Legislation Provides New Cotton Provisions; County Farmers Have Choice Of 3 Allotment Programs

Tishomingo County Cotton farmers will be able to choose from three Acreage Allotment Programs under the New Cotton Act of 1954, enacted on April 11, 1964, E. C. Allen, Office Manager of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

According to Mr. Allen, the allotment will be between: Growing cotton under the program — keeping with the "effective" allotment established for the farm last fall plus any remaining acreage; and, thus, for a price support at a basic level of 30 cents a bushel, Middle 1-inch cotton average location; or, Reducing cotton acreage keeping within a smaller "effective" allotment, thus, for the regular price support loan and an additional

price support payment of 3.5 cents a pound on the normal yield of the cotton acreage determined for the farm. For farms with an effective allotment of more than 15 acres, the extra price support payment will also depend on the producer's not exceeding the farm's Feed Grain Base. The farm's domestic allotment in most cases is 67 percent of the farm's "effective" allotment except that for small farms the domestic allotment is the smaller of the effective allotment or 15 acres; or, 3. Planting cotton within the farm's 1964 Effective Cotton Allotment plus up to 5 percent as "export market acreage," provided an application is filed by June 1, 1964, and bond furnished within 15 days after such filing. In this case, all the cotton except the part credited to the export acreage would

be eligible for the basic price support of 30 cents. The additional price support payments, however, would not be eligible to growers planting an export market acreage.

"The New Cotton Program supplements, rather than supersedes, the cotton program which has been in operation in prior years," Mr. Allen said. Marketing Quotas will be in effect for the 1964 Cotton crop. All excess cotton will be subject to Marketing Quota Penalties, as in past years.

Mr. Allen pointed out that one major difference for 1964 is that the grower may, if he wishes, plant a one-third (1/3) smaller acreage of cotton and meet other conditions of the program and in return be eligible for 3.5 cents price support payment in addition to the regular price support loan of 30 cent rate. The acreage not planted to cotton because the grower planted within the smaller "Domestic Allotment" may be planted to other crops (with the Feed Grain limitations mentioned under Point "2" above), thus providing an additional source of income.

"The other major difference is that a grower may produce some cotton to sell at the World Price as stated in Point "3" above," the office manager continued.

Domestic Allotments are being established for all cotton farms in Tishomingo County and farmers will receive these notices by May 1, 1964. On these notices will be three (3) important items, namely: (1) Domestic Allotment; (2) Normal Yield; (3) Payment Rate.

"As already stated, all farmers having an Effective Allotment of 15.0 acres or down will automatically be classified as a Domestic Allotment and will be eligible for the additional Price Support Payment of 3.5 cents per pound based on a Farm Index and Normal Yield. For farms with "Effective Allotments" of 15.0 acres and up, the "Domestic Allotment" is, in most cases, 67 percent of the Effective Allotment and if the larger farms plant within their Domestic Allotment will be eligible for the additional Price Support of 3.5 cents per pound," Mr. Allen said.

Farmers desiring further information about the program are urged to contact the A.S.C. S. Office in Iuka.

