In Thursday night play, Iuka Chieftain A's downed Okolona 71-50, halftime score being 37 to 21. High for Iuka were Tommy Dean with 43, followed by Earl Walker with 15 and William Crawford with 10. Bryant collected 17 while Henson got 16 for Okolona.

8 Fatalities In County Last Year

Due To Traffic; Property Damage Is Also Extensive

Eight people lost their lives in Tishomingo County from traffic accidents during 1963. In addition 54 injuries were reported as a result of the 108 accidents.

Property damage was also extensive. According to figures released, during 1963 the economy of the county suffered a loss of \$54,480.00. To bring these figures into closer focus, this means that traffic accidents cost county residents an average of \$149.00 a day or \$6.21 an hour for every hour that ticked off the clock during last year.

These figures are in the annual summary of traffic accident statistics prepared by the Accident Records Division of the Mississippi Highway Safety Patrol under the direction of Commissioner of Public Safety T. B. Birdsong.

The above figures showing fatalities and economic losses, emphasize the high cost of poor driving. At the present time, the state is below the traffic death toll for the same period in 1963.

\$32,500 A MONTH FOR PUBLIC AID LOCALLY

Report Says 1348 Residents Share In Assistance Programs

How much is being spent each month in Tishomingo County for public assistance? How does the local aid program compare with that in other parts of the country?

Answers to these questions are now possible, thanks to breakdown figures that have just become available, for the first time, in a Government report. It was issued by the Bureau of Family Services.

It shows the proportion of people being helped and the size of that help in every section of the United States.

Data is given on the three major subsidy programs that are being operated by the states with local funds, augmented by Federal aid. They are old-age grants, aid to families with dependent children and aid to the permanently and totally disabled.

The report emphasizes the state and local nature of each of them, as well as the wide range in number of people helped and the size of payments as between the various states and within each state.

In Tishomingo County, it is shown, old-age assistance is going to 801 men and women, out of a total population of 1,624 in the over-65 age bracket. On the average, they are getting checks in the amount of \$30 a month. This compares with \$73 per month throughout the United States.

The second largest program provides assistance for needy families with dependent children who are under the age of 18. Nationally, nearly a million families are receiving such help.

Of the 4,896 children locally who are under 18, the number being aided is 416.

Payments are going to them at the rate of \$11 per child, as against the national average of \$31.

The third program, which provides assistance for persons between 18 and 65 who are permanently and totally disabled, affects 131 locally out of a total of 7,369 who are between those ages.

Their monthly payments come to \$30. Elsewhere across the country, the average is \$71.

The total amount being expended in Tishomingo County for such types of aid is approximately \$32,500 a month.

Contract Let For Remodeling

Construction To Begin On Improvements To Belmont School

The contract for remodeling of the Belmont School has been awarded to R. J. Wilemon Construction Co. of Tupelo. According to County Superintendent of Education Julian R. Long, Wilemon submitted the low bid of \$53,860 for the construction.

Supt. Long states that work on the project is expected to begin within a month's time. Included in the project will be the building of six new classrooms, the creation of a completely new homemaker department, and remodeling of the existing auditorium. The new classrooms will replace a part of the old high school building. According to Supt. Long, new modern designs will be used in the remodeling and when completed, the Belmont school will be an up-to-date attendance center.

Other contractors submitting bids on the project were Kimberley Bros., \$67,829.11; Wilbur Jones of Corinth, \$55,500; Gilmore-Puckett Lumber Co. of Amory, \$56,925; Wilemon Lumber Co. of Aberdeen, \$56,925; and Frank Hardin of Columbus, \$75,442.

Advertising Is Essential To Modern Retailing

It is a pity that retailers so often have to learn the same lesson over and over again through cost and hardship.

This observation was made by Edward F. Engle, official of the National Retail Merchants

Association. Mr. Engle was referring to the importance of Newspaper advertising to retail trade.

Mr. Engle's conclusions were the result of a study made in New York City after a prolonged strike closed major newspapers.

Among the findings reported were:
(1) There is no substitute for the newspaper as a major medium for retail advertising.
(2) "Creeping disaster" to retail business gradually follows

the absence of newspaper advertising.
(3) The downtown area of any city is a unified shopping center. When "big store" advertising is not present, the entire center — including small stores, services, restaurants — feels the effect.

(4) Advertising is essential to modern retailing. Without advertising, retail merchandising would be in a chaotic state. Turnover and stock needs would be impossible to predict. The ultimate loser from inadequate advertising, then, is the consumer who pays for losses due to slow turnover, waste, and high per item selling costs.

HOG PRODUCTION
Mississippi farmers could certainly use an extra \$17 million. But this is approximately the amount that Mississippi meat packers spend for market hogs bought out of state.

