## Sen. Stennis Scores Easy Victory Tuesday

Senator John C. Stennis scored an easy triumph over his opponent, Negro Housewife Victoria Jackson Gray, in Tuesday's balloting. With 1689 of 1884 precincts reporting, Stennis has a statewide total of 170,283 while Gray follows far behind with only 4,321.

Stennis was seeking the office of United States Senator for the fourth consecutive term. Locally, he polled 1,118 votes to Gray's 9 over the county.

Among other business conducted by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Iuka during regular meeting on Tuesday night was the appointment of a director of recreation for youngsters of the community.

Named to the important post was Truman Holly, a teacher in the Iuka school. Mr. Holly will have charge of the entire program of recreation planned especially for youngsters. He will have the right to ask young men and women to assist him in carrying out the program.

Action of the Board came in response to a committee of adults that met with the Board, asking that some provisions be made to plan activities for the youngsters and keep them busy through the summer months.

In the discussion, the committee pointed out that heretofore, a program had been conducted in the park principally for those boys who were interested in and more proficient in baseball. Other children were left out a lot of the time, it was reported. The program sought this year and for the future is a planned schedule of activities that will give all the youngsters an opportunity to take part.

Guests are greeted by young ladies of the town and treated to refreshments. They are also presented with souvenirs and brochures containing information about Iuka and its recreational facilities.

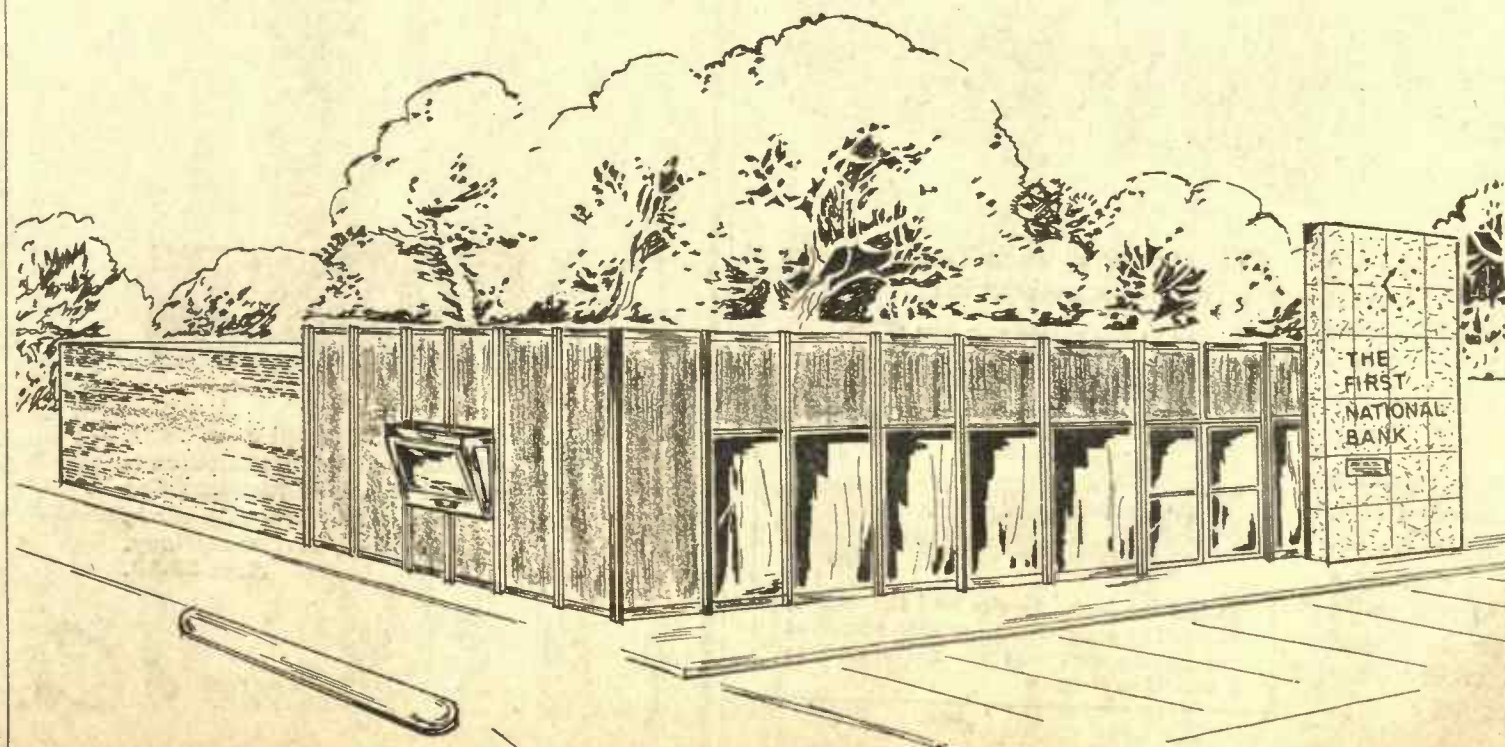

### Teachers Over 65 Should File For SS Payments

Teachers older than sixty-five, who have not filed claims for social security payments, should do so at once. Also those who have previously filed claims for payments and had them stopped at the beginning of the present school year should let the Social Security Office know if they do or do not expect to work during the summer vacation period. This advice comes from Hugh Tigrett, District Manager, Social Security Administration.

