Judge Sweat Will Attend National College Of State Trial Judges

JULY 6-31 AT UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO
SPONSORED BY AMERICAN BAR ASSOCIATION

Circuit Judge N. S. Sweat Jr.,
has been selected from among
more than 300 applicants to at-
tend the first session of the
National College of State Trial
Judges which will be held at
the University of Colorado in

July.
Judge Sweat is one of seven-
ty-five who received a fellow-
ship grant to cover the ex-
penses of his participation.

Judge Sweat will join 100
judges from all parts of the
United States July 6-31 in a
course designed to acquaint re-
latively new trial judges of
methods for effective judicial
administration being developed
in other parts of the country.
The faculty, composed of
leading jurists and law profes-
sors, will present courses in
court administration, modern
trends in evidence, sentencing
and probation, criminal proce-
dure, pre-trial procedures and
other currently developing
fields of trial court adminis-
tration. The course comprises four
weeks of intensive work in
these various fields.

The National College is part
of the continuing program of
the American Bar Association.
Its purpose is to bring about an
exchange of ideas and informa-
tion among the Trial Judges of
the United States. Sponsor is
the National Conference of
State Trial Judges which is an
activity of the ABA's Section of
Judicial Administration. The
sessions of the College will be
held annually.

corn and soybean production
and Chemical Weed Control by
Bill McKie, Extension Agrono-
mist; and the new pre-emerge
material Trellan for cotton will
be discussed by L. C. Murphy.
A discussion will also be held
concerning pasture weed con-
trol with chemicals.

Next Thursday's program has
been set up to cover all phases
of pre-emerge, oiling, flaming,
post-emerge, and chemical weed
control in general. "Farmers in
Tishomingo County experienc-
ed some damage from chemi-
cals on their cotton last year,
therefore they should make a
special effort to attend the
meeting most convenient for
them and learn all the latest
recommendations on chemi-
cals," Mr. Stricklen said.

High Winds, Heavy Rains Cause Damage In Area

Power Installations At Pickwick
Dam Practically Destroyed

High winds Wednesday about noon caused ex-
tensive damage to the power installations at Pick-
wick Dam just across the line in Tennessee.

Suffering the greatest blow from the twister
that went through that area at 11:04 a.m., was the
"Switch Yard" area on the north bank of the river
immediately adjacent to the dam. This is a section
of transformers, insulators, inductors and conduc-
tors mounted in steel framing that feeds power to a
great portion of West Tennessee and Northeast
Mississippi. The steel framing is a twisted mass of
iron with insulators burst and lying on the
ground. Also three transmission line towers in the
immediate vicinity of Pickwick dam were complet-
ely demolished.

Other extensive damage was done to trees,
light poles and other installations at the dam.

Path of the "Twister" was from the southwest
to the northeast. The storm also did damage to the
Alcorn Central school building where over 500 stu-
dents were in school. Only slight injuries were re-
ported to five of the students who were treated at
a Corinth hospital and dismissed. Damage to the
building consisted of broken window glasses and
some damage to the roof.

In Iuka and the immediate Tishomingo County
area, only very slight damage was reported.

Bill Brinkley, manager of the Tishomingo
County Electric Power Association, reported that
worst damage to the association's transmission
lines was in the northern sector of the county
where approximately 200 patrons were thrown out
of power for a short time late Wednesday.

Damage to the power lines was done by falling
trees.

About 30 patrons of the power association
were without electricity for a short time in the Hol-
cut vicinity.

Some signs and windows in Iuka were also
damaged.

Cost of the damage at Pickwick dam and
length of time necessary for repairs could not be
determined late Wednesday afternoon. TVA au-
thorities state that a complete evaluation of the in-
stallation will have to be made before estimates are
figured.

obstacles from the lake.

