Little King and Queen Annette Skinner and Norman Locke were crowned by last year's Little King and Queen, Frankie Wright and Janet Woodruff.

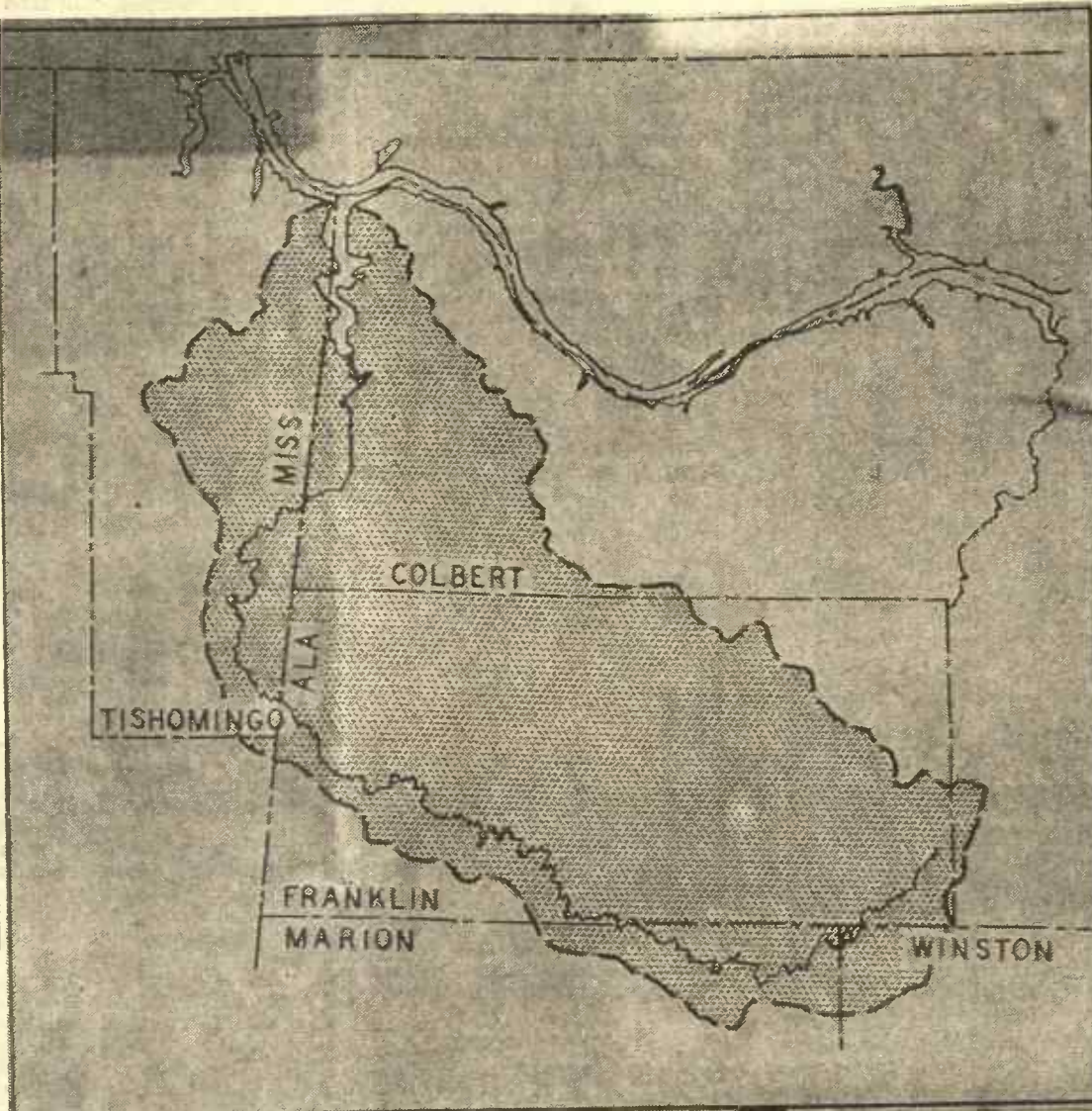

Water Control System Planned For Bear Creek

TVA Will Spend \$215,000 In 1964 For Preliminary Design; Dams On Creeks Will Be Started In 1966

The Tennessee Valley Authority announced today it will take an important step this year toward a multipurpose water control system for the Bear Creek Basin in northwest Alabama and northeast Mississippi.

The President's new budget submitted to Congress today includes \$215,000 for preliminary design work on such a system during fiscal year 1965, which begins July 1. Performing this work in 1965 will permit construction to be started in 1966.

Like another water control system now being built by TVA on western Tennessee's Beech River, the Bear Creek system will combine dams and channel improvements, serving several purposes including reduction of the present frequent flooding of bottomland crops.

