Advisory Group Assists NEMJC In New Vocational-Technical Program

The Advisory Committee of the Vocational-Technical Education Program to The Northeast Mississippi Junior College held its initial meeting on the college campus Wednesday, July 21.

The purpose of the meeting was to give the Advisory Committee an opportunity to assist the junior college administration in establishing programs in the area of vocational-technical education.

Committee members are business representatives from Tishomingo, Alcorn, Prentiss, Union, and Tishomingo Counties. Among those attending the initial meeting from Tishomingo County were: Russell Bonds of Burnsville, Second District Supervisor; Don Fiske of Iuka, Consolidated Aluminum Company; and Hubert Day of Tishomingo, Blue Bell, Inc.

The business session began with Dean Boggs explaining to the group how the Vocational-Technical Program will be correlated with the academic program and also emphasized that the new program would be able to meet the needs of students that the present pre-professional curriculum is not reaching.

The key-note speaker, J. W. Lewis, State Supervisor of Trades and Industrial Education of Jackson, explained the need for vocational-technical education in a growing industrial Mississippi. Attention was directed to the differences between vocational and technical education. Vocational education deals specifically with the hand manipulations of a given skill while technical education is technical in content and vocational in objective, Mr. Lewis stated.

Mr. Lewis also explained the programs now available through the State Vocational Department. The in-school program consists of the regular vocational and technical areas of training which will serve out-of-high school youth who are seeking immediate occupational status rather than the four-year professional curriculum. Iuka School Desegregation Plan Approved; Freedom Of Choice For First Four Grades This Year

The Board of Trustees of the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District has been notified by U. S. Commissioner of Education Francis Keppel that its desegregation plan has been approved and accepted. The formal publication of the significant features of the plan, as required by regulations of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare appear elsewhere in this issue of The Vidette.

The plan submitted by the Iuka School Board generally conforms to the recent ruling

of the U. S. Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals and to criteria laid down by Commissioner Keppel in his statement of Policies issued in April, 1965. It is similar in its basic aspects to the vast majority of the plans currently being submitted by Mississippi Schools to H. E. W. for approval.

The plan calls for the desegregation of Grades 1, 2, 3, 4 for Session 1965-66; Grades 5, 6, 7, 8 for Session 1966-67; and Grades 9, 10, 11, 12 for Session 1967-68.

The type of plan is Freedom of Choice rather than geographical zoning. Freedom of Choice simply means that in the grades desegregated no child is compelled to attend either school, Iuka or Carter, but may choose which of the two schools he prefers. That choice may be exercised by pupils in the first four grades this year; it will be extended to pupils in the next four grades the following year and to the upper grades the final year.

Letters have been mailed to the parents of children in grades 1, 2, 3, 4, explaining in detail procedures which must be followed. Each letter contains a form on which the names of children in these grades must be listed and the School chosen for each child must be indicated. The form should be filled in and returned at once to Mr. Shook, Mr. Brown, or Mrs. Johnston, or if needed, to any teacher in the Iuka System.

These forms must be in the hands of the designated personnel by August 20. No first grade child will be allowed to register until this form has been presented. We urge parents of children in the other 3 grades also to send their forms back promptly. Mr. Shook stated. Failure to do so will be considered as evidence that the school last attended has been chosen for the coming session but parents of beginners must give written indication of their initiative choice of schools, he continued.

Pupils in grades 1, 2, 3, 4 will be registered in the Elementary section of the Iuka School building from 8 to 11:30 a.m. on August 25. Parents of children in grades 1 and 2 will be permitted to accompany their children for registration. All others, except school personnel, are requested to stay off school premises during the registration period.

May-June Sales Tax Collections

The City of Iuka reported a total of \$5,686.54 in Sales Tax Collections during the month of June, showing a slight increase over the May figure of \$5,647.78.

This report, taken from a recent issue of Mississippi Municipalities, showed the Town of Belmont collected \$1,441.44 in taxes for June, while in May the total was \$1,982.63. Their rate is 1.2%.

