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1. That when a service, only, is required, a charge of \$15 shall be made. (A service shall be defined as the necessary wire, hardware, insulators, connectors, etc., up to and including a length of 150 feet, and where no pole is required.)
2. That in a service, secondary or primary line requiring one or more poles, the cost to the customer shall be the estimated unrecovered cost of the line required up to and including a length of 1000 feet. (Unrecovered cost is defined as the cost of labor required to construct and also to retire the line. This does not include the cost of materials.)
3. That in a primary line of more than 1000 feet in length Rule 2 above shall apply for the first 1000 feet, and any length of power line over and beyond the 1000 feet shall be paid for in aid-to-construction at a charge of 37 cents per foot according to the current policy of the Association in regards to permanent residences. (It is also understood that any line exceeding 1000 feet in length shall require special approval by the board of directors as is current policy.)
4. That the charges described shall be payable prior to connection of electrical service and shall not be refundable.
5. That any case not covered above shall receive special consideration of the board of directors.

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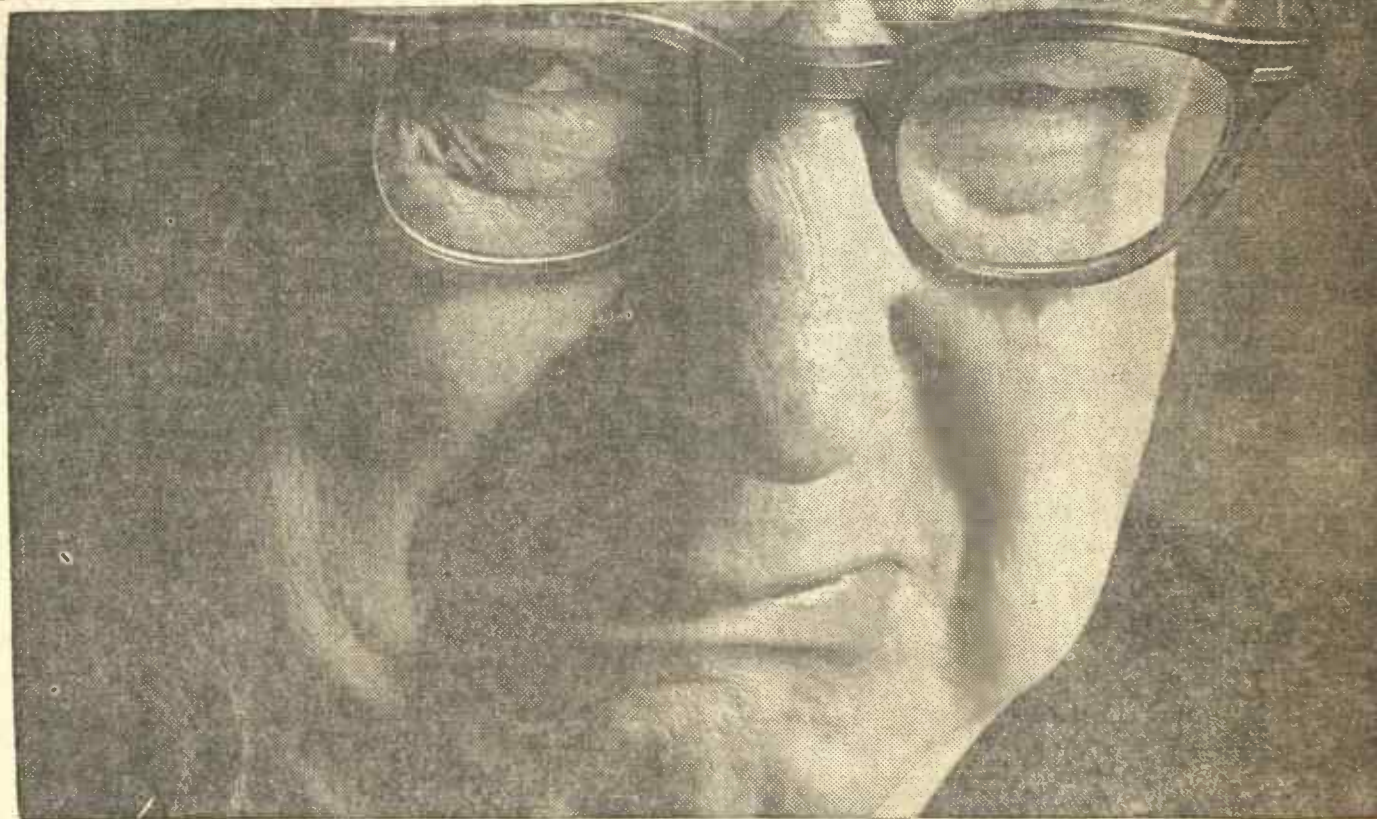


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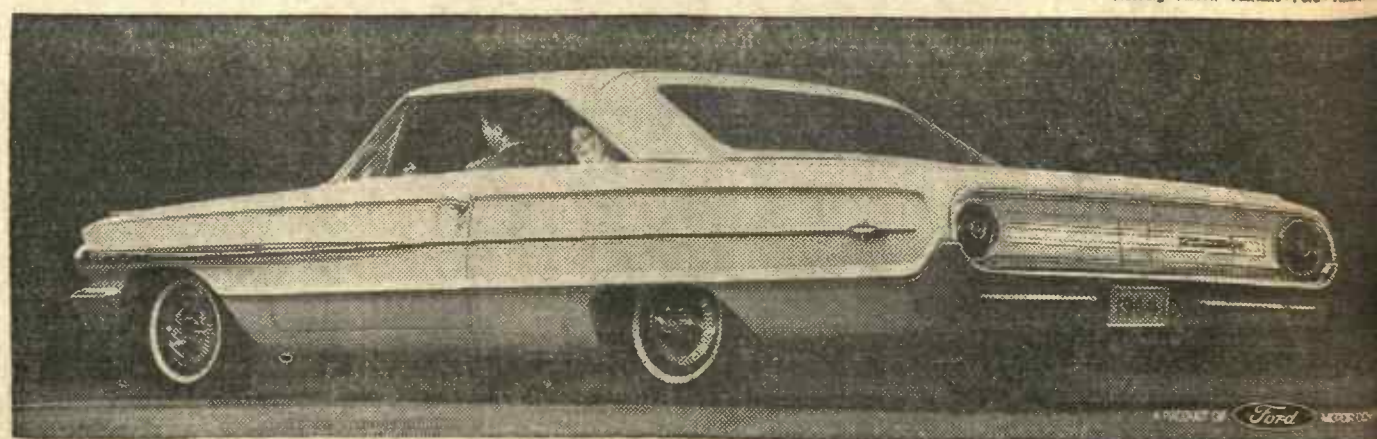
