Women Hold 34% Of Jobs In Tishomingo County

Approx. 1,834 Women Employed
Or Seeking Work Outside Homes

To a greater extent than ever before, Tishomingo County women are getting away from their homes and are taking jobs in offices, stores and factories.

With each passing year the number of women at work has grown larger, to the point where now about one out of every three persons in the labor force is a woman.

Details on this feminine march into the labor force, as it affects the local area and other sections of the county, come from the Department of Commerce, from the Labor Department and from other sources.

The latest official count shows 33.9 percent of all jobs in Tishomingo County to be held by women.

The proportion is greater than that reported for most parts of the United States, where the average is 32.7 percent. In the East South Central States, it is 32.2 percent.

The wide participation of women in all fields of industrial activity is noted in every

area of the nation. They are to be found in most technical and professional fields as well as in Congress, on assembly lines of factories, on farms, in stores, banks, schools and even the armed forces.

Approximately 1,834 Tishomingo County women are now employed, full-time or part-time outside the home, or are looking for such work, according to the latest Government estimate, updated to March, 1964.

Nationally, the Bureau of Labor Statistics reports, there are 25,430,000 in the labor force at the present time, as against 22,409,760 in 1960. All but 6 percent of them are employed.

Locally, as well as elsewhere across the country, it is the married women who are responsible for most of the increase in the number of female workers. Their earnings have contributed greatly to the rise in family incomes in recent years.

The National Consumers Finance Association finds that wives working full-time produce about 40 percent of total family income and those working part-time, about 20 percent.

The overall earnings of married women is placed at more than \$28 billion a year.

This added income has enabled many families to live more expansively than they could have otherwise.

Four Tishomingo County 4-H Club members are delegates to the statewide 4-H Junior Leadership Training Conference this week at Mississippi State University. They are Sherrell Umfress, W. T. Carson, Sybil Reynolds and Peggy Frederick.

The Tishomingo County delegates were accompanied to Mississippi State by Roy D. Doss, Associate County Agent.

Two boys and two girls from each Mississippi county are eligible to attend the annual conference. The delegates are winners in a statewide competition conducted by personnel of the Mississippi Agricultural Extension Service as part of the 4-H Junior Leadership Training Program and are selected on the basis of their records in 4-H Club work. The highest scoring 4-H Junior Leaders in each county are selected as winners of the three-day trips.

The 4-H Junior Leadership Training Program is administered by the Mississippi Agricultural Extension Service and is sponsored by United Gas. All travel and other expenses of the junior leaders, while attending the conference, are paid by the sponsor.

GEOLOGICAL SURVEY OF COUNTY PLANNED; SEVERAL AGENCIES EXPECTED TO SHARE COST

REPORT WOULD BE AVAILABLE TO PROCESSORS
OF MINERALS FOR INDUSTRY AND FOR FUTURE
INFORMATION ON RESOURCES IN COUNTY

A geological survey to determine the mineral resources of Tishomingo County is in the planning stages. The Mississippi Geological Economic & Topographical Survey Board in Jackson has approved the project and has set the cost at approximately \$75,000.00 with the State Survey Board to pay \$50,000.00 and the remaining \$25,000.00 to be furnished by the county Board of Supervisors and Tennessee Valley Authority.

Serving As Assistant In Legislature

David Reynolds of Iuka is one of the first Millsaps college students to serve a political internship through a cooperative program between the Mississippi Legislature and the Millsaps political science department.

David is gaining direct experience in the operation of Mississippi legislative government by serving as assistant to Senator Cecil Summers of Iuka. He engages in special research for other senators and for the Legislative Drafting Service.

Included in David's duties is providing a summary and critique of each bill, showing how new bills will amend the existing code and how they will affect other related laws.

David, son of Mrs. Jewel Reynolds of Iuka, was appointed by the North Mississippi Conference to serve as pastor of the Acona-Black Hawk charge.

Stephens of Belmont, Fred Melten, State Geologist, reports: "My Board (the Mississippi Geological Economic & Topographical Survey Board) has authorized me to negotiate with the good people of Tishomingo county for the immediate commencement of a survey of the geology and mineral resources of that area just as soon as satisfactory contractual arrangements could be made. We need a total of \$25,000.00 in co-sponsor's contributions to come from the Board of Supervisors and from anyone else who cares to participate in the work."

