\$55,000 In Bonds Will Be For Belmont Airport

3,000 Ft. Paved Lighted Runway Will Be Built Near Town Limits

Final stages in acquiring the necessary local funds for the construction of the Belmont Airport in the Fifth district were started this week with the publication that the county will issue \$55,000.00 in bonds for that purpose.

The Board of Supervisors, in cooperation with civic leaders of the Fifth district, will bear one-fourth the cost of constructing a 3,000 foot lighted and paved runway with the federal government and state assuming three-fourths the cost.

Location of the Belmont Airport will be south-east of the town between Highway 25 and the Red Bay, Ala. highway. Lay of the land is ideal for an

constructed with less expenditure on that property than on another site.

Since purchase of the property, the Iuka project has developed into a stalemate with no further progress being made at this time. However with the construction of the Belmont Airport, Tishomingo county will be in a far better position to attract industry than heretofore.

Belmont civic leaders state they do not anticipate any difficulty and that full cooperation from all Fifth District residents and citizens is expected.

Giving full support and cooperation in the construction of the Belmont Airport is the Mississippi Aeronautics Commission. This commission was formed in 1946 by an act of the legislature and among its duties is to encourage, foster and assist in the development of aeronautics in the state and to encourage the establishment of airports and other navigation facilities.

Aviation is now a principal mode of transportation in today's business world. Adequate airport facilities in all sections of Mississippi are essential to the economic growth of the state. Airport facilities are directly related to industrial development. The increasing use of the company-owned aircraft has made airport facilities a major consideration in locating an industry. This fact is recognized by officials and organizations active in seeking new industries for Mississippi.

Approximately two years ago, a movement to create an airport for Iuka was started. Last year, the Iuka Board of Aldermen spent slightly less than \$5,000.00 to purchase and did purchase the old Iuka airport located southeast of the city. This purchase was made on recommendation of the State Aeronautics Commission because, as a representative of the Commission said, the Federal government had previously spent approximately \$75,000.00 for grading and draining, and that a landing strip could be

Feed Grain Sign-Up Underway

\$10,000.00 In Drafts Already Paid To Approx. 50 Farmers

Approximately 50 farmers signed up to rent all or part of their 1964 Feed Grain Base during the first day of the Feed Grain Program Sign-Up on Monday of this week. According to E. N. Allen, ASOS Office Manager, these farmers were advanced one-half of their payment as they signed up, the drafts paid amounting to \$10,000.00.

Two incentives have been added to the program this year for the benefit of farmers participating. First, the rent on corn land has been increased approximately \$3.00 per acre over the 1963 program. The second incentive which makes the 1964 Feed Grain Program better is that if a farmer diverts (rents) 40 percent of his base, he can receive the high rate for all of the acres rented, plus Price Support at 15c per bushels, based on yield per acre on the acres of corn planted.

Mr. Allen urges all farmers to check on the program and to sign an application at the ASOS Office in Iuka if they do not need the acres of corn.

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Office is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. The closing date for renting will be March 27.

The program has been organized by and is under the direction of the County Extension Service and will get underway at 10 o'clock in the morning.

Welcome will be extended by Lamar Umfress, president of the Tishomingo County Unit Test Demonstration Families. Mrs. Travis Cain will conduct the devotional. Mrs. Cain is a member of the Balanced Farm and Home Planning Committee.

Beginning the discussion will be K. H. Buckley, Associate Extension Horticulturist. His topic will be on "Home Gardening" and will begin at 10:25.

At 11:10, "Foods for the Family" will be discussed by Mrs. Edwina Wise, specialist with the Foods and Nutrition Department of the Mississippi Extension Service.

At the noon hour, a "pot-luck" luncheon will be served. All who will be urged to bring a covered dish and join in spreading lunch.

From 1:10 to 1:50 in the afternoon, Kelton Anderson, Miss. State University Associate Agronomist, will discuss "Improved Fertility On Crops and Pastures." This is a topic that all farmers should be interested in due to the planting season just immediately ahead.

Concluding the program will be a discussion at 1:55 on "Good Lighting in the Home" by Mrs. Lillian Hicks, home economist for the TVA with offices in Tupelo.