According to Mr. Tigrett, the teacher over age sixty-five may get social security payments for any month during summer vacation periods in which she does not earn more than \$100 in wages or perform substantial services in self-employment. However, he said no payment can be made until a claim is filed.

Tigrett also said a teacher over sixty-two and under sixty-five may get social security payments on a reduced basis under the same work rules as those over sixty-five.

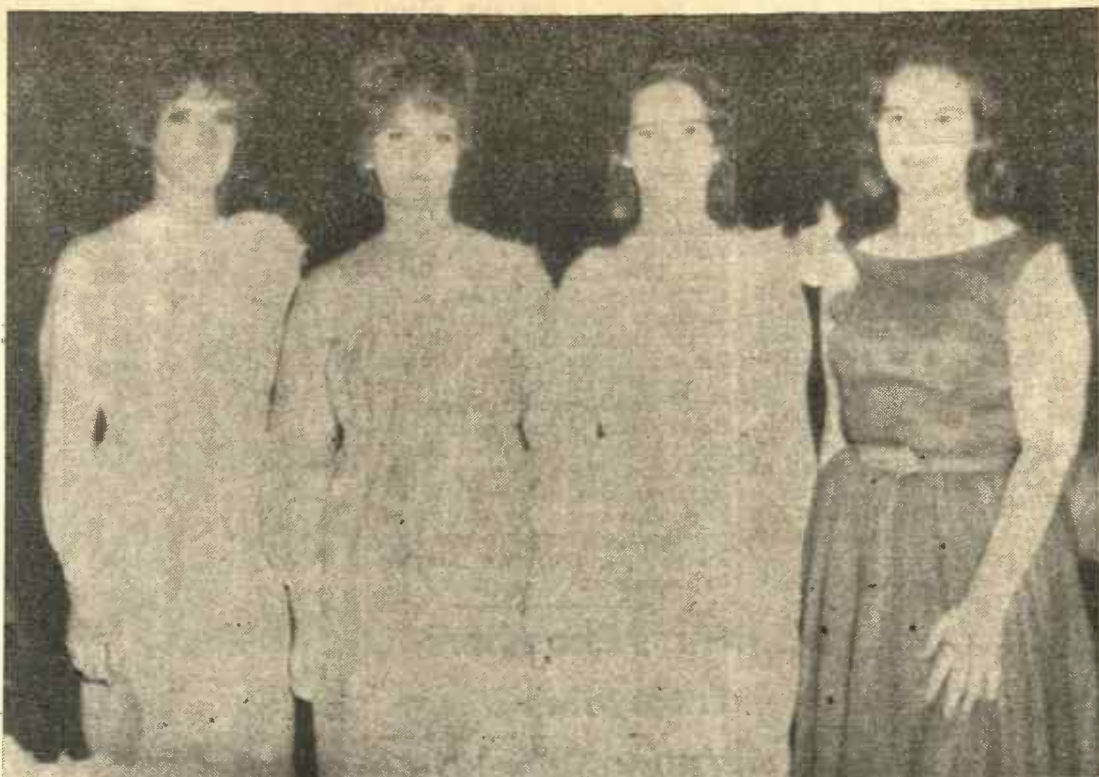

**County Agent's Notes**  
by P. B. Stricklen  
MSU Extension Service

**Fertilizer Use**  
June is a good month to fertilize for high production. Here are some places that you can profitably use fertilizer:

Grass pastures that had clovers growing in the early spring, or those that were nitrated in early spring can use some additional nitrogen now. For more grazing or a cutting of hay and grazing, 40 to 60 pounds of nitrogen per acre will get good growth.

Coastal Bermuda cut for hay can use 60 pounds of nitrogen to the acre for another year cutting.

Coastal Bermuda set this spring and which has runners growing can use 40 pounds of nitrogen per acre.

Temporary grazing crops that have been grazed down need another 40 pounds of nitrogen per acre for more grazing.

planted in June need 500 pounds per acre of a high analysis fertilizer at planting time. Where only nitrogen is needed, apply 60 pounds per acre.

Johnson grass after hay cutting needs at least 60 pounds of nitrogen per acre.

Grain sorghum planted in June needs 80 to 100 pounds of nitrogen to the acre plus 60 pounds each of potash and phosphate.

