The Mississippi Legislature during the current session passed a bill that exempts all qualified voters from the requirement of a poll tax receipt in national elections. LEGISLATURE PASSES BILL TO INCREASE SALES TAX

The Mississippi Legislature passed a bill Tuesday to increase the state sales tax by 1/2%, making the total state tax now 3 1/2%. The move will push the levy to 4 1/2% in Iuka and Tishomingo, where an additional one per cent municipal sales tax is already being collected. Tax in Belmont, where a 1/2% tax is collected for the town, will be increased to 4%.

The bill has not yet been signed by Governor Paul Johnson, but it is expected to be.

The Iuka athlete also had scholarship offers from 10 colleges, including Ole Miss, Wake Forest, Davidson, Memphis State, and Delta.

Dean was coached in baseball by his brother, Scottie Dean, rated among the better baseball coaches in Mississippi prep circles. He is a shortstop.

Tommy is 6 foot and weighs 165. He is a right-handed batter. He lettered in basketball and baseball for four straight years at Iuka. His overall batting average was .478 while he averaged 29 points during his cage career. In four seasons, he scored 2,985 points.

For the past two summers, Dean played baseball with the semi-pro team at West Point, Miss., and batted .401. In addition to his high batting averages, his range in the field and throwing arm placed him at the top of many "most wanted" lists.

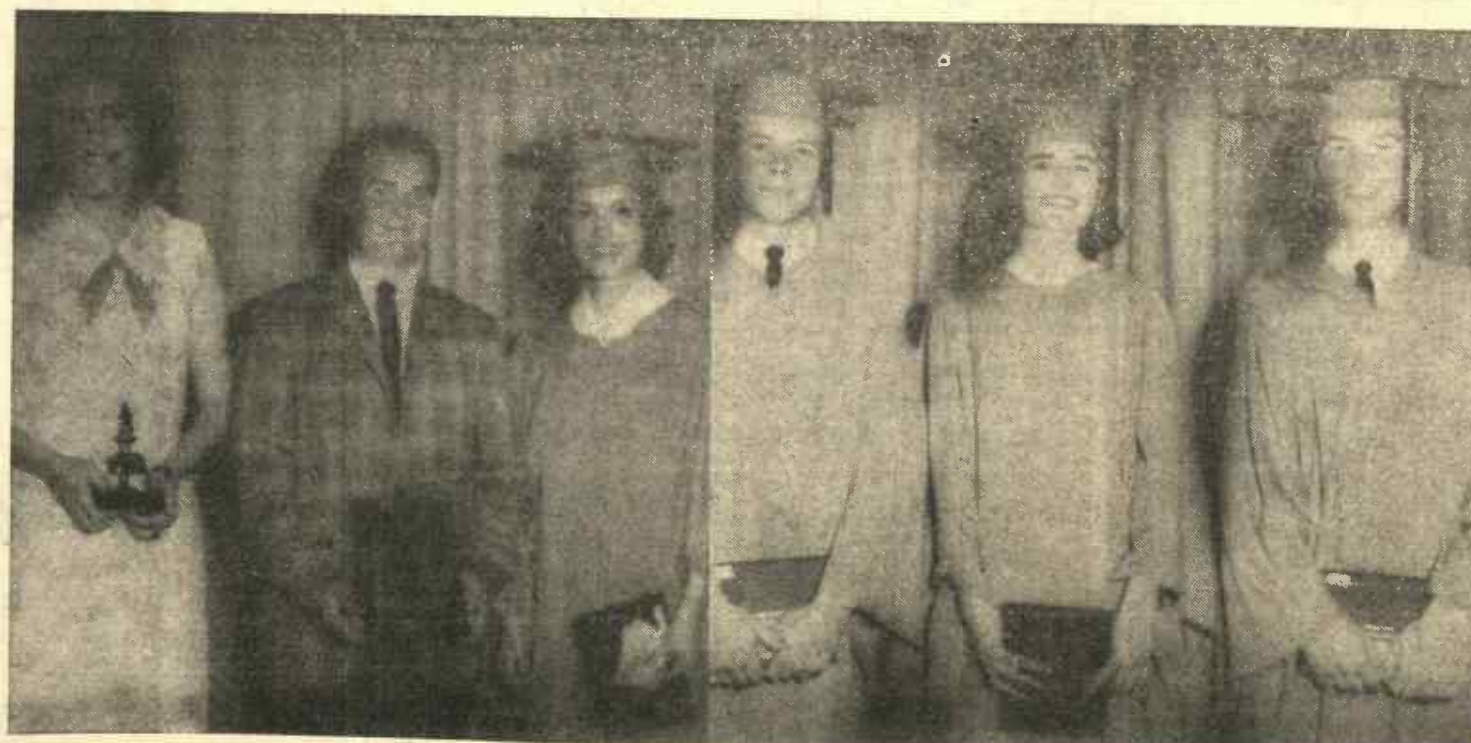
Guidance Course Begins June 15 At Burnsville