Mrs. Hicks works in cooperation with the Tishomingo County Electric Power Association and is always happy to consult with any of the patrons of the association concerning use of electricity in the home.

Speakers on Tishomingo County's first annual Farm and Home Day are all thoroughly qualified by training and experience and valuable information should be gained in hearing them discuss their topics.

Kermit Buckley was the associate horticulturist of the Co-operative Extension Service has promoted a strong year-round home gardening program and has been instrumental in improving both quantity and quality of home produced vegetables throughout the state. Paper Co. To Award Scholarships

Students Must Take National Merit Qualifying Tests

During March, 1964, many high schools in this area will be administering National Merit Scholarship Corporation qualifying tests.

The National Merit Scholarship Corporation is a non-profit organization that administers tests to second semester high school juniors and first semester high school seniors. Each year hundreds of scholarships are awarded to students who are classified as "finalists" in the testing program.

In the fall of 1965, it is anticipated that Tennessee River Pulp & Paper Company will award three scholarships to male students who take the tests in March, 1964. Each scholarship is for four years and has a maximum value of \$6,000. Students can only become eligible to compete for the Tennessee River scholarships by taking the National Merit Scholarship qualifying tests.

The Tennessee River scholarships are for Vanderbilt Uni-

versity in the fields of engineering, business administration or liberal arts; Norwich University in Northfield, Vermont, in the fields of engineering, business administration or liberal arts; and North Carolina State College in the fields of forestry, chemical engineering or pulp and paper technology.

Local students are urged to ask their high school principals about participating in this testing program.

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2-Car Collision Proves Value Of Seat Belts

A two-car collision in north Mississippi proves once again the great value of seat belts in reducing traffic fatalities.

The circumstances involved two vehicles in a head-on collision on a week end at 2:05 p.m. The driver was the only occupant of car No. 1. Car No. 2 had the driver and a single passenger. The weather, road and light conditions were excellent.

The accident occurred on a straight, level road during daylight hours. However, for some unknown reason, the driver of car No. 1 was in the left lane of traffic. Car No. 2 pulled to the left to avoid the car and when he did so the driver of No. 1 straightened up and hit him head-on. The driver of car No. 1 was killed and the passenger in Car No. 2 was killed also. The driver of car No. 2 received only bruises and was not hospitalized. Driver of car No. 2 was the only person involved that was wearing a seat belt. Authorities feel that the belt prevented death or serious injury in this accident.

Commissioner of Public Safety T. B. Birdsong said, "This accident is just one more occasion where the value of seat belts is seen. The use of automotive seat belts could help reduce the death toll in accidents. We cannot stress too

much the value we put on the installation and use of these life-savers. Make safety your first concern. Install and use seat belts regularly."

Forestry Notes

Mississippi Forestry

Many landowners in Tishomingo County are taking advantage of good weather and available markets to harvest some of their timber products and convert it into ready cash. A well managed farm woodland will pay a farmer handsome returns on his investment, and we all know that a farmer can always use extra income.

Most landowners now realize the value and importance of timber to our economy. One dollar out of every four in Mississippi comes from the growing, harvesting, and manufacturing of forest products. Yes, one-fourth of the income in our state comes from forestry. There are other values received from our forest lands such as prevention of soil erosion, scenic beauty, wild life habitat, protection of watersheds and reservoirs and many other benefits.

Landowners have not always realized the value and importance of wise management of our forest lands. In fact at one time our timber resources were becoming so depleted that the Mississippi Legislature found it necessary to pass a law governing the removal of timber products in order to insure a continuous supply of forest products. This law is known as

the "Forest Harvesting Act." I urge every landowner and timber cutter to become familiar with the Forest Harvesting Act. A section of the law states that no one shall cut, authorize, direct, or assist in the cutting for commercial purposes any pine trees under ten inches in diameter unless there is left standing on each acre of forest land being harvested, one hundred or more well distributed pine trees four inches or more in diameter, or at least four pine seed trees of ten inches or more in diameter.

A landowner who desires to clear-cut and plant seedlings or follow some other plan of management is required to submit to the Mississippi Forestry Commission an acceptable plan of management which will assure the continued productivity of the area to be harvested in lieu of the above provisions. This alternate plan of management is supposed to be approved by the Forestry Commission before any cutting is done.