Soybeans planted in June need from an 0-40-40 to an 0-60-60 to the acre.

**Dairy Notes**  
Antibiotics and pesticides can spell trouble to dairymen if they get into the milk, that is!

Here are some rules to follow in using these necessary materials:

First, use only recommended pesticides. For use on dairy animals, these include—chlorin (simar) spray, methoxychlor (marlate) dust, malathion dust, rotenone dust or spray, pyrethrins plus piperonyl butoxide spray.

In dairy barns, they include—cygon spray, diazinon spray or bait, ronnel spray or bait, malathion spray or bait.

Use these materials strictly according to directions on the label.

On cows treated for mastitis—teat insertions, withhold milk for six milkings or 72 hours. On intra-muscular injections withhold milk for five to seven days according to directions on material used.

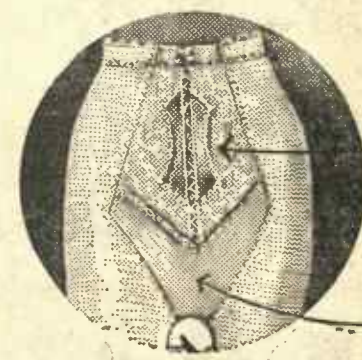

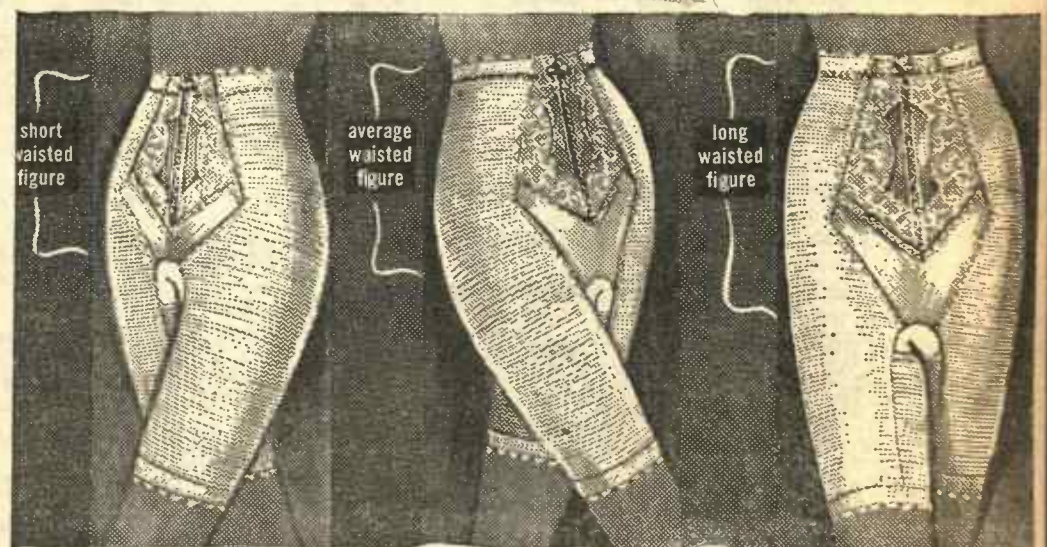

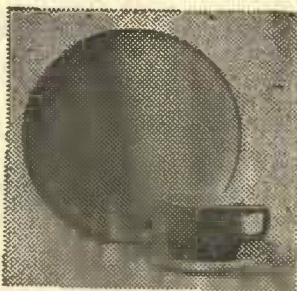

# NOTICE

## HOUSE TRAILER OWNERS

Effective June 15, 1964, any house trailer, or mobile home, bus, coach or any vehicle, conveyance or structure deemed by the management of Tishomingo County Electric Power Association to have been originally designed to be movable, shall in order to receive electrical service from the Association be subject to the following:

1. That when a service, only, is required, a charge of \$15 shall be made. (A service shall be defined as the necessary wire, hardware, insulators, connectors, etc., up to and including a length of 150 feet, and where no pole is required.)
2. That in a service, secondary or primary line requiring one or more poles, the cost to the customer shall be the estimated unrecovered cost of the line required up to and including a length of 1000 feet. (Unrecovered cost is defined as the cost of labor required to construct and also to retire the line. This does not include the cost of materials.)
3. That in a primary line of more than 1000 feet in length Rule 2 above shall apply for the first 1000 feet, and any length of power line over and beyond the 1000 feet shall be paid for in aid-to-construction at a charge of 37 cents per foot according to the current policy of the Association in regards to permanent residences. (It is also understood that any line exceeding 1000 feet in length shall require special approval by the board of directors as is current policy.)
4. That the charges described shall be payable prior to connection of electrical service and shall not be refundable.
5. That any case not covered above shall receive special considration of the board of directors.
