Quality Fruit Produced In Home Orchards

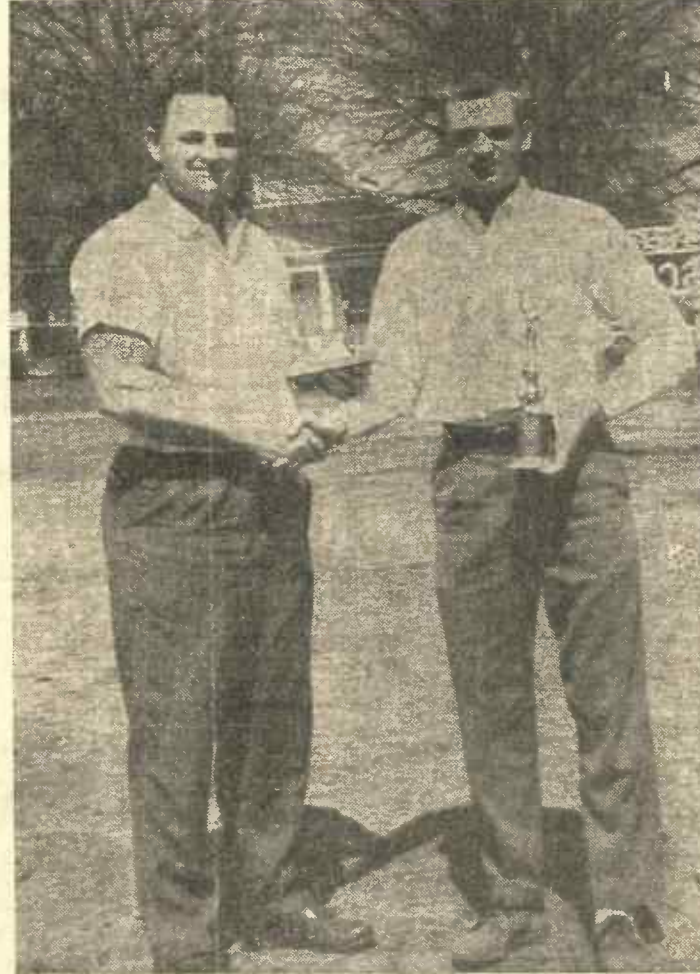
Quality fruit can still be produced in home orchards, according to J. W. Howell of North Iuka and O. A. Lambert of the Mt. Moriah Community.

The secret to being able to produce quality fruit, providing the weather is favorable, is getting on a good spray program. The spraying should start when the fruit trees begin blooming and continue until about three weeks before ripening date. The trees should be sprayed at least every ten days or once a week is better.

"We have learned that a combination of three materials can be used for all trees including grapes all during the year," County Agent Percie Stricklen said. This makes spraying convenient when the same material can be used throughout the season on all trees and grapes.

Materials to use and amount to mix together in 5 gallons of water are: Captan 50% wettable powder, 5 tablespoonsful; Sevin 80% wettable powder, 4 tablespoonsful; malathion 57% emulsion concentrate, 5 tablespoonsful. Mix all three insecticides in 5 gallons of water and shake well. Spray until leaves on trees are wet.

The above spray recommendations are recommended by the Extension Service, Vocational Agriculture Teachers, insecticide dealers as well as Mr. Howell and Mr. Lambert. "Mr. Howell or Mr. Lambert will be glad for anyone to visit their orchard and discuss fruit production," Mr. Stricklen said.

March 27 Final Date For Feed Grain Base Sign-Up

Cotton Acreage Must Be Released By Mar. 30; ASC Office Open Sat.

Friday, March 27, will be the final date that farmers of Tishomingo County may sign-up and divert all or part of their 1964 Feed Grain Base, according to E. N. Allen, local ASCS Office Manager. All farmers who have a Corn Base are urged to go by the local office before the final date.

"At the close of business on Monday, March 23, a total of 572 farmers had signed to divert or rent approximately 6,000 acres of their corn base. \$66,814.07 was paid these farmers, this amount representing approximately one-half of their payments," Mr. Allen said. Final payment is expected to be made around September 1 of this year.

