ten-year service award.

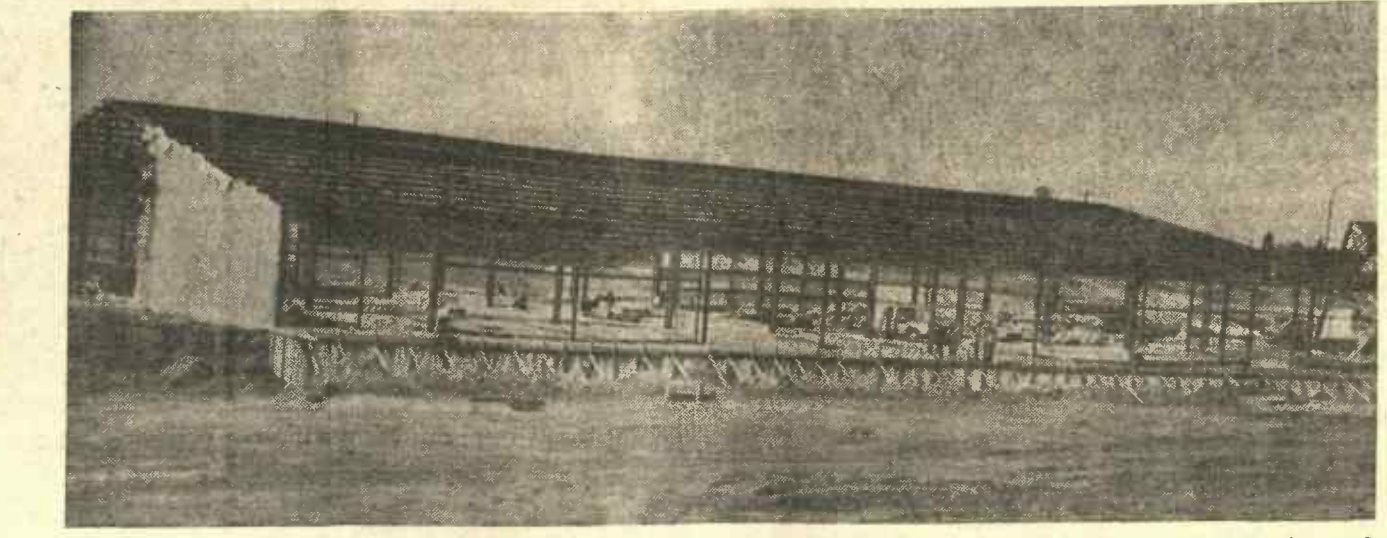
Boy Scout Spring Camporee

4th Victory Recorded By Chieftains

**Baseballers Whip
Shannon And Fulton
In Last Two Games**

Iuka High School's baseball
Chieftains racked up their sec-
ond win in as many starts last
Friday by beating Shannon's
Red Raiders 8 to 2.
Iuka broke up a 1 to 1 game
in the eighth inning by scoring
7 runs on 7 hits, highlighted by
Earl Walker's double. Both pit-
chers went all the way and, ex-
cept for Presley's eighth inning
lapse, made it pretty much of a
pitcher's game. Jim Robinson,
the winning pitcher, allowed 2
runs on only 5 hits. His Iuka
teammates committed two er-
rors behind him. Shannon's
Presley was charged with the
loss giving up 8 runs on 12
hits over the full nine innings.
Shannon also committed 3 er-
rors, but none figured in the
scoring. Robinson fanned 11 Red
Raider batters over the route
while Presley could mark up
only 3 strike-outs.

Defeat Fulton

Tuesday afternoon, May 31,
the mighty Chieftains met a
good team from Fulton High
School on the local diamond.
In a continuation of their win-

Sheriff's Raids Net 120 Gals. Liquor; One Out On Bail; Booze Destroyed

Sheriff's Office personnel re-
cently confiscated 97 gallons of
moonshine whiskey near the
residence of Mrs. Dellie Gober
of near Belmont. The liquor
was found in a shed on prop-
erty occupied by Mrs. Gober. Mrs.
Gober was arrested and charg-

ed with possession of untaxed
whiskey. She is presently free
on bond while awaiting the ac-
tion of the next term of Circuit
Court. Mrs. Gober was convict-
ed on similar charges last De-
cember, at which time she was
fined \$100.00.

A large amount of the con-
fiscated whiskey had been col-
ored so as to resemble bonded
whisky. According to Sheriff
Bishop, moonshine whisky is
sometimes artificially colored
and sold as bonded whisky.
This, of course, considerably
increases the price. Sold as
moonshine, without any tricky
color alterations aimed at en-
hancing the price, the 97 gal-
lons would probably be worth
considerably more than \$1,000.

