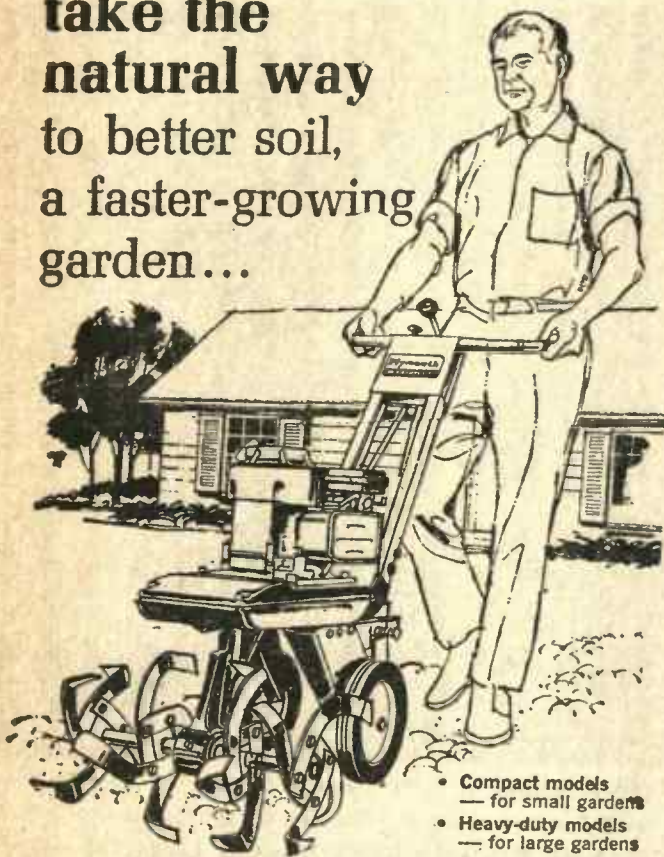
Mrs. Hayden Young of Chicago. Mr. Seago, age 49, died suddenly Saturday, April 4, enroute to Tishomingo County Hospital.

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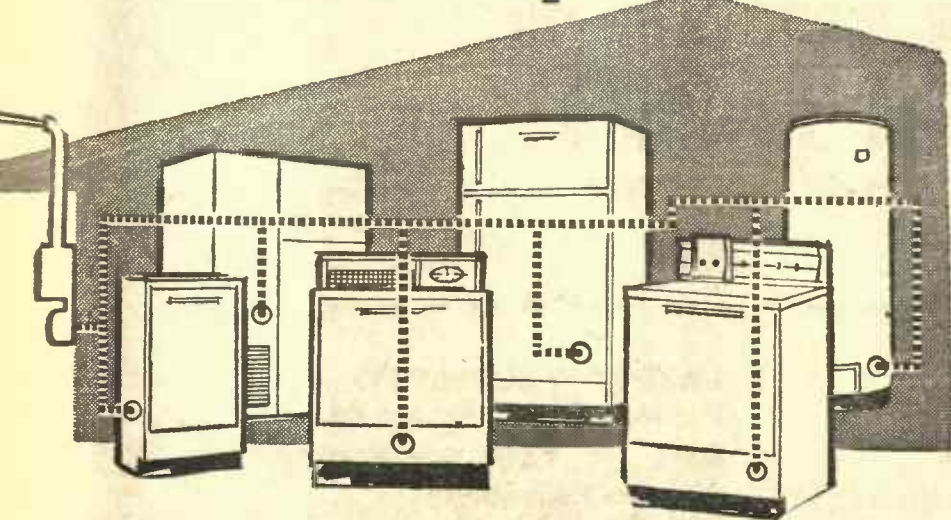

An estimated 10 per cent of children in public schools have emotional problems, requiring psychiatric help, Mrs. Pruitt said. In Mississippi alone, it is estimated that 200,000 people are effected in some way because of mental disturbance and the sooner treatment is given a person, the better are

his chances for recovery. In concluding her program, Mrs. Pruitt pointed out that the Mississippi Association for Mental Health is making much progress in how to deal with mental patients.

Watch Your Row Arrangement

Tractor farming presents a problem on some rolling cropland. The tractor driver wants long straight rows so he can cover as much ground in a day as possible. This is a recognized fact. It is also a fact that this

practice is causing severe soil erosion on many fields in Tishomingo County.

The ideal situation would be to take rolling cropland out of cultivation and put it in a sod crop, but this is not always practical. In many instances, all the cropland some farmers have is sloping upland, and they have to cultivate it.

By paying more attention to arranging the rows, soil erosion can be decreased. Every effort should be made to arrange crop rows so as to give surface drainage without excessive erosion. A few base lines surveyed in a field could set up a guide for row arrangement.

If you need assistance in arranging rows in one or more

of your fields, come by local soil conservation office. We may be able to help you.

