NEW GARMENT PLANT TO LOCATE IN GOLDEN

**Winfield Manufacturing Co. Will
Occupy School House; Will Make
Utility-Type Clothing For Govt.**

Announcement is made today that a new garment industry will locate a manufacturing plant in the old school building in Golden.

The new firm will be known as the Golden Manufacturing Co. and will manufacture utility-type clothing for the government. Parent company is the Winfield Manufacturing Company of Winfield, Ala. Owner of the firm is Milton Weinstein.

Initial employment will be from 75 to 125 operators, with more to be added if room is available.

A survey to determine the amount of labor available in the Fifth District area was conducted last Saturday and officials state that results were gratifying.

Upon the strength of the survey and civic and business leaders coming to terms with the owners, a contract was signed Monday of this week by Mr. Weinstein and by Steve South, acting for the Board of Supervisors.

Terms of the contract call for the company to pay rent on the building. Residents of Fifth District are to cooperate in bringing the building up to a good state of repair. No bonds will be issued.

Some of the work to be done includes a new roof and new paint. Money to finance cost of materials was obtained by businessmen in the Fifth district signing a note, the money to be repaid out of the rent payments. Contractors in the Golden and Belmont area have agreed to do most of the work as a contribution. Work days have been held by Golden residents to clean up the grounds.

Among those from the Golden and Belmont area present for the signing of the contract in addition to Mr. South, were Ralph Bowen, Dr. Billy V. Stephens, Hollis Dean Sparks, Harmon Davis, Frank James, and Kenneth Mayhall.

The county Board of Education granted a lease for the Golden school building to the Board of Supervisors for the Fifth District for a total of 99 years with an option to purchase at any time.

Billy Martin, a native of the Fifth District, is general manager of the Winfield Manufacturing Co., and will have charge of both the plants at Winfield and Golden.

Mr. Martin states that manufacturing operations will commence as soon as the building is ready for occupancy.

Burleson, who has 11.2 acres on his farm in Dennis; Travis Tidwell, also of Dennis, who has 5 acres of cotton; and G. A. Butler of Paden.

Each year, a year's subscription to The Vidette or The Belmont Tri-County News, whichever the farmer prefers, is awarded for the first bloom found and reported.

Bus Driver Training Schools Will Be Held At Iuka And Tishomingo

Announcement is made today that the State Department of Education will conduct bus driver's training schools in the county the week of July 6-11. Opening hour of the schools will be 8 o'clock.

Bus drivers from Iuka and Burnsville are urged to attend the school at Iuka, to be held Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, July 6-8. On Thursday, Friday and Saturday, the Belmont and Tishomingo drivers are requested to attend a school at Tishomingo.

The Iuka School Board of Trustees and County Superintendent of Education Julian Long state that they would like to have as many people as possible to take the training so offered. "With the fleet of buses to be operated, we need a reservoir of qualified people for regular and substitute drivers," they said.

The school officials state that no person can properly serve in either regular or substitute driver positions without a School Bus Driver's Certificate. They pointed out that the only way to secure this certificate would be to attend a bus driver's training school.

According to the school officials, each driver must hold a valid driver training certificate to be eligible to drive a school bus. Two-year certificates will be issued to new drivers after they have satisfactorily completed the regular 20-hour course.

Renewal certificates, good for two years, will be issued to old drivers after completing the work of the first day and the third morning. Certificates good for one year may be issued old drivers for completion of the first day. An old driver is defined as one who has received a certificate after completion of one regular driver

training course of 30 hours and has completed one year as a paid school bus driver.

Among the general requirements for school bus drivers are: they must be between the ages of 17 and 65 (special approval will be required if 65 or above); they must have good vision and be generally physically fit.

Students, housewives, and men who could use part-time employment in connection with other work are urged by the officials to take the training. There is no cost or obligation.

