FURNITURE PLANT IN OPERATION GOLDEN SCHOOL BUILDING

WILL MAKE UPHOLSTERED COUCHES AND CHAIRS;
TO EVENTUALLY EMPLOY SIXTY MEN AND WOMEN

Tishomingo County's newest furniture plant to come into operation is the Tuchin Furniture Co. at Golden. The plant is owned and operated by Jack Carpenter of Booneville. The firm will do business under the Tuchin Furniture Co. name and will have offices in Chicago. Principal items to be manufactured are upholstered couches, beds, and chairs. Upwards of 60 men and women will be employed when the plant is in operation.

Carpenter states that expansion plans include other units in this county. The plant will be in two units, a woodworking shop and an upholstery shop. The woodworking shop is located in the Golden school lunchroom. The upholstery shop is in the school building.

There will be four assembly lines when full operation is attained, Mr. Carpenter said. Local civic and business leaders are cooperating with Mr. Carpenter in establishing the furniture manufacturing plant in Golden. Supt. of Education R. Long, his brother, Raymond Long, and Dr. Raymond Shook, and Owen Ginn of Golden.

The plant comes to Golden from Booneville where the firm had to give possession of the building it was occupying. Some of the supervisory personnel will move from Booneville to Golden as soon as housing can be obtained.

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Swine Shortcourse To Begin

Thursday, Jan. 23; Classes At Holcut And Burnsville

Hog Producers and persons interested in hog production will have an opportunity to attend a Swine Shortcourse or Workshop beginning Thursday, January 23, according to County Agent Percie Stricklen.

The workshop will be taught at the Holcut RCDC Center two days each week for three weeks. Classes will begin at 1:30 p.m. and end at 3:30 p.m. For the benefit of those who cannot attend the day class, the same class will be taught again that night at the Burnsville High School Building beginning at 6:30 p.m. and ending at 8:30 p.m.

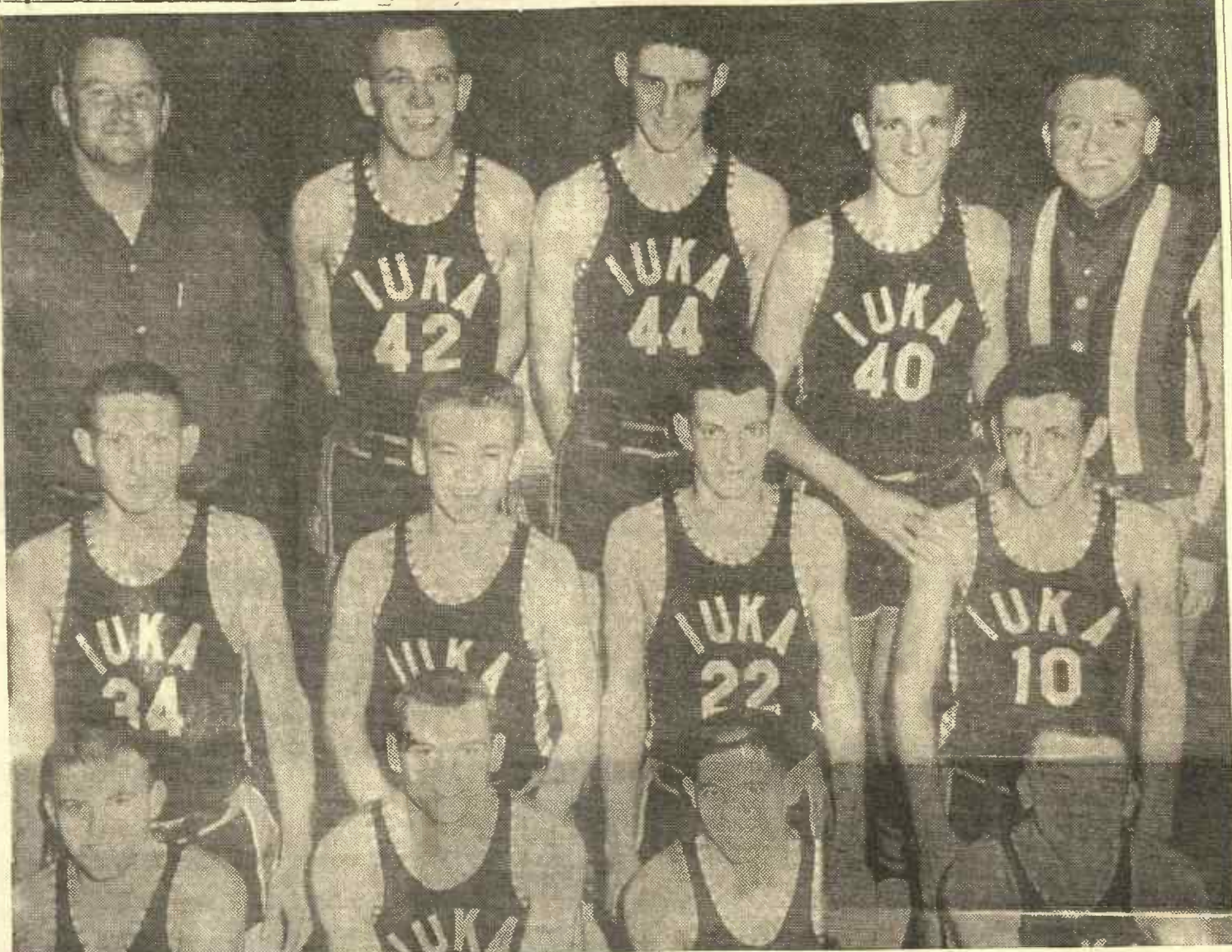
Date of the classes will be January 23 and 24; January 30 and 31st; and February 6 and 7th. W. L. Richmond, Extension Swine Specialist, will be teaching the course, which will include a detailed study of all phases of hog production. Field trips will be made to visit modern hog operations during the course.