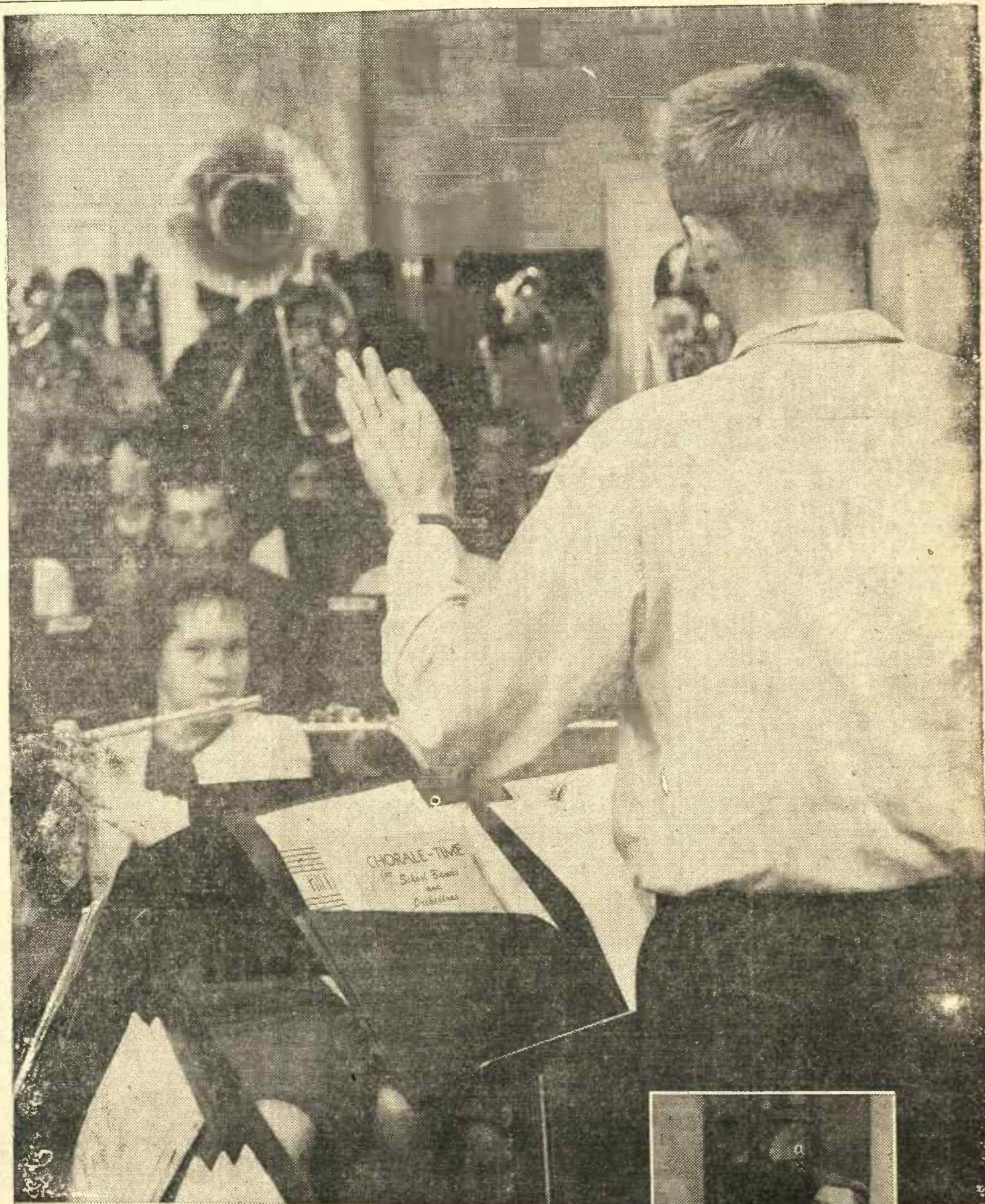

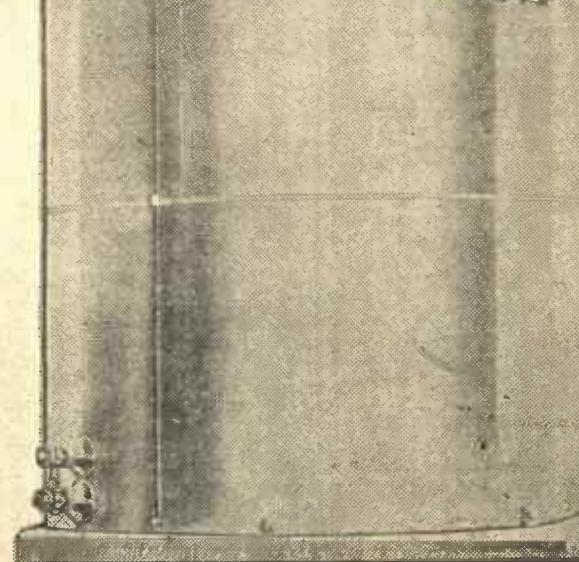