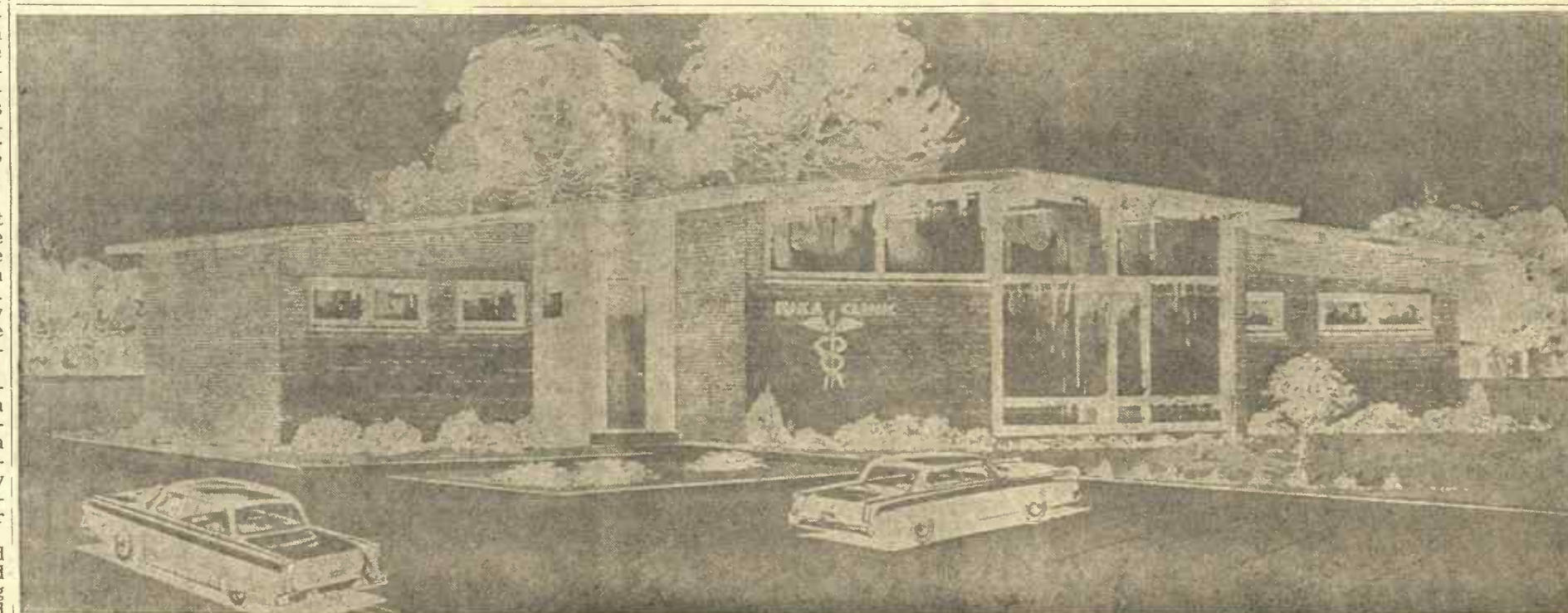

BE ALERT TO HAZARDS. Adjust your driving to road, traffic and weather conditions. Remember, posted speed limits are for NORMAL driving conditions.

ADOPT GOOD DRIVING HABITS. Merge smoothly into traffic... keep pace with other cars... signal well in advance of your exit or change of lanes.

USE COURTESY ABUNDANTLY. Everywhere—at intersections, when turning, while passing or being passed, at night when your headlights are on high beam—"Make Courtesy Your Code of the Road." It pays!