Another cache of 23 gallons
of illicit moonshine was also
found by Sheriff's personnel re-
cently, but ownership of this
lot has not been established and
no arrests have been made in
connection with it. Sheriff Bis-
hop advises that an investigation
is underway in this connection.

On Tuesday, Sheriff Bishop,
along with other personnel of
the Sheriff's Office, destroyed
the 120 gallons of moonshine
reported above, along with a
quantity of beer in cans, bot-
tles and cartons, which had
been confiscated from various
sources over a period of time.

COTTON RELEASE DATE EXTENDED TO APRIL 15

**Additional Days Provide Further
Opportunity For Many Farmers
To Release Unwanted Acreage**

Due to cotton legislation now
pending in Congress, Orville E.
Bostick, Chairman of the Mis-
sissippi Agricultural Stabiliza-
tion and Conservation Service
(ASCS), State Committee, an-
nounced this week to all Coun-
ties in Mississippi that the final
date for cotton farmers to re-
lease cotton allotment acres
that will not be planted is be-

ing extended from the date
March 31, 1964 to April 15,
1964. Many cotton farmers have
hesitated to release acreage
they will not plant, thinking
possibly it would be to their
advantage in the event legisla-
tion being considered by Con-
gress is enacted into law.

The Legislation being consid-
ered could possibly affect farm-
ers with original cotton allot-
ment of 22.4 acres or more who
release a part of such allot-
ment, but will have no effect
on farmers who release acreage
from original allotments of less
than 22.4 acres.

The House Rules Committee
has agreed to bring the Cotton-
Wheat Bill, passed by the Sen-
ate, to the floor of the House
shortly after the Easter recess,
possibly April 6. Debate will be
limited to one hour and the
vote will be either to accept
the Senate Bill without amend-
ment or reject it.

Note: The action taken by
the State Committee to extend
the final date for farmers to
release cotton allotment acre-
age that will not be planted
had no effect on the March 31,
1964 deadline for requesting
additional acreage. Any farm-
er who has an original allot-
ment of 22.4 acres or more who
has already released a part of
such allotment, may contact
the ASCS County Office in Iuka
and change their acreage for
release before the County Com-
mittee reapportions to other
farmers.

It is very important that all
cotton farmers either plant or
release their cotton acreage.

Poultry Notes

A state law requires that no dead poultry, carcasses or any part of a dead bird be disposed of by throwing or leaving along public roads, in fields or woods. It requires that they must be burned, buried or put in an approved type disposal pit.

Some poultry producers are having trouble with disposal pits, especially during wet weather due to poor drainage. Some good commercially made incinerators are on the market designed especially for the use of poultrymen. These units are reasonably priced and do good jobs.

Most of them burn fuel oil and will cost 12 to 15 cents an hour to operate. Some of these units will hold 150 pounds and will completely burn up the contents in five hours.

If you are having trouble with your disposal pit, it might pay you to check on an incinerator.

Make Money From Pastures
Some steps toward making money from pasture include:

Fertilize now. On permanent

pastures with grass and clover combination use phosphate and potash. On grasses alone use nitrogen.

Control weeds on all permanent pastures. Use chemicals early and the clipper during the summer.

Prepare to alternate grazing on all permanent pastures regardless of the type grasses you have on the pastures. To properly manage pastures, cross fences must be used.

Fertilize broomsedge areas and graze heavily during the spring. Cross fence broomsedge areas.

Set coastal bermuda during April and May, as long as the moisture lasts. Spray the area with 2,4-D or simazine.

Fertilize established Coastal Bermuda with complete fertilizer except in the delta. In the delta use nitrogen only.

On thin stands of Coastal, spray for weed control. Do not plow up last year's thin stands. Fertilize it and control weeds.

Soils Testing
Acid soils are costing Mississippi cotton farmers around \$30 million a year in reduced yields. Lack of lime on your soils may rob you of as much as one half bale or more to the acre.

Liming acid soils increases cotton yields by supplying calcium and magnesium, preventing manganese toxicity (crinkle-leaf), improving availability of phosphorus, reducing leaching of potash, increasing efficiency of applied fertilizer.

How do you know if your land needs lime? Soil testing will give you the answer!

Sensing The News By Thurman Sensing The NCC And The Civil Rights Bill

As the mass agitation groups in the nation step up their campaign to ram the Civil Rights Act through the U. S. Senate, their drive will have the full support of the bureaucracy of the National Council of Churches. In short, the NCC will be a full-time partner of the Congress of Racial Equality, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, the Student Non-violent Coordinating Committee and other groups that are seeking to impose a new pattern of regimentation on Americans and strip them of constitutional rights.

