**During 1964 Baseball Season;

The Iuka Chieftain baseballers closed their 1964 season on Monday of this week with a record of 11 victories and 5 defeats.

In overall season tally, pitcher James Huffman scored one victory; pitcher Jerry Holley lost one game and won none; pitcher Jim Robinson won eight games and lost only one; pitcher Jim Phillips lost one game and won none; and pitcher Donnie Brown won one game and lost two.

Batting averages for the entire season were recorded as follows: Tommy Dean .465; Jerry Berryman .406; Earl Walker .384; Donnie Brown .371; Jerry Holley .325; Larry Parker .320; Jim Robinson .317; Tommy Stricklen .308; James Huffman .250; Charlie Counce .200; Jimmy Phillips .200; and Sonny Gravette .185.

Leading the Chieftains in home runs was Charlie Counce. Leading in hits were Donnie Brown, Earl Walker, and Tommy Dean, with 20 each.

Iuka-Tupelo Game
The Chieftains topped the Tupelo baseballers last Wednesday afternoon, April 29, at Tupelo and posted a 1-0 victory. Winning pitcher in the game was Donnie Brown, who struck out five and gave up three hits. Losing pitcher was Martin, who gave up one hit.

Iuka's one run was scored on an error and was thus unearned. Their one hit was a single by Donnie Brown. Tupelo's three hits were all singles, one by Westmoreland, one by Bryant and one by Shumert.

Iuka-Saltville Game
In a game played last Thursday, April 30, on the home diamond, the Chieftains bowed to a powerful Saltville team. The score was Saltville 4 and Iuka 3.

Winning pitcher was Cresap and Phillips was the losing pitcher. In relief for Iuka was Parker. Saltville had two hits, a triple in the third inning which counted for three runs, and another in the fifth inning by Hankins. Iuka scored one run in the second inning and two in the seventh. For Iuka, Donnie Brown went 2 for 4, Earl Walker 2 for 3, and Berryman 2 for 3.

Iuka-Fulton Games
In another home game on Friday, May 1, the Chieftains posted a 6-1 victory over Fulton's team. Iuka scored four runs in the first inning on five hits and got 2 runs in the fourth on 2 hits. Fulton got a long run and one hit in the seventh inning.

The winning pitcher, Jim Robinson, pitched a one-hitter and struck out 8. Losing pitcher was Gregory, who gave up nine hits. Robinson of Iuka pitched the entire game.

In Iuka's attack, Donnie Brown, Jerry Holley and Tommy Dean each went 2 for 3. On Monday, May 4, the Chieftains traveled to Fulton but this time their luck changed. Final score in the game was 7-3 in Fulton's favor.

Fulton scored one run in the third inning and six in the fourth. For Iuka, three runs were scored in the fifth inning. Winning pitcher in the game was Gregory and losing pitcher was Donnie Brown. Brown, Robinson and Parker each pitched 2 innings for Iuka during the game.

Statistics in the game were 7 runs, 7 hits, no errors, with 10 left on base for Fulton while Iuka had 3 runs on 9 hits, 6 errors, and had 6 left on base.

Tish. County Residents Receiving 1 Million Dollars Annually From S.S.

About one out of every nine residents of Tishomingo County is now receiving a monthly social security check, according to Hugh Tigrett, Social Security District Manager.

Mr. Tigrett's report listed the number of Tishomingo County beneficiaries as 1,857 at the end of 1963. The 1,857 beneficiaries in this county are receiving \$87,039.00 monthly. This means that the residents of Tishomingo County are receiving 1 million dollars annually from Social Security.

In releasing the figures, Mr. Tigrett pointed out that the social security benefits are important to the community as well as to the people who receive them: "It is a fact," he said, "that almost every dollar of social security benefits coming into the County is spent each month in local businesses for food, clothing, shelter, and other essentials. In this way, the benefits have a stabilizing effect on the local economy."

Mr. Tigrett forecast that the number of social security beneficiaries will continue to increase in the future, but at a much slower rate than in the past 10 years.