Cotton Acreage Release

County farmers who will not plant their 1964 cotton allotment are urged to please return it to the County Committee not later than Monday, Mar. 30. Mr. Allen states that 20,054 allotted acres went unplanted and unsundered last year, and as a result, Mississippi lost that many acres of cotton. "Farmers should realize that such a loss will be repeated again this year unless they release the acreage they are not going to plant," the Office Manager said.

For the convenience of farmers who work away, the ASCS Office will be open all day on Saturday, March 28, so that they will have a chance to release their unused acreage. Those who may be unable to come to the office are asked to please call 423-4861 and request that the acreage be released.

"Remember, Monday, March 30, is the last day for the release of cotton acreage. We ask that if you have a cotton allotment to please plant it or turn it in to the office," Mr. Allen said.

Sign-Up on ACP

The local ASCS office is taking requests for help in establishing new pastures, fertilizing old pasture, and any other practice available such as application of agricultural limestone to pastures and cropland, stock ponds, secondary drainage ditches, V-ditches, etc.

"If you have need for some of this help, come by our office in Iuka and sign your request, get your material, and start work," Mr. Allen said. For the convenience of farmers in the south part of the county, a representative from the ASCS Office will be in Belmont at the Community Building each Tuesday from 8 a.m. to 12 noon and in Tishomingo at the Co-Op building each Tuesday afternoon between the hours of 1 and 4 o'clock.

Warned Of Deadline

Wednesday, April 1, is last day to sign Tax Exemption Forms

Wednesday, April 1, is positively and absolutely the last day on which Tishomingo county home owners can sign application forms for tax exemptions on homesteads.

This information comes from County Tax Assessor Alvia J. Blakney who strongly advises home owners who have not signed the application forms to do so at their very earliest convenience — or else lose the exemption and therefore be required to pay the entire amount of taxes on their homes in 1964.

"Several home owners in the county have not signed the application forms," Mr. Blakney said, "and I am doing my best to let them know. It is absolutely a must that they sign the forms in order to save paying all the taxes due on their home," he said.

KNOW YOUR INSECT ENEMY HIGH-FLYING 'HOPPERS'

Grasshoppers get way up in the air when it comes to the subject of food!

Various species are strong fliers, and adults sometimes gather in giant swarms moving hundreds of miles and destroying crops and range plants wherever they pause. Individual 'hoppers' have been snared in airplane traps at altitudes around 1,000 feet, but entomological history reveals that hordes in migration have reached heights nearing the one-mile mark.

The most spectacular example of the high fliers in this country occurred in 1874 when migrating swarms of Rocky Mountain grasshoppers swept the Great Plains causing such a food shortage that it was dubbed a national disaster.

An observer in Nebraska reported that one of the invading waves of 'hoppers' averaged half a mile in height and was 100 miles wide and 300 miles long. In places the column (seen through field glasses and measured by surveying instruments) was nearly a mile high—an estimated 23 million per cubic mile.

Many species travel long distances on the wing. Locusts, or grasshoppers, have become an international problem in certain parts of the world. They breed in one country and migrate hundreds of miles to another to devastate crops.

Coming back down to earth, we find that government surveys keep a sharp eye on hatching, development and flying 'hoppers' to help growers plan their control programs. Researchers recommend spraying infested areas with a pesticide when the insects



are "plentiful and stable, hatching is complete and egg deposition hasn't started."

Growers report excellent, long-lasting control of 'hoppers' with a newer carbamate insecticide called Savin, that is safer to use than many other insecticides. They find that drift problems are minimized using this material, and treated crops can be fed to their livestock without harmful residues showing up in meat or milk.

Reports indicate that a ton of alfalfa per day in each 40-acre field can be eaten by 'hoppers' when the population reaches 15 to 20 per square yard. That is why entomologists tell growers to be alert early to infestations and apply controls to hatching areas, roadsides, fence rows and headlands before these high-flying pests move to adjacent crops. **F.N.S.**

Better Varieties Grain Sorghum Now Available

When 35 grain sorghums were compared in Experiment Station variety tests, results showed how much progress has been made through breeding projects in the last 10 years.

Martin, one of the best pure-line varieties 10 years ago, has been retained in the test as a check variety. When the variety study began Martin was well up in the list of high producers. Development of superior new hybrids has increased yields to the extent that Martin was 35th in a field of 35 last year.