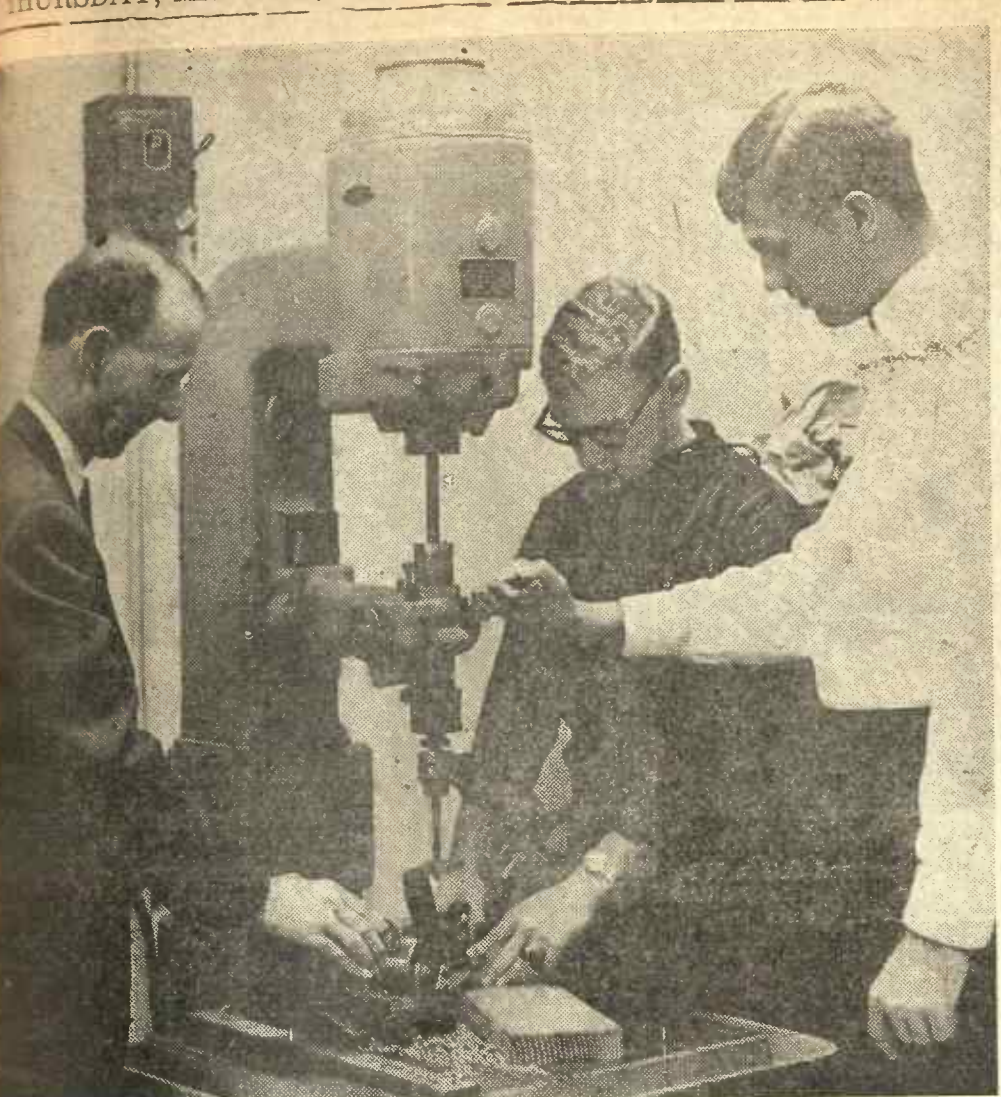
M. P. Haynes, who is organiz-

Sensing The News

Responsibility on Campus

Would a medical school in an abortionist to address doctors? Would a nursing school allow a nurse to state his views? Would a college of business administration give a platform to an embezzler?

The answer to each and all these questions is, of course, no. The lawbreaker and the criminal mind, the conspirator and the knowing doer of evil have no place in a teaching institution.

Then why should a community official be allowed to address the students of a university on university property? The logical answer is that such a person should not be permitted to use a university for his nefarious purposes. In North Carolina, where the legislature enacted a law against the appearance of communists at state facilities, "liberals" have teamed up to condemn the legislative act. They call it the silly notion that

academic freedom is somehow impaired if a communist is not given the same platform offered to respectable citizens. How absurd can people get?

