HOME AGENT NOTES

Mama, where did hamburgers get their name?

This may have been a question in almost any home where hamburgers are a popular food. The story goes that the ham-

burger got its start in Hamburg, Germany. But it was different from the hamburger of today. The Hamburg hamburger was a round of beef sliced thin, pounded and seasoned, then wrapped around a bit of veal kidney suet. The rolls were tied, browned in fat, and braised in gravy.

Before washing a concrete porch or steps, wet the porous surface with plain water. Then, when you scrub it with thick soap or detergent suds, the concrete won't absorb dirty water. Finish by rinsing with clean water — preferably a good hosing off.

JULY PLENTIFUL FOODS are headed by beef. Following close behind on the list are watermelons, turkeys, California plums, and fresh summer vegetables. Among fresh vegetables you should find plentiful are beans, lettuce, sweet corn, tomatoes and cucumbers.

Lighting The Doorway
As you plan lighting for the entrances to your new house or to improve the lighting for your present home, think first of safety. You want ample lighting to avoid stumbles or falls as you enter the house.

The second consideration in selecting light fixtures for all entrances to the house is decoration. You want an attractive appearance at the front doorway than at other entrances, but even here appearance must take second place to safety.

As you select the fixtures, you have a choice of many types. A recessed ceiling light mounted outside of, above, or in front of the door is suggested if the entrance is a covered porch or a recessed doorway. The recessed fixture may be round, square or rectangular.

Perhaps the most common type of entrance lighting is one light on either side of the doorway. One large light on the door handle side is suggested if the recessed ceiling light is not practical. Use 100-watt bulbs in these fixtures.

Preparing Summer Vegetables
Trim such greens as cabbage and head lettuce sparingly. Remember that dark outer leaves are rich in iron, calcium and vitamins.

Fresh vegetables are best when cooked quickly and served hot. The longer they are exposed to heat and air, the more vitamin C they lose.

When boiling vegetables, use as little water as possible.

First-Aid Kits Recommended For Home, Auto

If you do not have first-aid kits in your home and auto, now is the time to provide them.

"More accidents occur in the summer months than any other time of the year," said Dr. N. C. Knight, Sr., Director of the Accident Prevention Program of the State Board of Health, who advocates a first aid kit in every home and every car.

"A properly equipped kit can be invaluable in relieving many minor injuries and ailments—and at times may even be lifesaving before medical aid arrives," he stated.

The following items are suggested for a home kit: Gauge pads, Gauge bandage, adhesive dressings, Adhesive tape, Cotton, A mild antiseptic, Burn ointment, Petroleum jelly, Calamine lotion, Aromatic spirits of ammonia, Blunt pointed scissors, Tweezers, Thermometer, Wooden safety matches, and a small flashlight.

"For any family where a member is under medical care, the attending physician should be asked to recommend additional items suited to the particular need," stated Dr. Knight.

For autos, the "unit-type kit" is very convenient. The kit contains first aid materials in jackets of a standard size that are fitted into a case like blocks. Standard packets to replace those used are readily

available.

"The first-aid kits for the home and car don't have to be expensive ready-made kits. A well-fitted metal box or shoe box will serve the purpose. The important thing is to have a kit handy when emergencies strike," stated the public health official.

Social Security

Q—The postman brought me a letter about making social security reports for my maid. She tells me she doesn't want to be under social security. Is it all right for me not to report since she doesn't want to take part in it?

A—No, indeed! Social security taxes must be paid for any household employee you pay at least \$50 in cash during a calendar quarter. There is no choice in the matter. You must make the report and pay the taxes whether your employee wants you to or not.

Q—You keep writing about housewives having to send in social security reports on maids. What happens if I don't make the returns at the right time? How would anyone ever find out?

A—Last year, 21,000 delinquent household employers were "turned up" when former employees applied for retirement payments. In these cases, many of the employees had told their employers "they didn't want to join social security." But when the employment ended they quickly applied for retirement benefits. This led to the former employers having to pay the taxes plus penalties and interest for not making reports at the proper time.

