Feed Grain Sign-Up Begins

Opening Date Is
Feb. 10; Program
Deadline, March 27

Farmers of Tishomingo County will have the opportunity to sign or rent all or part of their Feed Grain Base on Monday, Feb. 10. According to E. N. Allen, ASCS Office Manager, an Advance Payment amounting to one-half of the total payment will be paid at the time, with the other one-half to be paid in the summer after the acreage is measured.

"Any farmer who rents at least 20 percent of his total Feed Grain Base will earn a payment for Acreage Diversion and also become eligible for the Feed Grain Price Support Payment," Mr. Allen said. The opening date to sign up is Feb. 10 and the deadline is March 27.

All cotton farmers who will not plant all or any part of their 1964 cotton Allotment are urged to release this acreage to the County Committee. "The deadline date for releasing this acreage will be March 30," Mr. Allen stated.

Farmers who would like to make application for additional cotton acres; this is, borrow cotton acreage, may file an application at the ASCS Office from now until March 30. Applications for new grower cotton allotment are being received from now until February 15.

With graduation near, Tommy is faced with a host of attractive offers. Upon graduation, Tommy will be eligible to sign either a professional baseball contract or a grant-in-aid program in either sport to some lucky college. During the past scout for the Los Angeles Dodgers, and Buddy Lewis, St. Louis Cardinals Scout, have paid Tommy visits. College scouts will get the first chance at Tommy after April 1 when open season begins on basketballers in the South Eastern Conference.

\$1,982,000 Is County's Share Of Fed. Budget

Tishomingo County taxpayers will be required to pay \$1,982,000 in federal taxes as their share of the proposed \$97.9 billion fiscal federal budget for 1964 if it is adopted by Congress, the Mississippi Economic Council estimates.

The MEC said the state will be called upon to pay \$450,340,000 as its share of the total budget, and this county's share of the state total is arrived at by applying an economic index which shows the county to bear 44 per cent of taxes paid by the state. A national economic index shows Mississippi to pay 0.46 per cent of total federal taxes, and this percentage applied to the proposed federal budget gives the state's share.

Earl E. Holder, 54-year-old former resident of this county, was one of five persons killed last Wednesday morning in a four-vehicle crash which occurred on a narrow bridge near Guntersville, Ala. Holder died shortly before noon Wednesday at the New Guntersville Hospital.

Holder, a medical technician for TVA, was working at Guntersville Dam and living in Guntersville for the duration of his work there. He was a passenger in a 1957 Pontiac auto which was hit by a gasoline truck.

Funeral services for Mr. Holder were held Friday at 3 p.m. at St. John's Episcopal Church in Tuscumbia. Burial was in Oakwood Cemetery. Mays Brown-Service Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Holder was a native of Mississippi and spent his childhood here. He was educated at Tishomingo High School and Union University at Jackson, Tenn. He had been with TVA almost since its conception and was active in early Malaria Control projects, later going with the medical phase of the work, where he served as technician on various occasions through the valley. He had served at Colbert Steam Plant and Wheeler Dam before being transferred to Guntersville in August. He had resided in Tuscumbia for 12 years.

Whole Blood: To replace blood lost by injuries, diseases, and surgical operations an absolute necessity for open heart surgery.

Packed Red Blood Cells: To correct or alleviate a red cell deficiency in blood diseases. Serum Albumin: Used in treatment of various kidney diseases and emergency replacement of lost blood volume.

Antihemophilic Globulin: To control bleeding when it is a result of hemophilia.

Vaccine Immune Globulin: Used to arrest abnormal reactions to small pox vaccinations. Single Donor Fresh Frozen Plasma: Plasma from fresh blood used to control bleeding as a result of hemophilia.

Irradiated Plasma: Used to replace fluids lost from the body and as an emergency substitute for whole blood.

Heparinized Whole Blood: Used to prime heart lung machine in open heart surgery.

