State's Top Leaders Say Mississippi Has The Foundation For Prosperity

Dr. Ronald E. Carrier, head of the Bureau of Business Research in the School of Business Administration at Memphis State University says Mississippi has experienced a "minor revolution since 1940." This statement was made at the first conference on Mississippi's economic growth and prospects held recently in Jackson.

In further commenting on the state's progress, Dr. Carrier said, "The new and expanded industrial and commercial development in the future will add to the population, to the labor force, to spending and to a higher standard of living. The state's economy has a firm foundation on which to prosper."

"Complementing this economic progress is a resource which will make Mississippi even more attractive to industrial and commercial development—water for consumption by industry and people and water which connects Mississippi with a large number of domestic and foreign markets," he stated.

Dr. Carrier said the state's economy has made the transition and has balanced agriculture with industry to place Mississippi "on the threshold of reaping the benefits of an accelerated growth."

"Per capita income growth has, in the past, been associated with loss of population but for the first time it is associated with growth in population,"

he said. "Mississippi is now experiencing an accelerated growth from a balanced economy and is ready to reap the benefits of an economic progress started 20 years ago."

Stating that the prospects for 1964 are good, he said personal income should rise from 3.1 billion dollars to 3.4 billion dollars and per capita personal income increase from \$1,373 in 1963 to \$1,495 in 1964—57 per cent of the United States average.

At the conference on Mississippi's growth and prospects, Gov.-Elect Paul B. Johnson said, "We must be on the offensive because we will not get anywhere if we sit down and hold our hands. Two of our key problems are the need for technically trained personnel for industry and immediate and expanded research."

Mr. Johnson, who takes office January 21, said he will present the Legislature a program "designed to continue the progress and prosperity of our state and lead it to an even greater plateau of agricultural, industrial and commercial growth."

Circuit Court In Session; 10 True Bills Returned

Grand Jury Inspects Buildings, Recommends Remodeling Court Room, Installation Of Fire Escapes

OFFICIALS SWORN IN

The January 1964 term of Circuit Court got underway Monday morning with a greater part of the first period being devoted to the swearing in of elected officials of the county and county districts. Most of the oaths were given by Circuit Judge N. S. Sweat who is presiding over the court.

After the selection of veniremen, T. E. McAnally was appointed foreman of the Grand Jury by Judge Sweat. M. H. Castleberry offered the invocation at the beginning of the session.

Grand Jury for this term was

composed of O. V. Johnson, M. C. Robinson, M. H. Castleberry, R. P. Mullins, Clester Robinson, A. B. Wood, Kermit Brumley, Stacy Cox, Roscoe Dick, W. P. Cornelius, J. W. Nunley, Homer Meeks, Raymond Ginn, R. W. Nunley, and Clyde Bennett.

During a two-day session, the Grand Jury examined witnesses, inspected public buildings and county offices. From the witnesses examined, the Grand Jury returned to open court 10 true bills. The charges included armed robbery, murder, burglary and larceny, public drunkenness, drunk driving and other felonies.

Among other actions of the Grand Jury was a recommendation that the courtroom in the county courthouse be remodeled or repaired so as to improve the acoustics and appearance. It also recommended that that portion of the building be required and adequate fire escapes be installed to the second floor.

Text of the report given by the Grand Jury follows:

"Now comes your grand jury for the January 1964 term of Circuit Court of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, and begs leave to submit its final report."

"We have been in session two days, have examined 14 witnesses, and have returned into open court 10 true bills."

"We have examined by committee the county home, county jail, all the factories of the county, the movie theater, the hotel of more than two stories, the tax collector's books and the county auditor's books."

"We find the county home to be in good condition and its inmates properly provided for and looked after, except that there is a need for a new range."

"We find the county jail to be in good condition, and the prisoners properly supervised."

"We find all the factories of the county to be in good, safe condition, equipped properly with exit doors opening outwardly as required by law and properly marked."

"The grand jury recommends that the court room in the county courthouse be remodeled or repaired in such manner as to improve the acoustics and appearance thereof and to further rewire, according to common electrical codes, that portion of said courthouse. The grand jury also recommends that adequate fire proof fire escapes be installed for the second floor of the courthouse."

"We find that the tax collector's books and the county auditor's books appear to be neat, well-kept and in balance."

"We find that the hotel is in safe condition."