He said that, nationally, the social security benefit rolls increased from about 5 million people in 1954 to more than 19 million at the end of 1963. This rapid growth in the beneficiary population resulted from major amendments to the Social Security Act from 1950 through 1961. He cited several amendments which extended social security coverage to self-employed business and professional men, farmers and agricultural workers, and other groups. As a result, several million people whose work was brought under social security are now receiving benefits. Others qualified through amendments which reduced the amount of work needed to get benefits. One change — lowering the age at which older people can get benefits from 65 to 62 — accounts for 1.8 million out of the 19 million people now entitled to benefits. The amendments also introduced a new protection under social security — disability benefits — and 1.5 million disabled workers and their dependents now receive benefits under the disability provisions of the law.

The duties of Tishomingo County Health Nurse were assumed last Friday, May 1, by Mrs. Rita Johnson of Iuka. The position had been vacant since the retiring of Mrs. Helen Pruitt on January 31 of this year when she and her family moved to Springfield, Tenn.

Mrs. Johnson is a graduate of Iuka High School. She received her Associate of Science degree in Nursing from North-east Miss. Junior College in Booneville in September of 1961. A few weeks after graduation, she met the State Board requirements and became a registered nurse.

In October of 1961, Mrs. Johnson began employment with North Community Hospital in Tupelo, leaving there a year later. From that time until April of this year, she had been with the Tishomingo County Hospital.

**Iuka School Science Students Win
2 Prizes in Chemistry Contest**

The science department of Iuka High School has won unprecedented honor this year taking both first and second prizes in the annual High School Chemistry Awards Contest, sponsored by the Wilson Dam Section of the American Chemical Society.

In this contest, 19 schools entered 406 completed examinations. The highest score, of a possible 124, was 104 made by Martha Dee of Iuka, a high school junior recently enrolled in chemistry at Iuka High School. The second highest score was earned by Melvin Lee Maxwell, also a junior.

Comparisons indicate the excellence of W. H. Osborn's current chemistry class. 15 of 16 students entered the contest. Of the highest score was the lowest 35, and the average 59. Of the total examinations entered (406) the best score was 104 (earned by Iuka) the lowest 8, and the average 43. Iuka, therefore, not only captured first and second place, but exceeded the average score on the examination by 16 points. Moreover, of Mr. Osborn's group of students in the top ten percent taking the examination, in fact, in the six occasions in which he has entered the contest he has not yet failed to have a student to gain recognition for excellent scoring.