Printed information will be passed out at each class that each one can carry home for future use. A certificate will be issued at the end of the course for those attending all the classes.

The Swine Shortcourse is available to anyone in Tishomingo, Prentiss, or Alcorn Counties. The Shortcourse is being sponsored by the Mississippi Extension Service and Yellow Creek Watershed Authority.

"We are fortunate to have a course of this type made available to our farmers and everyone should make a special effort to take advantage of this opportunity to learn more about hog production," the County Agent said.

Mrs. Wallace Injured In Car Accident

A two-car accident occurred late Wednesday afternoon on Highway 72 West near Mt. Moriah Church left one person, Mrs. Imogene Wallace of Iuka, hospitalized. Only other person involved was Thomas T. Austin of Corinth, who escaped without injury.

Austin, driving a 1955 Chevrolet Station Wagon and traveling west, collided with the 1959 Chevrolet, driven by Mrs. Wallace, who was traveling east. According to Highway Patrolman Ira Pace, Jr., who investigated the accident, Mrs. Wallace apparently applied her brakes and skidded into the path of the station wagon. The Wallace car was knocked completely off the road. Considerable property damage was done to both vehicles.

Mrs. Wallace was taken to Tishomingo County Hospital, suffering from lacerations of the head and several broken ribs.

Another minor mishap later Wednesday was reported by Patrolman Pace. A 1960 GMC Tractor-Trailer truck, owned by Union Carbide of Huntsville, Ala., rolled across Highway 72 in front of Rhodes Cafe and into a bank while James Olen Leach of Union Grove, Ala., who was driver of the truck, was inside the Cafe. No other vehicles were involved and only a small amount of damage was done to the truck.

Sumners, Scruggs In Jackson

Local Legislators Participate In Opening '64 Session

Senator Cecil L. Sumners of Iuka and Direct Representative Cleston Scruggs, also of Iuka, were among 174 legislators gathering in Jackson recently for the opening of the 1964 regular session of the Mississippi Legislature.

Sumners, Scruggs, and the others prepared to tackle the tough problems facing the legislature—the first reapportionment legislative body since 1890.

Highlights of the first week were Gov. Ross Barnett's final legislative address to a joint session in which he said the state's finances were in good condition and a major tax increase in present revenue sources or new taxes would not be necessary; and the re-election of veteran House Speaker Walter Sillers of Bolivar County for a sixth consecutive term and Senator George Yarbrough of Red Banks as pro tempore of the State Senate for a second time.

This week the legislature is expected to hold off action on key issues, awaiting the inauguration of Gov.-elect Paul B. Johnson, Jr. on January 21.

Senator Sumners and Representative Scruggs will participate in the Inaugural Parade up Capitol Street when the new governor takes over.

Circuit Court In Final Days; Jurors Dismissed

Severe Cold Curtails Proceedings, Yet Several Cases Disposed Of

Second week of Tishomingo County Circuit Court saw a number of cases disposed of in spite of the severely cold weather.