Engineering planning is now well advanced on a dam and reservoir on the Bear Creek main stem in southwest Franklin County, Ala., and channel enlargement below that point to Pickwick Lake. Core-drilling is under way at a proposed site

for this dam seven miles east of Red Bay to see whether it offers satisfactory foundation conditions.

Planning studies also are under way on other possible damsites on Cedar Creek and Little Bear Creek in the same county, and on Crippled Deer Creek in Tishomingo County, Miss. The preliminary estimate of total cost for developing the Bear Creek system is in the order of \$15 million.

The Bear Creek Basin covers almost a thousand square miles in parts of Colbert, Franklin, Marion, Winston and Lawrence Counties in Alabama and Tishomingo County in Mississippi. It is the home of about 35,000 people.

The 2,000-member Bear Creek Watershed Association, established in 1961, is one of 13 citizen groups and agencies in various Tennessee Valley tributary areas which are working with TVA and state agencies on area development.

Headed by David Morrow of Red Bay, the association works closely with TVA's Office of Tributary Area Development on activities in agriculture, forestry, water use and supply, recreation, business and industry, governmental services and human resources.

In this program, detailed study of the area's economy and resources has shown that the marginal productivity of many farm and forest holdings, plus a labor force concentrated in low-wage industries, result in a median family income here which is only about half the national level.

Opportunities for expanding income and employment in the area are limited, the study shows, but one asset which does have this potential is the water resource. Controlling the flooding of bottomland crops would provide an immediate stimulus to the area economy.

There may be other benefits from water control as well. Part of the association program is aimed at making greater use of the area's potential for outdoor recreation and tourism. The lakes created by a water control system would add to that potential.

Another line of effort by the citizen group is toward development of more industry, seriously needed to balance and expand the area economy. Present water supplies are considered adequate for municipal demands, but expanding this supply could be an important precondition for industries needing water in much larger amounts. Reservoirs could offer a more reliable source of supply.

These and other potential benefits of water control—beyond the established flood control value—have not yet been fully evaluated. TVA and the local association will cooperate in determining the possibilities for these benefits.

Unit Will Be At Nat'l. Guard Armory

The Red Cross Bloodmobile unit will be in Iuka next Friday, January 31, at the National Guard Armory. Mrs. Gertrude Carsten, executive secretary of the Tishomingo County Red Cross chapter, announces that the hours for blood donors to come to the Armory will be between 10 a.m. and 5 p.m. The unit will arrive earlier in the morning and volunteer workers will assist in setting up the equipment.

The Red Cross Blood program has proved of great benefit to area residents who have needed blood in the past year. 328 pints were used by Tishomingo Counties through the local hospital during 1963.

Prospective donors are asked to plan now to be at the Bloodmobile next Friday to donate a pint of blood. Those who already have donor cards are reminded that it will be necessary to renew the card in order to be eligible for blood after this month.

The blood quota for the coming visit of the Bloodmobile has been set at 150 pints. "It will be a golden opportunity for everyone who can to give blood to become a donor and make themselves and members of their families eligible for blood in event of need," Mrs. Carsten said.

Increase In Savings Bond Sales

During December; Local Chairman Gives County Totals

R. A. McRee, Jr., Chairman of the County's Savings Bonds Committee, reported that United States Savings Bonds sales had a tremendous increase in Mississippi in December. They amounted to \$1,650,464 compared to \$1,236,232 for December, 1962. Total sales for Mississippi for 1963 were \$17,183,063. Savings Bonds sales for 1963 for the Nation were \$4,760,000,000, a 11 percent increase over 1962.

Sales in Tishomingo County for December were \$7,303.00 bringing the total for 1963 to \$174,820.00.

He expressed thanks to the people for their interest in the Savings Bonds Program during 1963 and calls on all people to continue their cooperation in 1964. He said, "When people buy U. S. Savings Bonds they help themselves and their country."

In giving the report, he also called attention to two things:

(1) All Series E Bonds have been given an extension beyond maturity—Bonds bought May 1, 1941 through May, 1949, can be held 30 years. Bonds bought since June 1, 1949 have been given a 10-year extension.