The Mississippi Forestry Commission is designated as the enforcing agency for this law and employees of the Commission are authorized to enter upon any and all forest lands to inspect the area for compliance with the law.

The Forest Harvesting Act does not apply to the clearing of land for cultivation or pasture or other purposes such as building sites.

I would walk around in a forest with a metal ring in my nose, and around my neck would wear a loincloth that could afford one.

At night I would try to sleep on a dirt floor of a mud hut. Then on holidays I would feast on elephant roasted grasshoppers, a milk of a coconut.

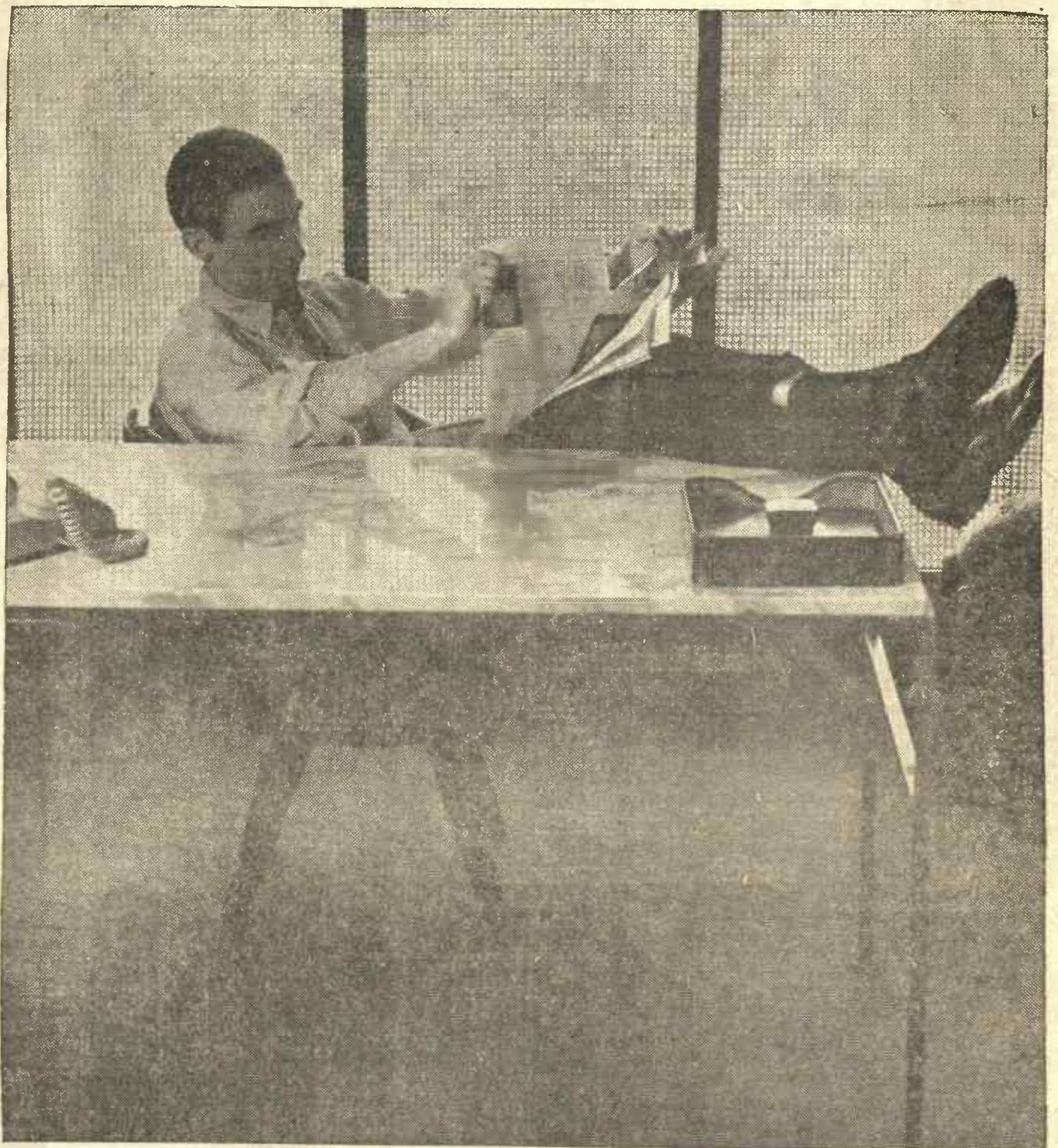
I get on my knees every day and thank God for permitting my ancestors to come to America as slaves. That is a great blessing to our race. I am thankful for it.

