Burnsville Students To Go On Trip

**Perfect Attendance,
High Average Are
Qualifying Points**

Glenn Williams, principal of the Burnsville school, announces that 5 bus loads of students from the school will make an excursion trip to Lakeland fun center near Memphis next Saturday, May 9.

Those making the trip will be students in the Burnsville school who have a perfect attendance for the entire year and students having an average on a per subject basis of 95 and above. At the present time, the total number of students to make the trip is 231.

Teachers of the school will make the trip as chaperones. Cost per student for admission to Lakeland will be \$2.00 each. After the students are admitted, they will be entitled to ride on all playground equipment as many times as they would like. Each student will be required to provide his own lunch, preferably one carried from home. The students will be kept together as a group and will return home late in the afternoon.

Buses will leave the Burnsville school Saturday morning, May 9, at 7 o'clock. According to Mr. Williams, this is the third year that this program has been in effect at Burnsville, and the number of students has grown from year to year. Free transportation is furnished by the County School Board.

THREE SISTERS ARE TRAFFIC VICTIMS IN WRECK AT TISHOMINGO

**Small Car Hit Head-On By
Big Cattle Truck; Were
Residents Of Aberdeen, Miss.**

Three young Aberdeen, Miss., sisters were killed instantly Sunday afternoon when the 1964 Chevrolet Corvair in which they were riding was rammed head-on by a 1960 model big Mack cattle truck. The tragedy occurred about 2 miles north of Tishomingo on Highway 25.

Killed in the collision were Lucille Smith Shaw Junior Powell, age 20, and her two sisters, Margaret Lemay Shaw,

16, and Janice Elizabeth Shaw, age 12. They were children of Lt. Col. and Mrs. John B. Shaw. Lt. Col. Shaw is stationed at Columbus Air Force Base.

Only survivor in the Corvair was John Montgomery Powell, a 23-month-old son of Mrs. Powell. The infant was asleep in the back seat.

Driver of the cattle truck was 23-year-old Billy Joe Brown of Franklin, Kentucky. Owner of the cattle truck is J. W. Moore of Lawrenceburg, Tenn. According to Tishomingo County Sheriff James H. Bishop, Brown has been charged with manslaughter. He spent Sunday night in jail, and was released Monday, pending action of the grand jury.

Investigating the accident were Mississippi Highway Patrolmen Audie Marlar and Clyde Shook. The young women were reportedly traveling south and were rammed head-on by the truck when the driver attempted to pass several cars that were stopped in his lane of traffic for one of them to make a left-hand turn. When the truck attempted to pass the stopped cars, it ran head-on into the Corvair driven by Mrs. Powell.

Col. and Mrs. Shaw were following their girls in a late model Oldsmobile, and were not involved in the wreck. The Shaws had been spending the week end at Mill Creek on Pickwick Lake and were on their way home when the tragedy occurred.

The bodies of the three dead girls were shipped to Pampa, Texas, for burial.

County Agent's Notes

Cotton Program
Some new choices are available to cotton farmers this year! You have an effective allotment, a domestic allotment and an export acreage allotment to consider.

The effective allotment, to be supported at 30c a pound for middling one-inch, is essentially the same as your regular allotment.

The domestic allotment is roughly 67 percent of the effective allotment. By just planting this amount, you can get a 3 1/2c a pound payment.

Except farms with 15 acres of cotton or less will be considered as domestic allotment and will qualify to receive the 3 1/2c a pound payment.

The export allotment is 5 percent of the effective allotment and can be planted in addition to the other allotments. However, growers who plant for export must ascertain that the cotton will not enter domestic trade channels, and they will receive the world price (around 23 cents a pound) for this cotton. To help assure that the export allotment cotton does not enter domestic trade channels, growers must post bond to that effect.

Here are some factors to consider when planning your cotton production program. The effective allotment will have a price 30 cents a pound on total production.

Domestic allotment for farmers with more than 22.5 acres represents a one-third reduction below the effective allotment. An additional 3 1/2c a pound based on normal yield will be paid on this acreage.

Acreage taken out of cotton production to meet the domestic acreage requirements may be planted to certain other crops, including soybeans. Feed grain crops are excluded.

Effective allotment plus export acreage equal to 5 percent of the effective allotment may be planted. Cotton produced on export allotment acres will be sold at world prices.

Dairy Notes
Want to make your cows give more milk? Most authorities agree that better feeding would

help! If you feed your cow to give 4,000 pounds of milk a year, that's all she'll give. Better start now planting an adequate supply of stored feed for the year ahead.

Think about silage. A check of the high producing herds in the state shows that all these dairymen are feeding silage. It is almost a MUST if you plant to get year-round high production.

Benji is a candidate for the Bachelor of Arts degree in political science. Scotty will

