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Charter Issued To Honeycutt

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New Motor Co. Will Be Dealer For Chrysler Products

Bonds Offered For Sale For Belmont Airport

The Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors will open sealed bids for the purchase of \$55,000.00 in bonds to pay for the construction of an airport for the Town of Belmont. Bids will be opened at 11 a.m. on Tuesday, March 24, in the county courthouse.

The bonds will be dated July 1, 1964, and will be issued in the denomination of \$1,000 each. Maturity dates will range from March 1, 1965, to March 1, 1984. The entire amount of \$55,000.00 will be issued against the Fifth Supervisor's district with a possible assessment to be levied against property in that district for repayment of the bonds.

Also, at the same time, the Supervisors will offer \$150,000 in bonds for sale for the construction of an addition to the county hospital. The hospital bonds will be issued against the entire county.

Funeral services will be conducted from Cutshall's Funeral Home in Iuka this afternoon (Thursday) at two o'clock. Bro. Joseph Morris, pastor of Iuka Methodist Church, and Bro. Bobby Burress, pastor of Iuka Baptist Church, will officiate. Interment will be in Oak Grove Cemetery.

Most everyone thought of Jack as indestructible, his courage and self-sufficiency not allowing them to think otherwise. The community has lost a tower of strength, and its foundation has been shaken. The familiar face of Jack at his usual place in the bank is missed.

FUNDS APPROVED FOR CONSTRUCTION OF HOSPITAL ADDITION

Public Health Service Will Furnish \$264,400 Of Total Cost

County To Sell Bonds To Pay Local Share

The National Public Health Service has approved a grant under the Hill-Burton Act to share in the cost of the construction of a 19 bed addition to the Tishomingo County hospital.

Announcement of the approval was contained in a telegram to the editor of The Vidette from Senators James O. Eastland, John C. Stennis and Congressman Tom Abernethy.

Total cost of construction will be \$396,600 with the county's share to be approximately \$150,000. Grant received from the Public Health Service is \$264,400.00.

The county Board of Supervisors has officially served notice that bonds in the amount of \$150,000 will be offered for sale on Tuesday, March 24. Sealed proposals are invited for the purchase of the bonds, the proposals to be opened at 11 a.m., on the day of sale.

The hospital bonds will be issued in a denomination of \$1,000.00 and are scheduled to fall due on dates ranging from March 1, 1965 to March 1, 1984.

Original plans for addition to the hospital called for 25 beds, however, due to higher costs of construction the number was decreased to 19. Need for the additional beds has been evident for over a year. Robert Lambert administrator, states that at all times during 1963, the hospital was filled to over 100% of occupancy.

When addition to the hospital is completed, personnel employed will be increased up to 25 more people.

Vehicle Inspection Deadline

Is March 31; All Autos, Trucks Must Pass Test

Only a few days remain before the March 31st deadline for inspection of all Mississippi licensed motor vehicles.

Donald J. Gray, President of the Mississippi Safety Council, in a recent news release stated "In spite of some criticism, the Motor Vehicle Inspection Law has reduced the 'traffic death rate in our state'."

In brief, the following parts must be found to be in good working order before the approval sticker is applied: Headlights, Tail Lights, Brakes, Wheel Alignment, Tires, Steering Mechanism, and Windshield Wiper on driver's side.

Motorists are urged to take their car or truck to an inspection station as soon as possible in order to avoid the usual last minute rush.

We, the undersigned natural persons of the age of twenty-one years or more, acting as incorporators of a corporation under the Mississippi Business Corporation Act, adopt the following Articles of Incorporation for such corporation:

FIRST: The name of the corporation is Honeycutt Motor Company, Inc.

SECOND: The period of its duration is Ninety-nine years.

