Chieftain Baseballers Win Victory Number 5

Corinth And New Albany Nines
Bow To Undeclared Iuka Team

As a result of games played last Friday and this past Tuesday, the Iuka Chieftains are on top in the Class A-AA North Division race. They are still unbeaten, adding victories over Corinth and New Albany this past week to run their string of wins to 5, and the team fans are talking about the possibility of a conference runaway.

Iuka had to go an extra inning to defeat the Corinth Warriors in a rain marred game on their home diamond last Friday afternoon. The final score was 3 to 2 for Iuka. The Chieftains got their 3 runs on 7 hits while committing 5 errors. Corinth had 2 runs on 8 hits and 1 error. Intermittent drizzle over the first four or five innings was the big factor in a number of errors which resulted in 2 of Iuka's runs and 1 Corinth tally being unearned. At the end of the regulation 7 innings, the teams were tied 1 to 1. Corinth shoved across a run in their half of the eighth inning but the Chieftain's hitters were equal to the challenge and scored the tying and the winning runs in the home half of the eighth. Robinson was credited with Iuka's win and Haynie was the losing hurler for Corinth. Big guns in the attack were Tommy Dean with two doubles for the Chieftains and Corinth's Holloway who went 4 for 4, including a double. Whitehurst also doubled for Corinth.

On Tuesday the 7th of April, the Chieftain's pitching star, Jim Robinson, ran his personal record to 5 wins and 0 losses as he defeated Corinth.

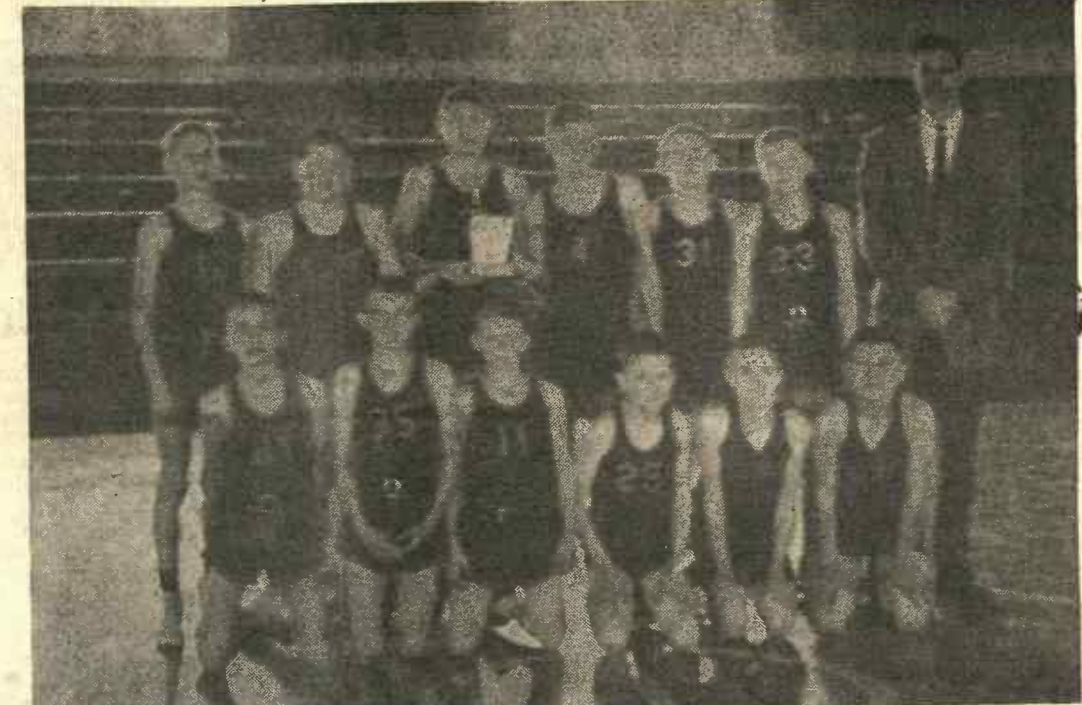
To win the championship, Miss Carr spelled the word "Incubator" which was missed by Miss Bobo and then correctly spelled the word "Partition."

OUTAGE OF ELECTRIC POWER IN AREA EXPLAINED BY TCEP ASS'N.

The Iuka, Tishomingo and Belmont Substations which serve loads in the Tishomingo County Electric Power Association's service area are normally supplied from TVA's large primary substation at Burnsville over 46,000-volt transmission lines.