The ACT is required for all high school seniors who plan to enter college.

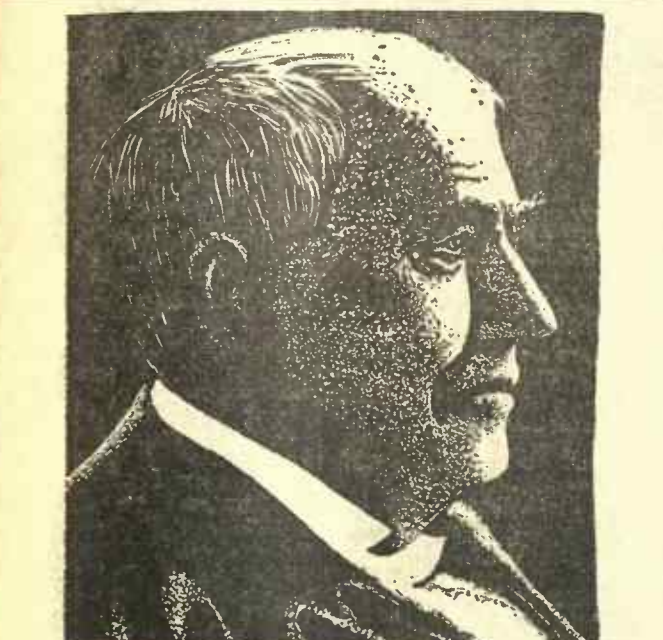
Jehovah's Witnesses Will Attend Assembly

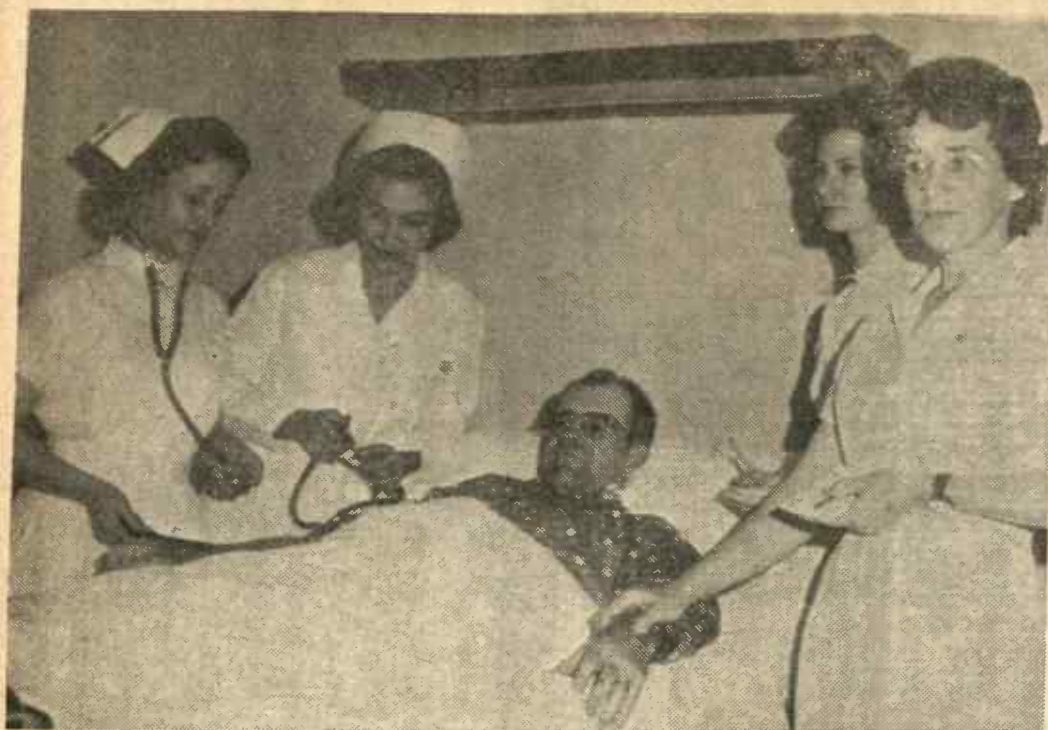

Practical Nursing Class Completing Clinical Training At Area Hospitals

The Tishomingo County Public School of Practical Nursing class, which began last September at the Burnsville Vocational Building, is at present completing clinical training at the affliating hospitals, which are Tishomingo County and Corinth Community. The school is accredited and adheres to the standards set by the National League of Nursing.