The communist point-of-view is not just the point-of-view of another political party. The communist is, by virtue of his beliefs and the conspiracy in which he is engaged, an enemy of free society.

Well, some persons may say, we should know our enemies. Indeed we should. But it isn't necessary to submit to a propaganda speech in order to understand the nature of the communist movement and its goals. The overall communist position is to be found in the writings of Lenin, Stalin and its contemporary theorists. Any student can go to the library and learn the character of the communist doctrine. He can read the speeches of Nikita Khrushchev, who needs the international conspiracy as well as the Soviet State, and those of lesser communist officials.

As a matter of fact, nothing prevents those persons in North Carolina, who think students should be exposed to real live

communists, to hire a hall in the town of Chapel Hill or elsewhere and have Communist Party officials give speeches for students to hear. There's no law against that in North Carolina.

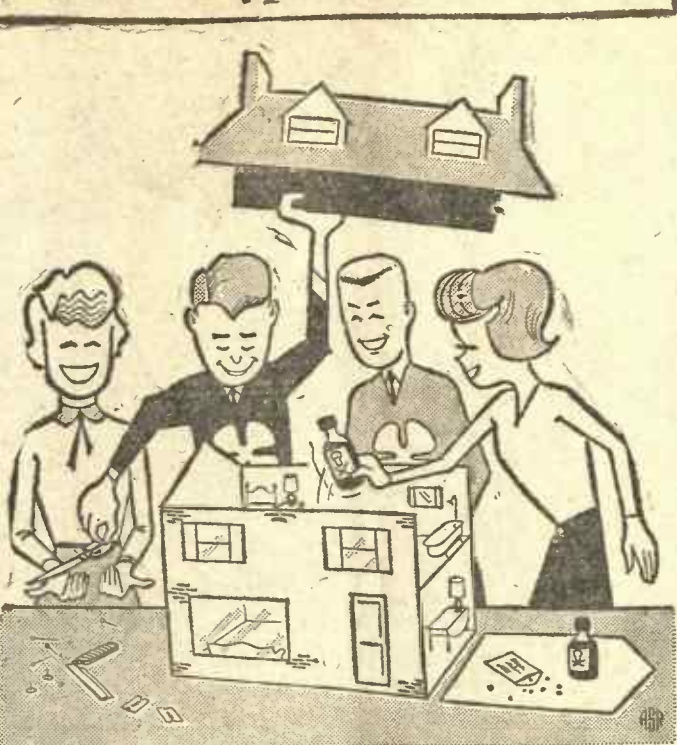
What the North Carolina law bars is the use of state property as a platform for communists. It prevents communist officials, such as National Party Chairman Gus Hall or National Committee Member Herbert Aptheker, from being given the honor that is associated with an appearance at a state university.

Whatever speakers are chosen to address a university student body should be there because they will contribute to the education and well-being of the students. To be asked to give a speech at a university, in North Carolina or elsewhere, is commonly and rightly regarded as a privilege and an opportunity. Neither the privilege nor the opportunity should be extended to a communist, who detests all our American values and who seeks the overthrow of the republic, by violence if necessary.

Aside from these considerations, there is the fact that communists do not speak the truth and do not believe in it. This is part of the communist philosophy. Communism says that truth is merely a function of the party's needs; it is manipulated to meet the demands of the party.

Therefore, a university that gives a communist an opportunity to address a student body is knowingly allowing untruth to be voiced on campus for the express purpose of indoctrinating youth or distorting real sit-

4-H 'Babyproofs' for Safety



How do you "babyproof" a home? Suzanne Simmons, 16, of State College, Mississippi, says it involves removing every possible home hazard that might harm a baby. In this manner she made her own home safer for her little brother and began a program of safety projects that lifted her to national honors in the annual 4-H safety competition.

Suzanne was selected as one of eight national winners of \$500 General Motors scholarships for outstanding 4-H farm, home and highway safety projects. The winners also received all-expense trips to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago.

Suzanne began her "babyproofing" project when her young brother learned to turn the handles on the home's gas space heater. She repositioned the handles, placing them out of his reach. Next, the national winner moved medicines, poisons and sharp objects out of sight and reach. Among other precautions was the placement of safety gates at the head of each staircase in her home.