The Burnsville substation is connected to the high capacity 161,000-volt transmission line which runs from Pickwick Dam to Tupelo. Before the tornado of March 4 destroyed the Pickwick Dam switchyard, the Burnsville substation could be supplied over this line from Pickwick or from Tupelo.

The tornado destroyed towers in the Tenn. River crossing of the Pickwick-Tupelo 161,000 volt line and the Burnsville primary substation can now be supplied only from Tupelo.

Recent interruptions to service from the Tishomingo County Substations have been occasioned largely by severe lightning and windstorms which caused trouble on the 161,000-volt line from Tupelo to Burnsville.

Some measure of back-up service to the Iuka Substation is provided by a 46,000-volt line from TVA's primary substation at Muscle Shoals by way of Cherokee and Magerum. This is a long, heavily loaded line and it does not have sufficient capacity to supply the total load on the Iuka Substation.

TVA is working actively to restore service to the Burnsville primary substation over the 161,000-volt line from Pickwick dam and expects to have this line back in operation by the end of April. At that time service to all Tishomingo County Substations should be normal again.

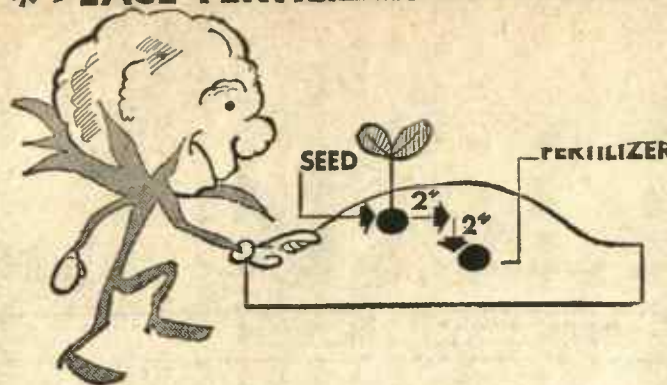

* PLACE FERTILIZER CORRECTLY



PROPER PLACEMENT—of fertilizer for row crops is important. It can save your stand. Where high rates of mixed fertilizer are being used the fertilizer should be placed at least 2 inches to the side and below seed depth. Band placement of fertilizer at least 2 inches to the side and below the seed will give the best use of applied fertilizer without injury to the seed or seedlings.

Ryegrass Silage Proves Good For Milk Production

Ryegrass, planted for winter grazing, often produces a surplus of forage when warmer weather arrives in the spring. Experiment Station tests show that Mississippi cattlemen may well convert forage into silage and have it available for feeding later in the year.

In a two-year milk production study at the North Mississippi Branch Experiment Station at Holly Springs, ryegrass silage proved better than corn silage.

For two successive years, Agronomist B. L. Arnold cut ryegrass in early May when it was in the boot stage. One year the dry matter content was 23 percent and the other 29 percent. No preservation was added. After cutting each year the ryegrass made enough regrowth to reseed itself for the following year.

The corn silage was made from Dixie 55 corn, cut in the early dent stage. It was considered good corn silage.

In 1962, cows on corn silage averaged 26.8 pounds of milk daily compared to 28.2 pounds for those on ryegrass silage. In 1963, corn produced 25.3 pounds and ryegrass 26.3 daily.

"There are times when pastures of ryegrass produce a surplus of grass in the spring," Mr. Arnold said. "If these pastures are fertilized liberally with nitrogen, they will yield from six to ten tons of silage per acre and the protein content of the silage is higher than might be expected from good corn silage."

County Tourney Decides Grammar Team Champs

Tishomingo, Iuka, and Burnsville Advance To March 27 Finals

The county basketball tournament for grammar school teams was played on Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights March 26, 27 and 28, in the Burnsville School gymnasium.

Of the three county championships decided during this tourney, Tishomingo took two of them, winning both the boys "A" team title and the girls championship. Iuka went home with the trophy signifying the championship of the boys "B" team category. Nice trophies were awarded to all three of the championship teams.

The championships of the county in all three classes was decided on March 28 as the survivors of the eliminations met on the floor of Burnsville's gymnasium for the last time this basketball season. The boys "B" teams from Iuka and Tishomingo opened the action and a good night's performance by several players helped Iuka to a 47-30 win over Tishomingo. The Tishomingo and Burnsville girls next took the floor and played another fine and close game. Tishomingo finally won it by another one-point margin, the final score being 32-31. Stephen's 21 points was equalled by Hardwick of Burnsville who also put 21 points on the board. The final was the meeting between the boys "A" teams of Tishomingo and Burnsville. Tishomingo won it, going away scoring 49 points; while Burnsville could only

come up with 30. Webb played a good game for Tishomingo as he scored 28 points. Bonds was high for Burnsville with 19 points.