(2) All people who will be entitled to an income tax refund of \$18.75 or more can ask

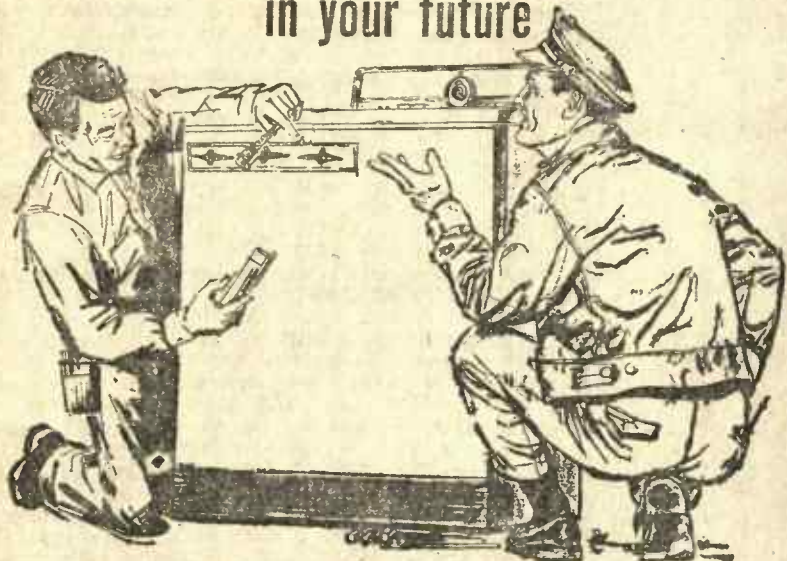
the Internal Revenue Department to make the refund in U. S. Savings Bonds.

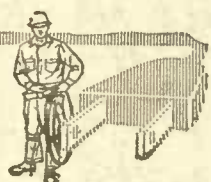

To provide the best available information on increasing yields and lowering production costs. To encourage continued research on soybean week control, insect and pest control, development of new varieties and development of additional uses of soybeans.

Farm Income Tax
February 17 is the deadline for farmers to file income tax returns unless they have already filed an estimate by January 15 indicating an intention to make a final return by April 15.

A limited number of copies of the "Farmer's Tax Guide" are available from local county agent's offices.

Several changes in income tax provisions that apply to farmers include a new optional 20 per cent depreciation allowance in the year of purchase and regular depreciation is allowed. It is based on the cost price of personal property usable for at least six years.

Beginning with 1958 a net operating loss can be carried back three years instead of two years. Land clearing expenses can be counted as ordinary expense. Casualty losses on property not covered by insurance can be treated as an ordinary loss deduction. Self-employed persons may deduct limited amounts paid to a retirement plan for his own benefit in taxable years after December 31, 1962.

In addition a credit against computed tax is allowed in an amount equal to seven percent of the "qualified investment" in depreciable tangible personal property (except livestock) and other tangible real property (except buildings) used in the farm operation.

These and other changes can save tax money. Consult the tax guide for more information before making out tax forms this year.

You'll find the baking soda on your kitchen shelf is a cleaning material you can use in a number of ways.

Buy Shoes That Fit
Never buy shoes by size alone. Have both feet measured and always try on both shoes (both seated and standing) every time you buy. Sizes vary from manufacturer to manufacturer. Be sure not only length and width are measured, but also

Feed Grain Program For 1964 Is Voluntary

Farmers Will Quality For Diverted Acres Payments, Price Support

E. N. Allen, ASCS office manager, announces that the 1964 Feed Grain Program is voluntary, which means it is basically the same as in 1963. Participating farmers will qual-

ify for diverted-acres payments and Price Support payments and they will be eligible for Price Support Loans.

In some respects the 1964 Program is an improvement over the 1963 Program. According to Mr. Allen the maximum feed grain acreage, which may be diverted (rented) on a farm, has been raised to 50 percent (from 40 percent) of the base. The average payment rate per acre for diverting (renting) 40 percent or more will be substantially higher than in 1963. "Feed Grain Bases have been figured by the same method used in 1963, based on the average number of acres on which feed grain was produced in 1959 and 1960," Mr. Allen said. The Farm Feed Grain Base, established by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee and furnished to each producer, is the starting point in figuring the diverted acres.

Feed Grain Bases, Yields, and Payment Rates have been figured for each farm in Tishomingo County. Farmers were mailed notices on January 20, 1964. From these notices, each farmer will know the payment offered for diverting (renting) their Corn Base Acreage.

"Each Feed Grain producer who takes part may choose the eligible cropland to come out of feed production and go into conserving uses. To meet the need of the farmer, the program provides a range in the acreage which may be diverted (rented). The smallest acreage of cropland that can be diverted for payment is 20 percent of the Feed Grain Base for the farm. The largest acreage on which payment can be made for diversion (renting) is 50 percent of the Farm's Feed Grain Base or 25 acres if this is more than 50 percent of the base; however, payment will not be made on more acres than are in the base. (In 1963 the maximum acreage that could be diverted (rented) for payment was the larger of 40 percent of the base or 25 acres.)