Suzanne's safety demonstrations have won numerous awards and include "Safe Toys for Children," "The Invisible Passenger—Carbon Monoxide Gas," "Halloween Safety," and "How to Use a Fire Extinguisher."

National 4-H winners were selected from a group of 44 state safety award winners. General Motors, now in its 20th year as safety awards donor, also gave state winners trips to the Club Congress.

Feed Grain Program?

What about the 1964 Feed Grain Program? Does it fit in with your type of farming? Would it pay you to take part? Examine your own situation. Find out all you can about the program. Then decide whether or not to take part!

First of all, the program is not designed to promote the development of the livestock and poultry industries in Mississippi!

It is designed to reduce stocks of corn and other feed grains nationally.

If you are a livestock farmer, remember that except in very unusual situations, long time successful livestock programs must be based on home produced feeds.

If you are a farmer who wishes to reduce his work load due to retirement, illness or work off the farm, then the feed grain program can well serve your purposes.

But when counting your income from placing land under the 1964 feed grain program,

be sure to deduct the cost of insurance and depreciation on those items of buildings and equipment that are idled as a result of reduced crop acreage.

If your estimate of yield is substantially above that assigned by the county ASCS committee, you would probably benefit by growing cash grain on the entire base acreage.

On the other hand, if your assigned yield is somewhat higher than your estimate of yield, it will likely pay you to consider participation rather than growing cash grain.

Before making your final decision on whether or not to participate in the 1964 feed grain program, consider these points:

Your feed needs for a livestock program, if any; feed available for purchase and estimated cost; availability of machinery and equipment for alternative uses; availability of labor, cost and alternative uses; concern for reducing labor requirements due to health, age or off-farm work; your estimate of yields as compared to that assigned by county ASCS committee; and effect on land such as weed infestation and reduced fertility level.

Pasture Fertilization

Topdress small grains now with 40 to 50 pounds per acre of nitrogen, whether you want grazing or grain.

On good stands of ryegrass, use 60 pounds per acre of nitrogen. On fescue without clover, use 60 to 75 pounds of nitrogen. If clover is growing with fescue, either hold the nitrogen until later or apply 30 to 40 pounds per acre so that fescue will not choke out the clover.

Recommended fertilization of permanent pastures calls for an application of at least 300 pounds of 6-24-24 per acre, or its equal in mixtures.

Dr. Gray Named Chief Of Clinic

Dr. Howard R. Gray, a fellow of the American Academy of Dermatology, has been named Chief of Clinic at the Skin and Cancer Hospital of Philadelphia, one of the largest dermatologic units in the country. The hospital's pediatric, acne, allergy, tumor, and adult clinics treat more than 20,000 patients annually with diseases of the skin and skin cancer.

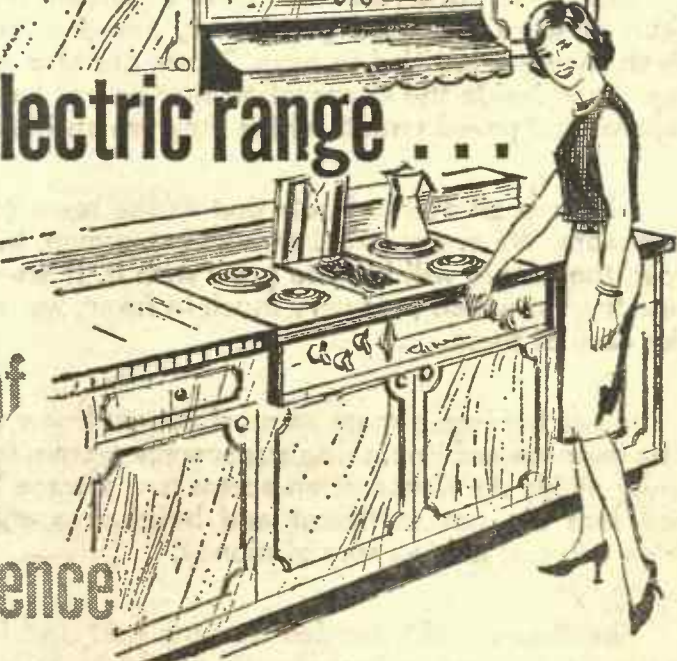

TO THE PEOPLE OF IUKA

It has been called to my attention by several good citizens of Iuka that a certain group of people are going around misrepresenting amount of my salary and other facts. I am drawing \$250.00 per month from the general, gas, and water funds. It is being told that I am drawing from the gas and water funds over and above the \$250.00 per month which I want all of you to know is nothing but a falsehood.