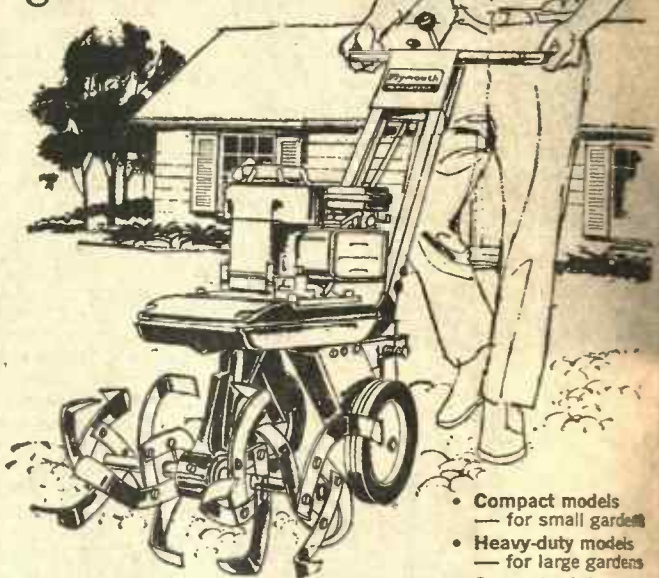

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Stennis Supports Appropriation Funds For Mississippi Projects

Senator John Stennis today supported the appropriation of funds for a number of Mississippi projects at a hearing of the Senate Committee on Appropriations. Senator Stennis presided at the hearing which received testimony from Major General Al. C. Welling, chief of the Atlantic Division of the Army Corps of Engineers, fiscal year 1965 appropriations.

General Welling was questioned in detail by Stennis with reference to the Jackson-Eastern Flood Control project, the Tombigbee River and the Mississippi River Flood Control project. Senator Stennis advised

the Subcommittee that both of these projects, which are designed to eliminate very hazardous, destructive and costly flood conditions, have very high benefit to cost ratios and are projects "of which I have personal knowledge and deep interest." Stennis urged the Committee to provide funds for construction of these projects during the next fiscal year.

Other Mississippi projects and the amount recommended for each by the President's budget message are: Big Black River Basin Comprehensive Survey, \$65,000; Pearl River Basin Comprehensive Survey, \$125,000; Pascagoula River Basin Comprehensive Survey, \$125,000; construction of the Okatibee Reservoir 7 miles northwest of Meridian, \$500,000 and continued deepening of the Pascagoula Harbor, \$620,000.

"Each of these projects," Stennis said, "is vital to the continued economic growth and welfare of Mississippi, and I strongly urge that funds be provided to carry out this essential work during fiscal year 1965."

HOME AGENT NOTES

Many homemakers are interested in cold water washing these days.

For one reason, garments made of treated cotton or synthetic fibers wrinkle less when they are washed in cold water than when they are washed in hot or warm water and put through the spin period in automatic washers.

Another reason is a lack of hot water in some homes. Is yours one of the homes where the hot water has to be rationed between the washing machine, the shower, the dishwashing and other uses?

Although cold water washing does reduce wrinkling and you do go ahead with the laundering without waiting for the water to heat, you should know the whole story: Cold water washing does not clean clothes as well as hot or warm water.

Untreated cottons should be washed in cold water only as an emergency measure, never as a regular thing. Treated cot-

tons, and synthetics may be washed in cold water to prevent wrinkling, but if you are going to iron them — as many homemakers do — then wash them in warm water.

If you use cold water regularly, give the clothes a warm bath at least occasionally. Remember the hotter the water the cleaner the clothes. Most synthetics do not need hot water, however, because they give up soil fairly easily. But they do need home hot water to re-

move body oils from garments and fabrics.

Liquid detergents do a better job in cold water because they do not have to be dissolved. Most granular detergents need warm water to help them dissolve.

Spring Clean-Up

Bright days, new growth on trees and lawns, colorful spring flowers, all make any clutter about home and yards show up like a sore thumb. Makes us all want to get into the Spring-Clean business. Not only will

our spring-clean up activities make things look better, but they will also remove hazards that might cause fires or accidents. . . make our homes and grounds safer.

While your spring-clean up work is underway, be sure you label clearly all medicines, pesticides and household chemicals. Put them out of reach of children. Remove all thin plastic film from bedrooms and play areas of small children. Remove all doors from unused refrigerators, freezers, ice boxes

and cabinets.

