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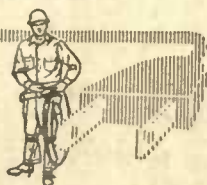

Luminous Emblems To Be Installed on Slow-Moving Vehicles on Hiways

Mississippi Highway Patrol and the Mississippi Safety Council have added their support to a campaign sponsored by the Mississippi Farm Bureau department to install designed luminous emblems on all slow moving vehicles that must share state roadways, especially the harvest season.

Officials of the three safety conscious organizations recently met at the highway patrol headquarters to inspect the safety emblems now being distributed over Mississippi by county Farm Bureau organizations.

The metal emblems—large, triangular, orange signs—are to be installed on the rear of farm tractors, trailers, cotton pickers,

and other farm and commercial vehicles that travel at speeds of 25 miles per hour and less on state roads. An educational drive by the Farm Bureau through the use of highway billboards, newspaper, radio and television publicity will be in full swing by harvest time when agricultural sections of the state have their heaviest load of farm equipment on the highways.

Harold Cummings, safety director of the Mississippi Farm Bureau Federation, states that the county Farm Bureau offices and many farm equipment dealers now have these emblems

Last year an average of five and a half fatalities were recorded in Mississippi per county through rural traffic accidents. Northeast To Receive \$16,706

Financial Aid Under
Work-Study Program
For Coming Fall Term

The Northeast Mississippi Junior College District will receive funds in the amount of \$16,706 under the College Work-Study Program authorized by Title I of the Economic Opportunity Act according to Northeast President Harold T. White. These monies will be for the fall term of the 1965-66 fiscal year. State Population Increasing Near National Average

Mississippi's population increased by an additional 26 thousand persons between July of 1963 and July of 1964, according to estimates resulting from population studies at Mississippi State University. Mrs. Ellen S. Bryant, of the Department of Sociology and Rural Life, has recently published results of this research which was done as an Agricultural Experiment Station project.

The states' net numerical increase since the 1960 Census was taken is almost 138 thousand persons. This represents a growth of 6.3 percent in four

years and is very close to the estimated 6.7 percent national increase over the same period.

The 1964 estimates set the state total at 2,315,900; the white total at 1,370,400; and the nonwhite total at 945,500. Seventy-three of the state's 82 counties are indicated as having experienced either total, or white, or nonwhite growth since 1960. The white to non-white growth ratio was more than four to one over the estimate year, and five to one over the four year period.

"Population growth is continuing in Mississippi at somewhat reduced, but substantial, rates as the state moves closer to the national pattern of rural-urban distributions," Mrs. Bryant said.

"The estimated growth, while relatively well distributed over the state, is essentially a result of movement into urbanized and industrializing areas. Thus the growth does not simply represent an accumulation of surplus population, but seems to be tied to a healthy and seemingly adequate industrial growth."

Underwriters' Laboratories, on October 15, 1964, required that
all water heaters it lists be equipped with a manually-reset, high-limit
switch. This is a protective device to assure safe operation of your hot
water heater.

(Underwriters' Laboratories approves almost all the electric
equipment you buy, from major appliances to extension cords. Their

familiar mark of approval is UL APPROVED, and it simply means
that the equipment meets minimum safety standards set up by the
electrical industry.)

There are two types of safety devices now available which will
meet most area's water heater installation requirements for adequate
protection:

1. The installation of a temperature and pressure relief valve
placed on top of the water heater tank or on the hot water line
not more than six pipe inches away from the tank. Such valves
should be B.T.U. rated and should bear the ASME and National
Board stamp.
2. The installation of a listed pressure relief valve along with the

standard on UL approved models after October 15, 1965.)

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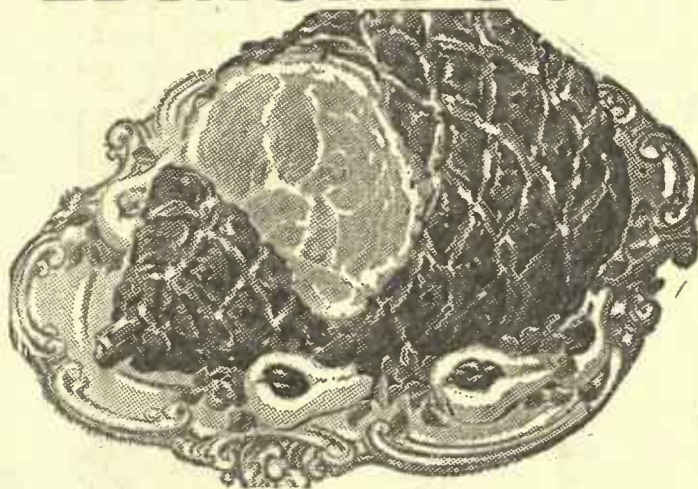

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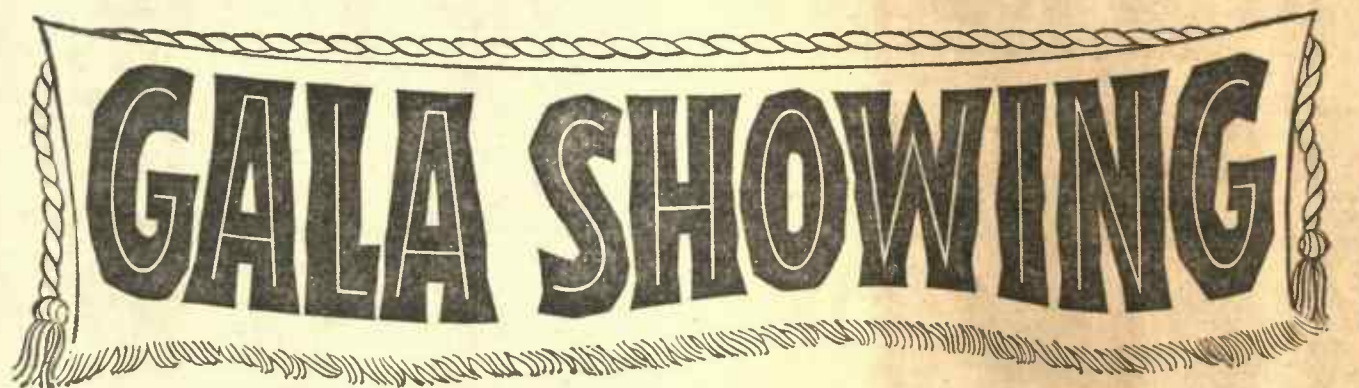