Land to be planted in early September to small grains or ryegrass should be fallowed beginning now. Fallowing does more to help insure early germination and growth than any other practice.
If the land needs lime, apply it before fallowing and mix it with the soil during the fallowing period. Mixing lime with the upper few inches of soil will increase the effectiveness of the lime as it will combine with the soil more quickly.
It is getting late to expect a good crop from sorghum or soybeans planted now. If grazing is needed, it would be better to plant millet or a sudan sorghum cross.
After July 15 soybeans or sorghum should not be planted as yields will be reduced and

This could save you a lot of trouble.
Putting pesticides in containers other than the ones in which they came can be dangerous and lead to serious misuse of the materials.
The contents of an unlabeled container or package are unknown; therefore, there is no guide on what crops the material should be used.
Using material on crops for which it is not intended can lead to crop damage, illegal and unwanted pesticide residues.
A soft drink bottle full of insecticide is an invitation to disaster. It is not only a temptation to children and others, but the bottle has no information on its contents. Such information might be vital to a doctor undertaking treatment for pesticide poisoning.
Remember, do not store pesticides in unlabeled containers. Never use old pesticide drums for mixing livestock insecticide. It can cause a serious loss. Always read and follow directions on the label.

Bitterweed Control
Five reasons why bitterweed is so wide-spread in Mississippi are: lack of good grass or overgrazing, poor soil management, tight soil in poor condition, lack of moisture and early season drought.
Control it by: Clipping the pasture two or three times during the growing season, or by spraying with amine 2,4-D in water. Spray anytime bitterweeds are present. Do not spray real close to cotton fields as 2,4-D will kill broadleaf plants. Clip weeds close to cotton fields and spray the rest.
After using 2,4-D in equipment, do not use the same equipment to spray cotton.
You do not have to remove livestock from the area while spraying with 2,4-D.
Sudan Crosses For Hay And Silage
The best time to cut sudan millet and sudan sorghum crosses for hay or silage is when the plants are around 40 inches tall. At this stage the plants will have higher moisture, but will make higher quality hay or silage.
If these crops are run through a hay conditioner at time of cutting, moisture will be down to 65 or 70 percent in a day to a day and a half. This is the best moisture content for silage. It will take a round three days to cure enough (get moisture down enough) for hay, especially if the hay is to be baled.

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

International Union Sunday School Lessons

BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Not Forgotten
Lesson for July 12, 1964

Background Scripture: Exodus 2 through 4
Devotional Reading: Psalm 103:1-13.

WHERE IS your God? can be an earnest, even desperate question. Or it can be a sneer or mockery. It can be asked by friends of God or by his enemies. In times of peace and prosperity the question loses its anguish.

Like one of Browning's characters, we can say happily "God's in his heaven and all's right with the world." But there comes a time when it is small comfort to think that God is in heaven. That's exactly the trouble, we think. He is in heaven when he ought to be here. This is a sore question even when we ask, Where is our God? Where is mine? When it's your own faith that is about to break, the question about God isn't just a theological problem, it is acute, it becomes the most important question in the world. With all the people who need God's help, where is he? What is he doing?

God knows
"God heard . . . God remembered . . . God saw . . . and God knew." These words stand out in the two sentences that close the second chapter of Exodus. This is the first assurance the Bible has for us: we do not have a forgetful God, or an absent-minded one. The true God is not a pen-house god with a privately listed telephone. He hears, he knows, he sees, he remembers. He neither guesses nor forgets what goes on in his world.

God prepares a man
One reason why that question "Where is God?" can be so often asked, is that God never addresses what he is doing. If he did what maintenance crews do on the city street, put up a yellow barrier and a sign: Slow—God at Work! it would be different. But he has his own ways of doing things. No doubt those toiling, sweating, bitter Hebrew slaves often thought to themselves or asked one another, Where is God? He seems to have forgotten us! But God did not report to them, and he will not report to us, every day what he is doing. Maybe if he told us we should only laugh—in the wrong place. What was God doing to help his poor persecuted people down in Egypt? Well, when the time came he was getting a man ready. (He was readying him in his great grandparents, but that's another story.) Where is God? He is seeing to it that a little basket of reeds is not lost in the Nile barge waters. He is seeing to it that a little baby cries just in time to catch a Princess' heart. God was arranging for that child to have the best education in the world. . . . Or if you had inquired some years later, you might have been told (if God had cared to let you in on the secret) that God was preparing an old man, a sheep-herder, to become acquainted with every mile of a terrible wilderness country. One day he would lead a nation where now he led his sheep.

Fertilize Your Farm Fish Pond
For better fishing, fertilize your fish pond. Fertilizing fish ponds that are properly stocked will result in your catching larger, heavier fish. If your pond is overstocked, the fish will be mostly small ones, proper balance of bream and bass is essential for good fishing. Fertilizing a fish pond that is overstocked with bream will do little if any good. So, the first thing to do is to determine if your pond is overstocked. If it isn't then fertilize it and you should get good results.
Fertilizing a fish pond works like this. The fertilizer causes the microscopic water plants and algae to grow. Insects feed on these small plants just as cows graze a pasture. The more plants there are the more insects there will be and the fish eat the insects and grow and get fat.
The fish do not eat the fertilizer.