The Town of Tishomingo, collecting on the 1% rate, showed a total of \$744.78 during June, compared to \$831.70 in May. Other nearby cities collecting on the 1% rate and their two-month totals were: Baldwyn, with \$4,825.73 in June and \$3,913.34 in May; Booneville, a \$9,720.88 total in June and \$10,258.64 for May; Corinth, \$21,875.41 in June, \$22,660.08 in May; and Fulton, \$6,000.80 in June and \$4,571.78 in May. Figures for the town of Ripley, on the 1/2% rate, were \$4,589.96 for June, with \$4,783.08 in May.

Farmers To Receive Pay In August

ASCS Office Notes About \$225,000

E. N. Allen, ASCS office manager, announces that approximately \$225,000 will be paid to farmers in Tishomingo County during the month of August.

These payments to County farmers will be made on both Cotton Domestic Allotment Price Support and the 1965 Feed Grain Payments.

The estimated payment to the cotton farmers on the Domestic Allotment Price Support will be approximately \$125,000. Farmers who are participating in the 1965 Feed Grain Program will be paid the Second Advance payment of approximately \$80,000. These same farmers drew their first advance of \$75,000 in March of this year.

Mr. Allen states that Feed Grain Farmers must qualify their land by mowing or clipping before the time for the second advance to be paid, in order to be eligible.

Farmers will receive notices as to when to visit the County ASCS Office to sign the application for their check, the office manager concluded, and all checks will be mailed to the farmer.

Lime Helps To Control Soil

The old adage which says, and I quote, "Lime and lime without manure, makes both the land and the farmer poor", may be true. However, it is also true that the farmer who fails to apply lime to his land when it needs it may also become poor.

It is pointed out in the last issue of "Chemical Farming" that no strongly acid soil, good stands of young cotton have been observed to die continuously throughout the growing period. It was also stated that the cotton on limed soil was free of crabgrass at harvest time while crabgrass was thick on unlimed soil.

This article in the Spring issue of "Chemical Farming" may not be entirely applicable to the soils of Tishomingo County, but it does not point out the need for liming cropland as well as pasture land.

More and More Tishomingo County farmers are applying lime to both their cropland and pasture land. Not only are they liming more of their land, but they are applying more needed plant foods through commercial fertilizers.

What does this mean for a soil erosion standpoint? It simply means that with sufficient moisture, properly limed and fertilized crops and pastures grow off faster, cover the ground quicker and runoff of rainwater which sweeps away precious topsoil is slowed down.

If you have cropland or pasture land that you think may need lime, have a soil test made to see if lime is needed, and if it is needed, make your plans to have lime applied.