The General Assembly of the NCC, meeting in Philadelphia early last December, passed a resolution calling upon Congress "to take every step necessary to ensure the earliest possible passage of the Civil Rights Act." Robert W. Spike, executive Director of the Commission on Race of the NCC, wrote a letter to the Executives of State Councils of Churches outlining the NCC's lobbying activities in behalf of this force bill. When the bill reaches the Senate, he said, "A massive letter writing campaign will be necessary. Remind everyone that their letters, telephone calls, and visits have made the progress of the bill possible."

Point 4 of Mr. Spike's letter states: "We plan round-the-clock church services in Washington at the time the bill comes to the Senate and during any filibuster which develops." He then asked, "Will you send us a list of clergymen whom you know would be willing to serve as a kind of preaching mission in our church services in Washington at the time of the filibuster?"

and employees, the right of a business man to control his own business; and so on ad nauseum.

The sum and substance of the measure being supported by the NCC is that it provides for a regimented way of life in the United States. Though described by its proponents as a "rights" bill, the legislation would only be concerned with the taking away of rights. It would constitute a legal black-jack aimed at the heads of citizens who do not believe that their personal lives should be ordered by the executive power in the federal government.

It is hard to understand how any citizen who believes in personal liberty and the historic American freedoms can support either the Civil Rights Act or the NCC, which is lobbying for it. Even if the bill were a good one, which it is not, an inter-denominational agency is in a scandalous position when it acts as a power bloc trying to bring pressure on Congress.

April Showers Take Short Cut To The Creek

Sunshine, April showers, soft breezes and pretty flowers. This is the season when Mother Nature seems a bit fickle and most anything can happen from a balmy day to a cyclone. This is a time when those mischievous little rain drops may decide to take a short cut to the creek, hopping, dancing and racing madly pell mell toward the creek. In their mad dash, they break terraces, run over rows and gather precious topsoil to carry it far away.

All this can be a deadly serious business because scientists tell us that it takes hundreds of years to build one inch of good, fertile topsoil. Just one heavy April shower can carry one-fourth or more of this away. The health of our nation depends on the unknown elements in our topsoil. Sure we can produce crops with commercial fertilizer. We do, but what about the life-giving content of the food produced from highly fertilized eroded soils compared with the food from plants grown from nature's fertile topsoil? It can well be that the strength of our nation lies in its topsoil.

It behooves all of us to guard this topsoil, to prevent the water from April showers or from any rain taking a short cut to the creek. This can be done by

maintaining terraces, properly arranged rows, sod crops, or by properly managing crop residue. Walk the water off your land. Don't let it take a short cut to the creek.

HOME AGENT NOTES By Mrs. Dianne F. Crubaugh Tishomingo County Home Demonstration Agent

Your April plentiful foods list gives you a choice of a variety of foods — beef, canned corn, eggs, rice, dried beans, cottage cheese, and canned ripe olives.

If you include cottage cheese on your shopping list, remember you can buy it in a variety of styles. You will find it with large curds or small curds, either dry or creamed, and plain or with vegetables and fruits added. One-half cup of creamed cottage cheese contains only 120 calories, but has the same amount of protein as three ounces of meat, fish, poultry or three eggs. Some of you will be buying beef for your freezer while it is at lower prices. If you buy a whole beef carcass, you can expect about one-fourth of it to yield steaks, one-fourth, roasts, one-fourth ground beef and stew and the other one-fourth to be waste (bone, fat and such).

If your grocery store has good prices on quick-cooking, tender cuts of beef, you may want to buy ahead and put some steaks in your freezer for summer cookouts.

The rice produced in our country that you will be buying has never been touched by human hands from the field to table and is packaged with the greatest care. So there is no need to wash it.

The old belief that rice is fattening has been disproved because the carbohydrates are so readily assimilated in the body. Rice is used in many reducing diets today because of its protein value. It is easily digested, too.

Eggs in Ham Blankets 1 cup fine dry bread crumbs, 1 cup milk, 1 cup ground, cooked ham (firmly packed), 1 (11 oz.) can Cheese soup, 1 tablespoon horseradish, 1 tablespoon prepared mustard, and 8 hard-cooked eggs, peeled. Combine dry bread crumbs, milk, ham, horseradish and

mustard. Press one-third cup ham mixture firmly around each egg. Place coated eggs in a shallow baking dish. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F) for 20 minutes. Serve heated undiluted cheese soup over each portion. Makes eight servings.

Flower Hints A cutting bed of annual flowers is a good addition to the vegetable garden area. You can then grow the flowers in the front yard mainly for show or display.

Start planting the first rows of glads late in April, and plant another row each 2 weeks. By staggering the planting, you will have a good cut flower supply.