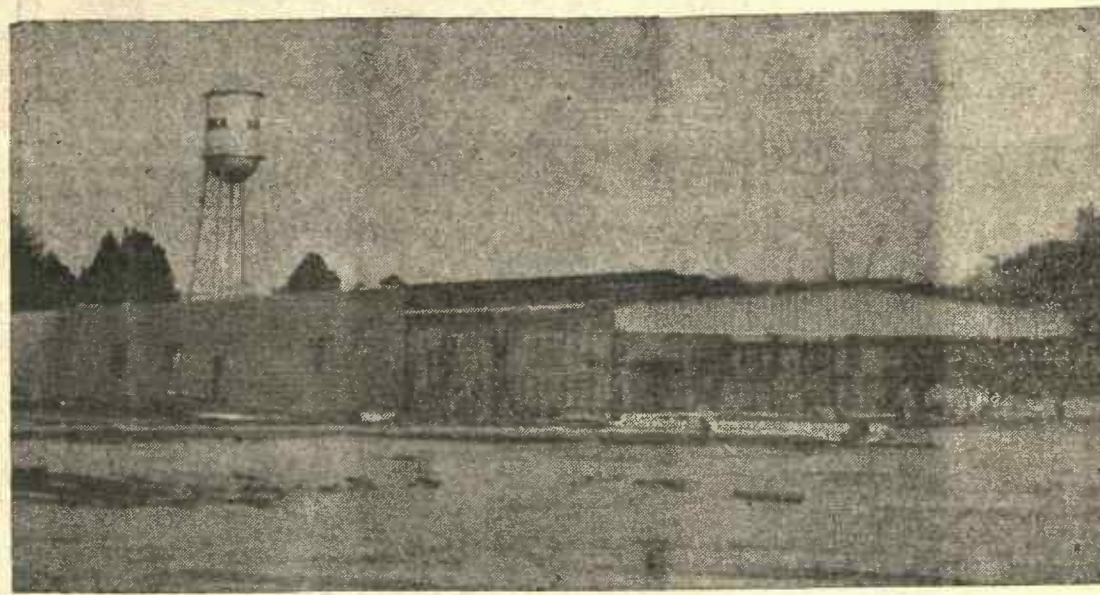
The Seniors invite the public to come to the play and see for themselves, the outcome of this hilarious comedy.

Dimes Drive For Funds Is Success

Final Report Shows County Contributions Total \$1,716.93

County Supt. of Education Julian R. Long, who served as county chairman for the 1964 March of Dimes campaign for funds, reports that total contributions this year amounted to \$1,716.93. Contributions in 1963 totalled only \$1,663.46. Mr. Long said, in pointing out the success of this year's drive.

A breakdown of contributions by areas follows: First District \$763.39; Second District, \$85.42; Third District: Midway, \$34.03; and Holcut \$16.71; Fourth District, \$195.72; Fifth District, \$559.17; and Carter High School, \$62.49. Mr. Long noted that children of the Third District contributed to Second and Fourth District Schools.

According to the county chairman, the greatest gain in contributions was in the Fifth District where an increase of \$148.65 was recorded over last year's total. "Mrs. Leo Williams, Chairman in the district, is to be commended for a fine job, as well as her many helpers and also Danny Lambert, County Teen-Age Chairman did a splendid job," Mr. Long said.

Tishomingo Sewerage System

Construction To Begin Immediately; Contract Let For 17,000 Feet

Hon. John R. Trimm, mayor of Tishomingo, reports that construction on the town's new sewerage system is scheduled to start on any day now.

Contracts for construction of the 17,000 feet of disposal line were let recently. Low and best bidder for laying of the line was the Hayes Co., Inc., of Tupelo with a bid of \$90,497.20. Completion of the project is expected within a few months.

Disposal plant will be the lagoon-type. Low bidder for this project was Russell Bonds with a bid of \$16,124.60. Mayor Trimm states that practically every house inside the incorporated limits of Tishomingo will have access to the sewerage system. Total cost of the project will be about \$135,000.00. Property owners will be required to run lines only to the edge of their property, the Town will complete the tie-on at the town's expense.

Tishomingo's first sewerage system comes as a result of a bond election held late last year at which only slight opposition was apparent at the polls. Federal government assistance is being used in the project.

Officials of Tishomingo in addition to Mayor Trimm, are C. A. Crow, Alderman and clerk; and aldermen A. W. Dean, A. F. Ward, Carlos Ingram and L. E. Crawley.

Installation Of Machinery Begins At Consolidated

Aluminum Co. Hires First Men; Rail Spur Construction To Start

Don Fiske, plant superintendent of the Iuka Division of Consolidated Aluminum Corporation, states that machinery and equipment to be used in the Iuka aluminum processing plant will start arriving today (Thursday) and is expected to continue to come in through May 25.

Other phases of activity pertinent to setting up the new plant are moving along as rapidly as possible, Mr. Fiske said.

Hiring of personnel has been started, the first men to be employed being E. C. Marlar and J. B. Barnes who will be maintenance men for the plant. A schedule of hiring other employees will continue as the machinery arrives.

