## Age Earners In County Better Off Economically

### Recent Rises In Income Makes Up For Increased Living Costs

Average Tishomingo worker has been better-off economically in recent years. Although his cost of living has been going up, his income has been moving upward faster rate.

Putting in any more than he did ten years ago in terms of hours of labor, he can live more luxuriously than he did then. Increase in his income has more than made up for the increase in his living costs.

Average working man in Tishomingo County now earns in only 37 minutes of work what he could buy a pound of coffee or a pound of butter for, for example, to buy a ten years ago they have involved considerable more working time.

Putting in 37 minutes of work he is able to buy a pound of coffee or a pound of butter for, for example, to buy a ten years ago they have involved considerable more working time.

Changes that have taken place throughout the United States and the comparison of working times with the year of 1953 are reported by the National Industrial Conference Board and by the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Idea of the extent of change is brought out in figures, which show the amount of time that the average worker must put in for various consumer items.

For example, grade A, regular eggs, 13 minutes of work to compare with 26 minutes of work 10 years ago.

Air of nylon stockings 23 minutes, as against 37 minutes previously.

Medium-price man's wool suit formerly a 27 1/2-hour job can now be bought with 20 hours of work.

Reports reveal, also, the gap that still exists between the buying power of the American worker and that of counterparts in other countries.

Loaf of bread that a worker in this country can buy for only 5 minutes on the job requires 11 minutes in Paris or West Berlin, 19 minutes in Tokyo, 24 minutes in Madrid and 36 minutes in Moscow.

## Singing Convention Closes Friday

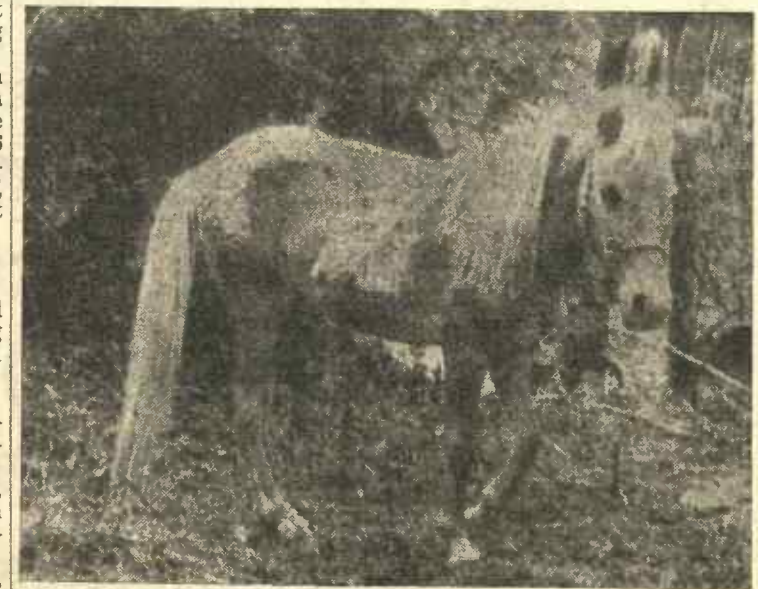
Friday night, July 3, is the last night of the Singing Convention in progress at Holcut Community Center.

## TVA To Ban Alcohol Use At Pickwick

To ensure continued recreation enjoyment of the area for the maximum number of visitors, TVA said today that it will increase enforcement of user-regulations at Pickwick Landing Dam Reservation.

Effective July 3, the swimming area will be closed to the public at 10 p.m.

Signs prohibiting the use of alcoholic beverages on the reservation are being erected, and patrols by TVA's public safety officers will be increased to provide stepped-up enforcement of these and other existing regulations.

TVA said the measures would continue on a permanent basis.

Recreation use of Pickwick Reservoir has increased rapidly since the dam was completed in 1938. Person-day recreation visits to the reservoir last year totaled nearly two and one-half million—most of them at the reservation.