Mrs. Carsten concluded with this question, "If you could save a life, by giving blood, WOULD YOU?" You will have your chance to give tomorrow at the National Guard Armory between the hours of 10 a.m. and 5 p.m.

Plant Pine Trees On Your Idle Land



This local stand of loblolly pine was planted twenty-seven years ago on idle eroding land. The pine stand has needed thinning for about nine years. When the new market for pulpwood became available, a thinning was made with 8 cords per acre removed in the Summer of 1963. There are 25 cords per acre still standing. The stand will need thinning again in two or three years and regularly at that interval for many years. Industry foresters marked the timber that was cut.

What would the land be like if pine had not been planted? While driving around Tishomingo County, look at the countless thousands of acres of broomsedge fields, and gullies and you will know what it would be like.

Which is worth more — 33 cords of pine pulpwood, or broomsedge, scrub hardwood, and gullies?

Have you planned your pine planting program for this Winter? Planting pines on idle land is good business.

\$50,915,000 Is TVA's Budget For Fiscal Year

Major Items For Capital Outlay In Appropriation Budget Discussed; \$36 Million Is For Construction

The President's budget for the 1965 fiscal year, which starts next July 1, requests an appropriation of \$50,915,000 for the Tennessee Valley Authority.

About \$36 million is for construction and \$14.9 million is for operating expenses of TVA programs other than electric power.

In addition, TVA expects to spend about \$319 million in fiscal 1965 from its electric power revenues and borrowings, and \$25 million from non-power proceeds (mainly fertilizer sales).

The power program is financed from the sale of electricity and borrowings by sales of bonds and notes. Proceeds from the sale of fertilizer products in experimental and educational activities are used in paying fertilizer production costs. Other TVA resources development expense is financed from appropriations as are similar services provided across the country by other Federal agencies.

The 1965 appropriation of \$50.9 million requested for TVA is about \$3.8 million more than the appropriation Congress approved in December for the current fiscal year. Most of this increase is for construction, with the Nickajack Dam and Land between the Lakes projects scheduled to get into full-scale phases of construction activity in fiscal 1965.

The budget requests \$700,000 for design of a new building on the Chickamauga Dam reservation to house TVA's Chattanooga offices, and \$215,000 for beginning design work on a water control system for Bear Creek in northwest Alabama. Other construction funds are for continuing work on projects started previously.

Major items for capital outlay in the appropriation budget include:

- \$9,800,000 for continuing construction on the new Nickajack Dam west of Chattanooga, scheduled to begin this spring.
- \$6,300,000 to continue rehabilitation and improvement of the National Fertilizer Development Center at Muscle Shoals, Alabama.
- \$6,000,000 to continue development of the Land Between the Lakes recreation area in western Kentucky and Tennessee, scheduled to start this spring.
- \$5,687,000 for substantial completion of work on the new Guntersville Dam lock in north Alabama.
- \$3,005,000 for substantial completion of the Beech River multipurpose water control system in west Tennessee.
- \$1,724,000 to continue construction of flood control facilities to help protect the cities of Bristol, Tennessee-Virginia.
- \$700,000 for design of a new TVA central building for its

Chattanooga offices and power dispatching center.

\$215,000 to begin design work on a multipurpose water control system for northwest Alabama's Bear Creek Basin.

Power

TVA estimates gross proceeds of its power program for fiscal 1965 at about \$296 million, with expenses of \$183 million, leaving estimated net proceeds before depreciation of about \$113 million. It also expects to borrow \$75 million through the sale of power bonds or notes.

The dividends and repayment to the U. S. Treasury on the appropriations investment in the TVA power system will require about \$52 million from power proceeds. The agency also expects to spend about \$137 million on power system construction and other capital items, slightly less than the total anticipated for the current fiscal year.