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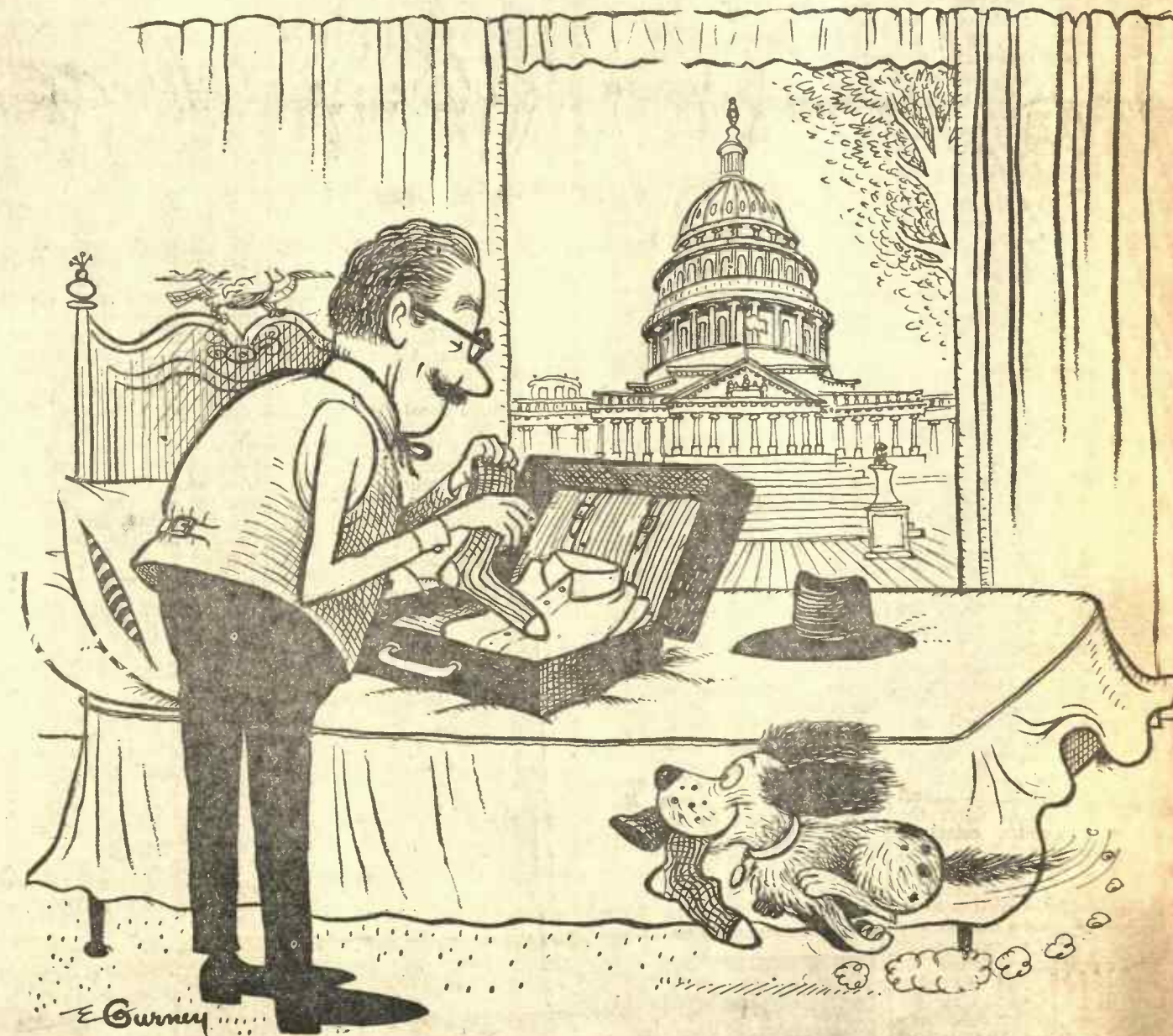