Interested persons in Iuka and Burnsville are urged to attend the school at Iuka to be held Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, July 6-8. Those in the Belmont and Tishomingo area are requested to attend a school at Tishomingo to be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday, July 9-11.

Among the general requirements for school bus drivers are: they must be between the ages of 17 and 65 (special approval will be required if 65 or above), and they must have good vision and be generally physically fit.

The Iuka School Board of Trustees and County Superintendent of Education Julian R. Long urges students, housewives, and men who could use part-time employment in connection with other work to take the training. There is no cost or obligation.

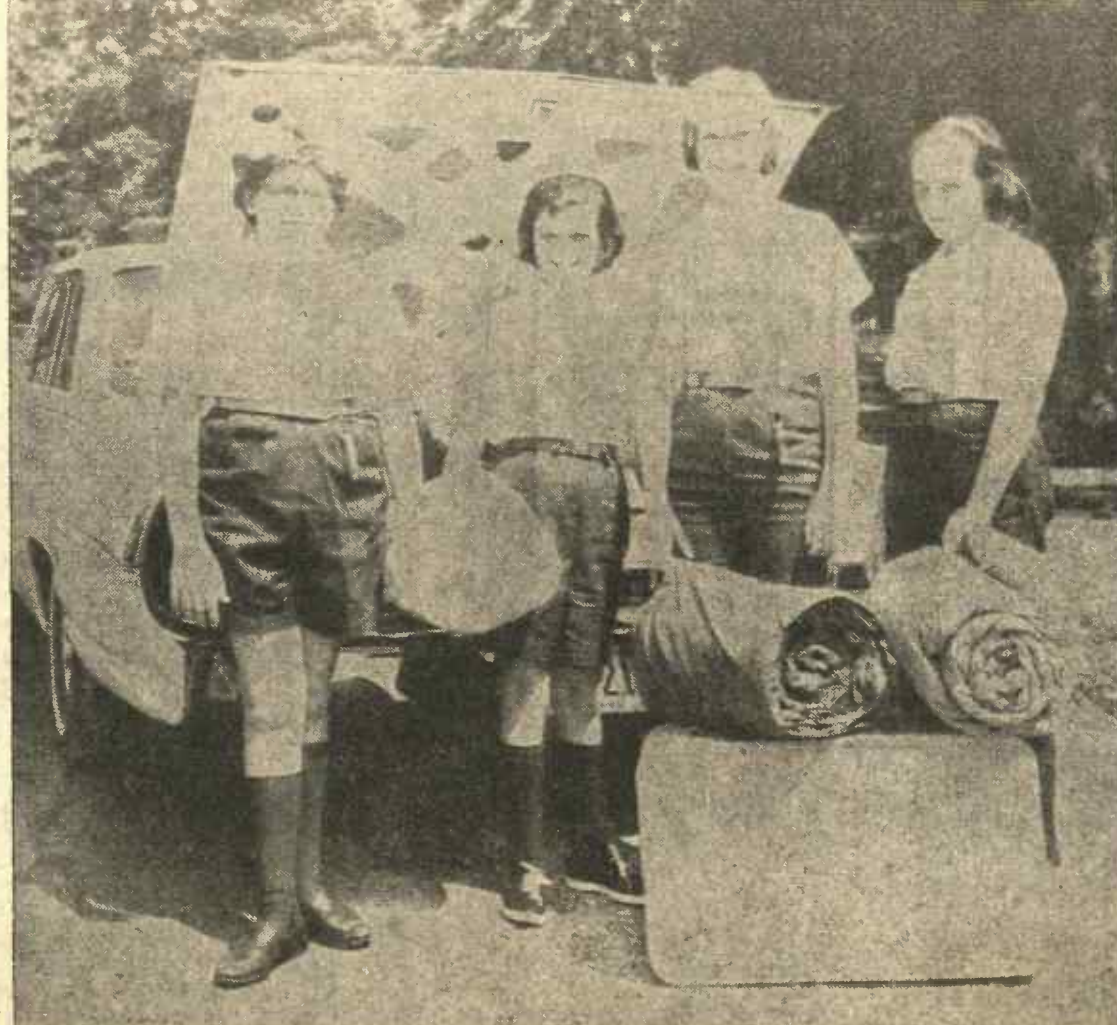

The Mississippi Intensive Immunization Program is well into its all-out campaign this all of the children of each county contact these parents.

