ADDITIONAL SALES TAX ASKED BY IUKA BOARD

City Sets Election For Tuesday, March 10; Total Of 1% Is Sought

Among other business conducted by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Iuka in regular meeting at the City Hall Tuesday night was the passage of an ordinance declaring that an election be held to determine whether or not retail sales shall be taxed at the rate of 1%.

Date of the election was set for Tuesday, March 10, at which time qualified electors will have the choice of voting for or against the proposed tax. The polls will open at 8:00 a.m., and will close at 6:00 p.m.

One-half of one percent sales tax has been in effect in Iuka since August of 1955. Original sales tax collections for the city were considerably low with some being less than \$1,000.00 per month in the beginning. However, sales tax at the current 1/2 of 1% rate is estimated to be \$24,000.00 a year for 1963-64.

Certain items sold in retail trade will be exempt from the 1% tax, and certain services will also be exempt, with the exempted services and items drawing a smaller percent of taxation. In a statement published by the Board of Aldermen, purpose of the additional tax is set out. The statement says: "It is understood and agreed by the Aldermen of the City of Iuka that if the Ordinance with intention to levy an additional 1/2 sales tax is approved by the voters of the city of Iuka at an election to be held March 10, 1964, that the money obtained from the additional 1/2 sales tax will be used first for a sewer system in Iuka, and then for physical improvements for the City; and further, part of the additional 1/2 sales tax (if approved) will be used for the general administrative purposes of the city."

\$396,600 WILL BE USED TO ENLARGE HOSPITAL

**Crowded Conditions Demand
More Beds, Additional Facilities**

Crowded conditions at the Tishomingo County Hospital and the need for more beds and additional facilities has prompted the Board of Supervisors to make every effort possible to increase the size and capacity of the local institution.

In response to these efforts, the State Commission on Hospitals and Hospital Care has approved a formal application for an addition to the local hospital. The addition will include 25 beds in single rooms, a new nursing wing, a new hospital laundry, an enlarged and remodeled kitchen, additions to the central facilities and greater administrative areas.

Robert Lambert, administrator for the hospital, states that crowded conditions have been excessive for the past year and that at all times during 1963, the hospital was filled to over 100% of occupancy. Visitors to the hospital have noted patients receiving treatment in the hallways.

Cost of the additions will be \$396,600.00, with the State and Federal shares being two-thirds and the local share being one-third. Broken down, the State and Federal share will be \$264,400.00 and the county share \$132,200.00.

Mr. Lambert further stated the hospital now employs upwards of 65 people and that with the new addition, employment will be increased by 20 to 25. There are eight practicing physicians that now use the hospital, and 8 registered nurses are employed in supervisory capacities.

Further action of the Board of Supervisors will be taken in the immediate future to expedite completion of the project.

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Nat'l. Children's Dental Health Week, Feb. 2-8

Survey By State Board Of Health
Reveals Tooth Decay Big Problem

Tooth decay is a major health problem of Mississippi children, usually affecting more than 90 per cent by the time teenage is reached.

Findings from a survey, made by the State Board of Health in eight Mississippi towns, reveal that the average six year old white child had more than 3 decayed primary teeth.

Eleven year olds had three permanent teeth damaged by dental decay, according to the study.

"The permanent teeth, which start developing around birth and begin to appear in the mouth about six, can and should last a lifetime," stated Dr. Aaron Trubman, Supervisor of Public Health Dentistry of the State Board of Health.

"Yet, more than half the population past 45 years of age wear some type of dentures. Quite often the start of this unnecessary dental loss is during childhood," Dr. Trubman explained.

To prevent loss of teeth from dental decay, treatment should be rendered as soon as possible.

"This means," said Dr. Trubman, "that regular visits to the dentist should be made so that areas of decayed teeth can be detected before extensive or untreatable damage has taken place."

While dental science has not been able to eradicate tooth decay, measures are available to reduce it greatly. They are:

1. Proper toothbrushing, especially right after eating. This is so important because sugar on teeth surfaces is rapidly converted into acid, which is the beginning of the decay process. When brushing is not possible, at least rinsing the mouth with water will accomplish some removal of the sugar.