The people of Iuka wanted Industry and the Board of Aldermen and I have gone all the way out to help get it. This has cost Iuka lots of money and will cost more yet.

When the Corporate lines were extended, the people that were taken in were promised gas, water, paved streets, and sewage of which they are entitled to have. There are also people that have always lived inside the Corporation that do not have access to sewage disposal and paved streets which they are entitled to have.

I believe all of you know that as the town grows it takes more to operate. We are proud that Iuka has grown, but if it continues to grow, the people will have to grow with it. If we expect to get more Industry, for which I am very much in favor, we must be prepared to take care of them.

It has become a must as most of you know that something has to be done toward improving our sewage system such as giving every family inside the Corporation access to a sewage line, reworking the lines that are not sufficient and building a new disposal system which will cost a large sum of money.

The Board and I decided that the best and fairest way to raise money to do these improvements would be to call an election and levy another 1/2% sales tax. It has been passed by the Board and is on the minutes that the money raised from this 1/2% will not be used for administrative purposes.

All of the surrounding towns that have a sales tax levy are already collecting a 1% sales tax.

I am not trying to tell you how to vote on March 10, 1964, because you are capable of making your own decisions. Are you satisfied with Iuka as is, or do you want to see the town make improvements and grow?

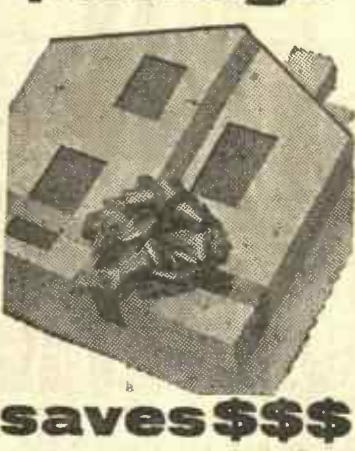

Wild Turkeys Need Protection

This article is an answer to a letter I received recently, addressed from Adamsville, Tenn. This person said, and I quote "Everyone knows and I know that poachers and roving dogs were the reason for not having more wild turkeys." No doubt this is true to some extent, and every effort should be made to rid the area of poachers and roving dogs. I thank you for your letter.

Now let us take a positive approach to this matter of wild turkeys. I quote from U. S. D. A. Leaflet 526 "If you want a high turkey population, you need to manage your land to (1) produce more turkey food in woodland and in open areas; (2) provide dependable and well-distributed drinking water; (3) maintain favorable cover including suitable roosting trees; and (4) protect the turkeys. This leaflet explains how these can be done.

In a section of the leaflet devoted to protecting wild turkeys, the author has this to say, and I quote "Wild turkeys need protection from some of man's activities, from disease, and from some predators. Illegal or excessive hunting; disturbance during the nesting season; and free ranging dogs, livestock and poultry are important factors in preventing turkey increase," end of quotation.

Our wildlife friend, and Vidette reader from Adamsville has a good point. Let those who do illegal hunting be a good sport and refrain from this practice, and let us all cooperate with the law in freeing our area of roving dogs.

Importance Of Keeping Copies Of Tax Returns

"It is good business practice to prepare and keep a copy of your income tax returns," J. G. Martin, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue Service, advises taxpayers.

A readily available copy of your income tax return will serve to assist you in preparing tax returns for subsequent years, provide the administrator of your estate with information needed for tax matters should you die, and will serve as a reference document in any discussions concerning tax matters with Revenue Service auditors.

Extra returns for this purpose are provided in both the 1040 and 1040A packages which were mailed recently to taxpayers.