Mr. Melten further states that a geologist from his department will move to Tishomingo county to live here during the duration of the survey which will take from two to three years to complete.

W. C. Hamilton, executive director of the Yellow Creek Watershed Authority, states that his agency is participating in planning the survey and that TVA's aid in a financial way has practically been assured.

Dr. Stephens, Mr. Hamilton, and other supporters of the survey, state that "A complete geological survey conducted in Tishomingo county with modern equipment, facilities, and technique, to determine the abundance and worth of our mineral resources can pave the way to industrial and economic development of our county. Indeed, this survey has proven in other counties to be the foundation for industrial and economic development."

The Director of the Mississippi Geological Survey Board and other geologists report that, from all indications, Tishomingo County appears to be the regal county in the State of Mississippi with its mineral resources potential.

Geological elements believed to be available in high quality and abundant quantity are clay and sand for manufacture of brick, sand for manufacture of cement, oil, gas, asphalt, lime, ash, chalk, bauxite, lead and iron ore.

The geological survey will involve drillings, borings, and recording and analyzing the quantity and quality of the various mineral materials. The completed survey would be printed and bound in book form. There will be diagrams showing subterranean formations and depths of materials found. The book will be made available to processors of minerals for their study in locating plants.

Realizing the County Board of Supervisors has several new projects of development which has increased the county mileage, the TVA has unofficially voiced interest and support of the survey. However, they point out, TVA can't make a financial commitment until the Supervisors resolve to participate in the survey, state the portion of the \$25,000 the county can assume, and then submit its intentions with a requisition for "grant in aid" to the TVA Mineral Resources Development in Knoxville.

THE VIDETTE

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Students Urged To Check Status
With Local Selective Service Board

"It is most important that all students, both high school and college, check their status with their Selective Service Local Board," announced Colonel C. S. Sanders, Jr., State Director of Selective Service for Mississippi. Many registrants during the summer vacation are prone to overlook the important fact that the Selective Service Board is reviewing the files and if they do not have the latest information on their status, it may result in their being placed in Class I-A and made available for preinduction or induction into the armed forces. "Therefore," Colonel Sanders stated, "it is imperative that the students keep the local board properly informed of their status, regardless of whether they plan to continue in school or plan to enter a profession after finishing school."

The Director further emphasized the importance of the registrant paying a visit to his local board, due to the fact that the examination of eighteen year olds will begin July 1. If the registrant cannot show that he is still in high school or intending to enter college, or qualified for other deferment, he will be placed in Class I-A and forwarded to the armed forces for examination to determine his acceptability for induction into the armed forces. However, this does not mean that he will be inducted immediately, but will determine whether or not he should be referred to the proper authorities for assistance in obtaining corrective measures at an early age should he fail the mental test or physical examination.

The age of induction of registrants into the armed forces at this time, the State Director pointed out, is approximately twenty-two years of age, and under the present criteria and the national situation, it appears that the age of induction into the armed forces will not materially change. But the

State Director stated that it does not relieve the registrants of responsibility to keep their local board fully advised of any change in their status. Failure to do so could result in the registrant being declared delinquent, and reported to the U. S. District Attorney. The Director advised that the vacation period is an ideal time for the registrant to get his "house in order" with his Selective Service Board.

Summer Pasture Management
Weed control is number one in summer pasture jobs. Do this by either clipping or spraying. Make sure that the material you use does not drift and damage cotton or soybeans. When clipping, be sure to raise the clipper blade five to six inches to avoid cutting the grass too short.

Alternate the cows from one pasture to another. This gives the grazing a chance to make a comeback.

Fallow land for fall planting. This will do more to help assure early stands and fast growth than any other practice. Crops to plant on fallowed land include alfalfa, small grains, ryegrass and clovers.

Lime pastures. Lime areas before fallowing during fallowing; or on land not to be plowed, topdress the lime.

Fertilize permanent pastures by broadcasting phosphorus and potash.

Get rid of broomsedge by liming, plowing, clipping and alternating grazing.