Personnel office for the company is in temporary quarters on Eastport street.

Construction on the main building will be completed by early next week, with all basic electrical construction to be finished by the end of this month.

Construction of the railroad spur to the plant will begin as soon as definite information on the grade incline is determined. The portion of the project is scheduled to be completed the first week in May.

Mr. Fiske reports that the first equipment expected to be ready for use is the "Household Foil" machine which should be in operation by May 4.

Landscaping of the plant site is scheduled to be done at an early date, the plant superintendent said.

Day, Evening Programs At NEMJC Will Be Coordinated This Summer

The Northeast Mississippi Junior College summer school schedule has been revised in order that the day and evening programs will be coordinated. The new schedule will allow the evening college summer session to begin and end on the same date as the summer day sessions. This plan, initiated to allow more free time between school sessions, will allow the day and evening programs to be closed on Friday, July 3, for a holiday.

Registration for the first term day classes will begin at 8:00 a.m. Monday, June 8, in the Administration Building. Classes are scheduled to begin on Tuesday, June 9, and end Wednesday, July 15.

Registration for the second term of day classes will begin Wednesday, July 15, with classes to begin Thursday, July 16, at 8:00 a.m. with final examinations on Friday, August 21.

The summer day school is scheduled to offer 2 class periods daily, the first beginning at 8:00 a.m. and ending at 9:35 a.m. The second period will begin at 9:45 a.m. and end at 11:20 a.m., with classes meeting 5 days a week for each six-week term. A student will normally enroll for six semester hours each term of the day session.

Registration for evening classes for the summer session will be held at 6:30 p.m. Thursday, May 28. Classes will begin Monday, June 8, with June 15-19 being the last day to register. Final examinations will be held on August 17-21. Classes are to be offered on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday nights for the summer term.

Each class will meet one night each week for three hours. To complete course work by August 21, each class will be scheduled for additional meetings during the session.

Evening college students may enroll for a maximum of twelve semester hours, subject to approval of the Dean. The following programs are offered subject to demand: business, education, English, mathematics, music, psychology, science and social science.

Coastal Bermuda
If you prepare a good seedbed, you can expect good survival from Coastal Bermuda set in April and May.
Spray following setting to control weeds. After the coastal runners start growing, nitrate. If crabgrass comes in, turn in the cows and graze it off.

Weeds and crabgrass are the biggest enemies young coastal has. Sometimes they prevent coastal from covering the ground. But once you get the ground covered with coastal, you won't be bothered with weeds or other grasses.

Fertilizer Placement
Just where you place the fertilizer in your row crop program can have a major bearing on how your crop produces.

For row crops, do not broadcast fertilizer unless you are willing to step up the rate of fertilization.

Unless the soil already has a medium or above phosphate and potash level, or you will increase the rate of phosphate by 50 percent; use band application.

When placing the fertilizer band, be sure to put it below and to the side of the seed drill. This will help prevent seedling damage from contact with the fertilizer.

Lawn Fertilization
The first step in any lawn fertilization programs should be a soils test. Then base your application of lime, phosphate

and potash on the soil test.

In most cases nitrogen, phosphate and potash are removed from the soil by growing grasses in a 3-1-2 ratio. Nitrogen requirements vary with the different grasses. Split your nitrate applications into three or four doses through the summer. All the phosphate can be applied in one application in the spring and the potash should be divided into two applications — spring and fall.

Controlling Outdoor Fires
Outdoor fires — the uncontrolled and dangerous kind — are closely connected with both the weather and people.

And while you can't do much about the weather, you can do plenty about your own habits to prevent field and other outdoor fires.

The danger of outdoor fires varies with changes in relative humidity, fuel moisture content, wind conditions, how recently rain fell and other factors. It's largely a matter of common sense to judge when these factors combine to produce dangerous conditions, and when conditions are favorable for safe burning.

Here are some "common sense" good practices:

1. Before doing any outdoor burning, check local conditions and notify area forester.
2. Pick a wind-free, dampish day for trash or brush burning.
3. Pick a spot well away from buildings and clear a good-sized strip of earth around the pile of trash or brush to be burned.