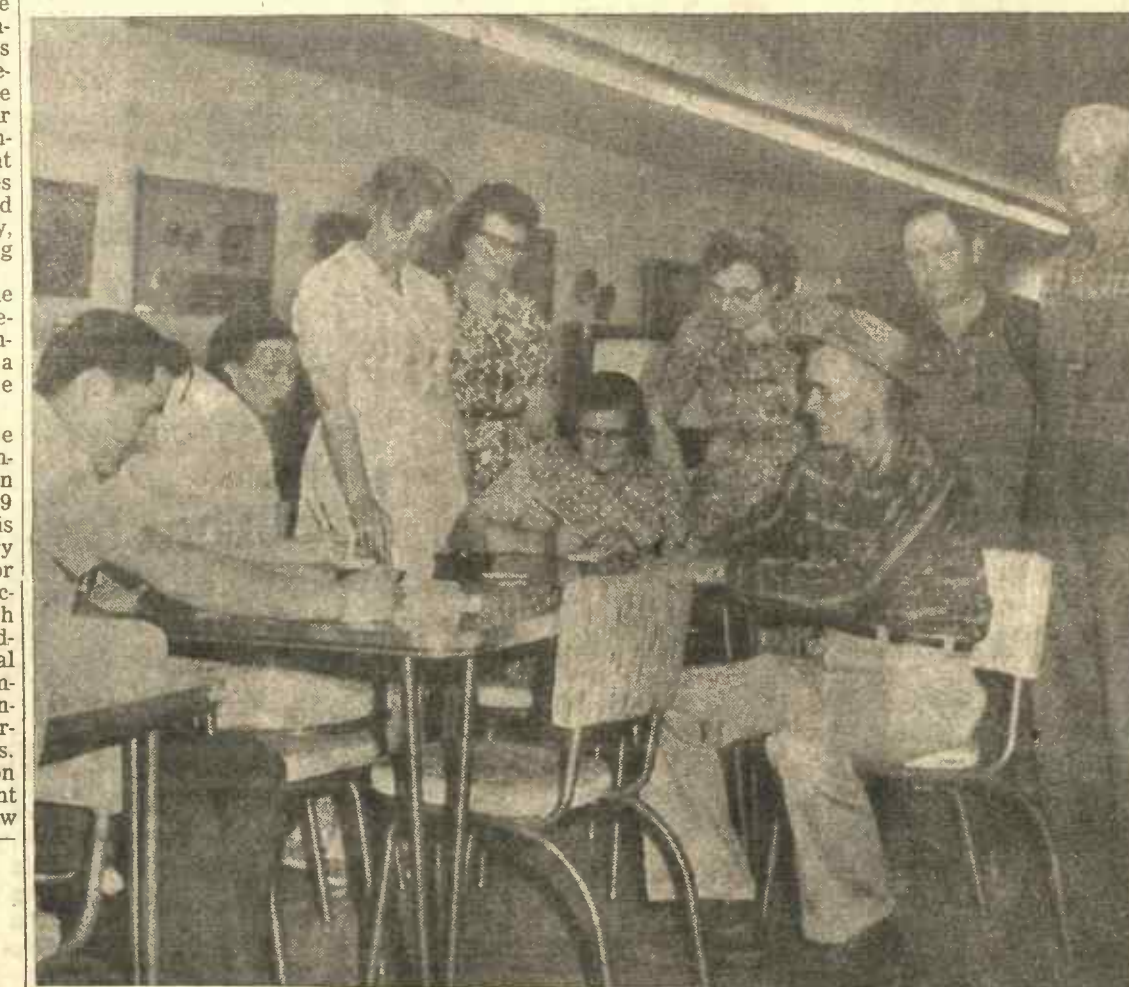

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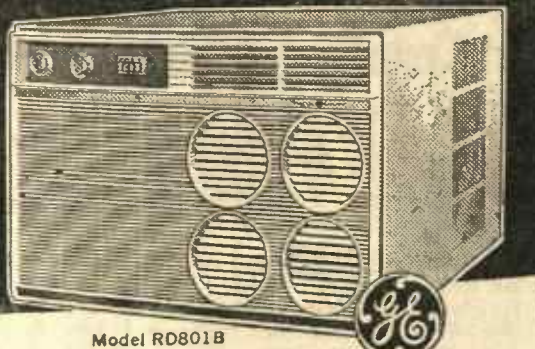
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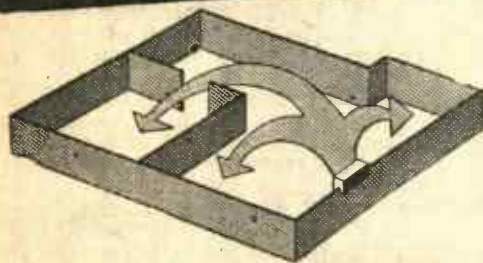
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Forestry Notes

Timberland owners many times vary from one extreme to the other in deciding the present or potential value of their stand of timber.

On one hand we have the person who thinks that timberland was put here for a very simple reason, to hold the rest of the world together. And this person also believes that he can best help with this predestined purpose by burning it off every year. Needless to say, this individual considers timberland practically worthless.

We have the other type of person who dreams of riches overnight from his timber and is quickly discouraged if every single tree doesn't bring in returns comparable to an oil well or a gold mine.

A person needs to realize that growing timber is some-growing timber, as any other agricultural crop. Certain cultural practices need to be carried out in order to establish or provide for the continued regeneration of the stand. Trees of undesirable quality need to be removed to cut down on competition for growing space and plant food.