The Nursing class was made possible through the efforts and cooperation of many people and organizations. Those donating much time and effort in order to make this program available to the people of Tishomingo County and surrounding area were: Mrs. Laura Blari, State Vocational Educational Department; Julian R. Long, Tishomingo County Board of Education; W. C. Hamilton, Yellow Creek Watershed; and R. E. Lambert, Tishomingo County Hospital Administrator.

Entrance requirements for the class were a 10th grade education or equivalent and entrants must pass all pre-entrance examinations.

The course consists of four (4) months pre-clinical training which includes 480 hours of actual classroom theory, eight (8) months clinical training which includes actual nursing under supervision, and advanced classroom theory. Upon completion, each graduate will be eligible to take the State Board Examination for Practical Nurses in order to become a Licensed Practical nurse.

The present class will graduate in August of this year. Sponsors of the program are anticipating a much larger class in September of 1964.

State Highway Workers Attend 1-Day Workshop

Mississippi State Highway Department employees are attending a series of one-day workshops on the standardization of compaction and density tests in highway construction, according to Roy C. Adams, Northern District Highway Commissioner.

Specifications in each highway contract require the base and supporting soils to be compacted to a certain percentage of standard density to insure maximum economical strength. These workshops are designed to provide engineering and technical personnel with a systematic and uniform method of testing and inspecting compaction and density.

Mr. Adams said, "Workshops of this type serve to enlighten our personnel on the ever-changing methods of roadbuilding and testing. We are placing more emphasis on these workshops and on special courses in order to provide thoroughly trained personnel in all phases of Highway Department activity."

The first two workshops, which are for the Northern District, were held February 5 at Tupelo and Feb. 6 at Batesville. Workshops are set for the Central District on February 11 at Yazoo City, February 13 at Newton and for the Southern District on February 19 at McComb and February 20 at Hattiesburg.

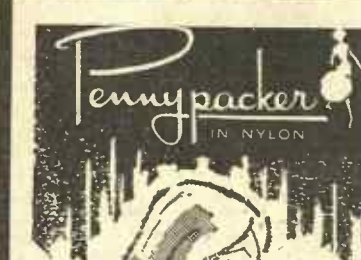

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI DECLARING ITS INTENTION TO TAX RETAIL SALES OR GROSS INCOME OF BUSINESS AT THE RATE OF ONE PER CENT EXCEPT FOR SALES OF CERTAIN PRODUCTS HEREIN SET OUT, AND CALLING FOR AN ELECTION WHEREIN THE PROPOSAL SHALL BE SUBMITTED TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SAID MUNICIPALITY.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Iuka, Mississippi, in regular session on this

the 4th day of February, 1964, as follows:

SECTION 1. That the Town of Iuka, Mississippi, does by this ordinance declare its intention to levy for its benefit upon the retail sales or gross income of business in said Town a tax at the rate of one per cent (1%) except that sales of farm tractors and self-propelled or drawn farm implements sold to farmers, automobiles, trucks and truck-tractors shall be taxed at the rate of one-half of one per cent (1/2 of 1%) and sales of electricity, current, power, steam, coal, natural gas, liquefied petroleum gas, or other fuel shall be taxed at the rate of one-fourth of one per cent (1/4 of 1%) when sold to a manufacturer or custom processor for industrial purposes, and provided, however, that the tax herein proposed to be levied shall not apply to gross income from ginning cotton, storing grain in elevators or warehouses, railroad transportation and sales of self-propelled construction equipment.

SECTION 2. An election shall be had in the Town of Iuka, Mississippi, on March 10, 1964, between the hours of 8:00 o'clock, A.M. and 6:00 P.M. wherein the qualified electors of said municipality shall have the choice of voting for or against the above and foregoing proposed tax levy.