2. Reduction in eating and drinking of confections. Consuming sweets frequently during the day subject the teeth

to almost continuous acid attacks.

3. Topical fluoride applications to the surfaces of the teeth. The frequency of these applications should be determined by the dentist, as individuals vary in susceptibility to decay.

4. Drinking fluoridated water. Drinking water containing adequate amount of fluoride during the first 10 years of life will drastically reduce the susceptibility of permanent teeth to decay from childhood and throughout life. Fluoridation of community water supplies requiring this additional fluoride is a simple, inexpensive measure for any town to undertake.

"The means are available to reduce the ravages of tooth decay and its adverse effect on health. What is necessary is that we take advantage of them," Dr. Trubman emphasized.

Sensing The News

The NCC And Parental Authority
In the fight to preserve constitutional government and the free enterprise system, nothing is more important than guarding the institution of the family.

In American life, the family is the basic unit in which a child learns the religious, national and personal values by which a person ought to live. Moreover, as a family is a collection of individuals, cooperating freely and relying on traditional truths, it is a teaching experience that prepares youths for an ethical existence and for a useful place in our capitalist society.

This is worth mentioning because totalitarians always seek to undermine the family and subject children to outside disciplines and to the thought reform and control that is called "brainwashing." Indeed, it is lamentably true that even in the free United States there are attempts being made to damage parental authority.

One such effort was made public in mid-January when the Youth Ministry Consultation on Race, sponsored by the Emergency Commission on Religion and Race of the National Council of Churches, was held at the Methodist General Board of Education building in Nashville, Tenn.

In a shocking display of contempt for law and order and for the right of parents to educate their children in their own values, the meeting openly proclaimed ways and means by which parental authority could be subverted. One adult editor of a "youth" magazine said that youths should be "blooded" in demonstrations, that "the kids owe it to the church to march, to picket . . ." She pointed out that "all over the nation parents have restrictive influences. Summer camp (church) is the first time for the youth to get away, free to do as they like." Another speaker said: "Parents in the North would get as mad at seeing their kids in a labor picket line as in a civil rights line . . . We need to get the kids politically involved." Indeed speaker after speaker urged that youths be encouraged to get in conflict with the law.

The Nashville Banner, in a strong comment on this National Council of Churches-sponsored conference, said: "These are, Mr. and Mrs. America, YOUR children this 'Emergency Commission' panel is talking about—and the parental authority it proposes to subvert is yours. The teenager it seeks to attract for its own scaffold use is right out of your home, school and church. The ideological manipulators are now picking them young."

Good churchmen undoubtedly are shocked to find that an organization that describes itself as religious in character should be urging youngsters to get out from under parental influence and to join street demonstrators in violation of the law of the communities in which they live.

These are many things that are outrageous about such efforts. But the worst of all is how it violates the precepts of the Christian religion. "Honor thy father and mother," says the commandment. But the NCC's commission would have the youngsters honor a commitment to civil disobedience rather than parental injunctions to

be law-abiding members of their communities.

Thus the damage done by such adult advice is not simply to the communities that might be plunged into strife but to the children themselves. To urge children to break the law and to engage in what amounts to social revolutionary activity is to damage a child's development. For Christians, this is shocking beyond words, for Jesus Christ specifically condemned anyone who would harm a child in any way. He said it were better that they have a millstone tied around their necks and to be cast into the sea than to harm a little one.

And what kind of citizens would these children be who accepted indoctrination by the NCC Commission instead of heeding the lawful authority of parents and community? Would they be law-abiding adults after having been law-breakers in their youth? What the NCC Commission suggested is that one can choose the laws one wishes to obey. Such a suggestion is unworthy of belief.

In learning of the conference's efforts to get students to join civil disobedience campaigns, one's thoughts go back to the terrible Nazi era and the rise of the Hitler youth movements in which youngsters were encouraged to become militant demonstrators and pay no heed to their parents' counsel. Such attacks on parental authority have no place in the United States of America.