Major case tried with Judge N. S. Sweat on the bench was that of the State vs. Nellie Sue Jourdan. Mrs. Jourdan was indicted by the Grand Jury at the August 1963 term for the murder of her husband, Bonnie Jourdan, last April.

Most of Wednesday morning was consumed in the selection of a jury. First witnesses in the case were heard about eleven

in the morning with the case being given to the Jury about 4 o'clock in the afternoon. Deliberation lasted only about an hour, the jury returning a verdict at about 5:10 p.m.

Mrs. Jourdan was found guilty of manslaughter. However, the jury, in rendering its verdict, asked that the defendant be shown mercy by the court. Sentence is expected to be passed sometime today.

Among other cases on which sentencing is expected to take place during the last days of court are the State vs. Dessie Boatwright, charged with forgery. Defendant entered a plea of guilty.

The State vs. Vester Lee Brown, charged with armed robbery and assault against the person of M. D. Wilhite, an elderly man of Burnsville; trial resulted in a hung jury resulting in the case being continued to the next term of court.

The State vs. James Murry Smith charged with false pretense, case retired to the files on recommendation of the state.

The State vs. Robert Charles Gillmore and Jackie Alexander (two different cases) charged with the armed robbery of McCune's restaurant; Gillmore's case was continued to the next term of court and Alexander's case is pending disposition of the Court today or tomorrow.

The State vs. Edward Andrew Eaton and William Lee Bridges (two cases) each charged with the burning of a truck; upon application of the defendants, case continued to next term of court.

The State vs. Holbert Caldwell resulted in a hung jury. Caldwell is charged with assault and battery and attempt to kill. Case continued to next term of court.

The State vs. James Leathers, charged with child desertion; case retired to files on recommendation of the state.

The State vs. Mary Reid, charged with removing mortgaged property from the state with intent to defraud; case retired to files on recommendation of the State.

The State vs. James Lambert, charged with burglary and larceny; case continued by agreement.

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The State vs. J. O. (Onice) Ledbetter, charged with possession of moonshine whiskey; case retired to files on recommendation of the State.

The State vs. Will Keeton, charged with non-support; case retired to files.

Jurors assigned to this term of court have been paid off and dismissed.

Electric Safety
Electricity can, if properly treated, be a wonderful servant. But handled carelessly it can be an enemy and do a lot of harm.

First make sure that all wiring, insulation, plugs, etc. are in good condition. This is a must!

Here are some rules to help you play it safe with electricity:

Know where the main switch is and keep it clear in case of emergency. Be sure to pull the main switch before making repairs. Be sure to use the right size fuse for the circuit.

Do not touch a bare wire or any metal that is in contact with a bare wire. Do not touch electrical fixtures, switches and appliances when you are wet. Pull out attachment plugs by holding the plug instead of the cord. When you are through using any appliance or electrical tool, unplug it or turn off the electricity.

Always buy and use equipment that has been UL approved and labeled. Be sure to ground the frame of 240-volt electric motors. On portable 120-volt electrical tools use three-wire cords. Always stand on a dry surface when using electrical tools. Keep children away from electrical cords and outlets. Check the circuit load if an attachment plug feels warm.

In Mississippi, those people who govern these Soil Conservation Districts are called District Commissioners. In Tishomingo County, there is a local Board of Deputy Commissioners who assist the Tennessee River and Northeast Mississippi Soil Conservation District Commissioners. The reason for having Deputy Commissioners in Tishomingo County is that more than seventy thousand (70,000) acres of this county lies in the Northeast Mississippi Soil Conservation District. In other words, there are parts of two Soil Conservation Districts in Tishomingo County, and Deputy Commissioners are needed to assist all the landowners of Tishomingo County with their soil and water conservation problems.

These Commissioners and Deputy Commissioners serve without pay or donations from any source whatsoever. They give their services to all the landowners of the county in order that our soil might be used now and made better by

applied and planned soil conservation practices.

Every landowner of Tishomingo County is eligible to have a Soil and Water Conservation Farm Plan made, free of charge, by the local work unit conservationist.

Soil Conservation Districts operate on this basis. No one is forced to work with the District. No one is forced to follow a Conservation plan after it has been developed. No one is bound to continue his association with the District, or to carry out programs on his land with which he is not in agreement.

Those of us connected with the soil conservation district program, in any respect, can be proud to have a part in such a program. As long as men prefer freedom, and they always will, such a program will be successful.