SECTION 3. 18,143 Deer Killed During 1963-64 Seasons

C. B. McSwain, Public Relations Director for the Mississippi Game and Fish Commission, reports that Mississippi deer hunters had the best year in the history of the state for one of our most popular hunting sports. According to Mr. McSwain, there was a total of 18,143 deer killed in the two deer seasons of 1963-64. This was 3456 more deer killed in the 1963-64 season than in the 1962-63 season when a total of 14,687 deer were taken.

The 1963-64 deer kill breaks down as follows: A total of 125 deer killed during the special archery season; 13,398 deer killed in the counties of the State during the open gun seasons; and 2,051 deer killed on the 14 management area and refuges during the gun season. In comparison to the 1962-63 season, there was an increase in all three of the totals.

Of the 73 counties that have open deer seasons, 51 killed more deer in the 1963-64 season, three had the same kill, and 19 counties showed a slight decrease. The ten leading counties in the state killed a total of 50.8% of the deer which were taken.

Pasture Weed Control
Pasture weeds need to be sprayed now. The main weeds are dock and thistle. These weeds are easy to kill in the early fast growing stage, when seeds stalks are put in the soil. It will be harder to kill in the early stage of three-fourths of a year. In the early stage of 2, 4-D to the acre will kill the dock and thistle are up.

Cattle Feeding
Cattle cannot afford to stop eating their beef cattle even if it may be expensive to them until spring. In many instances this would mean the loss of cattle, a poor crop percentage next year. It is because many times a gets so thin and run-down she will not readily breed.

If you are short on hay, check your county agent and possibly he can help you some.

In your winter feeding, do overlook protein. You can afford to try to winter cat without an adequate supply protein.

Cows that calve in fall and winter will need two pounds daily of a protein meal. Those that calve in the spring possibly make it through winter on one pound of protein meal per head daily.

Cotton Notes
Planning your 1964 cotton program? Research has shown that planting a good variety instead of a mediocre variety can increase profits as much as five times as much of lint produced. The best way to select a variety is to study research reports from the experiment station nearest your farm and the one that has growing conditions most similar to those on your farm.

You can save confusion and time and money by systematically listing, filing and storing your family papers. These papers are necessary in times, as a death or loss due

to fire or theft; for inheritance and other business matters; for a summary of your financial situation; and possibly to have many dollars in paying debts. It is important for the wife as well as the husband to be familiar with business affairs. And older children should know where business papers are kept and the persons to contact for advice in an emergency.

The family needs to keep information about location of valuable documents as deeds, leases, contracts, Social Security records; records of family business, farm or employment; records of outstanding debts, notes or mortgages and names of persons holding them; name of bank where savings and checking accounts are kept and location of bank books; names of business, personal and legal advisers; and nature of retirement plans.

Know The Poultry You Buy
Two labels you find on poultry can help you know the poultry you buy. One is the round inspection mark that means the poultry is wholesome, truthfully labeled, not adulterated

and has been processed in a sanitary manner.

The other is the official grade mark in the form of a shield. This shield tells you the quality of the product, as determined by a technically trained government grader. This grade mark may be used only on poultry that has first been inspected for wholesomeness. Look for these marks of wholesomeness and quality. You may find them on a paper wing tag, on the giblet wrap, on an insert, or they may be printed on the over-wrap or transparent wrapper.

Much of the poultry sold in retail markets today is officially graded. Grades are based on the shape of the bird, the meatiness, amount and distribution of fat, and the number and extent of dressing defects.

Quick Butterscotch Nut Rolls
Use brown and serve clover-leaf rolls. Combine 1/4 cup melted butter with 1/2 cup brown sugar and 1/2 cup chopped pecans. Spread the mixture over the bottom of a buttered loaf pan. place rolls atop mixture with top side down, and bake in 400-degree oven for 15

minutes. Let rolls stand in pan a minute after removing from the oven, then invert pan onto a serving plate and let butterscotch mixture run-over the rolls. Serve with butterscotch-nut mixture on top.

Wild Turkeys

If you have ever seen a wild turkey in the woods, it probably gave you a thrill and is something you have remembered. I don't know whether there are any wild turkeys in Tishomingo County or not, but there could be.