Before the workers started contacting parents, the county list was checked by health department clerks to eliminate all children who have been completely immunized by the health department.

If a child is found to have had only part of his immunizations, the representative will then call on the parents of this child in the event there is no health department immunization record on the child, the worker will visit the parents to see if the child has received its immunizations from a private physician or pediatrician.

When there is a family where the children are unimmunized, a prepared promotional kit is used to show parents the importance of immunizations. The parents are urged to take the unimmunized children to their private physician or health department.

In addition to the personal contact, Mrs. Clark says there's a massive radio, television and newspaper campaign being carried out to make the public aware of the need of immunizations not only for children but also for adults.

The Tishomingo County Health Department clinic days in Iuka are Wednesdays from 8:00 to 4:30 and in Belmont on Fridays from 10:00 to 2:00. Special immunization clinics in out-lying areas have been organized for the summer months.

Parents are urged to bring their children to the clinic nearest them for immunization. Children who have previously completed their initial series may be in need of boosters.

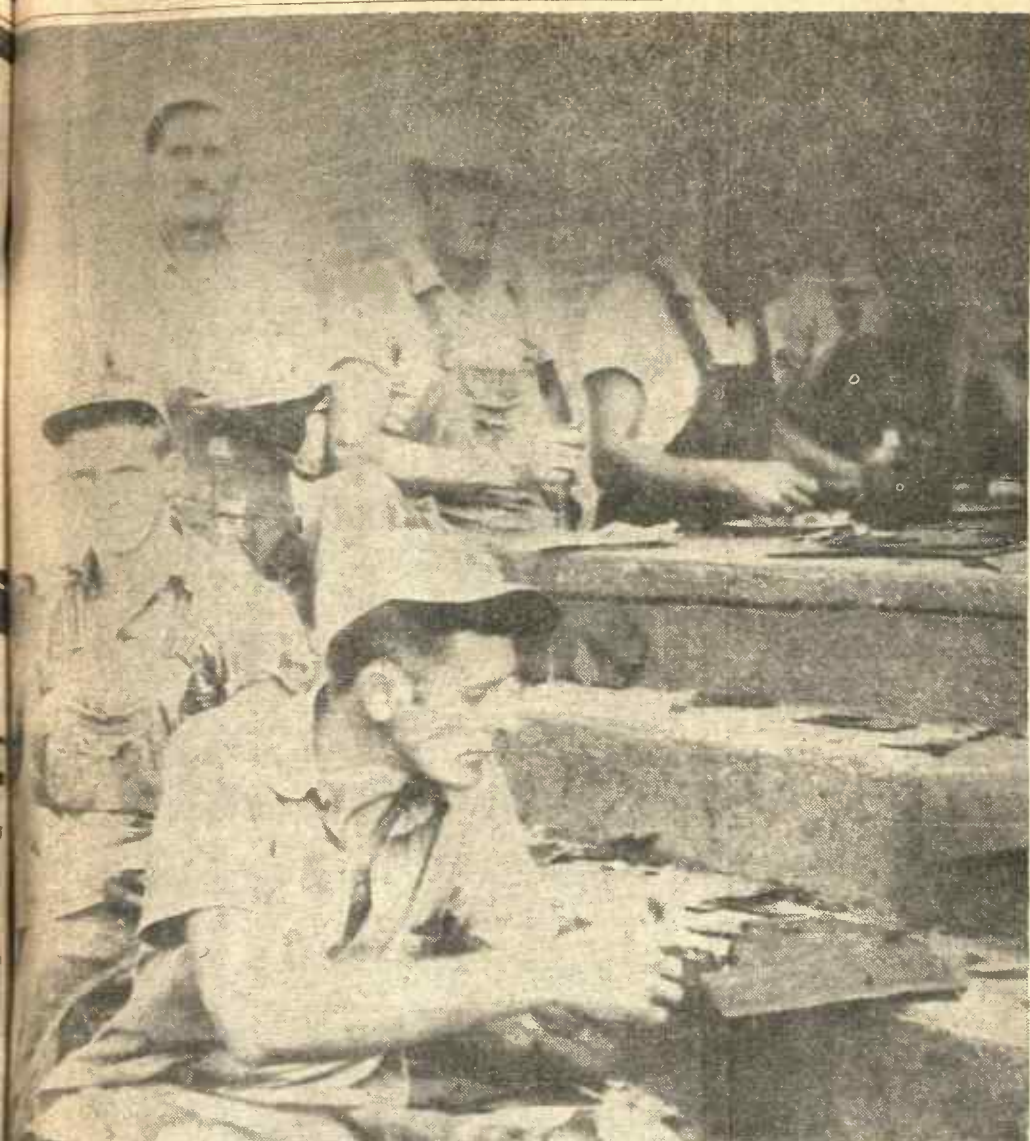