Summer Hog Management
Keep 'em cool and comfortable. With hogs, this advice can make money for you!

Research has showed that sows raise bigger and stronger litters when kept comfortable. For sows on pasture, make sure that they have shade... either natural shade or some that you provide. Sprinklers will also help on pasture. Do not over feed your sows.

Some millet in the summer grazing will help. It will go a long way toward cutting feed costs.

If needed, insulate the farrowing house. Check with your county agent about using some of the low-cost insulating material.

On finishing hogs, provide sprinklers. But be sure to leave some dry space where the pigs can get away from the sprinkler. It might be a good idea to cut off the sprinkler on cool nights.

Temporary Grazing
We still have time to plant temporary grazing crops in Tishomingo County. Extra grazing for all types of livestock will come in handy during July, August, and September.

Land should be prepared well before planting millet or other summer grazing crops. Five hundred pounds per acre of 9-12-12 or other high analysis fertilizer should be applied. The millet should be top dressed in the growing season with 40 to 60 units of nitrogen per

acre after the area has been grassed down.

Gahia millet is one of the later varieties and is recommended very highly. The sorghum-sudan crosses have also proven satisfactorily in good soil. Millet has proven to yield a little more on poor thin soil.

Temporary grazing should be 15 to 20 inches tall before grazing. Cows should be turned in to graze for a two hour period twice a day.

Rate of planting is ten pounds of seed per acre drilled in 40 inch rows or 20 to 30 pound of seed broadcast per acre.

There are some advantages to planting temporary grazing in rows.

1. Cattle go between the growing rows to graze and do not trample crop as much.

2. Less seed are needed.

3. Since fertilizer can be banded, you can make better use of fertilizer.

4. Oats can be drilled down the rows with a sod seeder in the fall. Animals may continue to graze in the summer temporary crop until the oats come up.

June, Dairy Month
The entire dairy industry—producers, distributors, and agricultural workers are promoting the increased consumption of milk and milk products this month.

Milk quality in Mississippi is second to none! Mississippi produced dairy foods are plentiful, pure, wholesome and tasty.

From sanitation standpoint, they grade excellent and are not surpassed by any state in the nation.

Dairying is big business within the state. Dairy dollars are earned and spent in each county. The retail value of dairy foods in Mississippi last year amounted to around \$110 million.

Weed Control In Corn and Soybeans

Want to control broadleaf weeds in corn that is around the lay-by stage? You can do a good job with 2,4-D on such weeds as cocklebur, morning glory, coffee-weed and ragweed.

Before corn is 12 inches tall, spray broadcast using 1/3 pound of 2,4-D in 10 to 20 gallons of water per acre. After the corn is taller than 12 inches use drop nozzles and spray over the tops of the weeds keeping as much of the material off the corn as possible. Raise the rate of application to one-half pound of 2,4-D to the acre. Do not use 2,4-D on corn that is silking and tasseling.

Corn can also be flamed for weed control. Frequent flaming is important if you expect to get good control because weeds must be flamed before they are 3 to 4 inches tall. You can use flame on corn until it is two inches tall and after it is 10 to 12 inches tall.

For soybeans, one application of herbicidal oil is an effective weed control practice. A single directional application of herbicidal oil at 5 gallons an acre when soybeans are 12 to 16 days old is recommended. Shoulder nozzles will aid the weed control under most conditions.

Only one application of oil is recommended in Mississippi, and only the naphtha type oil approved for use on cotton should be used.

For best results, seedbeds should be low, flat on top and free from clods. It is important to keep the oil on the lowest part of the soybean stem to prevent injury to the young plants. Do not use rotary hoe on fields you are planning to oil.

Insects
It is shaping up like a real buggy year. Thrips, fleahoppers, boll worms and a few weevils are being found in cotton. Bugs are out in large numbers in home gardens. For control of all these pests, see your local county agent for information on materials to use and how and when to apply them.