4. Have some fire fighting equipment and adequate help available.

5. Burn small amounts only and soak embers in water thoroughly when the burning is finished.

6. Keep brush and grass mowed close around all farm buildings. Better still, keep a broad strip around the building freshly plowed.

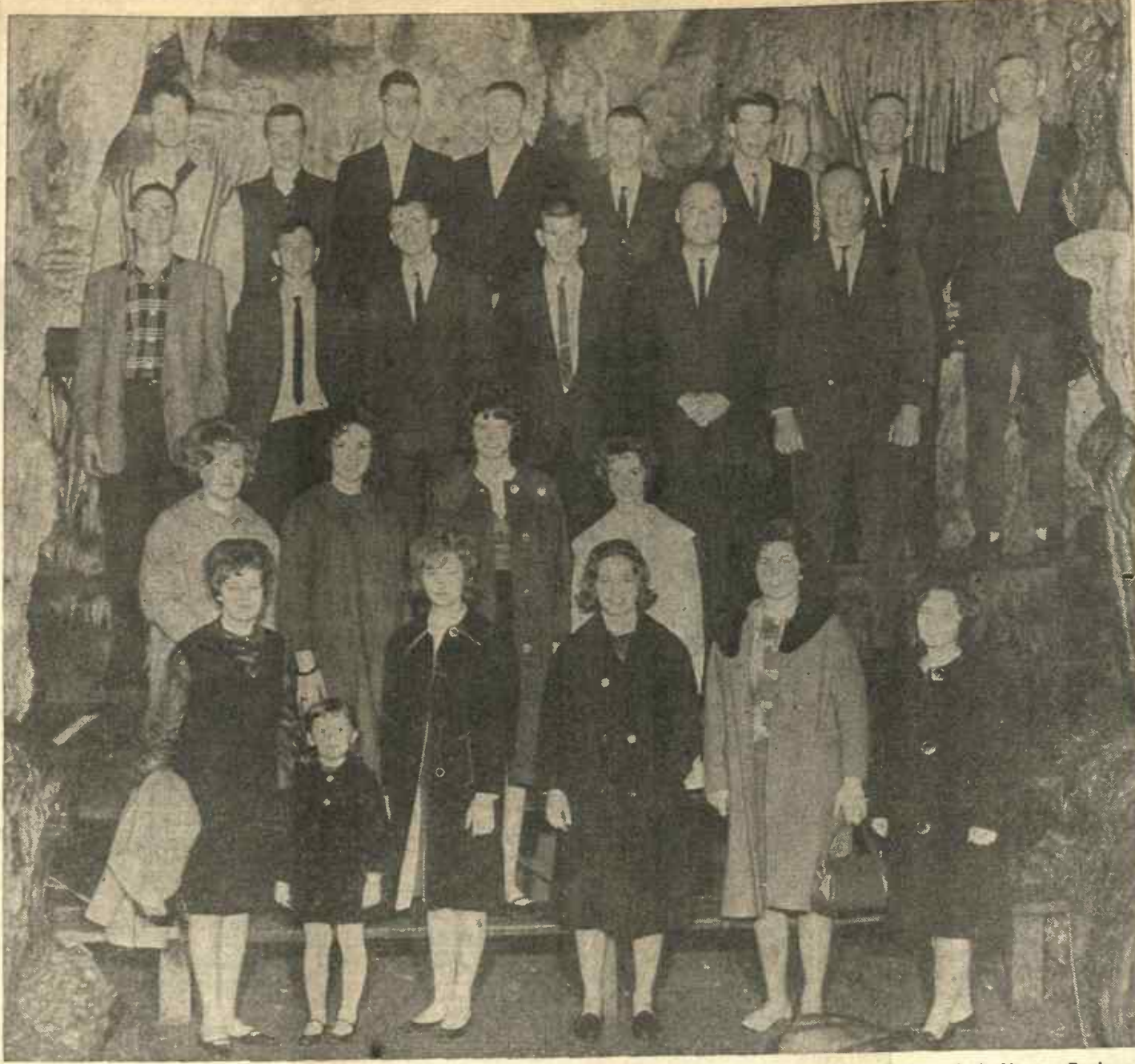

Managing Your Fescue Pasture

For best results from fescue pastures, take off the livestock about May 15th and do not graze it again before October. The reason for this is that fescue is, more or less, dormant from late July till early September and heavy grazing during this period will kill out the stand.