Six varieties—GA 615, Pioneer 820, Dekalb D50, GA 609, Ranger, and NK 210—made 70 or more bushels per acre, compared to 47 bushels for Martin.

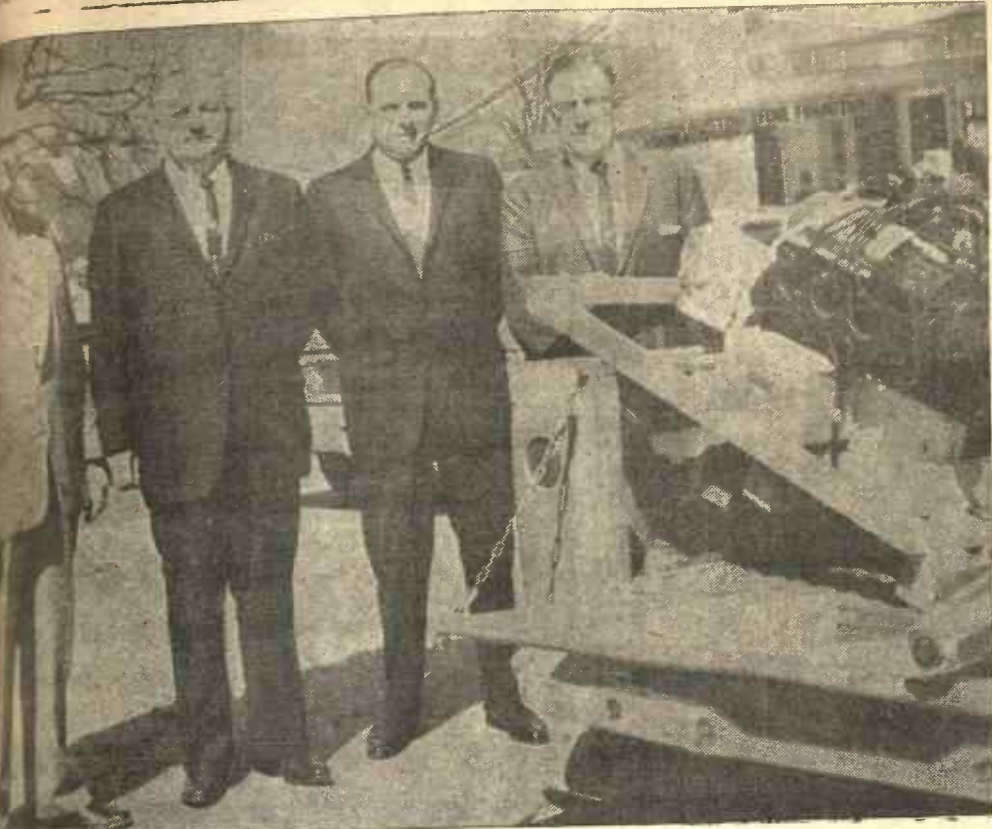

HOME AGENT NOTES

By Mrs. Dianne F. Crubaugh

Fishing County Home Demonstration Agent

With stretch garments and fabrics becoming more popular, many homemakers are wondering how to launder them.

The first advice is to read, save and follow the specific laundering instructions that are attached to the garment or fabric. If these instructions get misplaced, you can be guided by these general principles:

1. In general, the type of fiber governs the temperature of the wash water. In blends, the most "tender" fiber determines the method and temperature.

2. Heavier fabrics in sturdy weaves can take longer wash and rinse cycles than sheer, more delicate stretch fabrics.

3. Use hot water for colorfast cottons and for synthetic fiber yarns.

4. Use warm water for woolens, and a little extra soap or detergent because wool absorbs more suds than do other fibers.

5. If bleaching is required, use the type recommended for nylon.

6. Most stretchies are safe in a gas or electric dryer, set at the temperature proper for fibers concerned. Or, you may hang the garments to dry.

7. If touch-up ironing is desired, press lightly under a damp cloth. Set the iron temperature at "nylon" or "cool," or use a steam iron.

8. Slipcovers may be thoroughly dry before replacing on furniture, as the stretch factor

assures a smooth, snug fit without damp-shaping.