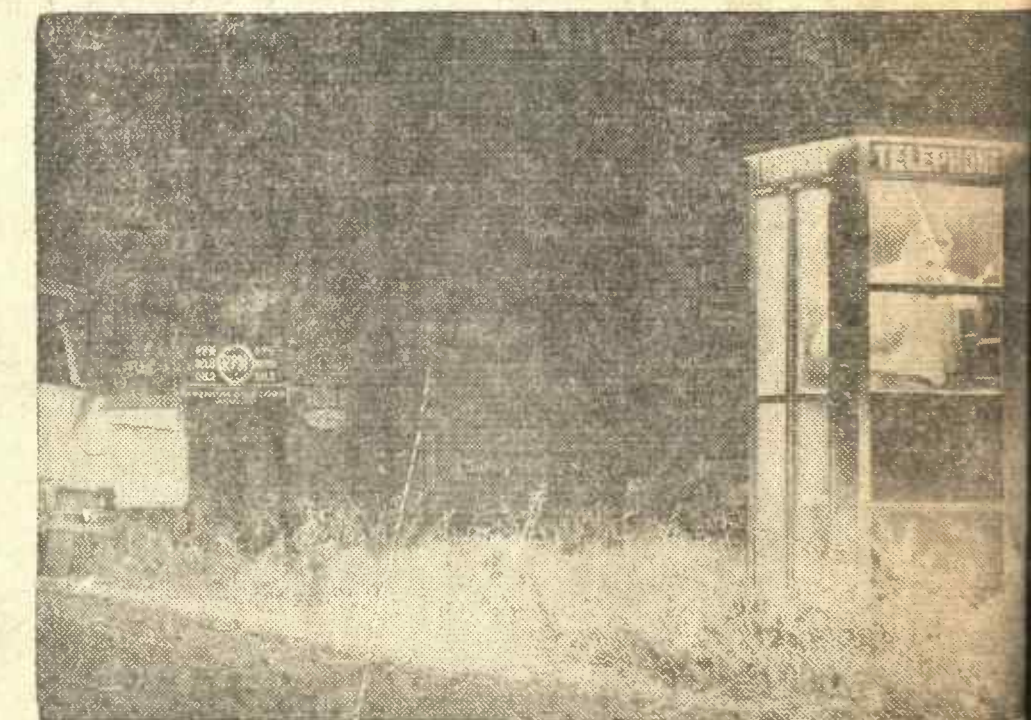

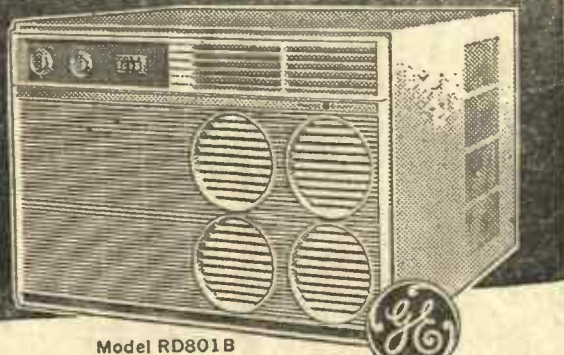

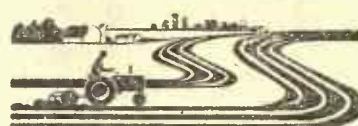

Maintain Your Drainage Ditches

Keep drainage ditches free of brush and other vegetation by any practical method you can use. As a suggestion go to your County Agent and discuss this problem with him. He may be able to help you select a herbicide that you can use that would prove effective and can be easily applied.

Regardless of how the landowner does the work, drainage ditches should be properly maintained and kept open. If a ditch is properly surveyed and properly constructed, it should last for years and years with a little maintenance.

The reason this article is being written is because some of the small dragline ditches that were cut a few years ago are filling up with debris and are no longer functioning as they should. The chief cause of these ditches filling up is the vegetation that has been permitted to grow in the channel.

This is a serious matter and landowners who have ditches cut should properly maintain them. This might be easily done by using the proper kind and amount of herbicides. As you know, some kinds of herbicides cannot be used near cotton, for it may kill the cotton, but your County Agent can give you the information you need on the use of herbicides. Resolve now to maintain your drainage ditches.