Fescue is a winter grazing crop and should be grazed from October until May. It is a good idea to apply 200 pounds of 14-14-14 fertilizer or its equivalent per acre on fescue during the last week of May. Do not cut for hay. Just let it grow during the summer. Then in early September, apply another application of complete fertilizer and some additional nitrogen to the fescue. Keep down the weeds with herbicides and apply lime every four years.

To summarize, do not graze fescue from May to October. Fertilize every year and apply lime every 4th year. Do not overgraze. A good sod of fescue protects the land and conserves moisture while furnishing winter pasture for livestock.

HOME AGENT NOTES By Mrs. Dianne F. Crubaugh Tishomingo County Home Demonstration Agent

You want your shoes to look nice, but above all to fit comfortably. Whether they fit properly for looks and comfort depends on whether you've checked all four dimensions for fit. You want to check length, width, depth and shape.

If your old shoes show wear at the toes or the inside sole has worn "pockets" for your toes, you need a longer shoe than you've been wearing. You will probably be surprised to know that there is only 1/8-inch difference between numbered sizes. For example a size 8 shoe is only 1/8 inch longer than a

size 7 1/2 shoe. But one size can make a great deal of difference in looks and comfort, so check your length carefully. If the upper part of the shoe above the sole of your old shoes extends over the sole, you're ready for the next width. The letters for shoes range from AAAA to EEEEE or M for medium, N for narrow and S for slim.

The widest part of the shoe should be over the first joint of the big toe. The heel should fit snugly. If you take a B width with a AA heel, for example, such combination widths are available.

The depth and shape of the shoe are determined by the last — the wooden form on which the shoe was made. If you see bumps that outline your toes on the uppers of your old shoes, you need a deeper last.

To check width, wiggle your toes. Do they all move freely? They should.

If your old shoes are puckered or wrinkled behind the ball of the foot along the arch, or if they're greatly out of shape, the shape of the last is wrong, and your shoes aren't long enough from ball to heel. The proportion of the shoe from ball to heel and ball to toes differs from last to last.

To check the shape, try on shoes standing up. Your foot should rest on the bottom of the shoe, with your weight equally distributed between ball and heel.

Always check the looks of shoes in a mirror. Walk in them and note first how they feel, but carefully note too: the fit at the heel (they should not slip, fit at sides (they should lie smoothly), fit at instep (there should be no bulge), and toes (they should not turn up).

Butter Measurements
In using butter in your cooking, remember: one pound or four sticks equal 2 cups. One-quarter pound or one stick equals 1/2 cup. To cut butter cleanly, cover knife blade with waxed paper or dip knife in hot water, dry and cut.