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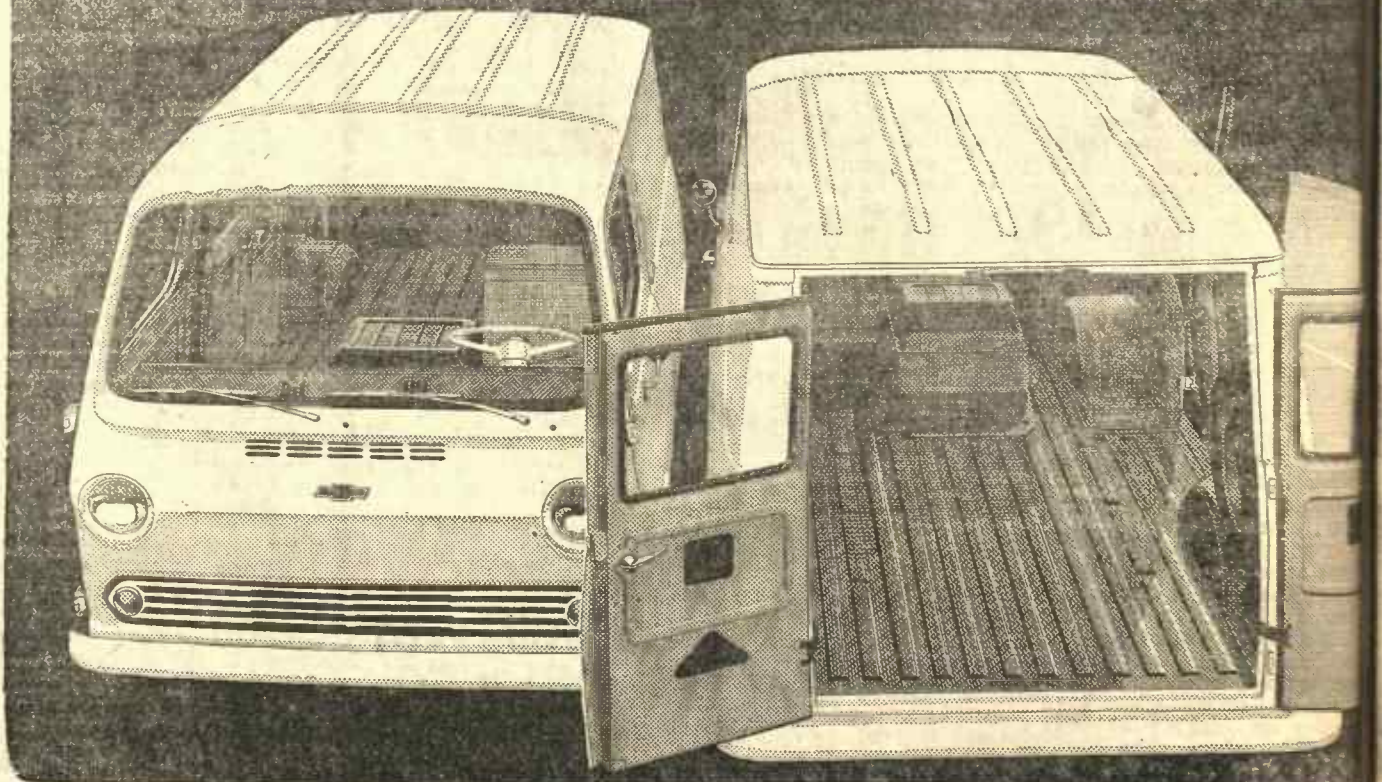

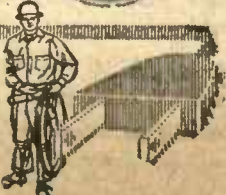

State's Mineral Outlook Bright

Mississippi mineral production in 1963 was valued at a record - breaking \$224,081,000, according to state geologist Fred Mellen, quoting a United States Bureau of Mines report. Released through the Mississippi Geological Survey, the report said 1963 production represented a five per cent gain over the previous year and it was the 11th consecutive year in which mineral production

has gained. Petroleum led all minerals during the year with a total value of \$162,840,000, followed by natural gas with a total of \$34,600,000. Clays had a value of \$5,837,000; sand and gravel, \$7,400,000; stone, \$1,239,000; natural gas liquids, \$1,900,000; LP gases, \$900,000; and other mineral items, \$9,345,000. In a separate statement, J. F. Borthwick, geologist for the State Oil & Gas Association, said Mississippi's 1964 oil and gas exploration outlook is bright. Recent discoveries contributed to the anticipated increased activity, they said. Kenna said annual expenditures for salaries, leases, rentals, royalties, taxes and drilling exceed \$150 million in addition to about \$130 million received from the sale of production.