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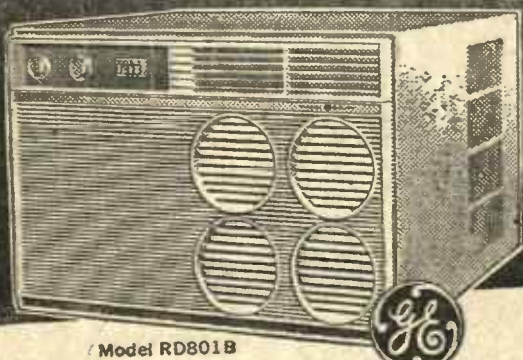

Now Is Time To Lime And Fertilize

If you have not already done so, now is the time to lime and fertilize your pasture. If you haven't had a soil test made showing the kind and amount of lime and fertilizer needed for your pasture, have a soil test made and use the amount of lime and fertilizer that the soil test shows is needed.

If you will do this, not only will you have more and larger pasture plants, but these plants will be more nutritious and your livestock will thrive and do better.

Too, the pasture sod will thicken up and the soil will be better protected. Fertilize your

pastures every year. Lime them every fourth year.

Forestry Notes

A landowner should carry out good management practices when selling his timber.

Many times a timbersale is made without any planning or thought to the future. The buyer who offers the best price is the one that gets the timber. On the surface, this sounds good but there are more things to consider in making a timber sale other than just the sale price.

Are you leaving an adequate stand? It is necessary to leave a certain part of the timberstand to produce more timber. These trees are in a sense, factories. Each individual tree works day and night to produce more wood. Also, when these trees reach maturity they will provide for a future stand by producing seed for a new crop.

How is the timber cutter caring for the timberstand? Is an effort being made to keep from doing any unnecessary damage to the remaining trees? Are the trees being broken down or damaged by machinery? A timber cutter can either save or ruin the remaining stand.

Another point to consider is whether or not you are being paid for all the timber being harvested. Is any wood being left after being cut? Make sure that you are being paid for all the wood carried to the wood-yard.

Before selling your timber, have it selectively marked by a forester. He will be looking out for your interests. It takes several years to grow a crop of trees to merchantable size and it takes many more years to correct damage to the timberland. This is why you should obtain the best advice available before harvesting your timber.

HOME AGENT NOTES

Planning a summertime trip with the children?

As you plan the route you will take, allow enough time for a leisurely trip. Plan for several daily stops to keep the children from becoming bored from riding and you tired from driving.

Take favorite small toys, such as hand puzzles, small dolls, picture books and comic books. For an added attraction visit a toy counter and select some new toys. Wrap as gifts. Present unexpectedly to children as rewards for good behavior, or as interest wanes.

Don't take pencils and sharpened or heavy toys for car riding entertainment. They can be quite hazardous, and can fly off the rear window ledge suddenly if you have to make a quick stop.

A shoe bag over the seat will prove extremely useful to hold toys, wash cloths, tissues and other articles necessary during car travel.

Keep a paper bag handy, too, for disposal of used tissues and other papers. You can empty it at filling station along the way. Don't be a litterbug.

A thermos jug of cold water will be handy for the inevitable "I want a drink" that you'll hear between stops.

Keep a supply of cookies and fruit, plus paper napkins and tissue. A damp wash cloth in a plastic bag and a towel will be convenient too.

Always keep a first aid kit in the car where it can be reached quickly. A flashlight close at hand is ever a convenience, too.

Plan for frequent stops. They for stops at wayside playground areas where you may find swings and other play equipment. This is very important when traveling as it provides a release for excess energy.

If the children includes a baby, you will find a bottle warmer that plugs into the cigarette lighter a convenience for heating bottles and jars of baby food.

Take along enough baby food for the trip. You may not be able to obtain your regular brand at wayside stops. Consider canned or dry milk and prepared syrup that can be mixed along the way.

1. Everyone must keep hands, head and articles inside the car.
2. Everyone must sit down while the car is in motion.
3. No one may bother the driver in any way.