These practices in addition to paying taxes and other expenses bring on definite costs, growing timber, as any other business enterprise, has opera-

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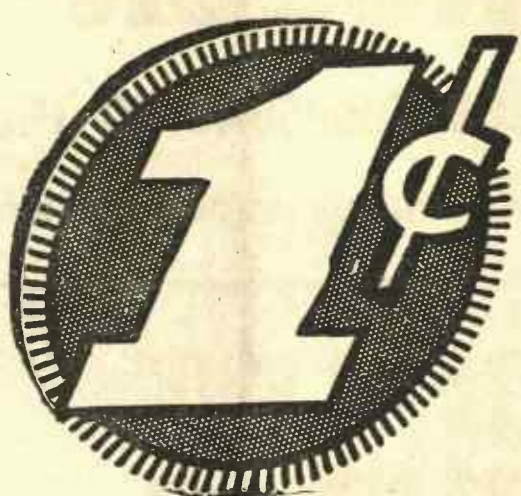

The sound developments in the other states cited by Mr. Johnson could be discussed if space permitted. Considered overall, these states are self-reliant states. What they need and want is more private industry, not presidential largesse from the public purse.

Indeed the Southern states mentioned by the President are states with excellent prospects for the future. With open space, abundant water supplies, reasonable electric power rates, a willing population that is not excessively unionized, these states stand to obtain a big new measure of prosperity in the years ahead.

It's true that some of the mountain areas have difficult problems. But mountain areas always have problems because of transportation troubles and other causes. These problems can be overcome by movement of people to centers of industrial employment and by promotion of the valuable tourist industry in scenic regions. Prudent state legislation, combined with private initiative—such as the development of the winter sports business in the Southern mountains—will do the trick for the Appalachian areas. The effort to make Appalachia out as a horrendous national problem is a cheap trick that fits in with the overall political design of the Johnson "war on poverty."

The public around the country, and in the states concerned, will have the right to wonder whether the proposed one billion dollar handout is simply an effort to buy the votes of the ten states. If it is, the proposal surely will backfire, inasmuch as Americans aren't for sale—not for billions or any sum. Believers in free enterprise in the ten states should let Mr. Johnson know that they stand ready to solve their own problems without taking money from Big Daddy in Washington who unquestionably seeks political loyalty in return.

Study Shows Inoculation Of Soybeans Needed

Soybeans must be inoculated to produce profitable yields but this does not mean that inoculation is necessary at every planting. Dr. E. E. Hartwig, USDA research agronomist and soybean authority at the Delta Branch Experiment Station, Stoneville, Mississippi, says:

"A reason frequently given to justify inoculating each time soybeans are planted is to insure the presence of highly effective strains of bacteria. Studies were conducted at Stoneville during the past 5 years using more than 100 different sources of nodulating bacteria. Many of the strains used had been selected as being very effective on Lee in greenhouse studies and also as being highly competitive with other strains of soybean nodulating bacteria."

"On the basis of seed yields produced by the soybean varieties used, there was no evidence to suggest that soybean yields could be increased by inoculating planting seed when a natural population of soybean nodulating bacteria

were already in the soil. These bacteria will survive for many years."

"Application of additional nitrogen in late summer gave no yield increase, indicating that nitrogen from nodules was adequate for the plants needs. Evidence was also obtained showing that an adapted population of nodule bacteria had produced at least 160 pounds of nitrogen for the plants use."

"The results presented show no need for inoculating soybeans that are grown in a regular rotation. However, it is important that soybean seed be inoculated with a soybean strain of bacteria if the field has no recent history of nodulated soybeans."

Summer Grass Hybrids Yield Well In Tests

Forage crops are definitely being improved. Fifteen of the newer sorghum-sudangrass hybrids were tested by the Experiment Station at seven locations in Mississippi last summer. They were compared with Greenleaf sudangrass and Gahi millet, two well known temporary summer pasture crops in this area.

When forage yields were averaged from all locations, all 15 of the hybrids ranked higher than the two crops grown to check them against. Grazer A had the highest state average yield of 6.5 tons of dry matter per acre. It was followed closely by RP Su 1, Haygrazer and Lindsey 77F. Lowest on the state average list were Greenleaf and Gahi with 4.66 and 4.27, respectively.

Dr. W. R. Meredith, Jr., Mississippi Station agronomist, conducted the tests with the assistance of staff members at six branch Experiment Stations in the state. Summarizing his findings, Dr. Meredith said:

"No detailed recommendations as to which varieties should be used will be made on the basis of this one year test, except to say that there are many new hybrids which produce yields as high or higher than the commonly used sudangrass and millet varieties."