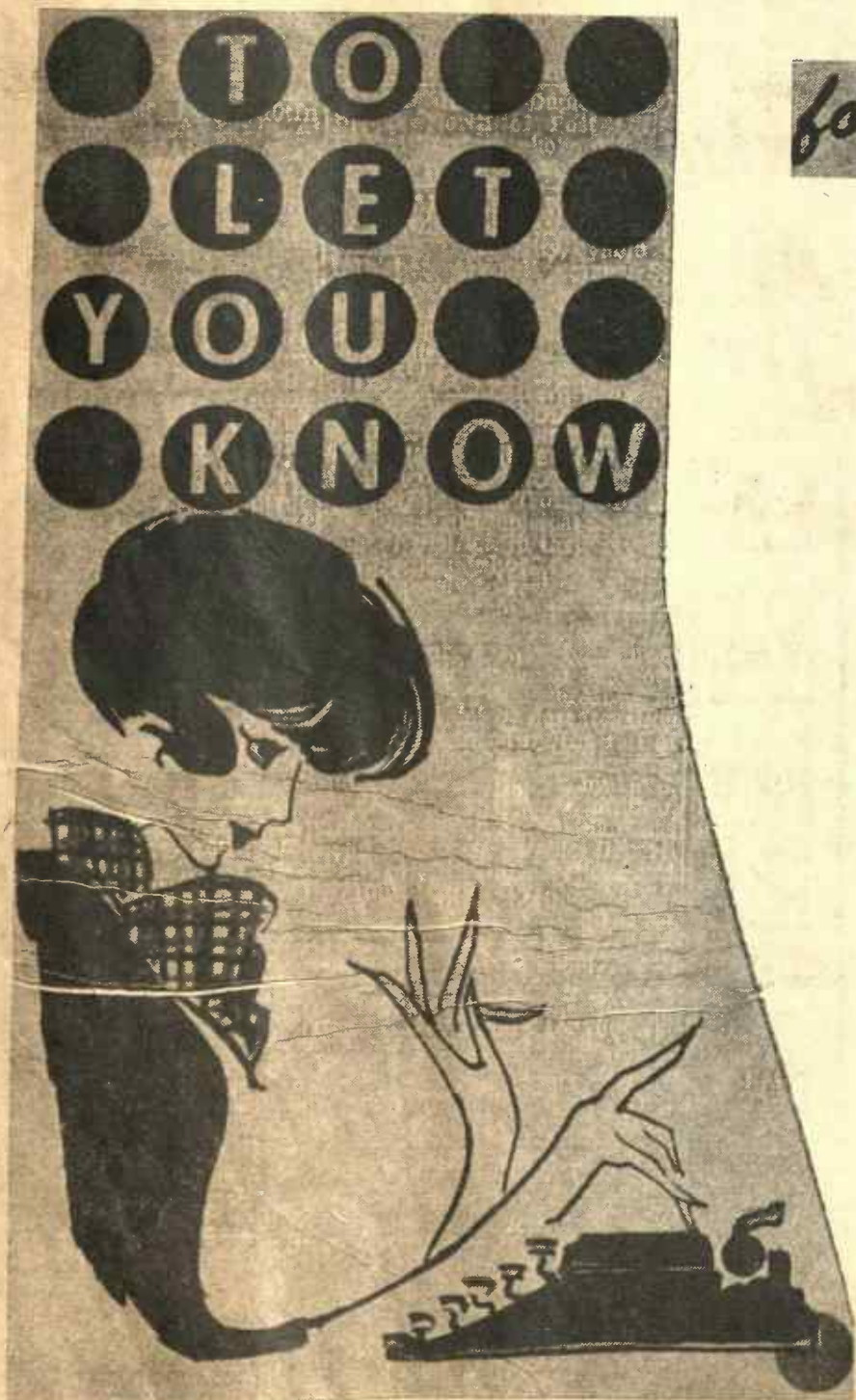

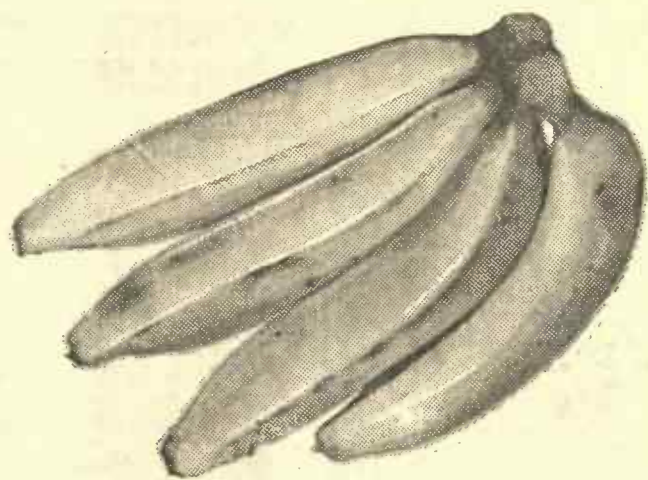

NOTICE TO SCHOOL PATRONS OF IUKA SPECIAL MUNICIPAL SCHOOL DISTRICT

The Board of Trustees of the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District, in their regular meeting on July 13, 1965, voted unanimously to revise the original plan of compliance with the Civil Rights Act of 1964 to include four grades for initial desegregation, and to add four grades each year thereafter so that complete desegregation may be achieved by the fall of 1967, thus meeting minimum requirements laid down by U. S. Commissioner of Education, Francis Keppel. The plan has been approved by the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.