Store large stretch garments flat. For example, slacks suspended from a hanger for some time can actually "grow" an inch or more in length. Laundering, however, will immediately correct such elongation and restore the original size and shape.

Egg Temperature Tips

The key to cooking eggs is a moderate temperature. The protein in eggs needs to be carefully cooked so it will stay tender and tasty.

Separate eggs as soon as you remove them from the refrigerator. Cold yolks are less likely to break.

Egg white whip to larger volume when at room temperature.

When you use eggs in casserole dishes, set the dish in a pan of water to keep the temperature low during cooking.

Keep the water in which you cook eggs below boiling. Keep fat in which you fry eggs below the smoking point.



County Agent's Notes

1963—A Record Farm Year
Cotton is still "king" in Mississippi. 1963 yield of 709 pounds per acre is an all time record for the state.

A new record in total production of soybeans was also set in 1963 with 25 million bushels produced. Beans produced \$65 million for Mississippi farmers.

Rice yields per acre set a new record of 3,900 pounds—a 500 pound increase over the

previous record.

Pecans produced record crops totaling 27 million pounds. Corn yields were the second highest ever in the state.

Mississippi growers also reached new highs in numbers of commercial layers, total eggs produced, number of eggs per hen and in broiler production.

A new record was set in 1963 in total milk production per cow.

With all of these increases, Mississippi farmers also set a new record in farm income.

The preliminary report places farm income at \$788 million, a 13 percent increase over the previous high of \$697 million.

Gross income per farm also reached a record. In 1963 this was \$7,406—an increase of 17 percent above the previous record.

A breakdown of sources of income to Mississippi farmers shows that crops accounted for 62 percent of the total and livestock and products accounted for 38 percent.

Chemical Weed Control In Cotton

Planning to use chemicals to control weeds this year in your cotton?

If so, when preparing the seedbed is the time to be sure that you get the field set up properly for use of the chemicals and for flaming. Your county agent can help you on this.

Some suggested chemicals to use include CIPC, Karmex (diuron), Telvar (monuron).

Treflan has created a lot of interest. Only one year's test results are available. But the material shows promise. To get results claimed by the manufacturer, treflan must be incorporated into the soil.

Some post emerge treatments recommended include: herbicidal oil when cotton is two to six inches tall; diuron plus surfactant for cotton over six inches tall; DMA plus surfactant for cotton three inches tall to first bloom; flame cultivation for cotton eight to 10 inches

tall. For layby, Karmex is recommended.

7.1 Per Cent Increase In Tax Returns

Refunds Certified For Payment During 1964
Total \$1.3 Billion

J. G. Martin, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue, today reported a nationwide increase of 7.1 percent in the number of tax returns processed for refund during the first two months of 1964 as compared to the same period of 1963.

Refunds certified for payment during the first two months of 1964 totaled \$1.3 billion representing an increase of 14 percent over the \$1.1 billion for the same period last year.

The accelerated rate of return of these refund payments into the American economy was credited by Internal Revenue to more rapid and effective processing operations through use of its Automatic Data Processing system.

Mr. Martin stated that one factor responsible for the rapid processing of refunds was the response which Mississippi taxpayers have made to the request that preaddressed tax returns be used to the greatest

extent possible. He urged that the taxpayers continue to use preaddressed tax returns in order that the processing of the returns can be achieved as rapidly and economically as possible.

