SALES TAX LEVY PASSES

Voters in Iuka endorsed a proposal to levy a 1% municipal sales tax to replace the 1/2% that has been in effect since 1955.

Retail merchants inside the corporate limits of the City of Iuka will be authorized to collect the 1% sales tax beginning on Wednesday, April 1. A resolution implementing the sales tax election is scheduled for publication in the near future.

Of the 251 ballots cast in Tuesday's election, 142 voted for the sales tax while 109 voted against.

Chemical Control Meetings

Scheduled For Today At Belmont VFW And Iuka Guard Armory

County Agent Percie Stricklen reminds all farmers of the two county-wide Chemical Weed Control meetings scheduled to be held today (Thursday) in Belmont and Iuka. The first meeting will be at the Belmont VFW building and will get underway at 10 a.m. The afternoon meeting will begin at 1:30 o'clock at the National Guard Armory in Iuka.

Today's program has been set up to cover all phases of pre-emergence, oiling, flaming, post-emergence, and chemical weed control in general. "Farmers will have an opportunity to learn all the latest recommendations on chemicals by attending either of these meetings," Mr. Stricklen said.

4 Extension Specialists will discuss the farm equipment needed for applying chemicals, cotton production and chemical weed control, corn and soybean production and Chemical Weed Control, and the new pre-emergence material Treflan for Cotton. A discussion will also be held concerning pasture weed control with chemicals.

Cherokee Awards Two Contracts For Construction Of Water Facilities

The Town of Cherokee last week officially awarded two contracts for the construction of new water treatment facilities for Cherokee. The contracts totaling \$331,750, were awarded to B. H. Craig Construction Co. for the filtration plant and to Matthews - Fritts Construction Co. for the water transmission.

The filtration plant low bid was for \$211,750 and the transmission lines low bid was \$120,000 including deductions. The facilities will have a filtration building and a high service pumping station. The water transmission line will include 27,700 feet of 10-inch pipe and 5,400 feet of 8 inch pipe. The treatment plant will have 400 cubic yards of concrete and 54,000 pounds of reinforcement steel.

Located 3.5 miles northeast of Cherokee on Pickwick Lake, south of the Armour property, the new facility is to be completed in 10 months or 300 days. Construction was expected to begin this week.

The City received \$155,000 in an accelerated public works grant from the federal government, \$225,000 from a revenue bond issue, and \$16,150 from the City itself.

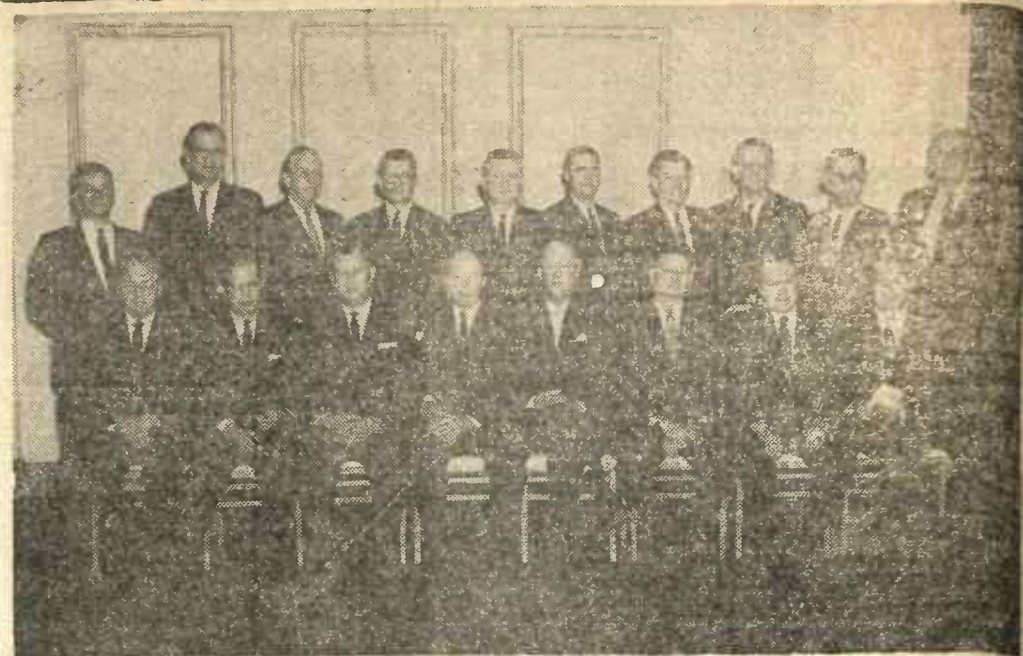

Scrub Hardwood Replaced By Loblolly Pine



Seven years ago this ridge was covered with slow growing, low quality hardwood consisting mainly of blackjack, post oak and hickory. Many of the trees were complete culls and most of the others were of very poor quality. Today, fast growing loblolly pine, ranging up to twelve feet tall, stands in the place of the scrub hardwood. Only four hardwood snags stand as evidence of the change. Soon these will fall and the change will be complete. This landowner applied good forest management practices on this land. Realizing that income from the scrub hardwood would be very low or non-existent, he planted loblolly pine seedlings under the scrub hardwood timber during the winter. All merchantable timber had been sold prior to planting. The following summer, tree injectors and 2,4,5-T chemical were used to deaden the remainder of the hardwood and the change from slow growing, low quality hardwood to fast growing, valuable pine had been made. Good hardwood on a good hardwood site and with a good growth rate should be maintained and managed. It is good business to convert low quality hardwood ridge land to pine in Tishomingo County. Are the culls robbing you of income from your land?