THIRD: The specific purpose or purposes for which the corporation is organized stated in general terms are:

(b) The Corporation may purchase, and own real estate and personal property and to sell the same and build, construct, buy, lease, rent and otherwise acquire buildings and structures of every kind whatsoever in conducting said business, and

(c) To operate and maintain a fleet of motor trucks and other mode of conveyances to carry out the purposes of said business, and

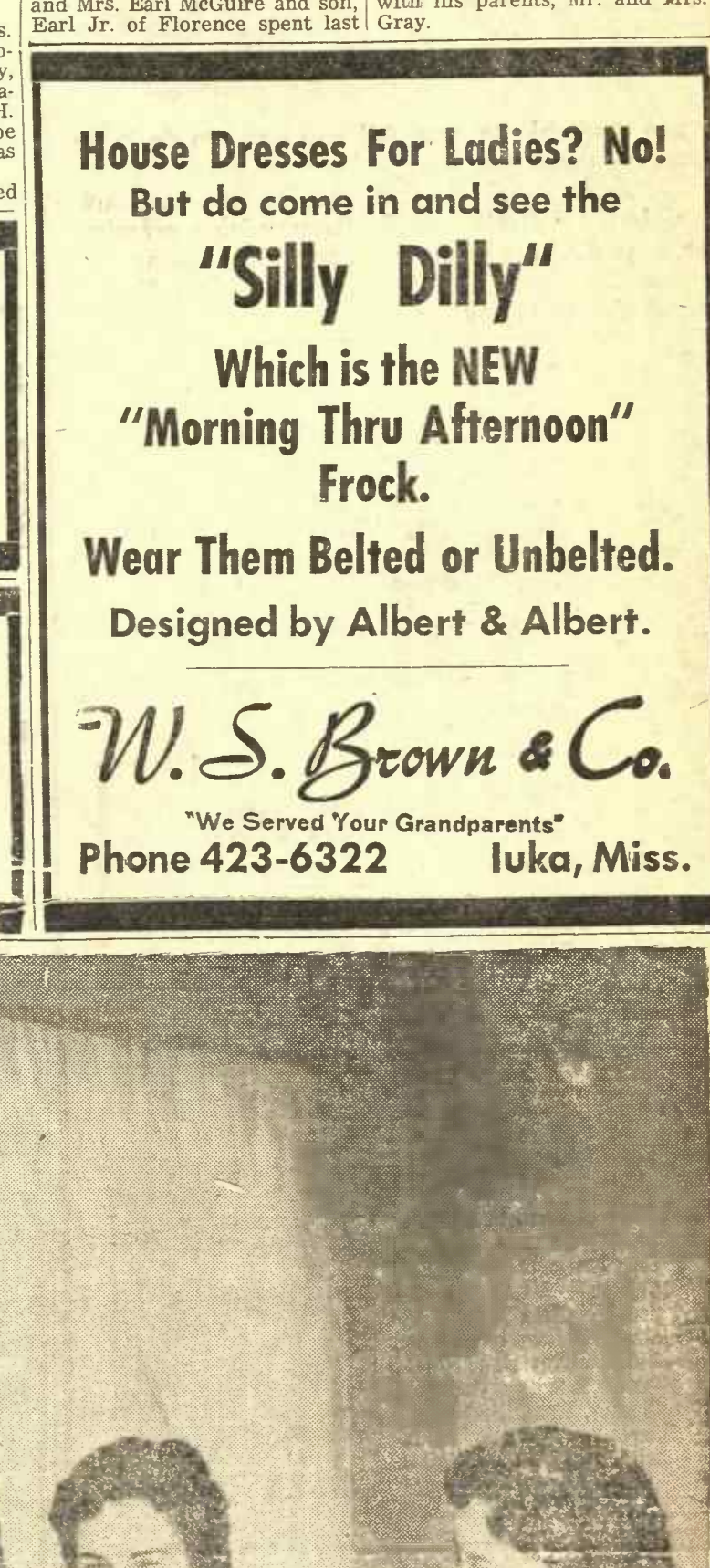

HOME AGENT NOTES

You will soon be adding another name to your list of man-made fibers. This time it is "Corfam," a material that has been developed to make into the upper parts of shoes.

Corfam can be cleaned with soap and water — even the soft-napped version. In surfaces other than the napped, it usually requires only wiping with a damp cloth or tissue, followed by a quick buffing with a dry cloth.