Of the around 815,000 hogs slaughtered within Mississippi each year, roughly 60 percent are purchased out of state. With stepped up production of market hogs and corresponding increase in production of feed grains, Mississippi producers stand to increase their income by around \$17 million.

The packing plants are expanding. Because of industrial progress in the state, consumption of red meat is expected to increase. Pork should share in the increase.

Mississippi National Guard Is Big Business; Gov't. Spends \$14 Million

The Federal Government is now spending \$14,711,850.30 annually in Mississippi for support of the Army and Air National Guard.

Each year Mississippi Guardsmen receive over 5 million dollars for attending drill in their home town armory. In addition, they receive one and one half million dollars for attending two weeks annual summer field training.

National Guard Technicians who are employed on a full time basis receive almost four million dollars. This group is divided into three sections; the United States Property and Fiscal Office; the Unit Technicians including Organizational Maintenance Shops; and the Field Maintenance Shop which supports unit maintenance.

Much of the Annual Federal budget is spent for the construction of new armories and the division size training site

based on home grown grain. Farmers cannot expect to expand pork production and at the same time, follow the present trend of reducing corn acreage.

Any farmer who can produce 60 bushels of corn to the acre can figure on cows and hogs as a reliable source of additional farm income.

Keep Fire Out of Pastures
It is mighty important at this time of year, especially, to keep fires out of all pastures. Young clovers and other legumes are getting started and fire will destroy them.

Folks once thought that a broomsedge area would give better grazing if it were burned off. They found that this is not true! Usually down in the broomsedge, where you can't see them, are lots of young clovers, other legumes and grasses. Fire will also destroy these.

The best method of getting rid of the broomsedge is to top dress some fertilizer so that these young plants down in the broomsedge can get started growing. The broomsedge also gives the young tender plants some protection from late winter cold spells.

Home Gardening
The time is here to get that spring garden underway. In some areas, lots of planting has already been done.

You can still plant all of the January plants like lettuce, turnips, English peas, Irish potatoes, radish and the rest of the hardy vegetables. Now add broccoli, cauliflower, beets and parsley to the list.

Food Hints

Keep in mind that canned vegetables are already cooked. To serve them with the most flavor and food value, drain off the liquid and boil down to one-third of its original volume, then merely heat the vegetable in the concentrated liquid.

When you buy ham, remember you can buy the whole or the shank or butt. If you buy the whole ham, you can have it cut into slices. Center slices and butt portions and the other slices. Center slices are a lower price per pound than they buy them in the ham rather than separate.

Know your store and be alert to packaging when shopping. Don't buy a package that is broken or excessively wet.

