Week End Accidents Area

Several Receive Minor Cuts And Bruises; Others Hospitalized

Number of residents in and around Iuka were hospitalized for broken bones or received minor cuts and bruises at the local hospital for injuries received in automobile accidents occurring Saturday afternoon.

Deputy Sheriff Robert Skinn investigated a mishap on Creek Road where two met head-on at the top of a steep hill. Their front ends hit, resulting in a side-impact accident. Involved was a 1957 Ford, driven by L. Bailey of Tishomingo, and a 1960 Chevrolet, driven by Derard M. Brown of Iuka. Only minor injuries were sustained.

Deputy Sheriff Tommy Clark investigated a head-on collision occurring on the Cagle Road, about 2:30 p.m. This involved a 1954 Ford driven by R. Williams of Iuka, R-1, and a 1958 Ford driven by William C. Roberts of Golden, R-1. Williams was hospitalized with a fractured pelvis and lacerations and bruises. Alfred Parsons, traveling with Mr. Williams, was treated for minor cuts and bruises and minor cuts and bruises.

Roberts, also hospitalized, received a broken leg, ruptured ear drum and possible damages. Mrs. Roberts, who was traveling with her husband, received minor cuts and bruises.

About 6:30 Saturday evening, Herman Audie Marlar was involved in a head-on collision in a hollow East of the Army on Highway 1 East where Ella Mae Seay, 45 year old negro girl, was darted across the highway, backed up, and was hit by a Volkswagen driven by Lee Hasseltine of Corinth. Seay was enroute from North Carolina to his home in Iuka. The child was taken to Tishomingo County Hospital where she was treated for minor cuts and bruises.

James Frederick Injured In Auto Accident

James Harold Frederick, formerly of Iuka, was hospitalized Thursday in Gainesville, Fla., with injuries received in automobile accident.

It is reported that James Frederick, driving a 1961 Renault, was hit in the side by another automobile at a crossing without a stop sign. The impact threw Frederick out of the car and he was pinned underneath.

James Harold is reported in critical condition. Both lungs and his bronchial tube are injured and he has a number of broken ribs. Latest reports, Wednesday afternoon, indicate that he had developed pneumonia.

18th Birthday Celebrations To Cause Youth To Hit Job Market, Colleges

In Tishomingo County, a great wave of youngsters will be turning 18 soon.

Beginning this summer and continuing through June, 1965, there will be a record number of 18th birthdays celebrated locally.

That fact is significant and important. It has a bearing on the labor market, since many of these boys and girls will be finishing high school and be looking for jobs.

It is of concern, also, to college registrars, because the number of 18-year-olds, locally and in most other parts of the country, who will want to go to college will be greater than in any previous year.

The situation is brought to light by the Census Bureau. It states that 3,728,000 boys, girls in the United States will reach 18 in the 12-month period. That is nearly a million more than

The winner of the "Miss Tishomingo County" Contest will receive a nice gift from the club and the winner of the "Miss Hospitality" Contest will receive an all expense paid trip to the Coast to participate in the State contest to be held at Biloxi July 22-25.

In the prior year, in Tishomingo County, it shows, there will be 313 attaining that age, 159 boys and 154 girls.

By way of comparison, this is 12 percent more than in the 1963-64 period, when the total reaching 18 was 279.

The new crop consists of the ones who were born shortly after the end of World War II, when the post-war baby boom took place.

Just prior to that time, births were at the rate of 20.5 per 1,000 population in the United States. Then, suddenly, the rate shot up to 27.5, the highest since right after the first World War.

The full impact of the present deluge of 18-year-olds will not be felt, according to the Census Bureau, until next year, when the last of them will have reached that age.

For many of the 159 boys in Tishomingo County who are reaching 18, the moment is approaching when they must register for the draft.

While there is no likelihood that any of them will be inducted at this point, a large proportion of them will be given examinations beginning July 1st, in line with President Johnson's orders.

The purpose is to determine now whether they meet the physical and mental standards of the armed forces.

Those who cannot pass the physical tests, but who can be helped, will be urged to go for medical treatment.

Provisions will also be made to help those who are unable to pass the educational tests.

Special Home Economist

For Yellow Creek And Bear Creek Watershed Areas

Miss Ruth J. Hamm of Memphis will begin new duties May 16 as special home economist for the Yellow Creek and Bear Creek Watershed Areas with headquarters at Iuka.

This is a new position established by the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service and the Tennessee Valley Authority, said W. M. Bost of State College Extension director.

Miss Hamm will develop means of regularly getting home economics information to families who have not been receiving it. This will be a valuable supplement to the program of home economists in the area, which includes Tishomingo and parts of Prentiss and Alcorn Counties.

As home economist for a major appliance firm with headquarters in Memphis, Miss Hamm has traveled over Northeast Mississippi since 1948. Her earlier experience included serving as home demonstration agent at Senatobia, with Farmer's Home Administration in Neshoba and Sunflower Counties, public school teaching at Lake, and with the Agricultural Marketing Service at Stoneville.

She is a graduate of Mississippi Women's College, and completed summer courses at several Southern colleges and universities. She is a native of Senatobia.