The need for new generating capacity on the TVA system in the next few years will be met partly by large power interchanges scheduled with Mississippi Power & Light Co. and associated systems. In fiscal 1965 TVA expects to spend \$66 million for transmission facilities—much of it for 500,000-volt lines to meet load growth on the system and carry the power exchanges—while work on new generating capacity will be somewhat less than in recent years, totaling about \$67 million.

The largest part of that amount is for continuing construction on Bull Run Steam Plant, where TVA is building one 900,000-kilowatt generating unit. Also scheduled in the budget is a start on a new project involving another unit of similar size, and some work will remain in fiscal 1965 to complete Paradise Steam Plant (now in operation) and the eighth unit at Widows Creek Steam Plant.

River Development

The budget includes \$9.8 million for continuing construction of the new Nickajack Dam, which will replace the leaking, 50-year-old Hales Bar Dam on the Tennessee River. The ultimate total cost, with two navigation locks, is estimated at about \$70 million. Hales Bar was acquired by TVA in 1939. Work on this project will have begun during the spring.

Improved lock facilities in the Nickajack project will carry on TVA's long range program of providing larger locks to avoid river traffic bottlenecks. New large locks were completed in 1959 at Wilson Dam and in 1963 at Wheeler Dam. The budget includes about \$5.7 million which will substantially complete the new \$17.5 million lock being built at Guntersville Dam.

The appropriations budget includes about \$5 million for operating expense of multipurpose budget includes about \$5 million for operating expense of multipurpose reservoirs and the navigation and flood control programs. TVA's program of cooperative local flood studies will continue, with \$313,000 budgeted for this work. The budget includes \$1,724,000 to continue construction of two small flood control dams above the cities of Bristol, Tennessee, and Bristol, Virginia.

ia, which TVA will start this spring. These dams are part of a comprehensive flood damage prevention plan developed by the cities and TVA.

Tributary Area Projects

The budget provides about \$3 million for substantial completion of the multipurpose water control system of eight small dams and channel improvements which TVA is building on the Beech River as part of a comprehensive area development program there in cooperation with the state and local citizens.

It also provides \$215,000 for beginning design work on a multipurpose system in the Bear Creek Basin of northwest Alabama, where some 2,000 local citizens are participating in an area development effort. This too would involve a combination of small dams and channel improvements for several purposes, including reduction of frequent crop-season floods. Based on preliminary information, total project cost is expected to be in the order of \$15 million.

Land Between The Lakes

The budget includes \$6 million for fiscal 1965 for the 170,000-acre demonstration recreation area being developed by TVA between Kentucky Lake and Lake Barkley in western Kentucky-Tennessee. Detailed planning, land acquisition and some preliminary construction are expected to be well under way by the start of the fiscal year in July. Project construction will take several years, and the total cost is estimated at \$32.5 million.

Chattanooga TVA Building

The budget provides \$700,000 for design of a new building on the Chickamauga Dam reservation outside Chattanooga to house TVA's power dispatching center and various offices of the agency now located in downtown Chattanooga, including those of the Office of Power, Division of Purchasing, Division of Property and Supply, Division of Health and Safety, Computing Center, and Maps and Surveys Branch.

The dispatching facility—nerve center of the TVA power system—is outgrowing its present quarters downtown and is linked to the dam by exposed cables vulnerable to natural or man-made disaster. TVA said the new building will provide a more satisfactory site for the dispatching center, and that more efficient operations will result from consolidating various other TVA offices now scattered throughout downtown Chattanooga.

Preliminary cost estimate for the new building is about \$18 million.

Fertilizer

The appropriation request includes \$13,601,000 for TVA's program of fertilizer, agricultural and munitions development.

This cost includes about \$3.5 million for fertilizer educational programs; \$3.4 million for research on products, processes and uses of fertilizer; and \$6.7 million for agricultural development projects and marketing studies.

The test-demonstration program jointly sponsored by land-grant colleges and TVA will be continued on an estimated 2,793 farms. Sales of fertilizer to farmers for educational purposes through industry and cooperative distributors also will continue. Between them, these programs involve farmers in 42 states.