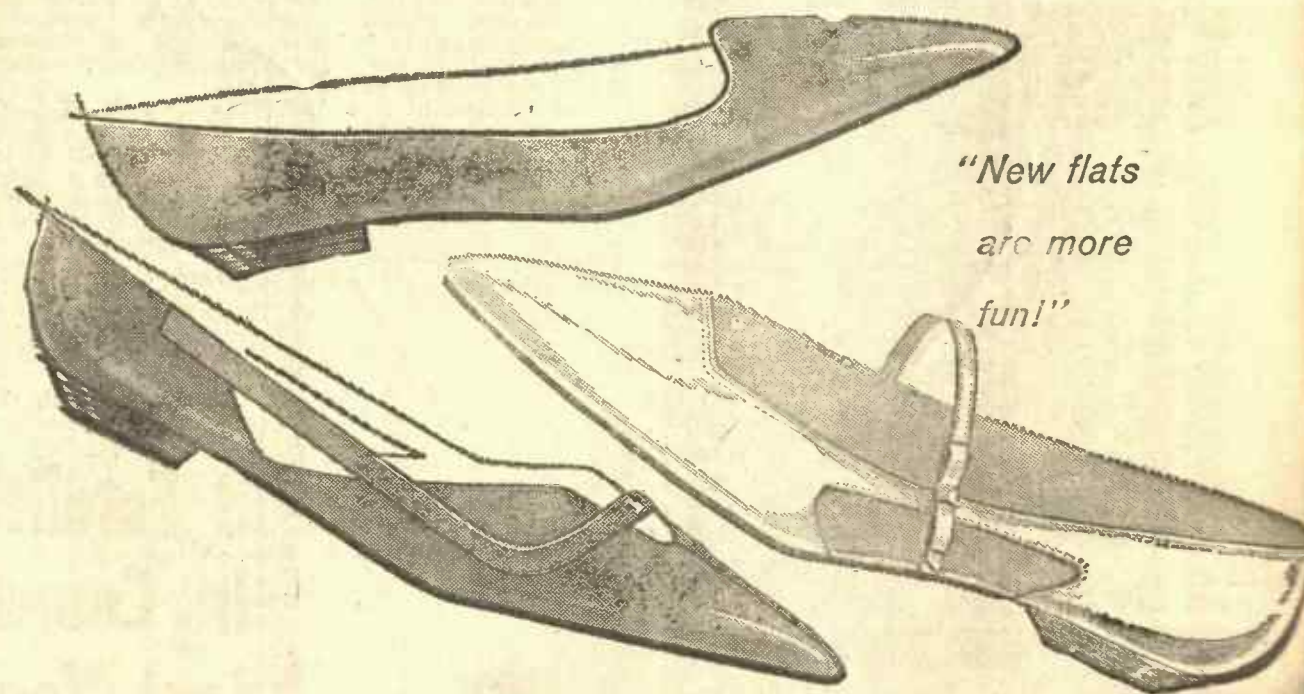

More Money Needed For Highway Construction

Itemized Account Of Each Present Project Given To State Legislature

The State Highway Commission, in its biennial report to the Legislature, says more construction money is urgently needed for the state highway system, and recommends a new building to consolidate divisions of the headquarters operation now housed in three locations at Jackson.

The report, which has been filed with the Legislature, covers every phase of Highway Department operation during the fiscal years from July 1, 1961 through June 30, 1963. It notes a continued upward trend in construction and maintenance costs and cites additions to the highway system totaling 182 miles during the two-year period.

Study Already Made

In 1960 the Legislature authorized a detailed study of Mississippi's roads and streets. Concluding a report on this study, the Automotive Safety Foundation estimated that to properly build and maintain the 10,500-miles of roads assigned to it, the State Highway Department would need over \$21-million a year more revenue than it now receives from its portion of the state gasoline tax and federal aid.

This existing deficiency in funds, an extensive and growing mileage of obsolete roads that have far exceeded design expectations; and unprecedented increases in traffic volumes and vehicle weights were cited by the report. Many of these older roads were built in the 1930's when vehicle registrations were less than a third of the present-day count; and maximum weights were less than half today's load limit.

Construction Program

Mississippi highway construction is now limited to the annual allocation of federal funds plus the required percentage of matching state money, the report pointed out. This year the federal allocation for primary, secondary and urban roads is approximately eleven million dollars, which after matching with equal state funds supports

a \$22-million construction program.

The report cited average construction costs to show how thinly this must be spread over the 82-county network—\$68,000 per mile for secondary roads; \$80,000 for two-lane intermediate type primary roads; \$201,000 for high-type two lane and \$600,000 per mile for four-lane divided highways in urban areas.

In contrast with this dearth of funds for primary, secondary and urban roads, the Commission reported adequate financing to complete the 678-mile interstate system in the state. Federal funds pay 90% of the cost of these super highways, and this year's total program amounts to approximately \$35,000,000.

Maintenance Costs

Like construction, the cost of highway maintenance has risen steadily since World War II. The cost per mile during the biennium covered by the report was \$778 per year. Maintenance costs, incidentally, show a direct relationship to traffic, age and structural strength of highways. Older pavements and roads with heaviest traffic are the most expensive to maintain. Average traffic counts range from less than 100 daily on a few remote rural roads to more than 25,000 at heaviest-traveled points.

Office Space Needed

At the present time, central divisions of the Highway Department are housed in three locations in Jackson. The Department occupies two floors of the Woolfolk State Office Building; several divisions are housed in a Laboratory Building and annex at Woodrow Wilson and North West Streets, while State Aid rents quarters in a downtown office building. All are overcrowded, with little prospect of economical expansion. A new building, the report pointed out, would effect greater efficiency, and would also release needed space for other agencies in the Woolfolk Building.

Itemized Report

Other information in the 170-page report includes an itemized account of every project on the state highway system during the two year period; the same information for the state aid system, a section-by-section report on maintenance costs; cost figures on vehicle operation and out of state travel by personnel.

The report has been distributed to the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and members of the Legislature.

Loan Funds Are Available Says Woods

M. Hays Woods, local county Supervisor for the Farmers Home Administration, states that loan funds are now available to help meet operating costs for farmers in Tishomingo county. Loans are made to farmers to buy machinery and equipment, livestock, feed and seed or fertilizer, to pay other farm expenses and in some cases, refinance their debts. Mr. Woods stated that the loans are set up over a period of from one to seven years, at a rate of 5% on the unpaid balance. Payment in full may be made at any time. This program will be of particular benefit to the following groups of farmers:
1. Farmers who need credit to make major changes in their own farm operation to do a successful job of farming.
2. Farmers working full or on part time at another job, who need operating credit to carry on a sound farming program. Borrowers may be young farmers needing capital to acquire livestock and equipment, and established farmers needing new or reconditioned machinery to increase efficiency on their land which they own or rent. Borrowers may be farmers with net incomes slipping because of outmoded methods or equipment and require modernization; farmers who receive income from off-farm work in factories; families, often semi-retired or handicapped on subsistence-type farms, who need a small operating loan plus guidance to increase incomes. Mr. Woods stated that loans to finance improvements on small farms in Tishomingo county made an important contribution to rural families in 1963. Such loans are still available thru the local F. H. A. office. In addition to the loan, F.H.A. provides all of its borrowers the necessary farm and financial assistance. Whenever practical, the borrower and F.H.A. supervisor work out a long-range farming plan with specific farm, financial and family living goals. Anyone interested in obtaining a loan can come by the local F. H. A. office in Iuka, next door to the Post Office.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE
TOWN OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI
DECLARING ITS INTENTION
TO TAX RETAIL SALES OR
GROSS INCOME OF BUSINESS
AT THE RATE OF ONE PER
CENT EXCEPT FOR SALES
OF CERTAIN PRODUCTS
HEREIN SET OUT, AND
CALLING FOR AN ELECTION
WHEREIN THE PROPOSAL
SHALL BE SUBMITTED TO
THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS
OF SAID MUNICIPALITY.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Iuka, Mississippi, in regular session on this the 4th day of February, 1964, as follows:

SECTION 1. That the Town of Iuka, Mississippi, does by this ordinance declare its intention to levy for its benefit upon the retail sales or gross income of business in said Town a tax at the rate of one per cent (1%) except that sales of farm tractors and self-propelled or drawn farm implements sold to farmers, automobiles, trucks and truck-tractors shall be taxed at the rate of one-half of one per cent (1/2 of 1%) and sales of electricity, current, power, steam, coal, natural gas, liquefied petroleum gas, or other fuel shall be taxed at the rate of one-fourth of one per cent (1/4 of 1%) when sold to a manufacturer or custom processor for industrial purposes, and provided, however, that the tax herein proposed to be levied shall not apply to gross income from ginning cotton, storing grain in elevators or warehouses, railroad transportation and sales of self-propelled construction equipment.

SECTION 2. An election shall be had in the Town of Iuka, Mississippi, on March 10, 1964, between the hours of 8:00 o'clock A.M. and 6:00 P.M. wherein the qualified electors of said municipality shall have the choice of voting for or against the above and foregoing proposed tax levy.

SECTION 3. The Town Clerk is hereby ordered to have the within Ordinance published at least once a week for three consecutive weeks in the Vidette, a newspaper having general circulation in said municipality; and she is further ordered to post a copy hereof in at least three public places in said municipality.

School Drop-Outs Affect Economy Of Mississippi

Mississippi youngsters are
staying in school longer but
the drop-out rate is still far too
high. This is the conclusion of
Tommy Wayne Rogers and Dr.
George L. Wilber who have re-
cently reported on a study they
made for the Department of
Sociology and Rural Life at
Mississippi State University.

found that the typical high
school graduate receives \$49,000
more during his earning years
than a person who has complet-
ed the eighth grade.

"Unemployment rates for
those who drop out of school
are considerably higher than
for high school graduates. For
1959-60, 22 of every 100 drop-
outs in the U.S. were unem-
ployed. Drop-outs are unem-
ployed for longer periods of
time.

"In Mississippi, as elsewhere
around the nation, the years of
schooling completed in rural
areas is less than in urban cen-
ters. And the average amount
of schooling is less in Missis-
sippi than in many sections of
the country, despite recent ad-
vances in the state. The median
years of school completed for
Mississippi's rural farm popu-
lation increased from 6.9 to 8.1
years during the 1960's, an in-
crease of 15 per cent."

HOME AGENT NOTES

You may want to store some
of this year's bumper pecan
crop for future use. The way
you pack and treat your pecans
affect the time they will keep
their high quality.

As a rule, the lower the tem-
perature, the longer the nuts
will keep. Tight, vapor-proof
containers protect nuts from
odors, flavors and moisture. At
ordinary room temperature, they
will keep two months. Store
pecans in a cool place.

Shelled nuts keep well in a
container for as long as 9 mon-
ths in a refrigerator and as
long as 2 years in a freezer.
Under these same storage con-
ditions, if you have space for
them, unshelled pecans will re-
main fresh for two to four
times longer than shelled ones.

Garment Construction for Easier Care

Some of the garment design
and construction features that
contribute to easier care are:
Simple design — less seam-
ing — fewer seam lines.

Bias cut seams tend to look
and stay smoother.

No top stitching — or at
least a limited amount. Avoid
"double-needle" or parallel line
stitching.

Smooth stitching — no puck-

ering. If stitching is puckered
when the garment is new, it
will most likely look more
puckered after laundering.

Generous seam allowances,
finished if necessary to pre-
vent fraying.

Well finished buttonholes.

Pleats that are pressed along
the grain of the fabric rather
than on the bias.

A minimum of trim and
frills.

Interfacing attached to the
facing edges to prevent curling
or wrinkling.

Hems with evenly distribut-
ed fullness.

A minimum of linings and
interfacings.