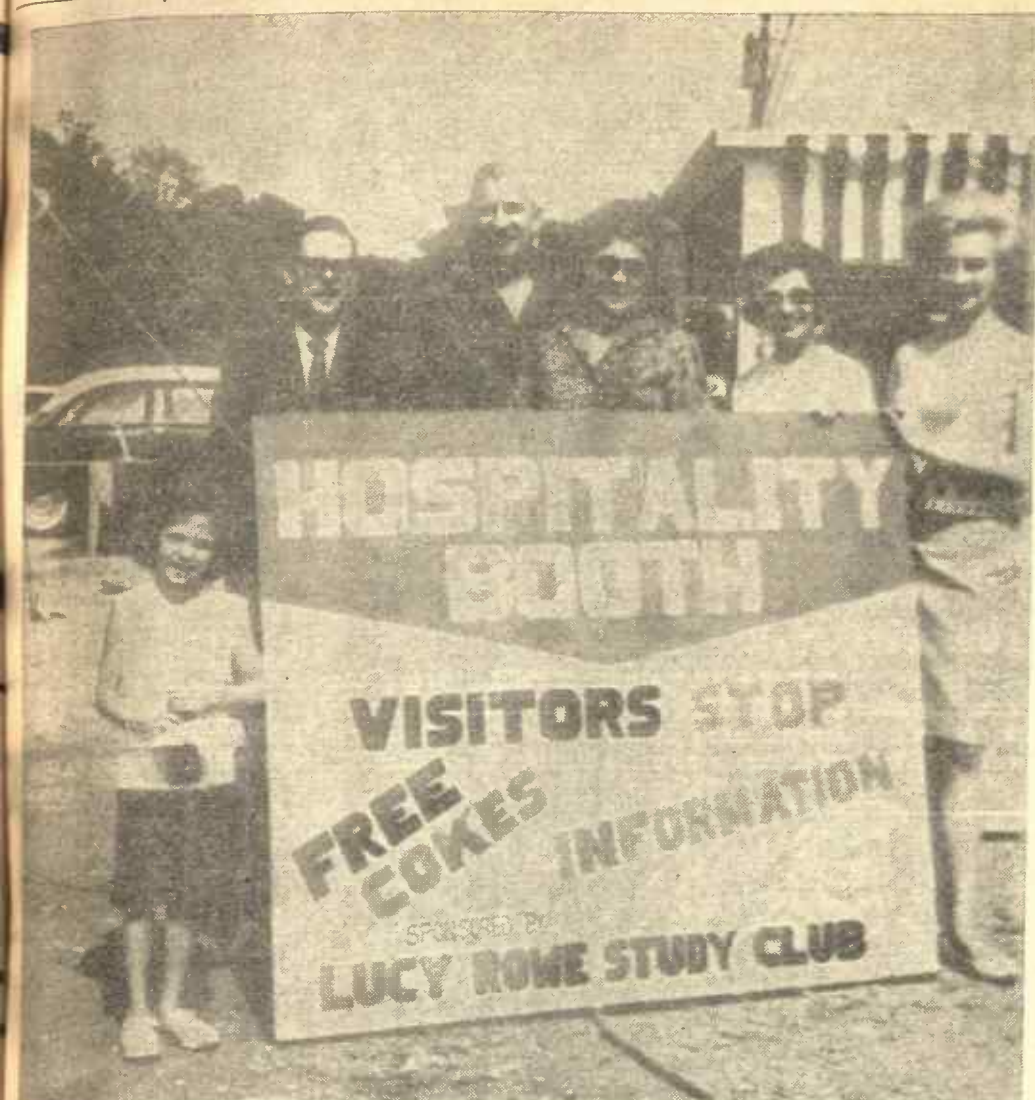

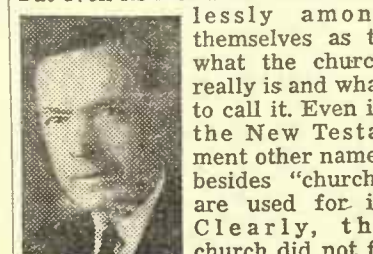

World Family Lesson for June 28, 1964

Background Scripture: Ephesians 2:11-22; 4:1-16. Devotional Reading: Ephesians 4:1-7.

THE CHRISTIAN CHURCH is one of the strangest collection of humanity that exists in the world. There is hardly another religion which has a church; it is a peculiarly Christian institution. But even its members debate end



lessly among themselves as to what the church really is and what to call it. Even in the New Testament other names besides "church" are used for it.

Clearly, the church did not fill all its titles equally well; if any one had been quite satisfactory, there would have been no need for the other names. One of the names used by St. Paul in referring to the church is "household of God" (Eph. 2:19).

This word includes the meaning "family": the striking point is that Paul calls it the household of God. What other organization can dare to call itself by such a high name? Paul does not mean to call the church perfect, completely holy; but he uses some of the same words to refer to the church that he uses in speaking about Christ and God. In short, we are invited by the Apostle to look at the church as both divine and human. The household—that is the everyday human word; of God—that is the word of divinity. This alone makes the church unique. This also raises problems. To bypass a long discussion, we must say that according to the New Testament, the church is not a club which has asked Christ to join them. It is the other way around: Christ invites the church to join him. "Follow me," he used to say in Galilee, and still does.