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Coach Bonner Arnold

Coach At Northeast Since 1948

Coach Bonner Arnold
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By All Sports Circles

Coach Bonner Arnold has the distinction of being the first and only coach in the history of the Northeast Mississippi Junior College. He has behind him a record that all sports figures admire and rival coaches envy. Coach Arnold is widely noted for the development of Centers in junior colleges.

Coach Arnold, who started his coaching career at Hills Chapel High School in 1931, has left records that range from high school State Championships to National Junior College runner-up. Coach Arnold, a graduate of Mississippi State University with a B. S. degree and the University of Mississippi with a M. A. degree, began his junior college coaching at Northeast in 1948.

The name of Bonner Arnold and Northeast Basketball has almost become a legend in itself. While Coach Arnold has been at Northeast, he has won 463 games and lost 104. His teams have won a total of 35 trophies. His records include winning the most junior college championships and the most conference games. He has coached five All Americans, Ken Lindsey, Gene Garrett, Charley Floyd, Jimmy Benson, Vince Del Negro; the National Junior College Runner-up twice; and the Most All State Players. Coach Arnold also has the honor of having coached a professional and Olympic Star, Adrian Smith of the Cincinnati Royals.

Aside from coaching, Coach

Arnold is Athletic Director, head of the Physical Education Department, member of the faculty, a community leader and maintains and operates a large farm. "Coach," as Northeast knows him, has no plans in sight for retirement from basketball or his busy daily schedule. When asked if he could explain the reason for his success in coaching, he remarked that, "Good players make a coach successful." When asked to name his most talented players, he declined, saying that while some were better than others, all shaped in the victories.



Tree Farming For The Future

Tree farming is the biggest farming enterprise in Tishomingo County. More land is being used to grow trees than is devoted to all other crops in Tishomingo County. This is as it should be, because of the topography and the nature of the land.

There is a difference in just having some woodland and in having a tree farm. There is an abundance of woodland in Tishomingo County that needs the treatment that would make it more productive.

Tree farming is a science and requires definite knowledge and skills on the part of the owner or operator. This knowledge and these needed skills can be acquired by taking advantage of the opportunities now afforded all landowners in the county.

Your County Agent can get the services of trained forest-

ers, from Mississippi State University, to teach groups interested in forestry through actual demonstrations on the land. The Area Forester is willing and well qualified to assist you with practices that will make your woodland more productive.

Your County ASCS office will advise with you on how the federal government will pay part of the expense of certain forestry practices approved by your Area Forester. The local SCS personnel will prepare a simple woodland plan to aid you in making your woodland more profitable.

Too, the personnel of the big land companies, who operate in Tishomingo County, will give you information and advise on how to make your woodland operation more efficient.

The number of tree farmers is steadily increasing in Tishomingo County as more and more landowners are taking advantage of the opportunity afforded them. The triangular Tree Farm sign is a mark of distinction for the landowner who has one on his farm. This sign indicates that he is doing something to make his woodland more productive.

Be a tree farmer—not just a farmer who has some woodland.

CAPITAL NEWS

The Secretary Of State
Secretary of State Heber Laddner predicts that the year 1964 will be "our greatest year" in the economic growth of Mississippi. There has been a gradual and steady increase in the past two decades, but all indications are the capital investments will increase at a greater rate during the next few years than ever before. Foreign investment capital is looking toward Mississippi and other southern states as never before, and good fortune awaits us in all phases of our economy if we will pursue, with faith,

our task—that of our tremendous potential resources into production.

The office of Secretary of State was created in 1820, thereto, it was the Secretary of the Territorial 133 of the Constitution 1890 created the present of Secretary of State; contrary to belief of many that it is primarily a political office, many administrative responsibilities are upon the secretary.

The Secretary of State charged with the responsibility of granting all domestic (for profit) and all foreign corporate (not for profit) to do business in the state. Another important duty of the Secretary of State is the supervision of the sale of securities within the state. The last biennial period was a 38 per cent average increase in the number of corporations, dealers, agents, exemption applications and registered prior biennial period.