New Canton Pecan Plant Commended By Governor

Governor Ross Barnett, participating at the opening of a new pecan processing plant at Canton, commended Canton on having the 546th new or expanded industry for Mississippi since January, 1960. The Goldkist Pecan plant was the subject of a \$250,000 BAWI bond issue which voters approved, 1329 to 64. The plant is expected to employ 100 persons at its peak.

Decatur Shirt Company Expansion To Start Soon

Contracts have been awarded for expansion of Boys Tone Shirt, Inc. (Decatur Shirt Corporation) at Decatur under a BAWI bond issue of \$150,000. Some 25,000 square feet will be added to the present factory to provide additional manufacturing space enabling the company to hire additional employees.

January 14 Set For Pontotoc BAWI Vote

A bond election will be held on January 14 to help locate the Miss Eaton Corporation in Pontotoc on a permanent basis. The proposed bond issue is for \$200,000. The company manufactures furniture and has been located in Pontotoc for about a year on a lease arrangement with the Pontotoc County Development Association. The company now employs 140.

Greenville Plant Expands

Moeller Manufacturing Company, Inc., expects to complete a 6,000-square-foot addition to its present 20,000-square-foot Greenville plant late this winter. The expansion will increase both production and warehouse space. The Moeller plant was built three years ago, but increased production demands have made an expansion necessary. The company manufactures a variety of stoppers for insulated bottles, closure devices and other similar products.

Southern Bell To Spend \$31 Million In 1964

Approximately \$31.7 million for new facilities in Mississippi in 1964 will be spent by Southern Bell Telephone Company, according to a company announcement. This would be the greatest amount spent for this purpose for one year in the state by Southern Bell. Southern Bell's total plant investment in Mississippi now stands at about \$215 million. Its payroll will total about \$23.5 million for 1963, and its total taxes applicable to Mississippi operations about \$22 million a year. Southern Bell serves 198 metropolitan areas and communities with approximately 510,000 telephones in the state.

Aluminum Plant To Be Automated

Joseph C. Bancroft, president of Croft Metal Products, Inc., McComb, has announced a modernization program of a subsidiary in McComb — Croft Aluminum Company, smelters and extruders of aluminum. He said the new facility will incorporate automated equipment and will produce more than ten million pounds of aluminum extruded shapes each year. He said the program will quadruple the company's capacity.

First National Tells Economic Progress Story

The January issue of Fortune magazine carries a two-page advertisement on Mississippi's economic progress placed by the First National Bank of Jackson. The ad features an aerial view of Jackson and eight photographs depicting the state's ports and water resources; strategic location; resources in power, fuel and oil; educational facilities; industrial job opportunities; retail sales growth; and recreational attractions. Bank president R. M. Hearin said the ad will be seen by some 400,000 Fortune subscribers who are managers of top businesses and industries throughout the country. In 1962, the bank ran a similar ad in U. S. News and World Report.

Stennis Blasts Civil Rights Plan As Unreasonable, Extreme, Severe

After hearing President Johnson's State of the Union message to the joint session of Congress here this week, Senator John Stennis said: "The President's position on Civil Rights is unreasonable, extreme and severe. I shall continue to oppose this Civil Rights bill to the limit."

Regarding the President's plans and outline for "frugal spending and the exercise of economy in government," Stennis declared, "These proposals are commendable and will certainly have my support."

"The President's plan to cut down on deficit spending is what I have advocated over the years," Stennis said. We cannot continue to spend more than we take in, and we must start somewhere, sometime to tighten the belt and cut out the frills of government spending. The President's move in this direction is at least a start, a beginning, but it does not go far enough by any means."

Stennis noted that the State of the Union message "covered the waterfront, touching subjects on nearly every phase of our national life and economy."

"Many of the President's recommendations," Stennis said, "are far-reaching indeed and will require the utmost study and caution, especially his call for new and expanded federal programs."