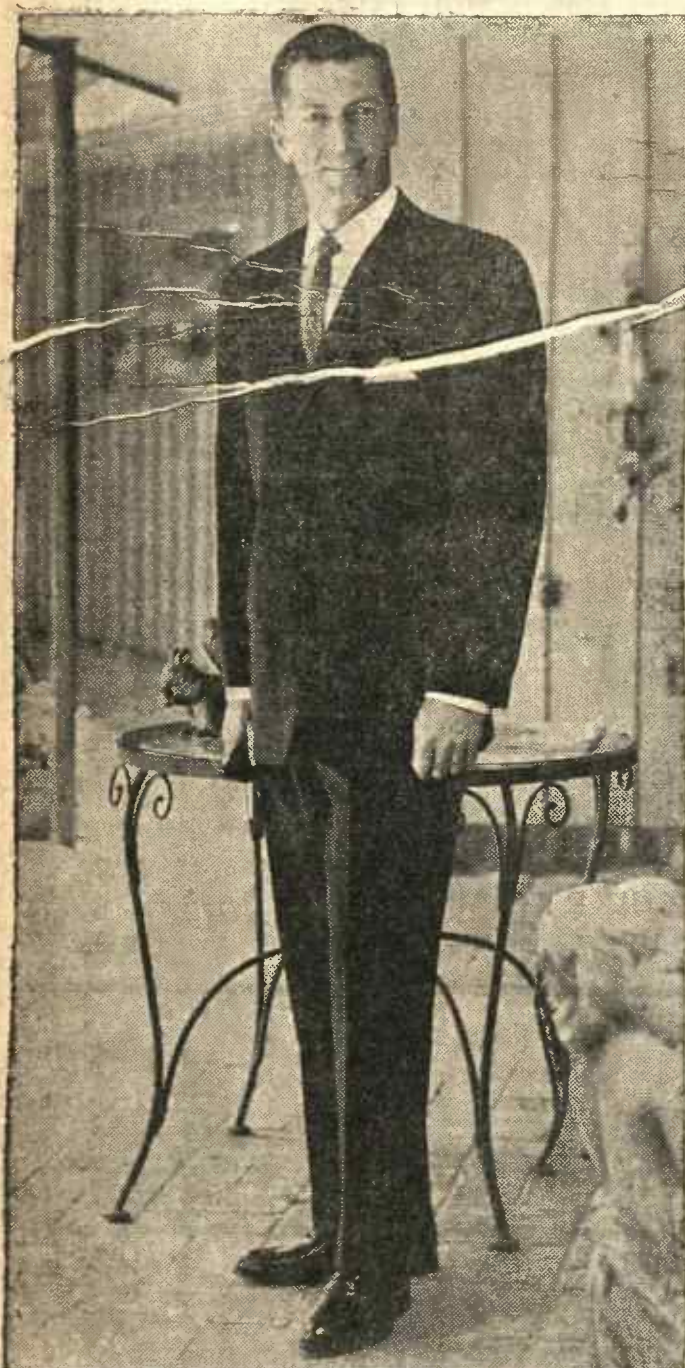

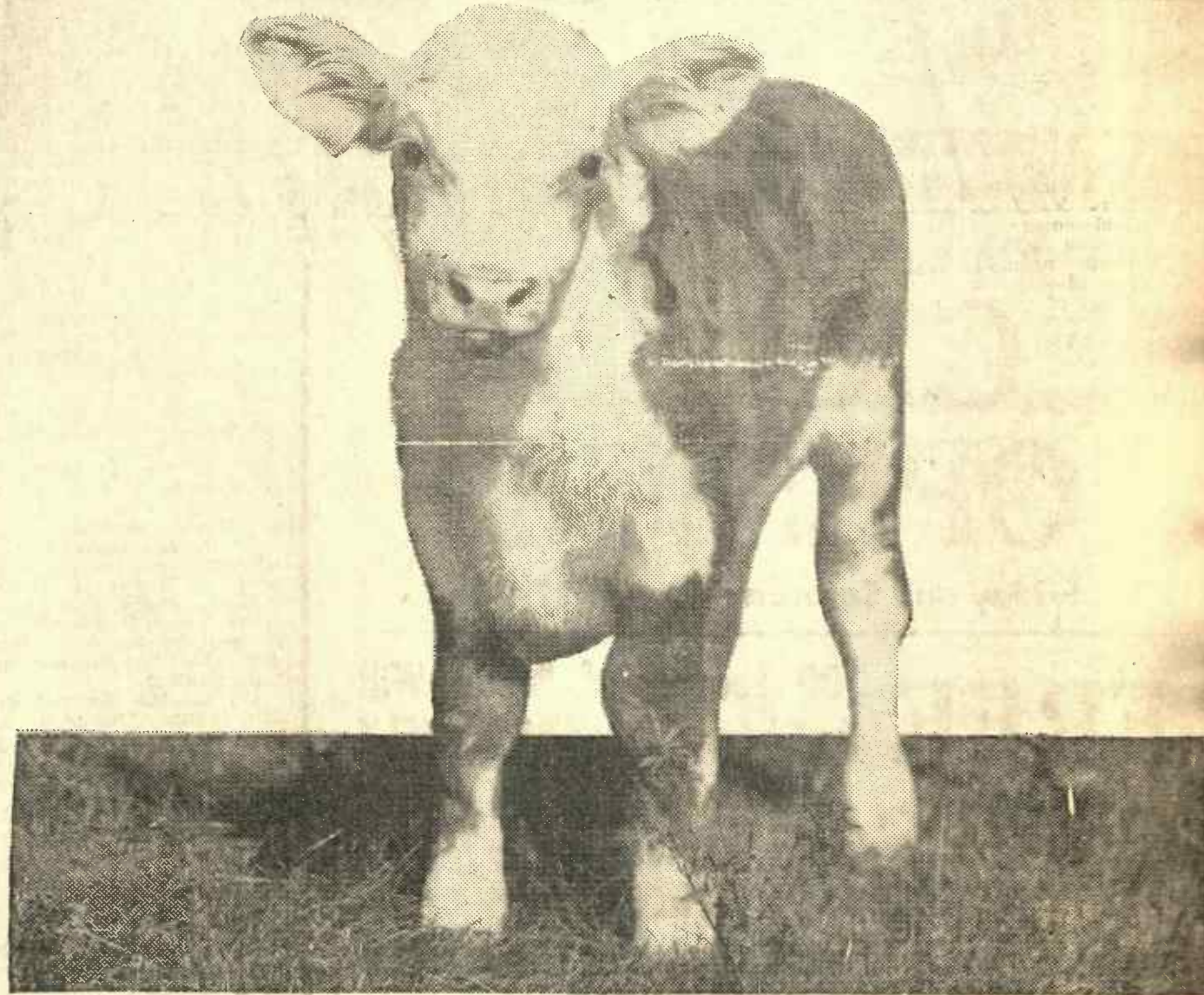