The Mississippi Official Statistical Register, known as the "Blue Book," published by the Secretary of State under the authority of law. In this register is a compilation of information regarding the operation of all state departments as well as facts pertaining to the cultural, industrial and commercial life of the state.

Importance Of Good Varieties Shown In Tests

Extensive cotton variety testing by the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station helps planters choose varieties that will make the most money for them.

Last year 17 varieties were compared at four locations in the Delta. At one of these locations the gross value of the top variety was computed at \$454 per acre while the poorest adapted variety made only \$305. Under these circumstances, variety alone apparently made \$149 per acre difference in the value of these two crops.

Delta test locations were Stoneville, Tunica, Yazoo City and Clarksdale. James B. Dick and Robert H. Loe, USDA and Delta Branch Experiment Station agronomists, were in charge of this research work.

In the hill sections of the state, 19 varieties were entered in nine tests. G. D. Green, agronomist at State College, conducted the tests with the help of agronomists from Branch Experiment Stations at Brooksville, Verona, Holly Springs, Pontotoc, Raymond, and Newton.

Results of the 1963 variety tests are measured not only in yields of seed cotton and lint. The Experiment Station is also concerned with such factors as size of bolls, staple length and strength. Yield averages over a period of several years are also computed to offset seasonal differences.

Complete results of the 1963 cotton tests are published in the January issue of Mississippi Farm Research, available on request from the Experiment Station at State College.

New varieties lead the list. The 10 highest yielding varieties in the hill section tests, only Stoneville 3202 and Auburn 56 have been in the tests as long as five years.

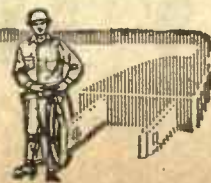

Mid-South Cotton Market Report

Here's the latest news from the Mississippi cotton market. Buying of cotton Loan certificates slackened in the Midwest this week, according to U.S.D.A.'s Agricultural Marketing Service. Demand for cotton weakened on both count and central markets throughout the territory. Prices for equities were mostly steady and ranged from \$1.00 to \$1.30 per bale. The higher grades were paid for Strict Low Middling and lower grades and staples of 1-3/32. Demand continued strong for low grades in the 10 to 29.00 cent range and low Grade cotton at 22.00 to 20 cents. Fair weather prevailed throughout most of the week allowing farmers to make the headway in stalk cutting and land preparation. Here's how conditions look on the Memphis market: Trading was dull and prices

were fairly steady. Strict Low Middling and higher grades with 1-1/16 inches and longer staples made up the bulk of purchases. Demand strengthened somewhat for low grade cotton but the short supply in these qualities limited trading.

HOME AGENT NOTES

By Mrs. Dianne F. Crubaugh
Tishomingo County Home Demonstration Agent

Prospects are for plenty of good, inexpensive eating during February, according to the plentiful foods list.

Foods for you to choose from are broiler-fryers and pecans at the top of the list, followed by beef, pork, canned corn, potatoes, canned ripe olives and apples.

If you choose canned corn, you will find you can add flavor to it with a dozen seasonings — used individually or in combination. These seasonings include celery salt, onion salt, garlic salt, chili sauce, chili powder, paprika, nutmeg, marjoram, thyme, dried sage, instant onion or freshly grated black pepper.

You can accent heated cream style corn with brown sugar, salt and pepper and sprinkle with crisp bacon crumbles.

When you buy potatoes, choose the size according to the way you plan to cook them. Many people like large potatoes for baking. For boiling, others prefer small potatoes. For general use most homemakers like medium sized potatoes because it is easier to estimate portions and there is less waste in peeling them.

Whatever the cooking method, choose potatoes of the same size to have them done for a meal in the same length of time. If you buy bags of mixed sizes, sort for sizes for different meals.

When you select fresh pork, look for a light, grayish-pink color. The meat should be fine