Mr. Martin also reminded taxpayers who file on Forms 1040 to use the preaddressed return which is the first return in the

THE BIBLE SPEAKS
International Union Sunday School Lessons
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Steps to Faith
Lesson for March 8, 1964

Background Scripture: John 9:1-41.
Devotional Reading: I John 1:5 to 2:5.

NOBODY KNOWS how many miracles Jesus performed during the few years between baptism and His crucifixion. The writer of the Fourth Gospel said that the world could not contain the books that would have to be written if anyone tried to write down all that Jesus did. John himself makes no effort to tell the whole story. The first three Gospels tell of many miracles, but the Fourth Gospel tells of only seven or eight. John's way of telling the stories is different, also. The first three Gospels just tell what happened and let the reader make his own comments. John makes every miracle a kind of text for a sermon or meditation on the meaning of Jesus, or the meaning of life.

A man named Jesus

So, we are not going off on the wrong foot, but following the evangelist's example, if we take one of the simplest of these stories and see in it a picture of the way faith grows. In itself the story is indeed simple. The man whom Jesus cured must have been a well-known beggar, for the disciples knew he had been born blind. Jesus made "clay" out of spit and dust, put it on the man's eyes and told him to go to a certain pool and wash. The man washed as directed and "came seeing." Just like that. The story of the miracle is told. But now begins the part (one of many aspects of this story) that brings us meanings, not simple facts. The particular meaning here now for us is the way this man advanced in faith. What did he think of Jesus? Is the question. The ex-beggar's first thought about Jesus was just this: "The man called Jesus?" Just a man with a name. But the point was the man called Jesus had cured his blindness. That much the man knew. You may not think this was a very lofty faith, indeed you might argue that it was not faith at all. But it was. He knew Jesus had cured him.

A prophet

A little later, the ex-beggar told the Pharisees (it really was now of their business, they only wanted to "get" Jesus somehow) that in his opinion Jesus was a prophet. This did not mean a soothsayer, a fortune-teller; it meant one who speaks God's truth, a Revealers. A prophet was like a window into the mind of God. Prophets were not supermen, they were quite ordinary men in fact. But they were self-emptying men, they let the Spirit of God have his way with them, they were sensitive to the will of God. Many have come only this far on the way to a full faith. But who shall call them unbelievers? Jesus did not denounce this man for coming short of the belief which the disciples of Jesus had towards him. He did not condemn him at all. So we should be slow about denying the name "Christian" or "believer" to men and women of our own time who think of Jesus simply as a teacher, first among teachers, even as one of many teachers. The Lord took this man where he was and helped him to a still higher faith.

The one Lord

Jesus asked the man, finally, if he believed in the "Son of Man." You and I might not understand that question, but this man did. "Son of Man" was one of the common expressions meaning "Messiah" or "Christ," both of which words were never in the plural. There was to be only one Son of Man, in a class alone by himself. This was more than Prophet, for prophets were many. At its height, faith looks at Jesus not as a mere man, not even as one among other revealers of God, not even as the First Saint; but as God's "only begotten Son," God focussed in a single man, the meeting point of the human and the divine. So the man who had been blind, in many ways than one, has his eyes opened. It is to what Jesus said he himself was: the Light of the World. And so he did what no man has right to do to another man: he worshipped Jesus. His heart had found its home at last, in God.

Many Pecan Pies are a Four-Flavor Hit



A great way to make an impressive dessert is with this recipe for miniature pecan pies. You can stick to the basic pecan filling, but more fun is to add a bit of this or that for a variety of flavors, such as Pineapple Pecan Pies, Fruit Pecan Pies and Chocolate Pecan Pies, then let guests choose one of each or the one that appeals most.

Miniature Pecan Pies
Pastry for 2 crust pie 1/4 teaspoon vanilla
4 eggs, slightly beaten 1/4 cup sugar
1 cup dark corn syrup 1/2 cup finely chopped pecans
1 teaspoon salt

Mix pastry; roll to 1/8 inch thickness on lightly floured board. Cut into 3 1/2 inch circles and use to line 24 individual tart shells in muffin pans (2 inches x 1 inch). Flute edges as desired.
Mix eggs, corn syrup, salt, vanilla and sugar together. Stir in pecans. Spoon about 1 tablespoonful into each unbaked shell. Bake in 400 degree F. (hot) oven 25 to 30 minutes. Remove from oven and cool on rack. Makes 24.