What we share

Now if we are, as a church, in any sense the household or family of God, we might be expected to have something in common. To put it another way, if you traveled around the world, meeting Christians in every nation (for there are fewer than half a dozen nations without any Christians) you might expect to find these Christians to be a good deal alike. But the fact is, you would probably be struck with how different they are. Even if you look into one congregation, say your own what a variety of temperament, dispositions, abilities, and taste. You would find! What draws these people together, what is the cement that holds these odd-shape stones in place? It is certainly not the peas-in-a-pod likeness that you might find in a college fraternity or the lockstep likeness of prisoners shuffling to bed. All sorts and conditions of men make up the church. Why doesn't the church split a thousand ways? The fact is, it has split, too many ways. But even so, as you pass from denomination to denomination from Protestant to Catholic, from liberal to conservative, there is still something that all these smaller groups share in common.

In our heritage

Let's be brief on paper here and leave the reader free to continue thinking about this for himself. One thing you will find in every church in the world—one thing that makes us all one, is that you can't even get into a church by telling the officers how good you are. You get in, and you stay in, by admitting that you're just not right. We call this "confession of sin," confession of the most serious failure a man can commit—not coming up to what God has a right to expect of him.

If we could say no more than that, the church would not have lasted long. But we can also say, and this is more important, that his great family is made up of those who admit their weakness and perverseness, and have asked the pardon of a gracious God, and have received it; and now, in Paul's words, "have access to the Father," through him—that is, Jesus. A young Mohammedan who had been converted to Christian faith said to me when I asked him what had persuaded him to be a Christian: "My old religion had plenty of theology, just as much as yours; but you have Christ, and we have nothing to match him."

Outstanding Belmont Citizen Dies Of Heart Ailment; Funeral Saturday

Death came to one of Belmont's most outstanding and best loved citizens E. Clay Wright, who died of a heart ailment in the Baptist Memorial Hospital at 9:30 Thursday night, June 18.

From the time he came to Belmont as a youth and throughout his entire life, Mr. Wright was recognized as a potent factor for good. As a student in Belmont High School in its primitive days and during the period in which he studied pharmacy, his attitudes and his conduct were always exemplary.

Upon the entrance of this country into World War I, he volunteered his services to the Navy, serving 18 months as Chief Dispenser in the Naval Medical Center at Norfolk, Va.

After the war ended, upon receiving his honorable discharge from the Navy in 1919, he returned to Belmont and became a partner in the Allen-Wright Hardware and Furniture Company, in which business he remained for 15 years. In 1929 he became affiliated with the Bank of Belmont, and served as vice president and cashier for a full quarter of a century, retiring in 1955 because of ill health. Assuming his duties as a banker as the great depression swept the country, he demonstrated his astuteness as a financier by keeping his bank on a solidly solvent basis while others over the nation were closing their doors by the hundreds.

Outstanding as he was in business and commercial areas, his greatest impact upon his community came from his great devotion to civic and religious matters. He served on the Belmont Board of Aldermen for 8 years and was an active member of the Chamber of Commerce. Always keenly interested in the growth and development of town and county, he was a powerful and active factor in the location of the Blue Bell plant at Belmont, and instrumental in other areas of civic advancement.

He had a deep and consum-

ing interest in youth and their welfare. He will be remembered by a great many who received material assistance from his hand, and, more importantly, encouragement to right living and lofty objectives.

His greatest love was for the church. He became a member of the Belmont Church of Christ in 1916 and served as teacher and elder for 45 years. His loyalty and devotion to the gospel of Christ were of a superlative quality; his sincerity in matters was constantly demonstrated in his daily life.

Mild-mannered, courteous, congenial, efficiently versatile in his interests, a model Christian, it can well be said of him that

"His life was gentle, and the elements So mix'd in him that Nature might stand up And say to all the world, 'This was a man'."

"None knew him but to love him Nor named him but to praise."

Funeral services were conducted for Mr. Wright at the Belmont Church of Christ Saturday, June 20, at 2:00 o'clock, James L. Segars, Minister of the Gadsden, Alabama Church of Christ officiating, assisted by the local minister, Jerry Steele.

Mr. Wright is survived by his wife, Mrs. Josephine Jourdan Wright; a daughter Mrs. Dorothy Thrasher, of Huntsville, Alabama; a brother, B. E. Wright, Sr.; a sister, Mrs. L. P. Allen, of Belmont; 4 grandchildren, and a large number of nephews and nieces.

Interment was in Belmont Cemetery, Deaton's Funeral Home in charge.
