to do so to call and hold the election provided in Chapter 2, Title 33 of the Mississippi Code of 1942, as amended, and upon a favorable vote thereof to issue its full faith and credit industrial bonds pursuant to the provisions of said Chapter 2, Title 33 of Mississippi Code of 1942, as amended, in a principal amount of not to exceed one hundred fifty thousand (\$150,000) dollars.

(2) To acquire for, or as, said enterprise a factory building containing sufficient square feet of floor space to meet the needs of such industrial enterprise and to expend therefor a sum not to exceed one hundred fifty thousand (\$150,000) dollars, including the land on which said building is to be located and all necessary plumbing, heating, air-conditioning and necessary fixtures for said building and said enterprise, but no part of said amount shall be expended for machinery or equipment to be installed for use in the operation of the industry to be located in such building.

(3) To own said property; and to let, lease, or rent said property to a person, firm or corporation for the operation of a factory for the manufacturing, processing, or assembling of aluminum products in strict compliance with the provisions of Chapter 2, Title 33 of the Mississippi Code of 1942, as amended;

(4) To expend, in order to acquire said property and said enterprise, such sums out of the proceeds of said bonds as may be required in order to

perform the obligations assumed by said Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, under the terms of a valid contract entered into by said Supervisor's Districts with any person, firm or corporation providing for the acquisition of such industrial enterprise and approved by this Board;

(5) To operate said industrial enterprise by leasing same under the terms of the contract referred to in Paragraph four (4) above and such lease as may be executed pursuant to such terms.

(a) That no part of the proceeds from the sale of the bonds authorized by this Certificate shall be used for the purchase of machinery or equipment to be installed in said building for use in the operation of the industry to be located therein. The proceeds from the sale of said bonds shall be used fully for the purchase of land, necessary improvements thereto, construction and purchasing of a factory building, together with all usual and necessary fixtures and services as set out in Paragraph two (2) above.

(b) That no bonds shall be issued by said Board of Supervisors pursuant hereto until said Board of Supervisors, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts, shall have entered into a valid contract with a person, firm or corporation providing for the acquisition of such property as an industrial enterprise by said Supervisor's Districts and the lease thereof to, and operation thereof by, said person, firm or corporation providing for payment as rent by such person, firm or corporation, as lessee, of the entire principal of and interest upon such bonds;

(c) The bonds herein authorized to be issued shall mature over a period of time not to exceed twenty (20) years with not less than one-fifth (1/5) maturing in each year during the first five (5) years of the life of said bonds, not less than one-twenty-fifth (1/25) in each year during the next succeeding ten (10) years of the life of said bonds and the remainder in approximately equal payments each year during the remaining life of said bonds;

(d) That for the payment of said bonds as and when issued and interest thereon, and for the creation of a sinking fund for the payment of said bonds and interest, the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi shall annually levy and collect taxes upon all non-exempt taxable property within said Supervisor's Districts in the amount of not less than the amount of principal and interest due during each year, and shall fix an annual tax levy over said period of years for which said bonds are issued so that said tax levy shall be substantially uniform throughout said period; and to further secure the payment of said bonds the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi may in its discretion pledge any and all income derived from said property, and to the extent that such income may be sufficient to provide for the payment of principal of and interest on said bonds, the annual tax levy above referred to may be correspondingly reduced.

(e) That said Supervisor's Districts may lease, let or rent said industrial enterprise but shall never operate same unless specifically authorized by this Board so to do.

(f) That said Board of Supervisors, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, shall in every respect in the exercise of the authority and powers hereby granted conform to and

comply with the provisions of Chapter 2, Title 33 of the Mississippi Code of 1942.

(g) That this Certificate shall expire on the 6th day of November, 1964, unless said Supervisor's Districts of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, thereto, proceed to authority and be granted.

Blood Sugar Screening Tests Being Processed By County Health Depts.

Diabetes is a serious health problem in Mississippi, Dr. A. L. Gray, State Health Officer, said on the eve of Diabetes Week, November 17-23.

He said there are approximately 40,000 diabetics in the state.

"Unfortunately about one-half of these 40,000 diabetics are unaware that they have the disease and are not under physical care, which is so necessary."

In Mississippi, Dr. Gray said that diabetes is the eighth leading cause of death. Moreover, it is the third leading cause of blindness.

"While there is no absolute cure for diabetes, it can be controlled and diabetics can lead fairly normal lives if the disease is detected early enough," the state health officer stated.

In order to find the undetected diabetics, the State Board of Health is carrying on a year-round case-finding and educational program.

Blood sugar screening tests are now being processed at the rate of about 2,800 monthly in the Public Health Laboratory at the State Board of Health.

This screening test is available to any citizen at any county health department in the state, Dr. Gray said. The blood sample is sent to the laboratory in Jackson, and when it shows a higher-than-normal blood sugar level, the person is referred to his private physician for further examination.