Check all guns to be sure they are not loaded. Lock all guns out of reach of children's reach. Lock ammunition in another place. Clean basements, attics and closets of trash and waste paper. Replace frayed wiring.

Fertilizer Now Available At Reduced Costs

Have you heard about the incentive fertilizer program that all farmers in Tishomingo County are eligible to participate in this year?

If you have not heard about it, be sure to visit your County Agent and talk to him about it. It can mean more fertilizer for the dollars you spend.

The Bear Creek and Yellow Creek Watershed Programs, Tennessee Valley Authority, your County Extension Staff and two fertilizer dealers have entered into an Incentive Fertilizer program for this year.

Fertilizer has been made available at a \$15.00 to \$20.00 per ton discount to use for demonstration purposes. Three materials are available and prices to farmers are:

30-10-0 ————— \$60.25 per ton
25-25-0 ————— \$69.60 per ton
33% Ammonium Nitrate ————— \$58.60 per ton

Limits on the amount of these materials which may be used as a single material or in combination are:

For corn ————— 3 tons
For Coastal Bermuda 2 tons
For Permanent Pasture 1 ton
For Temporary Pasture 1 ton

Four requirements will be made of each farmer receiving the fertilizer. They are: (1) Farmer must take soil sample on area of field on which fertilizer will be used before getting the fertilizer. Samples will be turned in to the county agents office. (2) Requisition form will be filled out by one of the County Extension Agents before farmer can pick up the fertilizer from the dealer. (3) Farmer will pay cash for fertilizer when it is picked up from the dealer. (4) Farmer agrees to let people visit his farm to see results of fertilizer.

Fertilizer is now available and everyone who plans to use this material should contact the County Extension office for more information. Soil samples should also be taken right away. The Soil Conservation Service and the District Commissioners urge all farmers to take advantage of this program. They suggest that crops and pastures should be well fertilized and that a good cover should be kept on the land as many months of the year as possible. A good ground cover prevents soil erosion.

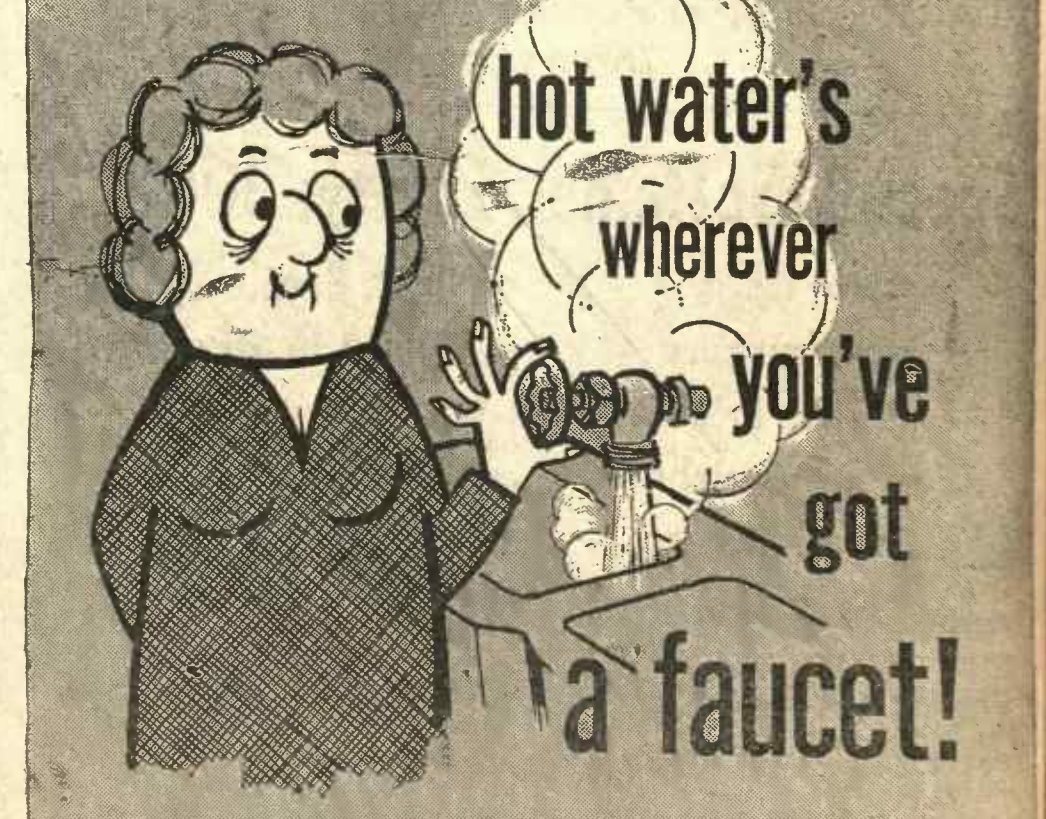

Hazard Hunt Of House, Premises Recommended

Many Accidental Deaths Occur; Suggestions For Safer Place Given

Families that have not had a hazard hunt in the house and the premises within the State Board of Health recommends that one accomplish a clean-up and fix-up list of clean-up, fix-up suggestions:

- Remove all unneeded and unnecessary items. This will reduce fire and tripping hazards and give you a bonus of extra storage space for usable things.
- Reorganize storage space so things can be put away when not in use.
- Airrange furniture for easy passage from room to room.
- Keep stairways and steps clear. Check handrails and lighting.
- Put household aids, cleaning products, other non-edibles in places inaccessible to children. Keep poisons absolutely beyond the reach of children, preferably locked up. Medicines and drugs, too. If potentially harmful household and drug products are accessible to children, reorganize storage or provide safe storage facilities.

Never put non-edibles in food or drink containers. Keep labels and instructions intact.

Store garden and farm chemicals in suitable areas inaccessible to children, pets or farm animals. Keep chemicals in original containers with labels intact. (Labels tell how to use, store and dispose of chemicals, also what to do in case of accident.)

Check electrical wiring in house, barn, other buildings. Repair if needed to safeguard against fire and shocks. If wiring is overloaded, consider improvements in system.

Repair or replace worn electric power cords, and plugs on lamps, appliances, TV, power tools etc. Also check for faulty switches.

Check grounding and operating safety of appliances power tools, electric motors, pumps, etc. Ailing electrical equipment can cause fire and nasty shocks.

Check the heating system, heaters, stoves, chimney. Clean them if necessary and make needed repairs.

Repair broken or rotted flooring in porch, house, sheds or barn.

Fix broken or raised places on concrete or stone walkways. Clean up the yard, barnlot, sheds and barn. Remove rubbish, junk, tools, toys and dry weeds to help protect against fire, falls and other injuries.

Inspect all ladders for broken or weak parts. Repair or replace ladders which are unsafe. Don't paint ladders. Rather, cover them with clear varnish, shellac, or linseed oil so cracks or bad spots can be seen.

Make certain firearms and ammunition are safely stored. Check to see that guns are not loaded, that ammunition is kept separate from guns.

Fill in or cover any large holes, shafts or abandoned wells. Also, remove rocks or stumps that might cause a stumble.

Check fire extinguishers in the house and barn for condition and readiness for action. If fire protection is inadequate, provide it.

"Keep an eye open for other conditions and hazards that could hurt someone and don't delay eliminating them," urged Dr. Gray.

Forestry Notes

Mississippi Forestry

is today a bad day for forest fires, only moderately bad, or just an average day for this season of the year? If you were to ask this question of any Area Forester or Dispatcher employed by the Mississippi Commission they would tell you, based on information obtained from one of the many fire danger rating stations operated by the Forestry Commission.

Fire danger ratings are reliable because of the careful research and experience applied in developing the system and the accurate information used in the daily computations. Measurements of fuel moisture and wind speed are made 4 times a day—9 a.m., 11 a.m. 2 p.m., 5 p.m. at each danger station. The amount of rain is measured just once each day. These measurements, combined with season of the year and condition of the lesser vegetation, form the basis for the day's fire danger. By using a fire danger meter which automatically gives the key factors their proper weight, the operator of a danger station can determine the type of fire danger quickly, accurately, and without personal bias. The ratings are expressed in numerical classes having definite meaning and calling for definite action.

Before this system was developed, Mississippi Forestry Commission personnel responsible for controlling fires tried to estimate the day's burning conditions by rough rules of thumb. Wind speed was estimated from the movement of trees or smoke drift. The extent to which a pine needle would bend without breaking

or the ease with which hardwood leaves would crush in the hand are examples of various attempts to find some basis for an opinion of burning conditions. These rules were useful to an experienced man in an area familiar to him.

Today, fire control men have a scientific approach to measuring fire danger. The amount of moisture and wind velocity are measured with instruments. Other important factors are included that were not considered by the old-timer. With the present system the report from all stations are comparable for any section of the state.

Fire danger ratings are a useful tool in the job of prevention and control and represent a tremendous advance over the informal and unskilled methods of guessing at fire danger, common a decade or two ago. The danger rating determines whether the fire suppression crews are standing by for immediate dispatch to suppress fire or whether they are assigned to other duties by the area forester.