Stennis, who is chairman of the Senate Preparedness Investigating arm of the Senate Armed Services Committee, said, "I was very well pleased with the

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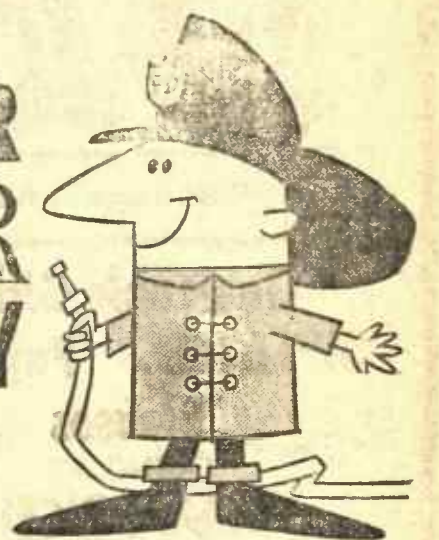

Veterans Corner

Q—What is the present maximum amount of a GI home loan the Veterans Administration will guaranty?

A—The Veterans Administration will guaranty up to 60% of the loan but not more than \$7,500. The limit on the amount to be obtained in a direct loan, when no loans are available from private lenders, is \$15,000.

Q—I understand my daughter although over 18 may continue to receive her nonservice-connected pension up to age 21 if she is attending a VA-approved school. How can we tell what schools are VA-approved?

A—Most well-known and recognized schools and colleges are on the VA-approved list. However, if you are in doubt about a school, contact the Department of Education in the state in which you live or the nearest VA office.

A Cautious Man

Lesson for January 19, 1964

Background Scripture: John 3:1-21; 7:40-52; 19:38-42.
Devotional Reading: I John 5:6-14

NICODEMUS might have been one of the Apostles. He had more to start with than some of them did. He had education and money, for example, not to mention great prestige as a member of the Jewish Council or Sanhedrin as it was called. But his case goes to show that it's not what you have that counts, it is what you do with what you have.

This man Nicodemus has been described in various ways. Some have thought that he came under the everlasting condemnation of God because he did not speak out boldly as he should have—he was a disciple who arrived too late. Others on the contrary paint Nicodemus as being as much of a disciple as the circumstances permitted, a man whose faith triumphed in the end.

He came by night. The thing that most people remember about Nicodemus is that he "came by night" to Jesus. That does not label him a coward, but it does show him to be a cautious man. He was willing, indeed almost eager, to hear what Jesus had to tell him. Only he didn't think it would do his prestige any good to be seen interviewing Jesus, and admitting that he, a ruler in Israel, did not know all he needed to know about religion.

Jesus did not brush him off. If the Lord had despised him or thought him altogether a coward, he would not have said to him the things he did. Some of the most profound things Jesus ever said were spoken in conversation with this careful, timid man. It is rash to say that Jesus failed to convert this distinguished personage. Nicodemus was not convinced that very evening, he took time to think it over. He took too long; for he never stood up for Christ until matters had gone too far to change. However, he did think, and seems to have come out openly for Jesus at the last.

Caution to the last. Nevertheless, Nicodemus never became a bold man. When he spoke a moderate word for the Rabbi from Nazareth, he did not profess to defend him. All he said was that Jesus deserved a fair trial. Even that little was too much for the Sanhedrin, and they shouted Nicodemus down. Nicodemus did not try it again, we may infer. Then after the death of Jesus, Nicodemus and Joseph of Arimathea joined in caring for the body. Yet ever here the reader notices that it was not Nicodemus but Joseph who took the lead. Nicodemus was doing a costly and gracious act, but he was led in this by another man.

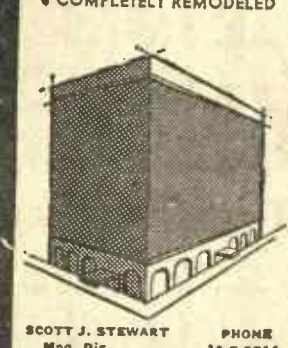
All the same, though as was said, this "ruler" never became outstanding for heroism, the fact remains that asking Pilate for the body of a man just executed by Pilate's own order took more courage than coming to Jesus by night.

What he missed. After all's said, it still is a fact that Nicodemus missed a great deal by not becoming a disciple in the whole-hearted way of Peter and John. He missed what he might have had, association with Jesus through those years of conflict. Not only that, he missed the great joy the disciples had in serving the Master. There can't be much doubt that the twelve apostles, humble and ordinary men though they were, did more for their fellow-men during those years with Jesus than Nicodemus ever did in the same space of time. Nicodemus cut himself off from joy and from usefulness, by his cautious and "cagey" approach to faith.