Spring flowering shrubs, as flowering quince, oriental magnolia, spirea and foysythia, should be pruned and shaped just after they produce their flowers in the spring.

Many landowners in this

Q—Is there any limit on the
amount of social security self-

Tests Show Value Of Fertilization On Johnsongrass

Fertilizer on Johnsongrass
meadows will pay for itself
many times over in high yields
of better quality hay, Dr. C. V.
Ward, Mississippi Experiment
Station agronomist, became
convinced of this in a two-year
study.

Without fertilizer his plots
made about 2 tons of hay per
acre. Thirty pounds of nitro-
gen, applied at a cost of \$3.60,
increased yields by two tons or
\$60 worth of hay. Each incre-
ment of nitrogen, applied along
with a steady rate of 120
pounds of phosphate and pot-
ash per acre, continued to
boost yields. At 240 pounds per
acre, the yield was 8 1/4 tons.

Nitrogen does not neces-
sarily have to be applied in the
early spring. These studies
showed equally good response
from applications after the
first or second hay cuttings if
summer rainfall is ample. Re-
gardless of the amount of fer-
tilizer used, Johnsongrass must
be cut at an early growth stage
in order to obtain high quality
hay.

"Thousands of acres of John-
songrass meadows in Mississi-
ppi are starved for plant food,"
Dr. Ward said. "Many of these
underfed meadows produce less
than two tons of hay annually.
To realize the full potential of
this grass, it must be properly
fertilized."

Liberal use of nitrogen fer-
tilizer along with recommended
levels of potash and phosphorus

will do four important things
for a Johnsongrass meadow. It
will thicken the stand of John-
songrass, help eliminate weeds,
boost hay yields, and give a
more leafy hay that is higher
in crude protein."

The Experiment Station test
was established near Prairie,
Mississippi on an old worn-out
hay field in 1962. Initially the
heavy black soil was low in
plant food and the stand of
Johnsongrass was sparse.

Contact Lens Prevent Injury

The eye was hit by a small
dart, but a contact lens pre-
vented any injury.

This was reported by Dr.
Newton K. Wesley, president
of the National Eye Research
Foundation, in a recent article
published in the American
Journal of Optometry and Ar-
chives of American Academy
of Optometry.

Although the dart actually
cracked the contact lens, the
thin plastic material prevented
any physical damage or loss of
vision.

Dr. Wesley also pointed out
that contact lenses can help
restore vision, in some cases,
where no other devices or
treatment was effective.

Reporting on a survey of 130
ophthalmologists and optomet-
rists attending a recent Na-
tional Contact Lens Congress, Dr.
Wesley noted that the doctors
knew of 238 eyes which were
saved by contact lenses or
could have been kept from in-
jury if contact lenses had been
worn.

He cited records in which
eyelids were cut and the lenses
scratched in automobile ac-
cidents without damage to vision.
The same 130 doctors reported
that 10,700 eyes were helped
by contact lenses in cases
where they could not have
been satisfactorily helped other-
wise.

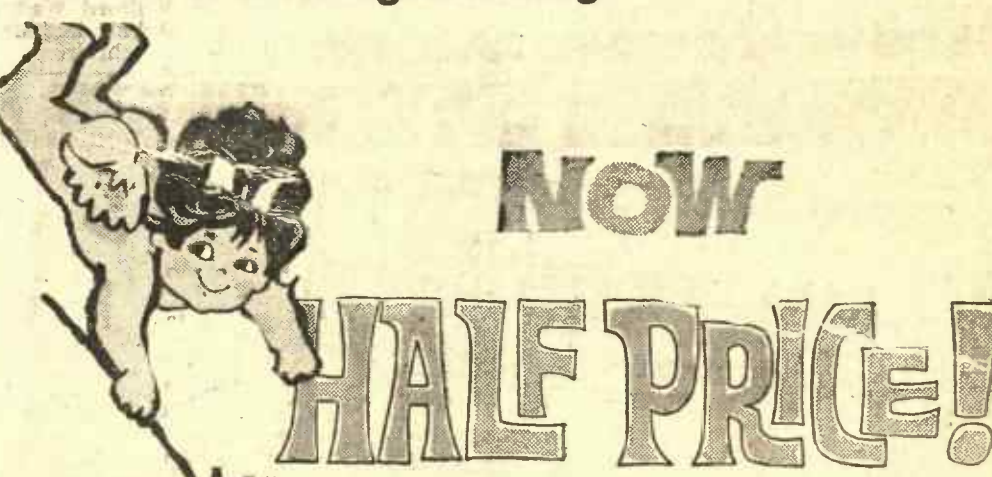