"There are two diversion payment rates. Either one or both of the per acre rates may be used in figuring payments. The lower rate applies to the first 20 percent. The higher rate applies to acreage in excess of 20 percent. Also, the higher rate could apply to the entire acreage diverted (rented) if the total rented is equal to at least 40 percent of the base. For example—On a farm with a base of 20 acres, if 6 acres are rented, 4 acres will be paid for at the low rate, and 2 acres at the high rate. If 8 acres are rented the entire payment will be at the higher rate.

"A farmer with an interest in the Feed Grain Crops on more than one farm may rent on one farm and not rent on the other. However, you will not be permitted to plant corn in excess of the Feed Grain Base on the farm that is not rented. "Notices of Payment Rates were mailed to all county farmers with a Feed Grain Base on Monday, January 20, 1964. Farmers will be notified later as to the Sign-Up Period when Advance Payment can be made," Mr. Allen concluded.

Scholarships To Be Awarded For Study In Pulp, Paper Technology

Fred B. Schelhorn, Resident Manager and Vice President of Tennessee River Pulp and Paper Company, Counce, Tenn., has announced that the Pulp and Paper Foundation, Inc. will award scholarships for up to \$1,000 per year for study in pulp and paper technology at North Carolina State College in Raleigh, North Carolina.

The Pulp and Paper Foundation is supported by companies of the pulp and paper industry and the scholarships are designed to assist qualified young people in the study of pulp

and paper manufacturing. Tennessee River Pulp and Paper Company is a member of the Foundation and Mr. Schelhorn serves as a director of the organization.

"Any high school graduate or college student can apply for one of these scholarships," Mr. Schelhorn said. "The scholarships are made on a yearly basis and are subject to renewal. The pulp and paper technology course consists of three years' work in English, math, chemistry, wood technology and the humanities. The fourth year stresses the application of these fundamental courses of study to pulp and paper technology. North Carolina State College is the only school in the South that offers such pulp and paper training."

The selections of scholarship winners are made by a Scholarship Committee composed of representatives of several pulp and paper mills. The deadline for applying for a Pulp and Paper Foundation Scholarship is February 15, 1964. Interested students should make arrangements to take the College Entrance Board Examinations. High school principals can supply information about when the examinations can be taken.

It is anticipated that any winner of a Pulp and Paper Foundation Scholarship in this area would be offered employment at the Tennessee River Pulp and Paper Company mill during the summer months between school years when the scholarship is in effect.

Marion Holt of Savannah, Tennessee, won a Pulp and Paper Foundation Scholarship last year and is currently enrolled at North Carolina State College. Mr. Schelhorn urges interested students to apply for the scholarships.

Sensing The News

The Stars & Stripes Forever

The U. S. Marines who raised the stars and stripes above the mountain of Surabachi on the Japanese island of Iwo Jima in World War II wrote a glorious, never-to-be-forgotten page in American history. The nameless American youths who earlier this month raised the flag with the broad stripes and bright stars in front of their school on American territory in Panama Canal Zone also deserve the thanks of the nation. But there's tragedy in this event, which was followed by Panamanian rioters assaulting U. S. territory. For these patriotic youths were raising the American flag in defiance of a regulation of the American governor of the Canal Zone. The U. S. State Department, in a despicable deed of appeasement of Panama's leftwing nationalists, had agreed that the American flag would not fly in front of an American school attended by American children.

What could those children have thought when they read of Iwo Jima and other battles in which our flag was the symbol of our nationhood and then learned that that flag could not fly over their school? Americans at home can be thankful that they refused to countenance the shameful betrayal of American sovereignty by State Department officials. The parents of these youngsters can be everlastingly proud of the patriotic reactions of their children. If this is the measure of American youth, the Republic will be safe in the hands of the next generation.

But the Republic is NOT safe in the hands of those who are willing to see the stars and stripes pulled down or hidden out of sight. This is what happened, for the U. S. flag had been removed from the federal court building and other American offices in the Canal Zone in the period before the Panamanian invasion.

Great principles and important interests are involved in the Canal Zone situation. Panamanian leftists want to deprive the United States of a portion of its territory, of its sovereign right to fly its flag alone, and to take away from the U. S. control of the canal that is a part of our system of trade and national defense.

By a treaty signed more than 60 years ago, the United States obtained the right in perpetuity to the sole use, occupation and control of the Panama Canal and Canal Zone. This treaty is as valid as the document by which the United States obtained Alaska from the Russians or the Virgin Islands from Denmark. No one in the American government, whether minor official or President, has the right to dispose of this American territory or to accept any reduction in this country's sovereign rights in the Canal Zone. It is to be hoped that the Johnson administration realizes that it cannot play international politics with the Panama Canal or trade it away or share it with any other nation or combination of countries or international body. The Panama Canal, by historic right, is solely an American canal. If the Panama Canal were to fall into the hands of some Latin American equipment of Dictator Nasser of Egypt, who controls the Suez Canal, America's security would be gravely threatened.