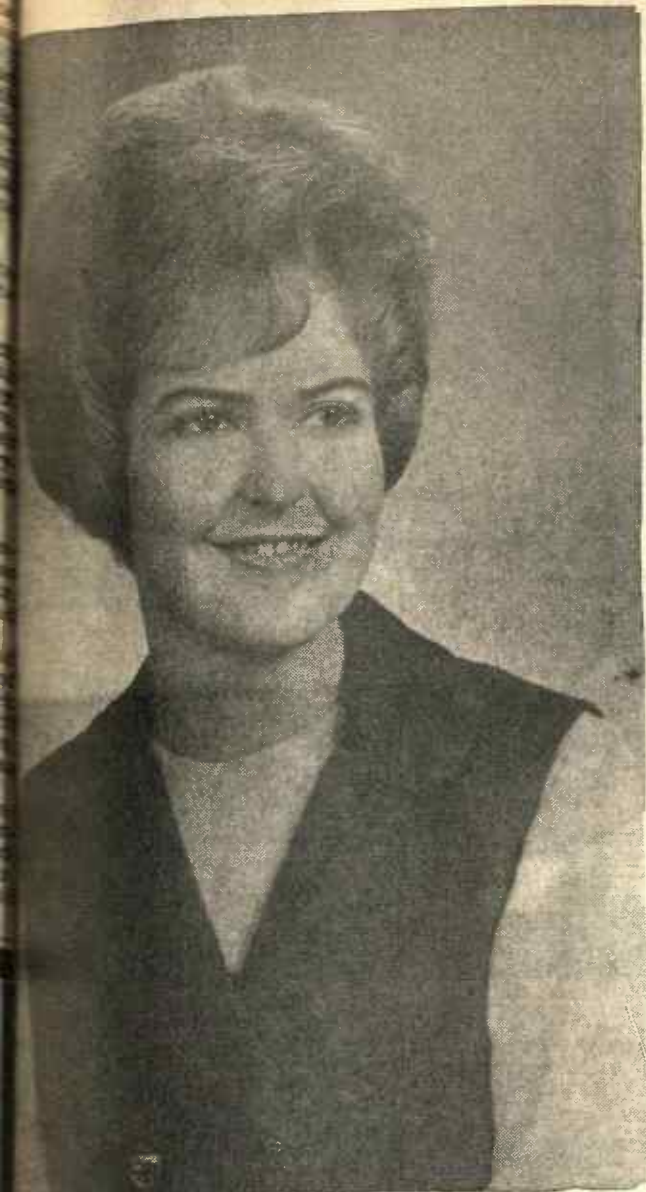

Veterans Corner

Q—Is a veteran given preference in obtaining private employment?