Additions, replacements, and improvements to the chemical and agronomic laboratories and experimental production plant are budgeted at \$6.3 million, about \$2.5 million less than in the current year's budget. These continuing improvements are being made to modernize the Fertilizer Center, not to expand production.

Proceeds from the sale of fertilizer during fiscal year '65 are estimated at \$17,675,000.

Miss Connie Sue Hudson is Iuka School's 1964 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow. She was awarded a "Homemaker of Tomorrow" pin signifying her achievement by General Mills, Inc., sponsor of the program. Her test paper will be entered in competition for state honors.

The state Homemaker of Tomorrow will be awarded a \$1,500 college scholarship and will be named a national finalist. Her school will be presented with a set of Encyclopedia

Fertilizer production expenses are substantially paid from these and other nonpower proceeds.

Cooperative Valley Development Programs

Development work in these three related programs will continue at about the present level, with operating expenses budgeted at \$1,071,000 for forestry projects, \$124,000 for mineral resource studies, and \$1,018,000 for tributary area development.

Summary

Funds to finance TVA during the 1965 fiscal year would be provided as follows:

Power program—\$295,714,000 from proceeds, \$923,000 from reserves, \$75,000,000 from borrowings. To provide \$179,617, for expenses, \$3,170,000 for power inventories and deferred charges, \$52,200,000 for payments to the U. S. Treasury, and \$136,650,000 for capital outlay.

Other resource development programs—\$25,035,000 from proceeds, \$349,000 from reserves, and \$50,915,000 from the appropriation. To provide \$40,284,000 for operating expenses and \$36,015,000 for capital outlay.