Indeed in considering the riots in Panama it must be borne in mind that the long-time principal aim of the communists in Latin America has been to take the canal away from the United States. If they were successful in this enterprise, it would be of greater help to the Soviet Union than anything they have done thus far, including the capture of Cuba. The Panama Canal is the lifeline of U. S. security in this hemisphere. It is not one bit outdated by the air age, for all inter-oceanic shipping depends on it, as do our naval forces for swift movement from one ocean to the other.

All good Americans have cause to pray that President Johnson will fully appreciate the importance of fully defending and maintaining U. S. rights in the Panama Canal Zone and that he will resist to the utmost all efforts to steal or undermine those rights.

If Mr. Johnson should heed the counsel of appeasers in the State Department, one can be sure that the American people would never forget such appeasement in the upcoming presidential election. It is highly unlikely that anyone could be elected President who bore the stigma of giving away the Panama Canal.

Forestry Notes

Mississippi Forestry
Now is a good time to carry out needed work in our timber-

stands or woodlots. This is a slack season for farmers and it is an established fact that each hour spent improving your timberstand will bring you handsome financial returns in the future. There is a good market for timber products in Tishomingo County and this is a good way for a farmer to increase his income.

We should remember that growing timber is like growing any other crop. Certain cultural practices should be carried out to obtain maximum production. Many landowners cut their pine trees as soon as they reach merchantable size with no thought of leaving or providing for a future stand. Eventually, cull and undesirable hardwoods will replace the pine and the landowner is left with land producing nothing of merchantable value.

We have many cutover acres such as this in Tishomingo County. This land is not producing enough to pay the taxes in most cases.

The most urgently needed forest improvement practice in

Tishomingo County is conversion work. This is a process of underplanting stands of scrub hardwoods with seedlings and killing the woods by the application of herbicidal mixture of 2,4-D and diesel fuel with a tractor.

This practice will bring additional income for the owner in the future as well as increase the value of the land. Also, this practice will pay for ACP cost-sharing assistance.

Amory Plant Construction
The new home of Amory Plant, Inc., manufacturers of appliances, is rapidly taking shape at Amory. The plant, a subsidiary of the Crampton Manufacturing Company of Grand Rapids, Michigan, will do casting and chrome plating. The plant is expected to be ready for production in March. 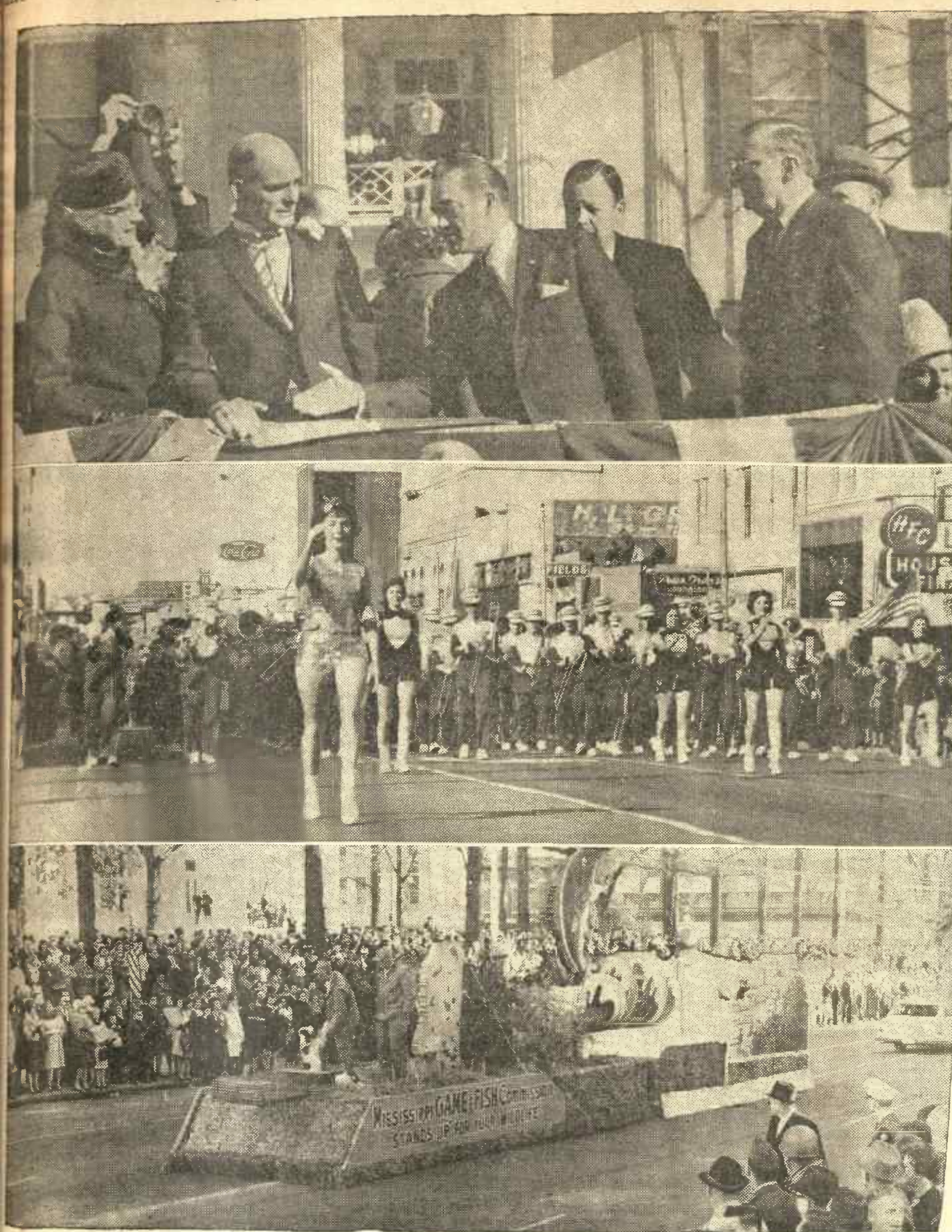