Pineapple Pecan Pies: Follow recipe for Pecan Pies, lining 32 shells with pastry, placing a scant teaspoon drained crushed pineapple in each and then covering pineapple with 2 teaspoons pecan filling. Makes 32.

Fruit Pecan Pies: Follow recipe for Pecan Pies, lining 32 shells with pastry, placing a scant teaspoon chopped candied fruit in each and then covering fruit with 2 teaspoons pecan filling. Makes 32.

Chocolate Pecan Pies: Follow recipe for Pecan Pies, lining 32 shells with pastry and adding 1/4 cup fortified chocolate flavored syrup to pecan filling. Makes 32.

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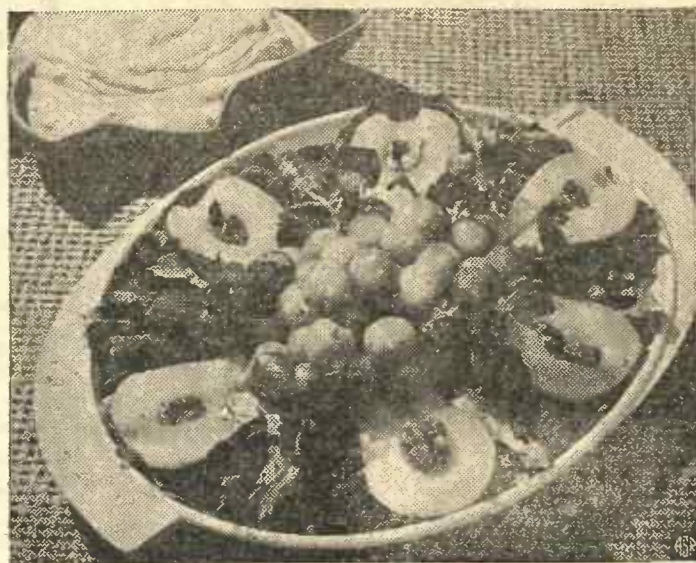

Social Security Questions And Answers

Q—It is true that a disabled worker cannot qualify for monthly benefits until he has been disabled six months?

A—Yes. A worker must be disabled for six full consecutive calendar months before he can become entitled to benefits. This is called the 6-months' waiting period. If the worker qualifies, his first check will be issued for the 7th month. However, the disabled worker should check with his social security office before the end of the first 6 months of disability.

Q—Please settle an argument: my father says you have to be 50 years old before you can draw social security disability benefits, but I say you can get them any time. Which one of us is right?

A—You are correct; since 1960, anyone totally and permanently disabled, and qualified for social security, can receive disability benefits. However, when he reaches 65, his disability benefit will be converted into an old-age benefit, even though he may still be disabled.

Q—I am a veteran about to retire. Will my Social Security benefit and also 26 weeks of unemployment compensation be considered as income?

A—Your Social Security benefit will be considered income but not until you have been given full credit for your personal contributions from wages to the Social Security fund while you were working. All unemployment compensation benefits are considered in-

come.

Q—I have not worked since I applied for benefits several years ago at age 65 and was turned down for lack of credits. Would it do any good to re-apply now?

A—It might. The work requirements are not as strict now as they were then. You should make another application right away.

Q—If I apply at age 65, but continue to earn too much to get any checks, will these extra earnings raise my payment when I do retire?

A—Quite possibly. Social security benefit payments are based on average earnings over a certain number of your best years. High earning years after age 65 can be used in refiguring your benefit rate.

Q—I did not file my 1960

farm self-employment tax returns, and now I hear that I lost social security credit that way. Can I still file for 1960?

A—Yes, but you must file your 1960 tax return on or before April 15, 1964, to get social security credit for your earnings. You should get in touch with the local Internal Revenue Service office to file tax returns.