These excerpts from the plan give the more significant details for public information:

"The Board of Trustees proposes the desegregation of Grades 1, 2, 3 and 4 for the Session 1965-66. . . . After the initial desegregation of (these grades) the Board then proposes the desegregation of Grades 5, 6, 7, 8 in 1966-67, and Grades 9, 10, 11, 12 in 1967-68, thus accomplishing total desegregation by the target date of 1967. . . . The type of the desegregation plan selected is 'Freedom of Choice', with the clear understanding that once a grade area is opened to desegregation, freedom of choice will continue in that area each subsequent year. . . . No child who is entitled to transportation under the School Laws of the State of Mississippi will be denied, on the basis of

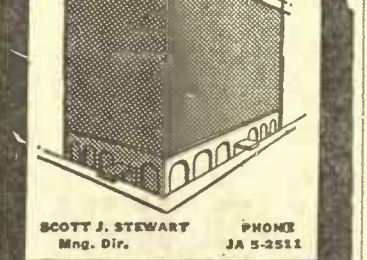

THE BIBLE SPEAKS
International Uniform Sunday School Lessons
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN
God Accessible
Lesson for August 8, 1965

Background Scripture: Mark 1:35; Acts 2:46-47; Colossians 3:16-17; Hebrews 10:19-23.
Devotional Reading: Psalm 84:1-10.

EVERYBODY HAS a god of some kind. What we worship has all the marks of God, or a god. Even the professed atheist has a god of sorts. Martin Luther remarked once: whatever a man hangs his heart on and depends on, that is his god. Sometimes a man's god is himself. Henley's poem "Invictus" shows us in a few lines the heart of a man who had been beaten up in the battles of Dr. Foreman life, but still he thanks "whatever gods there be for my unconquerable soul." It is quite clear that Henley really hung his heart on himself and depended on himself rather than any god that religious people would be thankful for.

God in the Dark
Human beings are not to be classified into believers in God on one side and non-believers on the other. The division ought to be between those who worship and serve the true God and those who worship some other kind. One of the first questions to ask if you want to find out about a man's religion would be: Is your God accessible? There have been men in all ages, probably, who believed in some sort of god but never tried to make contact with him. In darkest Africa before the white men came, the natives in many if not most tribes had two religions, as a famous missionary pointed out. They had (so to speak) their every-day religion with doll-gods called fetishes, but they were also dimly aware of a high god, a sky-god. They seldom if ever prayed to this God, they just felt he was there.

God in the Light
The ancient Hebrews, God's Covenant people, had traces of the idea of God in the dark. The room where his "seat" was in tabernacle or temple was a room without windows or lights. No one was allowed to enter that room except the high priest and he only once a year. The mystery and even terror of that God loomed strongly in the worshipper's mind. But for all that, God was also a God of light. His people could pray to him. The very fact that they made covenants or agreements with him, whether he was visible or not, showed vividly in the prophets' messages and in other ways.

God Accessible
The writer to the Hebrews, in the New Testament, makes a strong distinction between the accessibility of God as it was in older times (the days of Moses, for example) and since the coming of Christ. Instead of being a hidden god, to be reached on special occasions by special people, he now lives just beyond the door of worship. More than once in Hebrews the throne of God is mentioned, but no longer a throne in the dark. Christ is the one who has made the throne of God accessible. God is no longer the silent god; he speaks to us; and what he says can be summed up in one word: JESUS. God does indeed sit on the throne of the universe; but that throne is as near as your next prayer. Once and for all, there has come a Light of the world, and in time this Light will control and destroy the darkness. God had been known as the Creator of men, and as the Judge of men; but now he is to be known, in a transforming way, as the Companion of men. All persons long associated with one another come to be very much alike. So those who are companions or friends of Christ come to resemble him in thought and action. If a man or woman lives deeply and intimately with the Father of our Lord Jesus, seeing life as Christ saw it, living as he lived it, Christ will be shared with more and more people. If any man would master the art of living, he must meet and live with the Master of Life.

throughout his ballot. Before leaving the voting compartment, the voter shall fold his ballot without displaying the markings thereof, but so that the words Official Ballot, followed by the designation of the election district and the date of the election, shall be visible to the officers of the election. He shall then cast his ballot by handing the same to one of the managers of the election for deposit in the ballot box; this he shall do without undue delay, and as soon as he has voted, he shall quit the inclosed place at once.

A voter shall not be allowed to occupy a voting compartment already occupied by another voter, nor any compartment longer than ten minutes, if other voters be not waiting, nor longer than 5 minutes if other voters be waiting. A person shall not be allowed in the room in which the ballot boxes, compartments, tables, and shelves are, except the officers of the election and those appointed by them to assist therein.