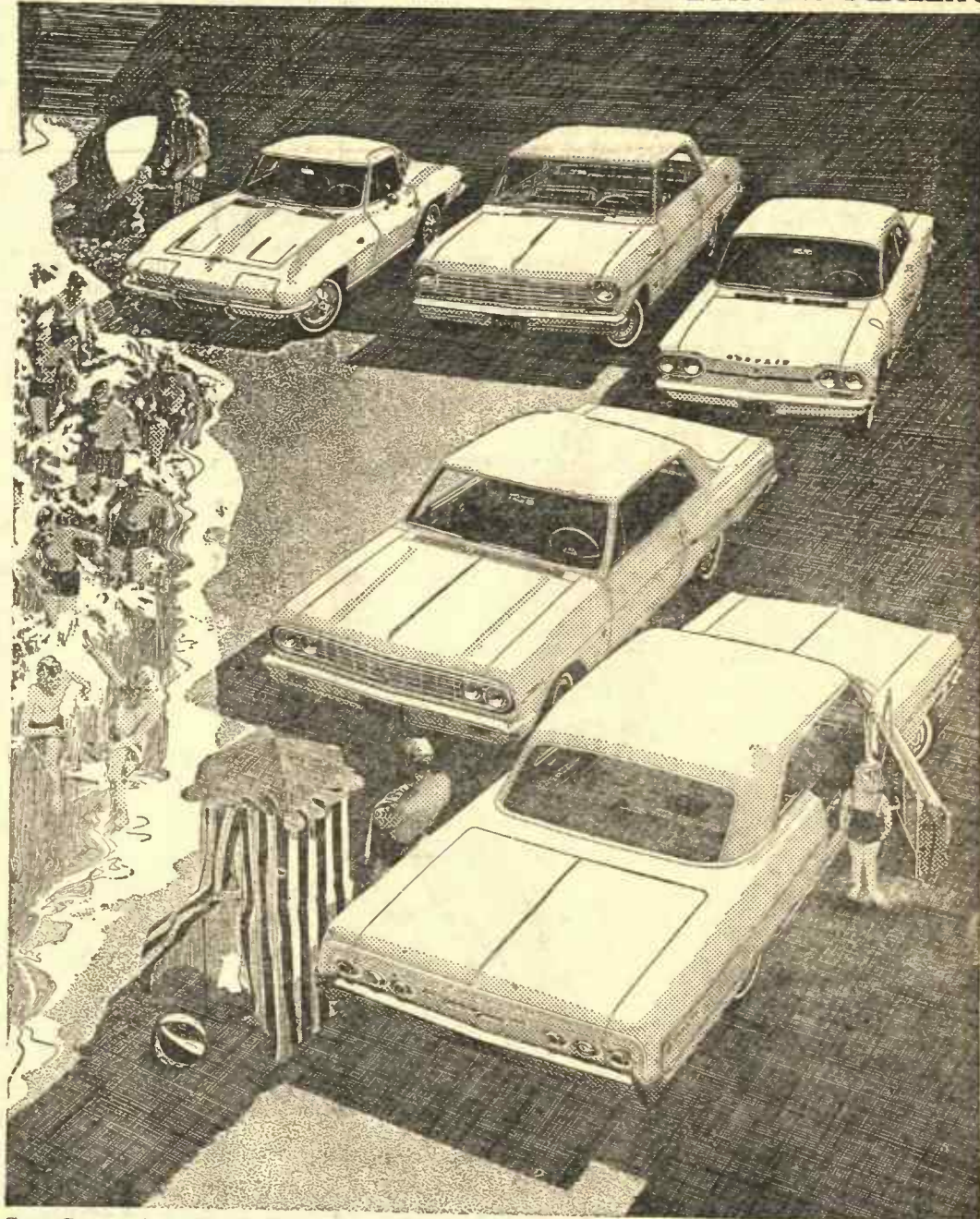

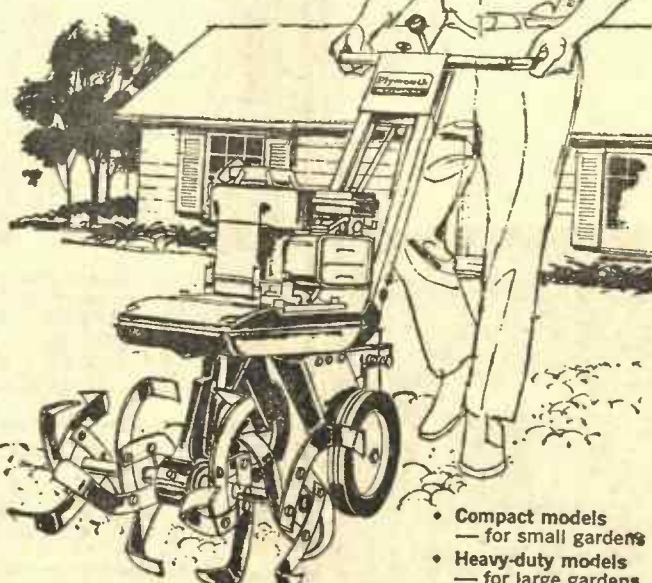