People today are like that man, sometimes. They expect to be saved in due time, but they are in no hurry. They want a lot of evidence to convince them. They spend too much time, by the river of Truth, testing the temperature of the water and never heartily diving in. A Nicodemus may arrive in the end; but think what he misses along the way!

Snow and Ice On Highway Make Driving Hazardous

Maintenance Personnel Placed On Alert; Operations Continue Around Clock Until Hwys. Clear

When snow and ice, such as experienced over the Christmas holidays, make driving hazardous to the motoring public in Northern District Highway District, a system of planned operations will be put into effect with a minimum of effort in a minimum of time. It is up to Roy Adams, Northern District Highway Commissioner, and his organization to see that the plan is carried out and the highways in 31 northern Mississippi counties are kept open as safe as possible for motorists despite adverse weather conditions.

This system of planned operations is coordinated in an "Snow Removal Plan" which was prepared for use in Northern Highway District. The plan details the routes that

each motor grader and truck will take when snow and ice occur. The Northern District's 32 area maintenance headquarters serve as originating points for operations.

"When snow and icing conditions threaten our highways all maintenance personnel in the district are placed on the alert," Mr. Adams said. "In case of snow or ice in only one section of the district, men and equipment from other sections are deployed to the critical area. Our snow and ice removal equipment is complete with heaters and lights so that operations can continue around the clock until the highways are safe for driving."

During the snow and ice experienced during the Christmas Holidays the Northern District

had personnel working in continuous shifts from 8 a.m. on December 22 until 6 p.m. December 24.

Snow can usually be cleared from a highway with motor graders or trucks mounted with snow blades; but ice presents a more difficult problem since the blades have little effect on it.

"The best means of removing ice from the surface of a highway is by the application of special chemicals to the road," the Northern District Highway Commissioner said. "A spreader, which is attached to the rear of the highway department trucks, is used to spread the chemicals evenly over the road. These spreaders are calibrated to discharge the chemicals at the rate of 500 pounds per mile at a truck speed of 25 miles per hour. One truck can carry enough chemicals in one load to service approximately 15 miles of highway."

These special chemicals can produce harmful effects on the undersides of automobiles when they are used regularly in large quantities. Because the chemicals are applied to the highways in the district in limited quantities and with no degree of regularity there is little danger of them producing any serious effects on motor vehicles.

Mr. Adams said, "The chemicals might possibly produce

some minor effects on motor vehicles but the advantages of having our highways open to traffic more than compensate for this one disadvantage. Our overall economy is dependent in many ways on a good system of highways. If the recent snow and ice had forced the closing of Northern District highways the people and industry of the district would have suffered. When highways are closed people can't get into the trade areas and to work, industrial production is curtailed, and education is hampered."

Although this snow and ice came at a time when most of the schools were out for the Christmas Holidays, it could have come when the schools were in session. When highways are closed because of snow and ice it becomes virtually impossible for grade schools and junior colleges to continue their classes and usually must close also.

"We strive for an overall state of preparedness in the Northern Highway District," Mr. Adams said. "Before the first threat of snow and ice two chemical spreaders, one truck frame and cover, truck chains, an average of 10 tons of special chemicals, and 300 cubic yards of abrasives (crushed stone and slag) are stored at each of the area maintenance headquarters in the district."

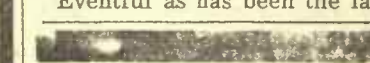
The truck frame and cover is a special device that was built by maintenance personnel in the second district. It is made of heavy duty canvas which is stretched over a steel frame and can be readily attached to highway department trucks. This cover protects the men in the back of the trucks, who feed the special chemicals into the spreaders, from the sub-freezing temperatures.

"Our main objective is to see that the highways in the Northern District are kept open to motorists regardless of how bad the weather might become and to see that they are kept as safe as humanly possible," Mr. Adams said.

That objective is being accomplished.

year, 1964 promises to hold even greater significance for the American people. The new year is a year of decision-making for the nation's voters.

Each and every responsible citizen has a high obligation in 1964 to make people start thinking about the American destiny at home and abroad. We can move forward in the direction of national integrity and independence, toward further refinement of the free enterprise system and to a restoration of rights that have been impaired by bureaucracy and leftwing extremism. Or the nation can continue to scrap both the Constitution and the capitalist system on a piecemeal basis, surrendering more of its freedoms and accepting more direction by bureaucratic power elites.