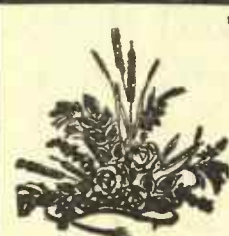

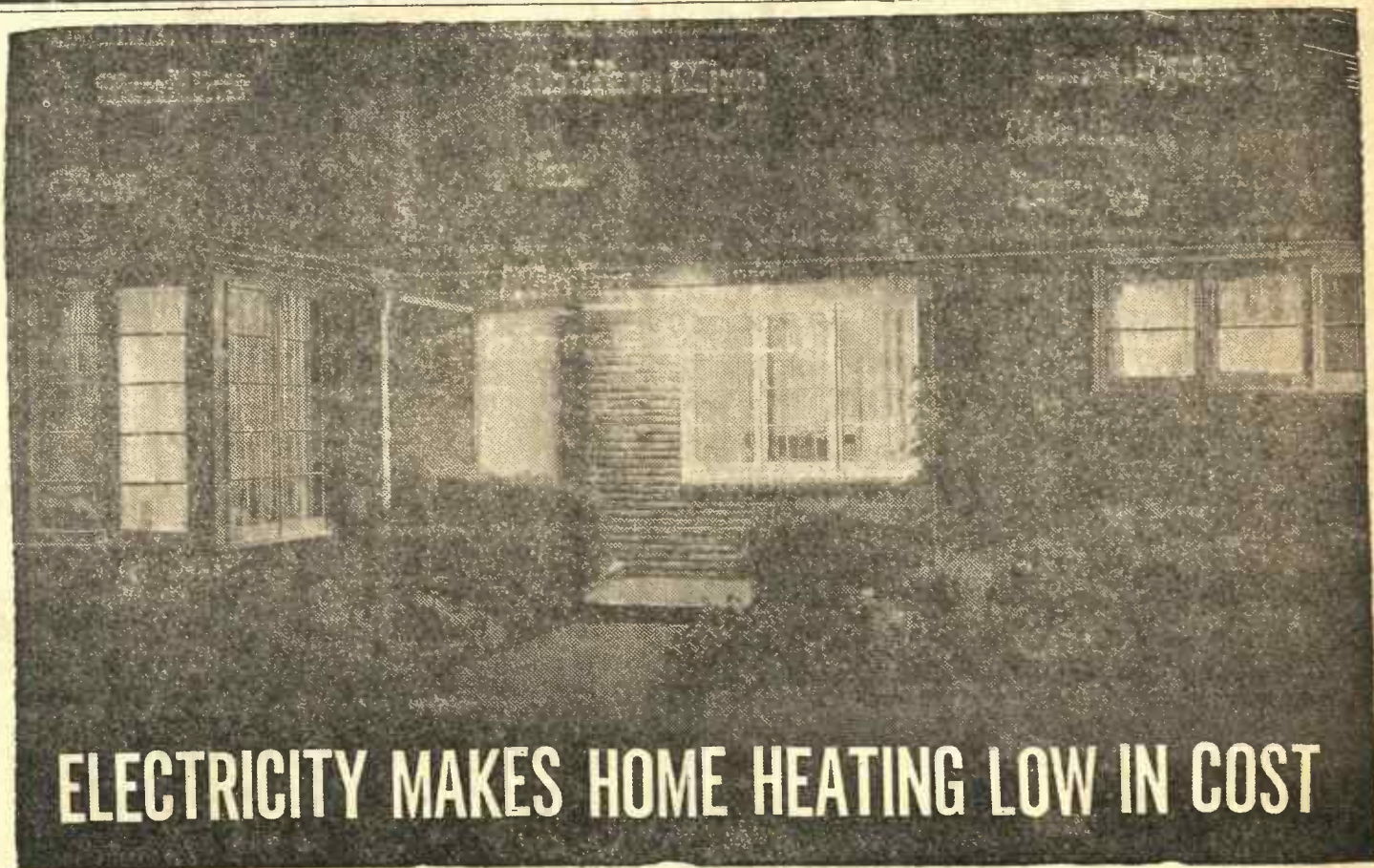

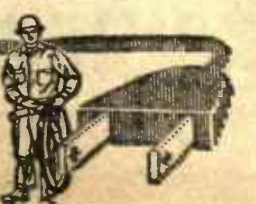

Feed Grain

Orchard Notes

In North Mississippi spray peach trees also with bordeaux mixture while dormant to control peach leaf-curl disease. The bordeaux mixture may be applied with oil emulsion spray.

How Long Will Food Keep In The Refrigerator?

Just how long food will last in your refrigerator without spoiling depends on a number of things. How fresh was the food when you brought it home from the grocery store? How long and under what conditions was it kept there before you bought it?

You might be able to keep food safely a little longer than the storage limits listed in this column, but it's better to observe them for quality's sake.

Storage for Very Perishable Foods. 24 hours—Fresh Fish, Shellfish (wrapped loosely); Ground Beef; Meat; Poultry, Fish and Egg Salads (covered). 1 to 2 days—Cooked Fish, Shellfish (covered or wrapped); Canned Fish, Shellfish (opened, covered); Soups, Gravies (covered); Variety Meats (wrapped loosely); Poultry Stuffing (removed from roasted bird, covered or wrapped); Casseroles, Stews (covered); Berries (in crisper or moistureproof wrapping).

2 to 3 days—Custards, Custard Sauces, Cream-filled Pies or Cakes (on coldest shelf). 3 to 4 days—Fruit Juices (in covered container).

3 to 5 days—Vegetables, Salad Greens (in crisper or moisture proof wrapping); fruits other than citrus and apples which will keep in crisper for 7 days. Bananas should not be refrigerated.

Moderately Perishable. 1 to 4 days—Leftover Vegetables (in covered container); Canned Vegetables (in original can or other covered container); Cooked Fruit (in original can or other covered container); Cooked Fruit (in covered container); Egg Yolks (covered with water); Egg Whites (in covered container); Cooked Meats, Poultry (covered or wrapped).