"From these and previous experiments, the following general recommendations on management may be given. These hybrids can be seeded as early as late April and as late as June. When early land preparation is possible, the early seedings are preferred as they will result in greater yields. Greater forage yields can be obtained from 5 to 20 inch row spacings than the conventional spacing of 40 inches. Ten pounds of seed per acre are currently recommended for 40-inch rows and 25 pounds for broadcast seeding."

"Grazing should be started when the forage is 20 to 30 inches high. Harvests for hay should be made before seed heads emerge."

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Misunderstanding Causes Disabled Workers To Lose Out On S.S. Benefits

"Some disabled workers are losing out on social security benefits that are due them because they have not acted to protect their rights under the law," according to Hugh Tigrett, social security district manager in Tupelo. "Others have failed to act because of a misunderstanding of the program," he added.

Mr. Tigrett listed some of the mistaken beliefs that people have about the program. Some he said, think that the worker must have reached age 50 in order to draw disability benefits, or that benefits are reduced if a worker applies at a younger age. He corrected this impression by stating that a disabled worker who qualifies can get benefits at any age and is paid at the full rate without reduction.

Some people think that a person has to be completely helpless in order to qualify. Again this is incorrect, according to Mr. Tigrett. "Our program," he explained, "is based on whether or not a person can do any substantial work. The loss of ability to perform in a job situation of some kind is what we consider."

Another important point brought out by Mr. Tigrett is that the social security disability program takes into account a person's total ability to work, rather than just abilities to hold certain types of jobs. Many industrial disability programs pay benefits if a man cannot do his usual job; but social security takes into consideration his ability to do any type of work, considering his education, training, and experience, in deciding whether or not he is disabled.

Many disabled workers do not realize that benefits can also be paid to his wife and minor children, if he qualifies. Social security is a program for family protection, Mr. Tigrett said.

Another disability provision covers benefits for any person who was disabled before age 18, and has never been able to work. Such a person can receive benefits on a parent's earnings if the parent is disabled, retired, or deceased.

"There are many other factors that could affect a person's rights to disability benefits," Tigrett said, "and the law takes into consideration the needs of

County Farmers Had Approximately 100 Percent Of Ginnings Classed

Here's news of interest to Tishomingo County cotton farmers: Tishomingo County farmers submitted to the USDA's Memphis Classing Office for classification, samples representing 100 percent of all the cotton produced in the county during the 1963-64 season. This amounted to 8,750 bales, according to the Agricultural Marketing Service. All cotton farmers in the county are members of an organization called the Tishomingo County Cotton Improvement Ass'n. County Agent P. B. Stricklen serves as representative for the group.

The cotton classing service is free to members of this organization. All gins in Tishomingo County made arrangements with the Classing Office for sampling cotton for farmers belonging to the group. Market News information was another service provided farmers under this program. Market news reports were furnished to the newspapers, radio stations and the local county agent.

millions of people, no two being exactly alike. The only way that anyone will be able to know how the law applies to him is to get in touch with us and receive information and assistance tailored to his particular case."

Market news and price information helped cotton farmers keep up with the changing trends of the market. Farmers in Tishomingo County used their class cards along with market information and price quotations to get the top dollar for their cotton.

Over 1,620,000 dollars is the approximate value of cotton and cottonseed obtained from 8,750 bale crop produced in the county during the 1963-64 season.

Middling White grade accounted for 40 percent of the cotton classed this past season and 1-1/16 inches were the predominant staple length.

Construction will begin soon at Pascagoula on a new type oil exploration mobile barge capable of drilling from an on-bottom position in the Gulf of Mexico or from a semi-submerged floating position in once-prohibitive ocean depths. Announcement of the start of construction was made by Fred J. Mayo, president of the Ingalls Shipbuilding Division of Litton Industries. Ingalls will build the giant drilling barge for Southwestern Drilling, Inc., Dallas. The new unit will cost over \$7 million and should be completed within 11 months.