Local Postmasters Will Attend ZIP Code Conference At Tupelo

The Post Offices at Iuka and Belmont will be represented at a series of Regional conferences arranged to give information to the national postal ZIP program. The first meeting will be held today (Jan. 23).

Postmaster, and Lealon Yarber, Belmont Postmaster will represent their postoffices. Only First and Second class postoffices will be included in the series of conferences. Purpose of the meeting, according to I. C. Pattison, Jr., Regional Director of the Memphis Region comprising the states of Alabama, Mississippi, and Tennessee, will be to explain to postmasters plan for accelerating effective implementation of ZIP Code—the Department's new five digit system for addressing the mail and how the program is keyed to the electronic age.

ZIP Code program by members of the Regional Staff. Included in the agenda of the one day conference will be a discussion on the use of automatic data processing equipment in converting address files and pre-sorting mail to adapt to the program. ZIP Code will permit the Post Office Department to short-cut repeated address reading, a necessary chore that has slowed the process of mail dispatch and added to the opportunity for human error. The address on mail deposited by the average individual mailer must often be read by as many as eight or ten postal employees to get it to the proper one of our tens of millions of homes and offices. Each reading consumes valuable time in transit, and adds one more opportunity for error—particularly so when the address on the letter is poorly written. With ZIP Code, a clerk needs only a glance at the code to know immediately to what national area, state, and post office the letter is destined, and to speed it on its way.

By reducing the number of steps required in mail handling, and by cutting the time required to process letters, ZIP Code helps the Department contain costs, and operate the postal system with increased efficiency, thus greatly reducing the likelihood of additional rate increases within the coming few years.

By cutting down on the time clerks must spend reading addresses, ZIP Code frees them to devote more time to moving peak-volume mail, with the result that more mail can be handled with greater accuracy and speed in dispatch and delivery.

Bear Creek Assn. Joins In Effort To Improve School Dropout Situation

The Bear Creek Watershed Association has joined in the nationwide effort to improve the school dropout situation, according to David Morrow, Association president. He says his organization, which has as its primary objective the economic development of the watershed area, is very interested in the problem, since there is a direct relationship between economic growth and the general educational attainment of an area.

The Association's Human Resource Work Group has initiated a dropout counseling project at two "test" schools —

one in Alabama one in Mississippi. According to Leonard Allen, work group chairman, a number of people are participating in the program. Among them are the superintendent of education in Franklin and Tishomingo Counties, the principals and faculty of the two schools involved, and a number of local business people. If the project is successful at these schools, the work group plans to expand it to include junior and senior high schools throughout the watershed.

Allen says department of education statistics indicate that almost 50 percent of the children reaching the 8th grade fail to graduate from high school. He says this is not a new situation, but the problem is becoming more serious each year.

The Nation is experiencing an explosion in the "18 years and under" age group. During the 1960's the total U. S. population will increase by 50 percent. Coupled with this is the fact that there are fewer and fewer jobs for which a high school dropout is qualified.

Most of the young people leaving school before graduating are destined to a dull, frustrating life. Competition for the shrinking number of unskilled jobs is increasing. Many won't be able to find jobs at all and those who do will find they are only qualified for the lower paying, uninteresting type jobs. These jobs are often unsteady, and the dropout finds he is without a job more often than not.