A person shall not take or remove any ballot from the polling place before the close of the polls. If any voter spoil a ballot, he may obtain others, one at a time, not exceeding 3 in all, upon returning each spoiled one.

Any voter who declares to the managers of the election that, by reason of blindness or other physical disability, he is unable to mark his ballot, and whose declaration is not palpably untrue, shall have the assistance of one of the managers or other person of his own selection, in the marking thereof; but such person giving such assistance shall not give information in regard to the same.

Poll tax receipts are not required to be presented to the election managers at general or special elections, but the poll book should reflect that poll taxes are paid.

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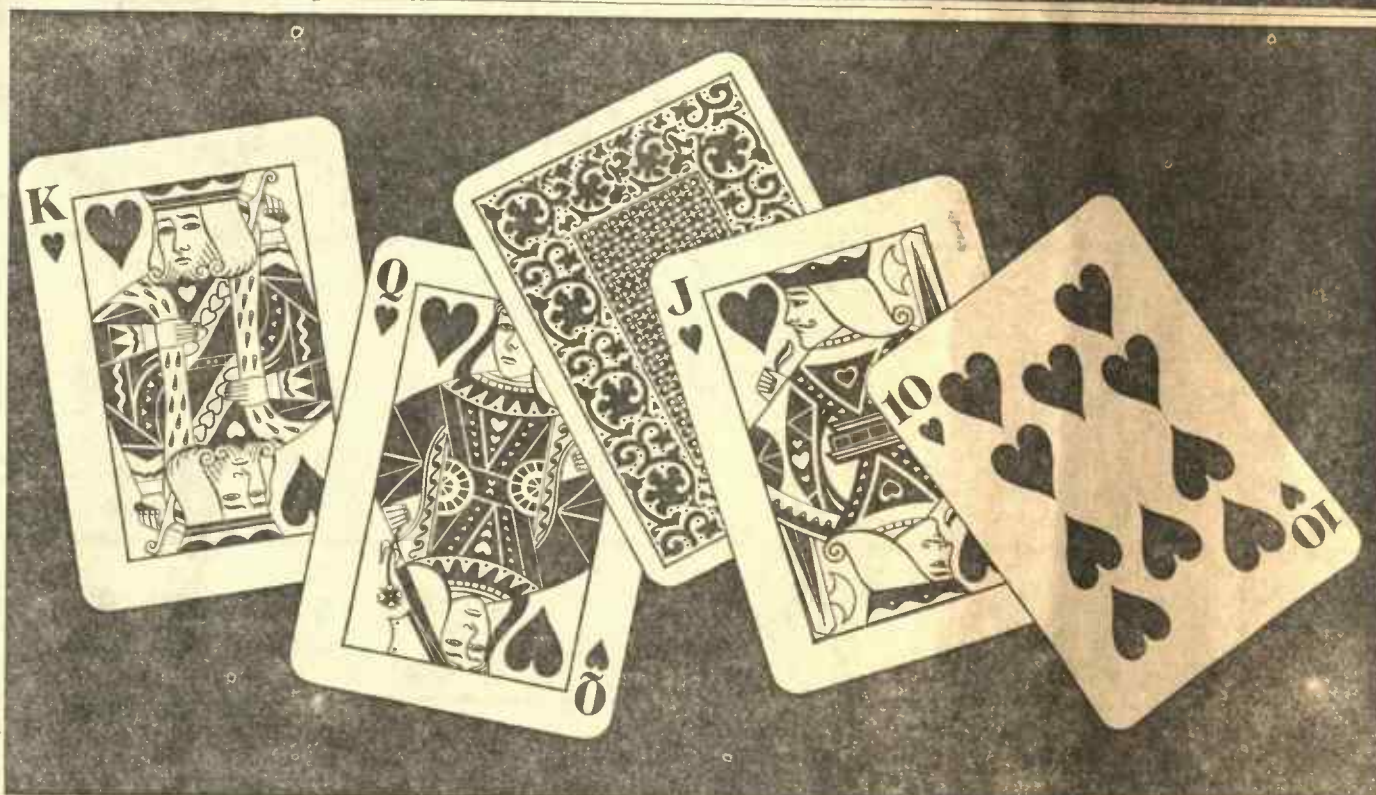