"And now, having concluded our labors, we respectfully request to be finally discharged."

The report was signed by T. E. McAnally, foreman of the Grand Jury.

A number of cases have been docketed for the remainder of the week, among them being: The State vs. Vester Lee Brown, set for today (Thursday). Brown is accused of robbing and beating M. D. Wilhite at Burnsville early last year. Floyd Wells, Jr., was sentenced in the August term of court to 30 days in the penitentiary in this same case. Wells pled guilty. Brown's plea is not guilty.

The case of the State vs. Nellie Sue Jourdan is scheduled to begin Monday. Mrs. Jourdan is accused of shooting her husband, Bonnie Jourdan, to death on April 2, 1963. She has entered a plea of not guilty.

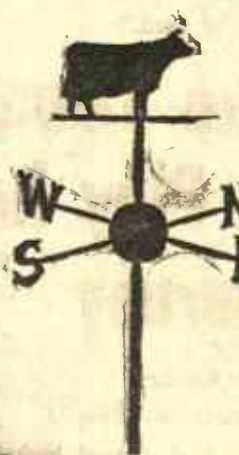

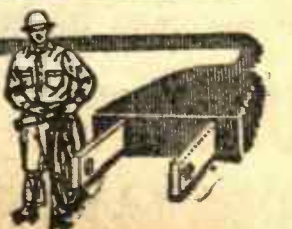

Do Better Job Of Soil And Water Conservation

The best resolution any landowner can make is to conserve his soil. The practices he will apply to his land to conserve it will also conserve the water that falls on it.

Soil and water are basic requirements for a prosperous rural community. The better the soil the more efficiently water is used, the more prosperous will be the community.

Soil conservation district co-operators who have farm plans will be wise if they review these plans. If they still meet the needs and objectives of the landowner, well and good. If they do not, they should be revised and brought up to date. This can be done and more land taken out of row crops and put into pastures, permanent hay or to trees.

The resolution to conserve your soil is a good one. We, the Soil Conservation personnel, want to help you make this resolution a reality in 1964.

Prevention Of Frostbite Is Very Important

Frostbite is an ever present danger in winter in much of the nation. It can be a serious injury.

First signs of frostbite are "pins and needles" prickly feeling and then numbness, says Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association. The affected part will turn white or gray, and later red.

Frostbite can be very painful for a long period, can result in amputations and leave the victim hypersensitive to cold for the rest of his life. In some ways the damage is similar to a burn.

Prevention is the best protection against frostbite. Dress properly in warm clothing, waterproof shoes and heavy dry socks. Cover face and ears. Keep clothing dry from outside moisture and from perspiration. Avoid tight clothing or garters that may restrict circulation.

Motorists should carry heavy clothing and shoes in the car. It might be necessary to hike to a garage for assistance if the motor stalls.

The first step in first aid is thawing of frozen body tissue. Bring the victim indoors to a warm room. Treat the frozen part with gentleness. Don't rub or massage. Ice or snow applied to the frozen part merely delays thawing.

Prompt medical treatment is important. Control of severe

pain is required. Antibiotics and antitetanus injections may be needed if the skin is broken.

First degree frostbite, similar to sunburn, is likely to attack the ears, toes, fingers, cheeks or nose. Second degree frostbite produces blisters, and third degree freezing damages deep tissues. Much of the frozen part may be lost.

Most cases of frostbite need not have happened, if the victim had been properly dressed and had used judgement about staying out too long in subfreezing weather.

It pays to keep up the level of protein in ration for breed sows. In experiments at Mississippi State University breed sows fed one pound protein meal daily plus grain farrowed two more pigs per litter and weaned 1.4 more pigs than those fed one-half pound supplement daily with grain. On the average, bred sows need at least a pound of supplement daily plus three or four pounds of grain.

Breed sows and gilts twice during the heat period 12 to 24 hours apart. If possible use two different bars.

Worm sows with piperazine two weeks before farrowing. Check heat lamps for correct installation and be sure that sow cannot reach the cord or any connections.

Do not feed sow too much after she farrows. A rule of thumb is one pound of feed for each day after farrowing. One pound the first day, two the second and so on until around the eighth day. It varies, but eight to 10 pounds a day is enough the second, third, fourth and fifth weeks.

Do not rush pigs on creep feed if sow is a good milker. Wait until pigs are around 10 to 14 days old.