A good way to begin the New Year is by having faith in the capacity of the American people to recognize the choice before them and the fateful nature of the decisions which they will make when they vote. What really separates the lib-

erals and the conservatives is that the former don't really trust and believe in the American people whereas the latter have confidence in the ordinary, qualified citizen. Though the liberal frequently prates of "democratic processes" and "civil rights," he invariably wants to make government in America something that is run by "planners" in Washington. The hallmark of the "liberal" is that he wants to remove power and decision-making from the average citizens, whether it be in business matters, foreign affairs or the choice of associates and customers. These "planners," which is the same as saying "these liberals," assume unto themselves the omniscience to know what is best for the people rather than leaving that decision to the people themselves.

The conservatives, on the other hand, believe that the average American community—and the states—don't have to seek direction or guidance from Washington. George Washing-

ton once said, "The people of the United States mean well, and I firmly believe they will always act well whenever they can obtain a right understanding of matters." The conservatives believe that too. It takes a lot of faith and patience to believe in the democratic process, to believe that the people themselves, should have the right to choose their own destiny and guide their own future. These qualities the "liberals" do not have; these qualities the conservatives do have—and it is these qualities that must be preserved if we are to remain a free people.

In many subtle ways the "liberals" seek to present their non-freedom as freedom, their plan of regimentation as an enlargement of rights. They attempt to take something away from each American and at the same time attempt to convince those who are losing something precious that they are obtaining a gift from government.

Thus in 1964 it is not enough to be steadfast in one's belief in constitutionalism. The good citizen must be informed and he must learn the various dodges by which leftists aim to strip citizens, communities and states of their right to regulate their own affairs. The union bosses will be ordering programs of "political education" in the coming year. Conservatives must launch vital programs of their own. Not only must they have the political facts at their fingertips in a year of debate, but they must take the offensive against "liberals."

Conservative Congressmen will have a lot to do in 1964, blocking a foolish tax bill, a so-called "civil rights" bill that actually reduces civil rights and property rights and in opposing various grab bag measures aimed at rounding up the votes of the ill-informed on election day. But conservatives in public life can't do the entire job by themselves. Not all the "liberals" are in Washington or on the federal payroll. They are on the local level in every community, and they will be working hard this year.

One reason the New Frontier came to power was that the New Frontiersmen worked terribly hard at the grassroots in 1960. The AFL-CIO in California, for instance, conducted doorbell voter campaigns such as this country has never seen. Conservatives must not only have purer ideals than the "liberals," but they must out-orga-

156 Business Firms In Tishomingo County

Statistics just released by D. K. Kelley, District Manager of the Memphis office of Dun & Bradstreet, Inc., reveal that there are 156 business firms in Tishomingo County of which 53 are in Iuka. These figures were obtained from a physical count

of the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book for November, 1963.

Farmers Annual Cash Reports Due By January 31

Farmers are reminded that the annual reports to Internal Revenue Service of the cash wages paid to their employees during 1963, are due by January 31, 1964. This reminder comes from Hugh Tigrett, District Manager of the Social Security Administration in Tupelo.

Mr. Tigrett points out that the amount and manner of determining each employee's wages are to be considered in deciding whether or not those wages must be reported. If an employee was paid \$150 or more in cash wages, his wages must be reported. Wages must also be reported regardless of the amount if the employee worked on twenty or more days during the year and was paid by the hour, the day, or the week rather than by the job.

Mr. Tigrett states that a complete report to the Internal Revenue Service includes the name, social security number and total wages paid to each employee. Proper forms to make these reports may be secured from any office of Internal Revenue Service. No elaborate record keeping system is needed, but the farm employer should make sure that he has accurate identifying information for each employee, especially the employee's social security number.

Farmers who want more in-

formation about how to report their employees for social security can obtain this information by contacting the Social Security Representative who visits the City Hall in Iuka, each Monday morning.

A—From what you say, you won't get disability checks from us. Your disability has to be one that will last indefinitely. It sounds like you'll be back on the job soon.

Q—I recently opened a small business after working for another fellow. Now what do I do about social security for my workers?

A—I'm sending you an application for an Employer's Identification Number. Fill it out and send it to the Internal Revenue Service. They'll send you a business number and send you the forms you'll need to make social security reports every quarter. Don't forget, now that you're in business for yourself, you'll have to send in your own social security once a year.