Allen said if this sounds like we're painting too dark a picture, just ask a half dozen kids who dropped out of school a year or more ago and see what their experience has been. "We have, and the picture is no darker than the facts," he concluded.

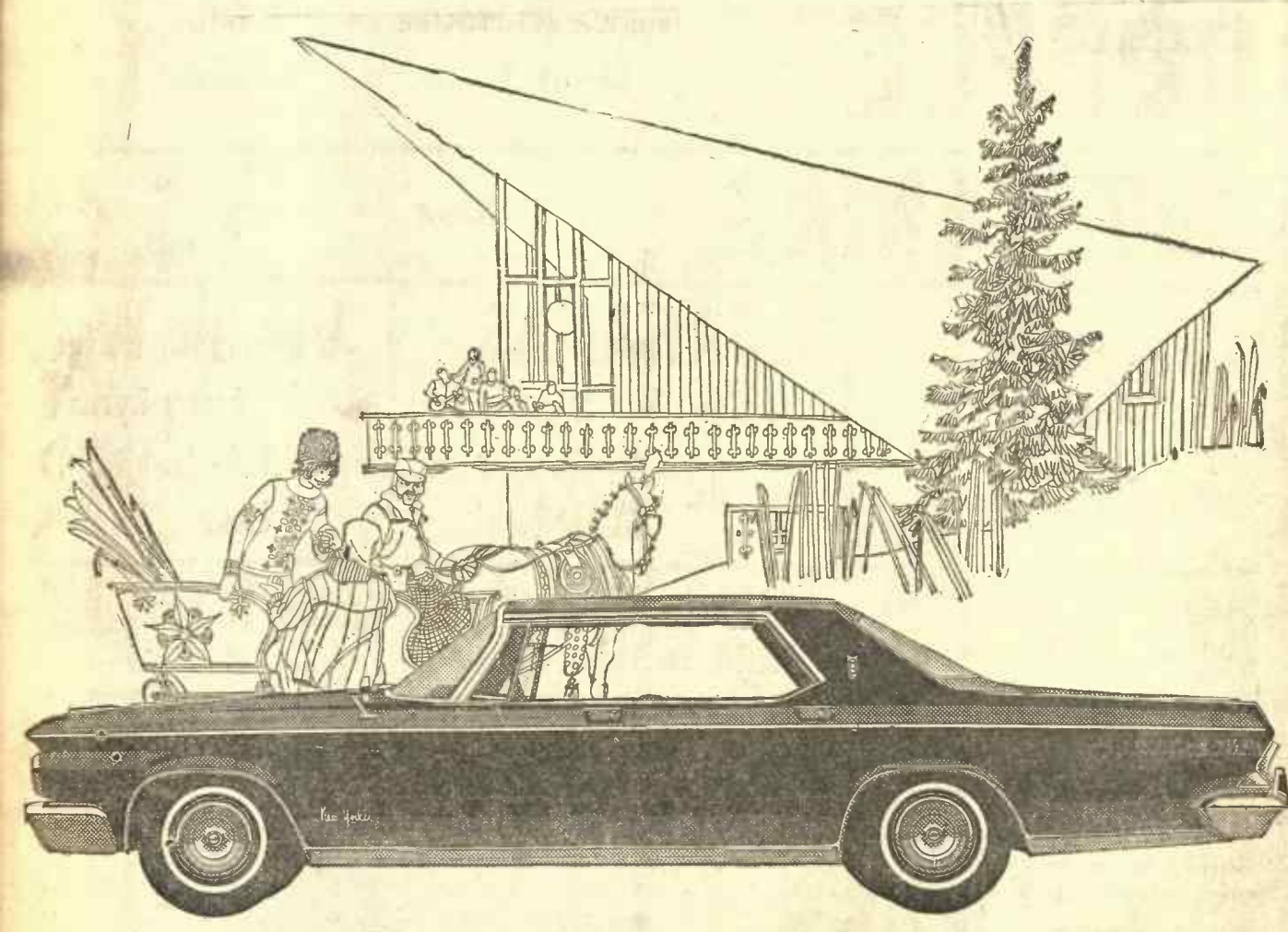

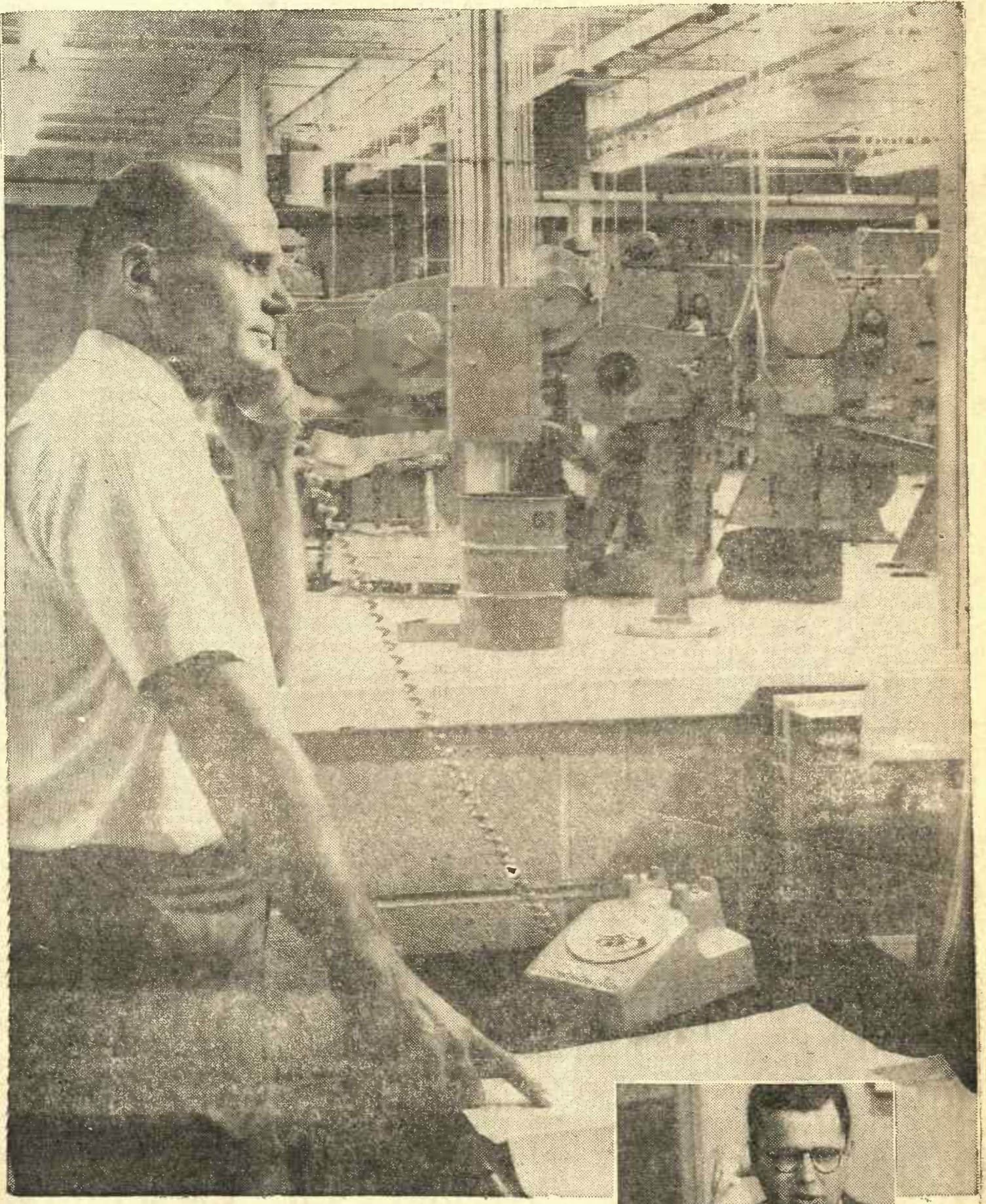

Court Circuit Concluded

Final Disposition Made Of 4 Civil, 13 Criminal Cases

The January term of Circuit Court in Tishomingo County was concluded last Thursday afternoon by Judge N. S. (Soggy) Sweat, Jr.

The court docket was comprised of 21 civil cases and 28 criminal cases. Final disposition was made of 4 civil cases and 13 criminal cases, with one criminal case being transferred to Youth Court.

Several sentences were issued by Judge Sweat on the final day of court. Nellie Sue Jourdan, indicted by the Grand Jury at the August 1963 term for the murder of her husband last April, was given a sentence of 15 years in the state penitentiary with 7 1/2 years being held up on good behavior.

Jackie Alexander, found guilty of armed robbery, was sentenced to 12 years in the penitentiary, the sentence being reduced to six years for good behavior. Alexander was charged in the robbery of McCune's Restaurant last November.

William Harold Edmondson and Theron Brock, both charged with distillery possession, were given a sentence of 2 years in the state penitentiary with that time suspended, and each placed under 5 year probation.

The final sentence was issued to Earl Watson Hill, indicted for crime of burglary and larceny. Hill was sentenced to 7 years in the state penitentiary, with 5 years suspended on good behavior.