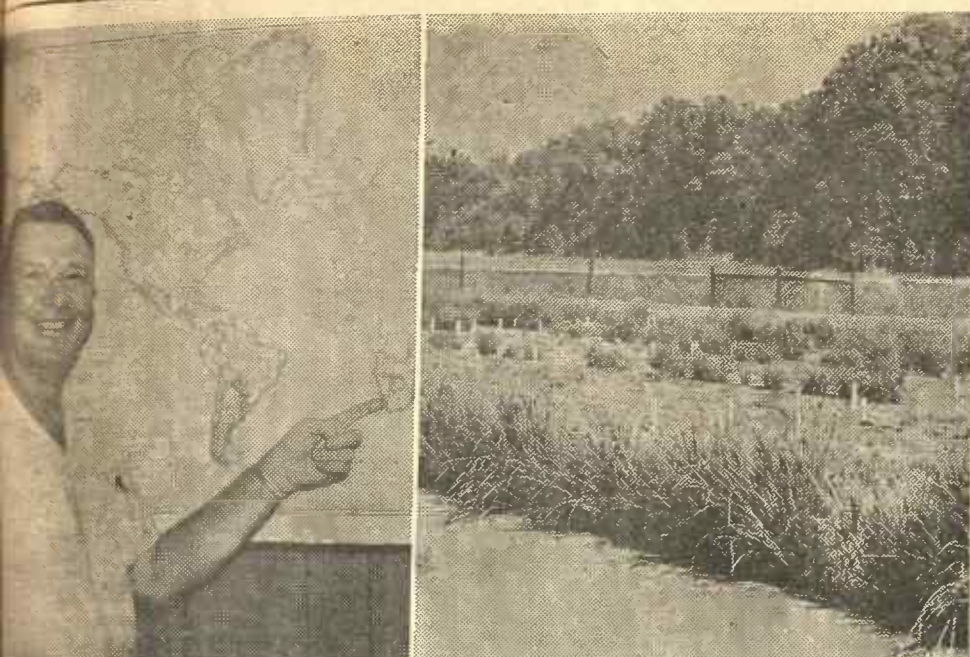

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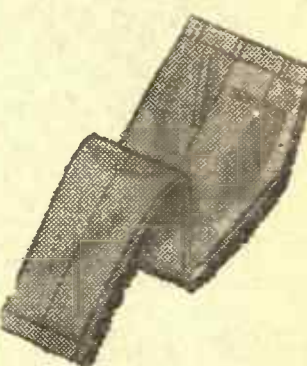


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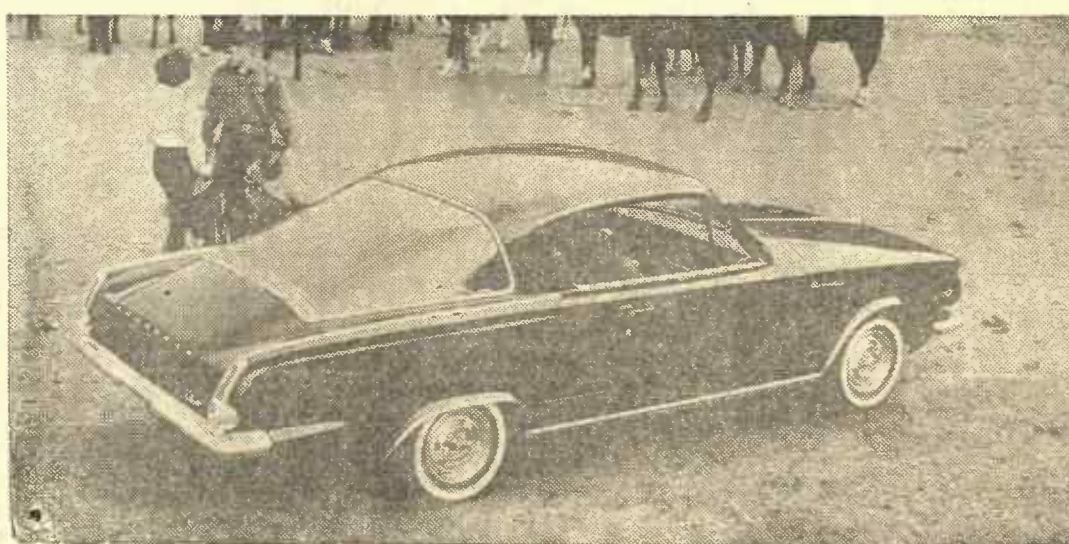