2 to 3 days—Baby Foods (covered, in original can or jar). 3 to 5 days—Cold Cuts (ham, salami, etc., wrapped, on coldest shelf); Evaporated milk (in

open can); Cottage Cheese (in closed container); Canned Ham (wrapped, on coldest shelf); Meats (wrapped or covered loosely, on coldest shelf). 3 days—Milk, Cream (in carton or bottle). 8 to 10 days—Hard-cooked Eggs (in shells). 1 week—Bacon (wrapped, on coldest shelf).

1 to 2 weeks—Butter, Margarine (covered or wrapped); Soft Cheese (in closed container, on coldest shelf). 2 weeks—Whole Cured Ham (wrapped, on coldest shelf). 2 to 4 weeks—Eggs (in carton, in covered dish, or on special rack); Root Vegetables (in crisper or moistureproof wrapping). 6 to 12 weeks—Mayonnaise, Salad Dressing (in covered container). 3 to 6 months—Hard Cheese (in moisture proof wrapping).

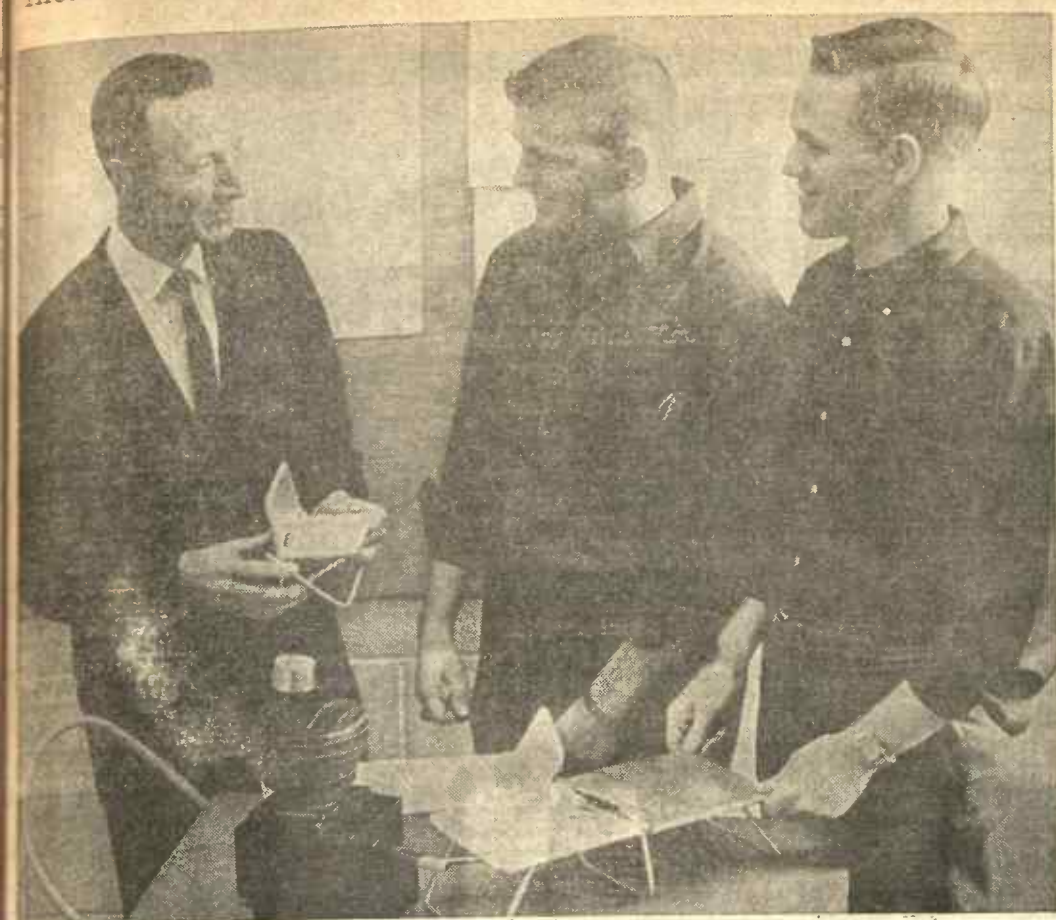

DEADLINE FOR PAYING YOUR 1963 TAXES ON REAL ESTATE AND PERSONAL PROPERTY IS

SATURDAY, FEB. 1

All Taxes Unpaid After That Date Shall Be Delinquent And A Penalty May Be Charged.