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MEMORANDUM TO PRESIDENT JOHNSON (before Congress goes home)

THE people's business must come first." You said it, Mr. President, and we agree. The people of this country, and you and your Administration, are entitled to have a vote on several important measures during this session of Congress.

One of these measures worthy of attention now because it is truly in the public interest is H.R. 9903, presently blocked by the House Rules Committee's recent refusal to clear the measure for consideration by the full House. This is a crying shame—because if this bill ends up on the legislative scrap heap, American consumers will go on being cheated out of several billion dollars annually from freight rates kept artificially high by regulation which kills off real competition.

Selfish interests which are profiting at the expense of the public are working against this legislation. But, it is basically the same legislation recommended to Congress by President Kennedy and by you, Mr. President, to

substitute competition for unnecessary regulation reductions in freight rates on agricultural and bulk commodities.

This public-interest legislation will save American consumers billions of dollars a year. It will stimulate the Nation's economy. It will improve the competitiveness of American products against foreign products, at home and abroad. For the public good, we urge its passage respectfully request that you repeat once again your appeal for favorable action by the lawmakers in session of Congress.

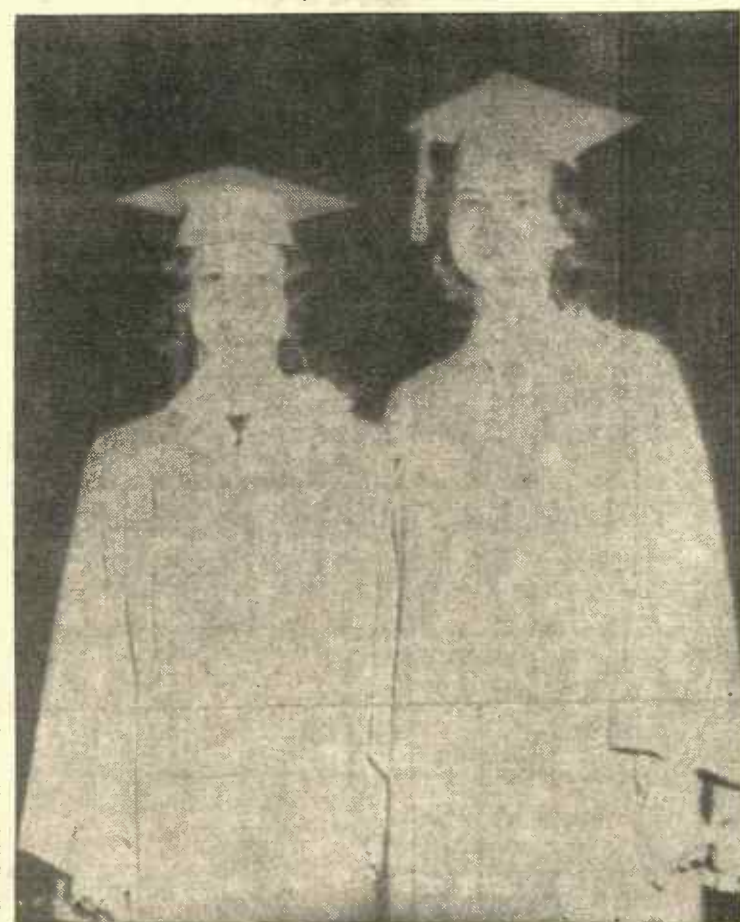
