Fed. Excise Tax Law Changes

J. G. Martin, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue, Jackson, Miss., has prepared the questions and answers below to furnish answers to some of the more common questions being asked concerning the changes in the Federal Excise Tax Law recently passed.

Question: What will I have to do to recover the tax I have already paid for the period beginning July 1, 1965, on Amusement Devices, Bowling Alleys and Pool Tables?

Answer: No action is required

on your part. Your money will be refunded automatically; however, it will probably be from 3 to 5 weeks before you receive your refund.

Question: Does the repeal of the excise tax include tax on bill-folds?

Answer: Yes.

Question: Has the excise tax on appliances such as stoves, refrigerators, air conditioners, etc., been repealed?

Answer: Yes.

Question: Has the tax on automobile tires been repealed?

Answer: No.

Question: When do we stop collecting the excise tax on toiletries and on other items on which the tax has been repealed?

Answer: Repeal of this tax was effective as of midnight June 21, 1965. Therefore, no tax should be collected after this date.

Question: Has the tax on guns been repealed?

Answer: No.

The Issue of July 18, 1940

It was announced that Iuka School would begin construction on a new building in September. The building, to be used by the grammar grades, was to be of brick construction, and contain four class rooms with lockers and an auditorium. The new building and old building were to be forty feet apart and connected by an arcade.

Tishomingo County was designated as a Tenant Purchase County for 1940-41 according to the State Farm Security Administration. This meant that deserving farm tenants, sharecroppers or farm laborers would have an opportunity to purchase a family-sized farm under the provisions of the Bankhead-Jones Tenant Act.

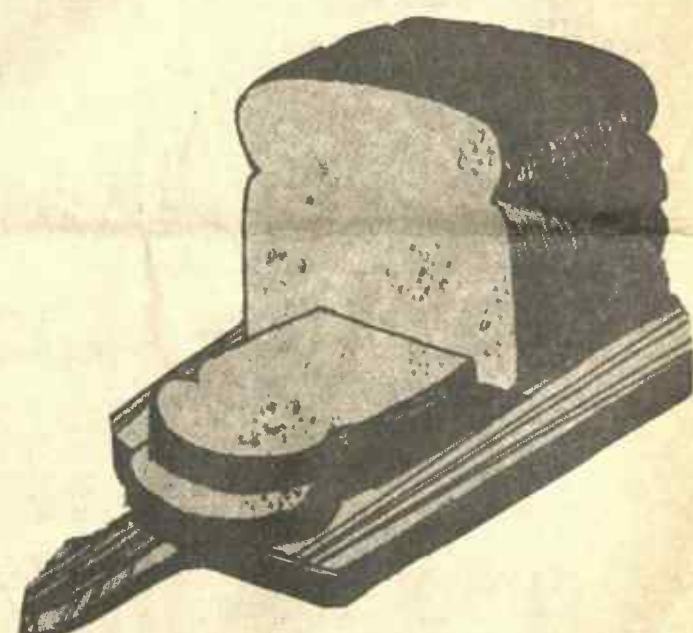

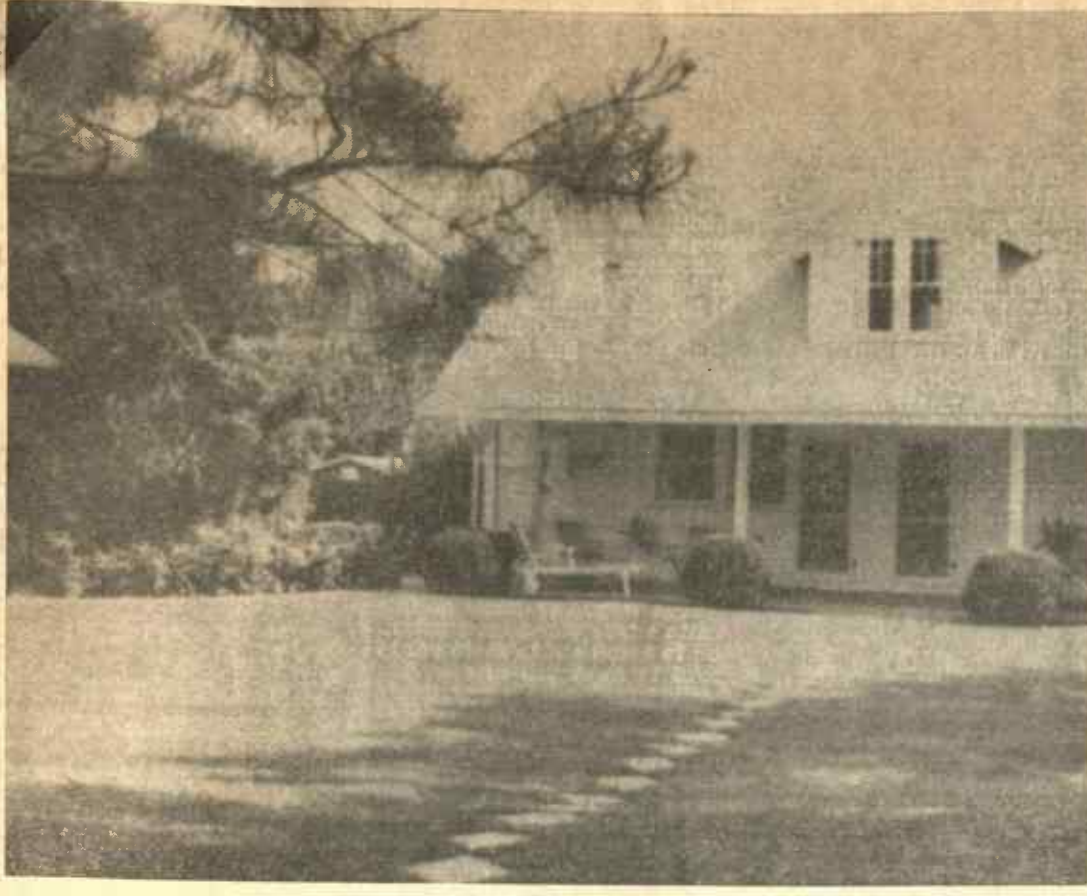

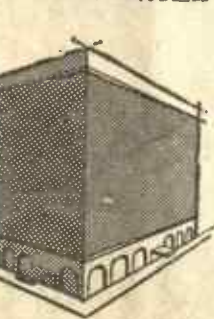