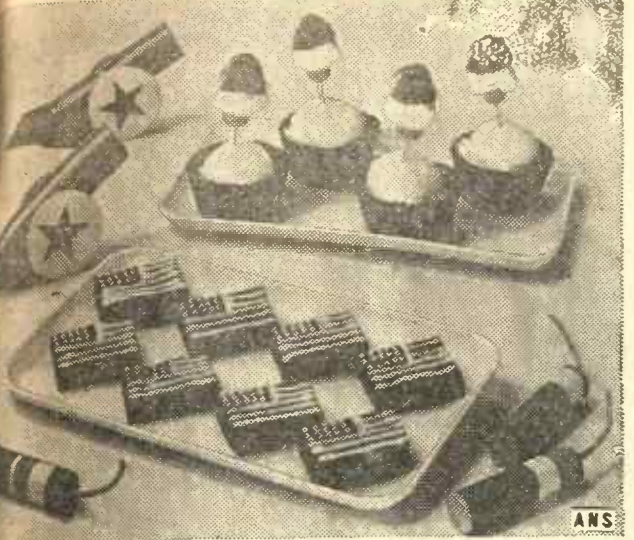

**CHOCOLATE CREME FUDGE**  
To make "fudge" in celebration of the glorious July 4th, make chocolate crinkle cups by melting 6 squares semi-sweet chocolate with 2 tablespoons butter; stir. Using a teaspoon, drop the chocolate all around the inside of 10 large paper baking cups. Chill. To make the decorations melt 1-1/2 cups semi-sweet chocolate; stir and cool to about 83°, then dip end of 10 pineapple wedges into chocolate. Let stand on waxed paper until firm. Insert wooden pick through candied cherry and end of pineapple. Ten minutes before serving, fill cups with fudge. Place in freezer ten minutes. Peel off top ice cream with fruit-picks.

**CHOCOLATE CREME FUDGE**  
Baker's Semi-Sweet Chocolate (1 package) 1/4 cup butter or margarine  
1/2 teaspoon vanilla  
chopped walnuts 1-1/2 cups sugar  
marshmallow cream 1/2 cup evaporated milk  
Cut the chocolate squares in half. Place in a bowl with nuts, small cream, butter, and vanilla.  
Boil the sugar and evaporated milk in saucepan. Bring to a boil over heat, stirring occasionally. Continue boiling, without stirring, until a small amount of mixture will form a very soft ball in water (or to a temperature of 232°). Immediately pour over nuts in bowl. Stir until chocolate is melted and all ingredients are mixed. Pour into buttered 8-inch square pan. Cool until firm. Cut into pieces or rectangles. Makes about 1-3/4 pounds. Fudge should be stored in the refrigerator.