Overseed Oats With Lespedeza

Many landowners have sown
 oats, and now have a good stand
 of oats, on land they plan to
 leave out of row crops for the
 next several years. Some of
 this land is in the feed grain
 program and some of it is not.
 It is a good soil conserving
 practice to overseed oats in
 March or early April with 25
 pounds of kobe lespedeza seed
 per acre. This should be done
 after the oats have received
 the usual application of nitrate
 in March. After the nitrate
 has been applied, and after it
 has rained to dissolve the ni-
 trate, overseed the area with
 25 pounds of kobe lespedeza
 seed per acre. After the oats
 are cut for grain, the lespedeza
 will grow, cover the land, and
 should produce a good crop of
 hay.

The following fall oats can
 be sod seeded in the lespedeza.
 By doing this, the land will
 have a crop growing on it most
 of the year, winter and sum-
 mer, and two crops can be har-
 vested from each acre.

Those farmers who have co-
 operated in the feed grain pro-
 gram will have to follow the
 feed grain regulations. How-
 ever, the lespedeza overseeded
 on their oats would improve
 the land and give some frosted
 hay for cattle to eat in the late
 fall.

The Soil Conservation Ser-

vice personnel urges all farm-
 ers to apply good soil conserv-
 ing practices to their land at
 all times. Overseeding oats
 with kobe lespedeza is a good
 soil conserving practice.

Forestry Notes

One of the main things that
 a timberland owner should be
 concerned with is the quality
 as well as quantity of products
 that his woodland produces.

Here are some points to con-
 sider. Is your timberland fully
 stocked? Is there a good stand
 of trees over the entire area,
 are there some open spots with
 few, if any, trees?

Are the trees of a desirable
 species? Generally, this will
 consist of pine on the hills and
 hardwood on the bottoms. There
 are many acres in this County
 in need of stand conversion.
 This consists of changing the
 stand of trees from an un-
 desirable to a desirable species.
 An example is changing from
 cull and undesirable hard-
 woods to pine on hill land.

If the species of trees on an
 area are desirable and the
 stocking is satisfactory, are the
 trees of good quality? Are they
 tall, straight, and have few
 limbs? You probably have some
 trees that do not meet these
 standards. If so, some of them
 should be removed when the
 next timber sale is made.

Every tree farmer looks for-
 ward to that time when he can
 sell some of his timber. This
 means additional income. We
 should remember that in Mis-
 sissippi one dollar in every
 four comes from forestry.

The time to plan for the fu-
 ture quality and quantity of
 your timber is when a timber-
 sale is made. When selling your
 timber, you should bear in
 mind that the better quality
 trees, in most instances, should
 be left to put on future growth.
 The growth put on by good qual-
 ity trees is much more valu-
 able than the same growth on
 poor quality trees. The timber
 to be cut should be selectively
 marked by a forester in order
 to make a combined thinning
 and improvement cutting.

Motorists Reminded Of Deadline

For Inspection Of
 Motor Vehicles;
 Mar. 31 Is Last Day

The end of the 1964 Motor
 Vehicle Inspection period is
 fast drawing near. State moti-
 vists have until the end of March
 to have their vehicles inspected
 and the approval sticker ap-
 plied. Vehicles may be inspec-
 ted at any of the more than 1100
 inspection stations throughout
 the state. Highway Patrol offi-
 cials recommend early action to
 avoid the last minute rush.

T. E. Birdsong, Commissioner
 of Public Safety, added his
 thoughts on vehicle inspection.
 "We are fully convinced this
 program is effective. We had
 our statistical section research
 the accidents resulting from
 faulty equipment causes for
 the past eight years to deter-
 mine just how effective the
 program is. They found that
 the five years immediately
 prior to the introduction of the
 inspection program had an
 average of almost 500 accidents
 per year directly attributable
 to faulty equipment. Since the
 inauguration of the program in
 1961 the average per year has
 fallen to approximately 350 ac-
 cidents per year. We feel this
 is a definite proof that the in-
 spection has been effective. We
 are proud of the work done by
 our Motor Vehicle Inspectors
 and the fine cooperation given
 by the driving public."

Blue Bell, Inc. Wins Injunction Against Republic

Blue Bell, Inc. has won a per-
 manent injunction in Supreme
 Court (New York) against Re-
 public Novelty Company, Inc.,

in a dispute over Republic's use
 of a label on ladies' knee pants
 and shorts.

Blue Bell filed the suit Feb-
 ruary 20th, claiming that Re-
 public was guilty of unfair com-
 petition by using a label simi-
 lar to Blue Bell's "Wrangler"
 label. Republic was said to be
 importing the competing mer-
 chandise from Japan.

The permanent injunction,
 which was consented to by Re-
 public, and formally entered
 on March 3, 1964, restrains it
 from "buying, selling, shipping,
 delivering or otherwise dealing
 in" any garment carrying a la-
 bel like Blue Bell's. The Court
 also ordered Republic to re-
 move the label from any gar-
 ments in its possession or con-
 trol.

Samuel R. Cohen, Secretary-
 Treasurer of Republic, in an af-
 fidavit consenting to the in-
 junction, stated that Republic
 had ordered 25,000 dozen gar-
 ments, but that none with la-
 bels affixed had been delivered
 to any customer. The President
 of Republic Novelty Company
 is Herman Katz, according to
 trade sources.

The suit involves a 4-1/2" by
 8" label stapled to the hip
 pocket of the garment. Both
 labels have a yellow back-
 ground, decorated with the
 drawing of a girl. Republic's
 label uses the name "Rocking
 K".

In charging unfair competi-
 tion by Republic, "Blue Bell
 claimed that the Republic mer-
 chandise was of "inferior qua-