Leaflet 526, published by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, outlines in a simple manner the things that might be done to have wild turkeys in wooded areas. Since most of the land in Tishomingo County is in woods, it seems reasonable that we should have more wild turkeys than we have.

Why don't we have more wild turkeys? This is a good question. Perhaps the main reason is there just isn't enough good turkey food.

The Soil Conservation Service has assigned a biologist to this area, and his services can be obtained to advise with groups of interested landowners on increasing the wildlife in this county. If any of you are interested in having more wild turkeys in this county, come by your local SCS office in Iuka and let's talk it over. Information on this subject can be obtained and with this knowledge, landowners may be able to apply a few simple practices that would bring more wild turkeys into this county.

Now this is not just a lot of turkey gobble, it is a fact. If you don't believe it, give it a fair try and see.

Small Pine Planting Pays Dividends

Will a person 50 years old benefit directly from planting pine trees?

The answer is yes. A man reaching 50 years of age has an average life expectancy of 22 more years.

In only 20 years after planting one acre of loblolly pine can be worth about \$100 or more based on today's stumpage prices.

Average stands of loblolly can be ready for thinning when they are about 15 years old. Some stands can be ready for thinning at an earlier age of about 12 years and some at a later age of 17 or 18. The important point is that income from pine plantations can begin about 15 years after planting and, with proper management, continue every 2 to 5 years thereafter.

Loblolly pines planted on an average to good site in this region of high rainfall and long growing seasons can grow 1 to 1 1/2 or more cords per acre each year. A stand that is 20 years old can contain from 20 to 30 cords per acre.

The proof exists now in the numerous plantations planted 20 to 30 years ago by the Civilian Conservation Corps on idle, eroding land. Not all of such land has been planted for thousands of acres of this idle, eroding land still exist today. This land is truly tree country.

Yes, a man 50 years old can expect to benefit directly from planting pines today. The younger people can have the same benefits by reclaiming idle land with loblolly pine plantations. It's good business.

Nine Varieties Of Tomatoes In Station Tests

Variety testing by the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station each year helps growers produce high yields of the kind of crops consumers desire.

Shoppers buying tomatoes, for instance, each year show more discrimination in favor of more ripened fruit. Such tomatoes are more attractive than the artificially ripened "green

wrap" ones and buyers associate this improved appearance with better flavor and superior quality. Many growers in Mississippi gross \$1,000 or more per acre from tomatoes harvested at the pink or vine-ripe stage of maturity.

The Truck Crops Branch Experiment Station at Crystal Springs emphasizes research on breeding and testing tomato varieties for vine-ripe production and market qualities.

Nine leading varieties were included in the 1963 tests. Rainfall was much below normal and the crop had to be irrigated seven times with 1 1/2 to 2 inches of water each irrigation.

John A. Campbell, superintendent of the station, reports Marion continues to be a top yielding variety which has been widely used by Mississippi growers during the past three years. This variety and Manapal were about equal in the production of No. 1 and No. 2 grades, were equal in earliness and fruit size. Both were relatively low in percentage of fruit stem cracked.

Indian River also produced a high yield of marketable fruit. It is three to five days earlier and fruit size is somewhat smaller with a low percentage of stem crack. Of the pink varieties, Bradley produced the highest yield but was significantly lower than the top three red-fruited varieties.

Cotton Ginnings In County Show 64% Increase

Cotton ginnings in Tishomingo County during 1963 showed an increase of 64% over 1962. According to a report issued by the U. S. Department of Commerce, a total of 8,773 bales were ginned in 1963 compared to 5,617 in 1962.

The tabulation of individual reports from ginneries of cotton shows there were 15,127,386 bales of cotton ginned in the United States through January 15, 1964 from the crop of 1963. Cotton ginned in Alcorn County was 14,687 bales, compared to 4,453 last year. In Itawamba County, 7,610 bales were ginned this year in comparison to 5,126 in 1962. Prentiss County showed a large increase over last year's ginnings, by reporting a total of 18,561 bales in comparison to 12,992.

Increases were also reported in Colbert and Franklin counties. Ala. 21,515 bales were ginned in 1963 in Colbert County compared to 16,785 in 1962. A total of 12,021 bales were ginned in Franklin County in comparison with 7,973 in 1962.
