County, District Officials Will Assume Duties Jan. 6

22 Men will Take Oaths; Only Few New Names Appear In List

Monday, January 6, 1964, will be an important day for all recently elected county and district officials. On that day, officials who were elected in the 1963 election will assume their various duties. Twenty-two county officials got by the deadline without opponents and will continue their duties as before. Those elected without opposition were Harry Finch, County Prosecutor, Attorney, and L. S. Honeycutt, surveyor. Others taking county posts were elected either in the first or second primaries.

James H. Bishop will take over the reins as county sheriff on the first Monday. Mr. Bishop won his office over a field of 3 opponents in the First Primary. He will succeed Clarence Pace. Remaining in the County Clerk's job is Robert D. Sims. Mr. Sims won also in the First Primary over his lone opponent, Alver Belue. Also being reelected was L. E. (Gene) Robinson who will stay in the Circuit clerk's job. Gene was victorious over three women opponents, one of them, Mrs. Arh Ivy, was his opponent in the Second Primary. Remaining at the helm in the county school system is Julian R. Long who defeated his only opponent, Marrell Hatcher.

In the First District, Herbert M. Biggs will remain as Supervisor and Bob Waters will go back as constable. However, there will be a new Justice of the Peace, C. D. (Doan) Davis will fill the job now held by L. Parker. Mr. Parker did not run.

In the Second District, Russell Bonds will continue as supervisor and John W. Bonds will continue as Justice of the Peace. New constable will be Ben F. Case.

In the Third District, A. C. Ryan will succeed O. L. Wade to the job of supervisor. Mr. Ryan has been president of the Board for the term just ending. Mr. Ryan was elected over a full slate of candidates for supervisor of that district. Bill Ryan will go in as Justice of the Peace while Raymond P. Turner goes in as constable.

Retail advertising in newspapers is testimony that Christmas shopping involves little waste. Clothing, household appliances, foods, automobiles, home accessories, and recreation equipment are the most widely advertised goods.

If there is any "waste" in Christmas spending it must be accorded to the expenditures for ornaments and children's toys. But neither children nor those who enjoy a respite of gaiety consider such costs a waste.

Is beauty and the happiness of children materialistic commercialization?

Since the dawn of history religious holidays have been observed by a brief flaunting of material wealth.

In our economy of overabundance and under-consumption, whines of "commercialization" seem grossly inappropriate.

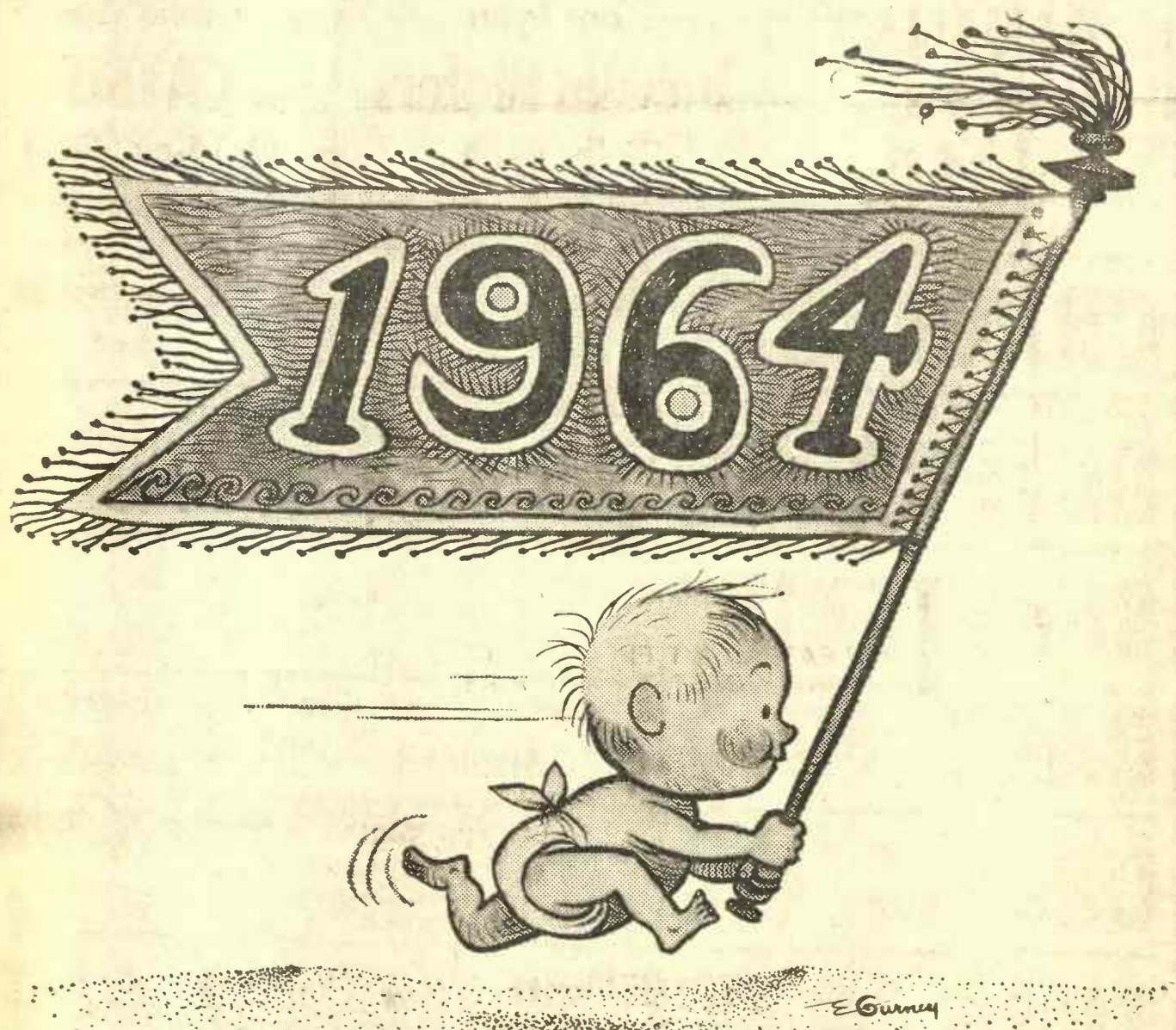