A—A veteran is aided in obtaining private employment by the Veterans Employment Service of the U. S. Department of Labor. This work is carried on through the local state employment offices in each of the 50 states. A veteran also has some re-employment rights for the job held prior to going into the service. Full details may be obtained at the nearest state employment office.

Q—Can I select my own lot for burial in Arlington National Cemetery?

A—No. Gravesites are not assigned in advance of immediate requirement. Application may be made at time of death of the veteran or that of an eligible dependent.

Q—I am a Canadian and have served in the armed forces of the United States but not during wartime. Am I entitled to become an American citizen?

A—An alien with three years active service during peacetime may have this naturalization process authorized and expedited provided he file citizenship papers while in the service or within 6 months thereafter.

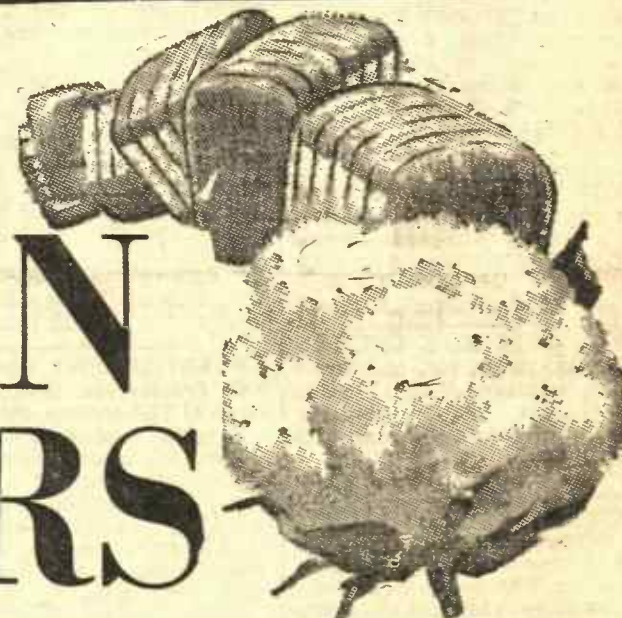

Conservation Farmers Are Good Farmers

There have been good farmers and poor farmers since men have tilled the soil. It has al-

ways been true that the good farmer was a conservation farmer. He was a conservation farmer because he maintained his soil while earning a livelihood from it.

The difficulty with this proposition is that there were only a very few good farmers, and a vast number of poor farmers. Today the number of good farmers is steadily increasing. We like to believe that this is true because of the assistance they receive from the various agricultural agencies.

The Soil Conservation Service would certainly like to claim part of the credit, but regardless of how good a farm plan, based on the capabilities of the soil, is written for a farmer, if he does not put it into practice by using information and help from other agricultural agencies, it is doubtful if the

plan would be of any value.

The good farmer uses good varieties of crops, the proper kinds and amounts of fertilizer, and controls insects. Where does he get the information needed for this? From the County Agent. Most farmers need financial assistance, some get this from the local bank, but many get help through the Farmers Home Administration and/or through the ASCS programs. If they have questions concerning their woodland, the area forester is there to help them. Nor should the Vocational Education (or VO-AG) teacher be overlooked. No one has done more than he, in his school district, in assisting and guiding farmers in good crop and livestock practices.

All of the information and service is needed to efficiently carry out a good soil and water conservation plan for the kind and amount of land owned by an individual farmer. It is the personnel of the Soil Conservation Service who map the soil and with the farmer, writes a plan just for his farm. The idea of the plan is to use the soil according to its best capability and treat it according to its needs. The farmer who does this will save his soil while using it. So, in the long run, or even the short run, the conservation farmer is the best farmer.

If you do not have a soil conservation plan for your farm, you should get one made. It will cost you nothing, but it can be of great benefit to you.