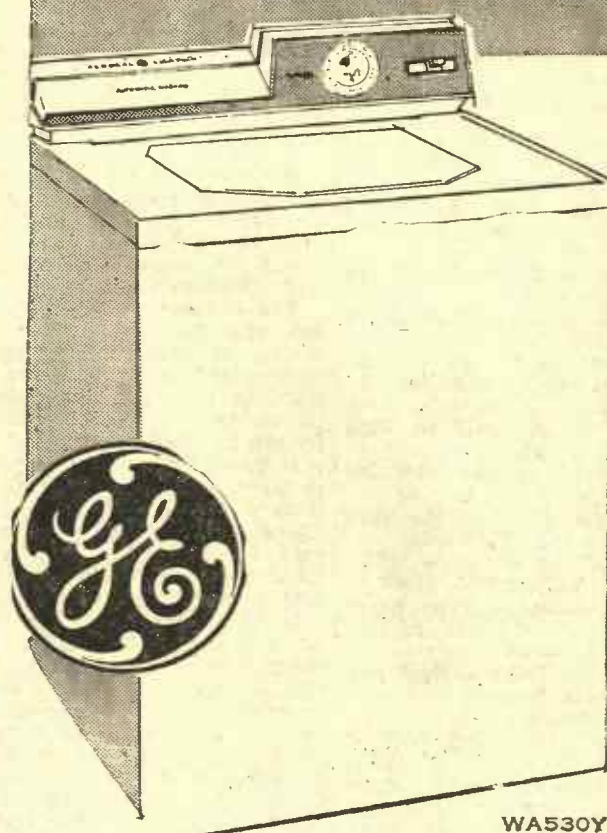
receive a Bachelor of Business Administration degree with a major in production.

Sensing The News

Awakening in Wisconsin

The drive to regiment the American people through the means of the so-called Civil Rights Act of 1964 received a tremendous jolt when Gov. George Wallace of Alabama won more than a quarter of million votes in Wisconsin's

preferential presidential primary.

Political writers in the North are openly acknowledging that the grassroots disapproval of the "Civil Rights" bill is much greater than anticipated. The votes that went to Gov. Wallace represent a great awakening on the part of citizens outside the South. For years, the Southern States have been presented in national news media as a benighted region. Politicians automatically assumed that a Southerner couldn't win support north of the Mason-Dixon line. But Wisconsin proves that times have changed.

Despite the outpouring of abuse directed at Gov. Wallace and at Southern opposition to federal force bills, more than 30 per cent of the Democratic voters of Wisconsin, including those in heavily urbanized areas, went to the polls to throw their support to a Southerner who stands for opposition to totalitarian democracy.

From now on out, no politician or "liberal" agitator will be able to dismiss Southern leadership.

It is tremendously heartening to know that so many people in Wisconsin, a state with a long tradition of "progressive" politics, have not been fooled by the pressure groups' campaign in behalf of the Civil Wrongs bill. They have seen the significance of its contents, and realize that the legislation represents a blow at American liberty.

Wisconsin is not the only area in the North where people are waking up to the danger from coerced association as decreed by federal bureaucrats and agitation front leaders.

The thousands of New Yorkers who marched earlier this spring in behalf of neighborhood schools are part of the nationwide movement of emancipation from "liberal" political dogma. In Chicago, aroused citizen groups are employing legal talent to defend their rights from a combination of ultra-liberal sociologists and pressure group leaders who want to turn the city's school system into a sociological experiment.

In Cleveland, Ohio, the public is beginning to learn of the anarchists in their midst, the vigilantes who in the name of "civil rights" are determined to take the law into their own hands and plunge the community into chaos. The people of Cleveland are learning about the Black Muslims, the formation of rifle groups with Mau Mau names, and of the role of Castro supporters in the local agitation.

In the space of a year, the country has had revolutionary groups grow up in its midst. Agitators openly discuss turning a city like Cleveland into another Cyprus. Dangerous men talk of Molotov cocktails and hand grenades being thrown.

Finally, the press, public authorities, the police and the courts are beginning to comprehend what has been going on. In Cleveland, a judge warned that in the future he will throw the book at demonstrators who create violence. A large daily spoke plainly of "anarchists" in the city's streets.

Responsible citizens in communities north and south, east and west, cannot allow this country to be taken over by a handful of lawbreakers and leftwing extremists who, to prove a point, would give American cities a bloodbath. No

doubt this summer these extremists hope to plunge the nation into internal chaos. They are planning for this objective. Thus communities across the country should be forewarned and ready for prompt and effective community action. Congress should let the agitators know that it will not be intimidated into passing legislation that would not only give irresponsible citizens but would give irresponsible lawless elements the privilege to disrupt the nation. Preservation of the Republic requires an alert citizenry that will not tolerate social terrorists who hide behind the label of "civil rights."

Dish Towel Tips
Save your dish towels for drying dishes. Don't use them for dirty jobs like cleaning the stove or wiping spills from the floor. It is a good idea to keep in the kitchen two sets of towels that you can distinguish easily by different colors or patterns. Use one set for drying hands, and reserve the other only for drying dishes. Keep them handy to the kitchen sink.

It is both economical and convenient to use plenty of clean towels for drying your dishes. A damp towel cannot dry efficiently, and damp towels are no longer as sanitary as they should be for wiping pieces that will hold food.

You may need to bleach kitchen towels, dishcloths and pot holders occasionally to remove stubborn stains.

When To Use A Bleach
As you do your laundry, save the chlorine bleach for the times you really need it, when it is a cure, when you are taking no risks and have no "ifs, and or buts" about the advisability of using it.

Use chlorine bleaches for: Heavy stains that can't be completely removed with mild bleach.

Occasional bleaching of sheets and pillow cases to assure complete removal of body oils.

Whitening white terry towels and dish towels.

Young children's grubby clothes when dirt is imbedded and possible color loss doesn't matter.

Work clothes with hard to remove soil and stains where soil removal is more important than color retention.

Disinfecting baby clothes and diapers and laundry items from a "sick room."

Remember, never use chlorine bleach on silk, wool or acetates. Be sure before chlorine bleaching that that wash and wear or fabrics with special finishes are labeled "chlorine bleachable." Use caution with colors. Follow directions. Don't overuse either in amount or time and rinse well.