Many People Accommodated By Visitor Center

The Visitor Center in Shiloh National Military Park has accommodated 22% more people during the first three months of this year than in 1963 according to information just released by Park Superintendent I. J. Ellsworth.

Visitors from 46 states and 15 foreign countries have indicated, both verbally and in comments in the visitor register book, how pleased they are, generally, with the park exhibits and the orientation movie. These have been enthusiastically accepted as an introduction to the story of Shiloh and the tour of the park.

The new entrance road terminating at the Visitor Center parking area helps insure guidance, so that visitors have a ready source of information and orientation available soon after entering the park.

The park staff is busily engaged in making preparations to serve the many thousands of park visitors expected this spring and summer. A new supply of free leaflets has been received and the new picnic area will soon be ready to accommodate those who visit the park. Interest in the military action and the events commemorated has been sustained and is increasing. On April 7 the guns of Shiloh will have been silent for 102 years. Today they stand as reminders of our historic heritage.



County Agent's Notes

Replanting Cotton
I hope none of our farmers have to replant, but if you think it's necessary to replant, I have seven suggestions to follow:

1. Do not hip up fresh soil over old treated band with middle-busters or hiping-rigs.

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ers. Cotton will be injured when roots penetrate the old chemical band;

2. Where the soil is not compact, run planter centering old treated band and do not retreat. Seed covers will not place enough treated soil around seed to give injury. As soon as cotton is up and 3 inches tall use post-Herbicidal Oil or Dicryl plus DMA or DMA plus Surfactant to get rid of grass and weeds in drill;

3. Where soil is crusty and compact, run rotary-hoe-plant in center of old treated band and do not retreat. Follow with post chemicals after cotton is 3 inches tall;

4. Where Johnson grass, grass and weeds are on the bed and drill, use 12 to 14 inch flat sweep in center of bed to push old chemical band onto shoulders of seed bed. Replant and retreat. The old chemical will be of value in middles;

5. Where field conditions warrant, rework entire seed bed, thoroughly mixing old chemical band with soil; re-bed, replant and retreat;

6. IMPORTANT NOTE: Do not plow up a stand of cotton. Give it a chance. Sixty-five thousand to seventy thousand stalks per acre is a perfect stand; and

7. Ask your County Agent for copy of Bulletin 681 dated February 1964; "Recommendations for 1964 Weed Control In Cotton."

Corn Comments
Don't forget to side dress corn with more nitrogen. Use 60 to 90 pounds of nitrogen to the acre when corn is knee-high (enough to bring total ni-

trogen to 120 pounds per acre). High rates of nitrogen are necessary to produce 80 to 100 bushels per acre.

If you have problems with small broadleaf weeds in your corn, you can control them with 2,4-D. Until corn is 12 inches tall, it can be spray broadcast with one-third pound of 2, 4-D in 10 to 20 gallons of water. After it gets taller than 12 inches, use drop nozzles to cover weeds without getting material on corn (except at base of plant). Raise the rate of application to one-half pound of 2, 4-D per acre. This will do an excellent job of controlling morning glory, rag-weeds, cocklebur, coffee weeds and most other broadleaf weeds. The cost of the 2, 4-D will be around 50 cents an acre.

Soybeans
This year it is advisable to treat all soybean seed with a-rasan, captan or sporgon. But if it is necessary to inoculate the bean seed, do not treat. Inoculation is necessary only if soybeans have not been grown on the field in the past five years.

Be sure to handle soybean seed carefully before taking them to the field. Rough handling of low moisture seed can damage the seed coat and substantially reduce germination.

Silage Crops
High quality silage is a number one feed for dairy cows. Different silage crops available to Mississippi farmers and the average per acre yields of each at the Mississippi State University Experiment Station include: corn—12 to 14 tons; RS 610—10 to 12 tons; FS 1A—14

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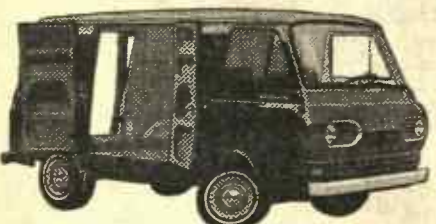
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