POLL TAX IS ALSO DUE AND PAYABLE BY SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 1

ANY PERSON OWNING A TRUCK OR AUTOMOBILE ON WHICH OUT-OF-STATE TAGS ARE USED, IS HEREBY WARNED THAT MISSISSIPPI LAW REQUIRES ALL VEHICLES TO CARRY MISSISSIPPI TAGS. PERSONS VIOLATING THIS LAW SHALL BE DEALT WITH ACCORDINGLY.

BOAT TRAILER LAW

(Excerpts from Sec. 9352-09, Miss. Code of 1942 as Amended)

Trailers.—(a) In all cases where a trailer or semi-trailer is used for the transportation of property, either as a common carrier, contract carrier, private commercial carrier, dray, private carrier, or otherwise, and is operated in conjunction with, and is drawn by a tractor or other motor vehicle, the tax upon such motor vehicle, truck tractor or road tractor shall be calculated and levied on the maximum gross weight of such vehicle, and the tax to be levied upon the operator thereof upon each motor vehicle, truck tractor or road tractor drawing a trailer or semi-trailer shall be computed in accordance with the foregoing schedules in the proper classification. In such cases, however, the gross weight of the trailer or semi-trailer shall be combined with the gross weight of the truck tractor, road tractor or other motor vehicle, and the total gross weight of both vehicles counted as one unit shall be used in determining the tax to be paid under this act. Provided, however, that no tax shall be levied upon any trailer or any farm tractor using the highways solely in hauling or transporting farm products of the soil from the farm to the gin or market, or transporting fertilizer or feed to the farm, where the gross weight does not exceed eight thousand (8,000) pounds, and where the title to such products is still in the producer thereof.

(b) In cases where a trailer or semi-trailer transporting property or persons is used with and drawn by a private carrier of passengers, there is hereby levied an annual privilege tax upon each trailer or semi-trailer of one dollar (\$1.00).

Owners and users of Trailers are advised that tags MUST be properly displayed on their trailers. A close check shall be made to enforce this law.

Income Tax Return Forms 1099 And 1096 Must Be Filed By February 28

Every person engaged in a trade or business must file information returns covering 1963 payments of salaries, wages, commissions, and other forms of compensation for services rendered to him aggregating \$600 or more that is not reported on Form W-2, J. G. Martin, Jr., District Director Internal Revenue reminded today. Forms 1099 and 1096 should be used for this purpose and must be filed by February 28, 1964, he said. Filing instructions are contained on return Form 1096. Payments of rents, royalties, annuities, pensions, and other fixed or determinable income totaling \$600 or more must also be reported.

Information returns must also be filed by every person or organization who made payments of dividends or interest aggregating \$10 or more to any other person during 1963. The payers must also furnish recipients of dividends and interest with a record of the amounts reported to the Government.

Mr. Martin cautioned those preparing information forms that employer identification numbers and/or social security numbers must be entered in the space provided on the forms.

Filing Joint Returns
"It will be generally advantageous for married taxpayers to file a joint return," Mr. Martin said. "A husband and wife may file jointly even though only one had income," he added.

Mr. Martin urges taxpayers to use the preaddressed returns which were recently mailed to them. If an election is made to file jointly and the preaddressed

return contains only one name and social security number, the other spouse's name should be entered in the name and address space together with his social security number.