Mass diabetes blood-testing programs have been put on by public health workers at statewide meetings, at fairs, in industrial plants and in Home Demonstration Clubs.

Within the past six months, Dr. Gray said that more than 300 diabetics suspects have been found in the screening programs and referred to private physicians and about 100 previously undiagnosed diabetics were found.

The Blood Relative Project, in cooperation with the University Medical Center Diabetes Clinic, was recently initiated as part of the State Board of Health's case-finding program. In this project diabetic patients are interviewed for the names of their parents and any children, brothers or sisters. These relatives are then contacted and offered a screening test for diabetes through the local

Dr. Gray said that people of any age, sex or race may develop diabetes, but that most diabetics fall in one or more of four high risk groups:

—over 40 years of age and overweight

—blood relatives of diabetics

—people suffering from other chronic illness such as tuberculosis

—mothers of babies weighing over 9 pounds at birth

"Mississippians in one of these high risk groups should take a test every six months to keep from being an undetected diabetic," Dr. Gray stated.

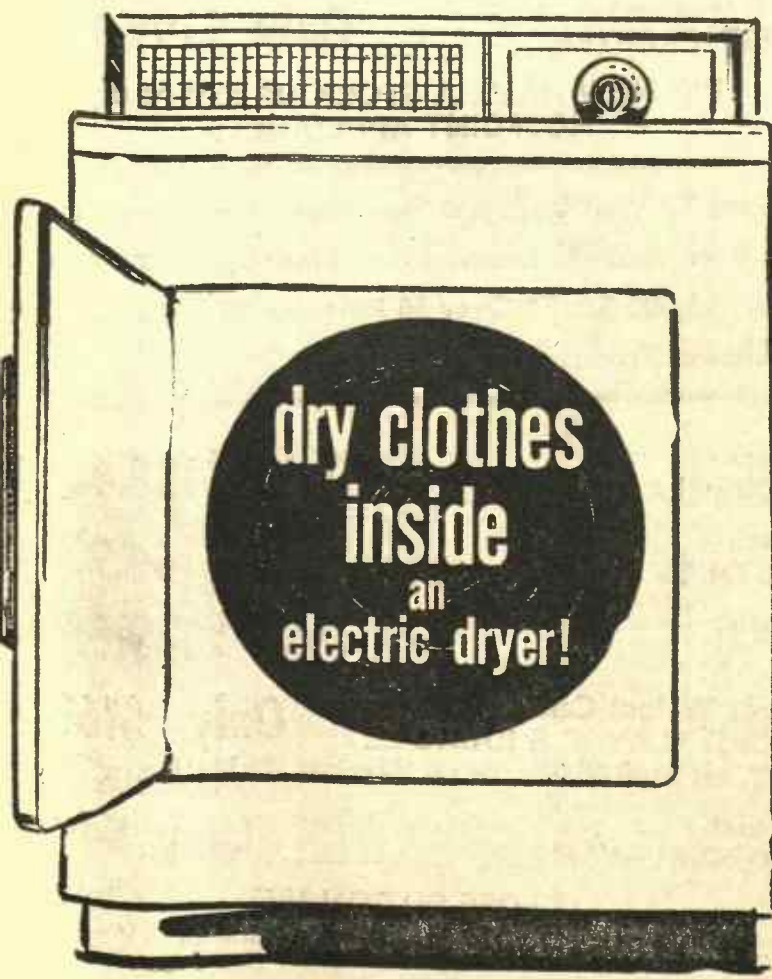

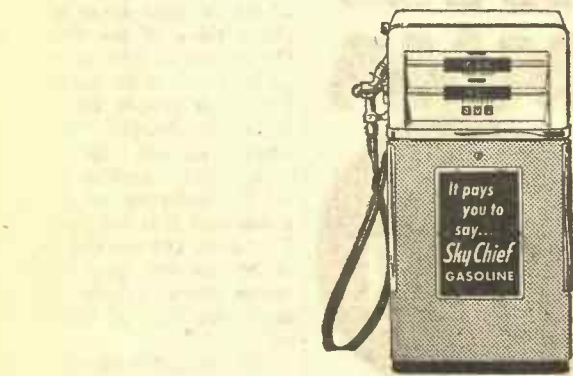

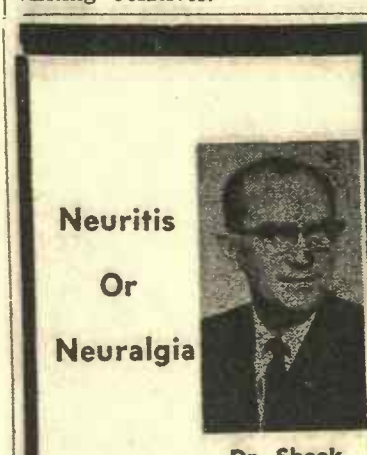
