Dean Leads
League To
Place

Foreman of the Grand Jury that
held session for two days exam-
ining witnesses, inspecting
public buildings and county of-
fice.

A text of the report made by
the Grand Jury to the court
follows:

"Now comes your grand jury
for the August 1965 term of
Circuit Court of Tishomingo
County, Mississippi, and begs
leave to submit its final report.

"We have been in session two
days, have examined 18 witness-
es, and have returned into
open court 12 true bills.

"We have examined by com-
mittee the county home, county
jail, all the factories of the
county, the movie theater, the
hotel of more than two stories,
the tax collector's books and
the county auditor's books.

"We find the county home
in good condition, except sev-
eral screen doors need repair;
and there is an odor back from
the septic tank through the
commode. We recommend that
the proper authorities be noti-
fied. We find the inmates pro-
perly provided for and looked
after otherwise.

"We find the county jail to
be in as good a state of upkeep
as could be expected under the
circumstances, and the prison-
ers properly supervised.

"We find all the factories of
the county to be in good, safe
condition, equipped properly
with exit doors opening out-
wardly as required by law and
properly marked, except Win-
field Manufacturing Company is
excessively overcrowded in the
production area.

"We find that the tax collec-
tor's books and the county audi-
tor's books appear to be neat,
well-kept and in balance.

"And now, having concluded
our labors, we respectfully re-
quest to be finally discharged."

The report was signed by
Morris E. Byram, foreman.

Two - Car Collision Fatal

Harmony Road Scene
Of Death, Wednesday

A two-car collision claimed
the life of Estelle Roberts, mother
of three children and 31
year old wife of Raymond Rob-
erts, in an early morning acci-
dent Wednesday, about 3/4 mile
west on Harmony Road.

Mrs. Roberts, who died at ap-
proximately 10 a.m. in the Em-
ergency Room of the Baptist
Hospital in Memphis, was a pas-
senger in a 1959 Chevrolet driv-
en by her husband, age 32. The
couple, residents of North Iuka,
were on their way to work at
the Tishomingo Shoe Plant
where Mr. Roberts was employ-
ed, and the Iuka Shirt Plant
where Mrs. Roberts was employ-
ed.

Mr. Roberts received facial
cuts, lacerations and possibly
chest injuries. Both he and his
wife were given first aid at the
Tishomingo County Hospital
and then carried on to Mem-
phis by Cutshall Ambulance
Service.

Lloyd H. McBride, age 30,
was driver and only occupant of
the other car, a 1965 Pontiac.
Mr. McBride, who was on his
way to McBride's Meat Plant,
received chest injuries, cuts
and bruises. He was admitted to
the Tishomingo County Hospi-
tal. He is also of Iuka.

The fatal accident was investi-
gated by the Tishomingo Coun-
ty Sheriff's Office. According to
Deputy Sheriff Kenneth Mar-
lar, Mr. Roberts stated that the
road was under construction
and was extremely dusty.

Contitutional Amendment Passed By Wide Margin

County Goes With Rest Of State
To Lower Voter Requirements

FARM BUREAU PICNIC WILL BE THIS AFTERNOON

The annual Farm Bureau

on the Tishomingo High
School campus. Activities in-

Farm Bureau families. Rep.
E. L. Boteler of Grenada
County will be the after-
noon speaker. T. E. Finch ur-
ges all Farm Bureau mem-
bers to come and bring their
families and enjoy the eats
and fellowship.

Voters of Tishomingo county
strongly endorsed constitutional
amendments Tuesday and help-
ed push across laws that will
lower previously stiff voter reg-
istration requirements in Mis-
sissippi. The amendments pass-
ed by almost three to 1.

Latest returns from over the
state gave 121,112 for the
amendment and 45,439 against.

The margin of victory was
even greater in Tishomingo
county than elsewhere in the
state. A complete returns 1,231

voted for the amendment and
117 voted against.

The amendment had the
strong support of Governor
Paul Johnson who said Tuesday
night that the affirmative vote
given was "evidence of the de-
sire of the people of this state
to continue a positive approach
to our problems."

School Bells Ring For Iuka Students, Wed.

Registration Schedule Given
With Roster of Teachers Listed

The 1965-66 Session of Iuka
Public Schools will begin Wed-
nesday, September 25, at 8:00
o'clock, when Grades 1, 2, 3, 4
assemble in the Elementary
Wing of the School building for
the purpose of registration, ac-
cording to H. L. Shook, School
Superintendent. Faculty mem-
bers will be available to regis-
ter these children until 11:30,
after which the first general fa-
culty meeting will be held.

Although all bus routes will
run on this date, only children
in the designated grades will
be permitted to ride. In fact, all

other pupils, and all adults ex-
cept parents of children in the
first and second grades are re-
quested to remain away from
the building and off school
grounds during the registration
of these desegregated grades.

On Thursday, August 26,
from 8:00 to 12:00, students in
grades 5 and 6 in the Eleme-
ntary School and 10, 11, and 12
in the High School will be reg-
istered. All school busses will
run.

On Friday, August 27, from
8:00 to 12:00, grades 7, 8 and
9 will be registered grades 1-6
and 10, 11, 12, will not report
to school, but all faculty mem-
bers will be at their posts; the
Elementary School faculty will
be in conference on the prob-
lem of dividing grades into sec-
tions. All busses will be on
their routes.

On Monday, August 30, the
high school, grades 7 through
12, will operate on a full day
schedule, 7:45 to 3:00. Text-
books will be issued and lesson
assignments made. The Eleme-
ntary School, Grades 1 through
6, will not be present this day
—elementary teachers will be
engaged in preparing text-book
cards and making up textbook
sets to be issued Tuesday. It is
hoped that the cafeteria, which
is being enlarged, will be ready
to serve the first meal on Mon-
day.

On Tuesday, August 31, the
regular schedule will be in op-
eration, the daily session begin-
ning at 7:45.

Monday, September 6, has
been declared a holiday by the
School Board, since this is La-
bor Day.

The children of R. J. Gann honored their father Sunday in celebration of his 67th birthday.

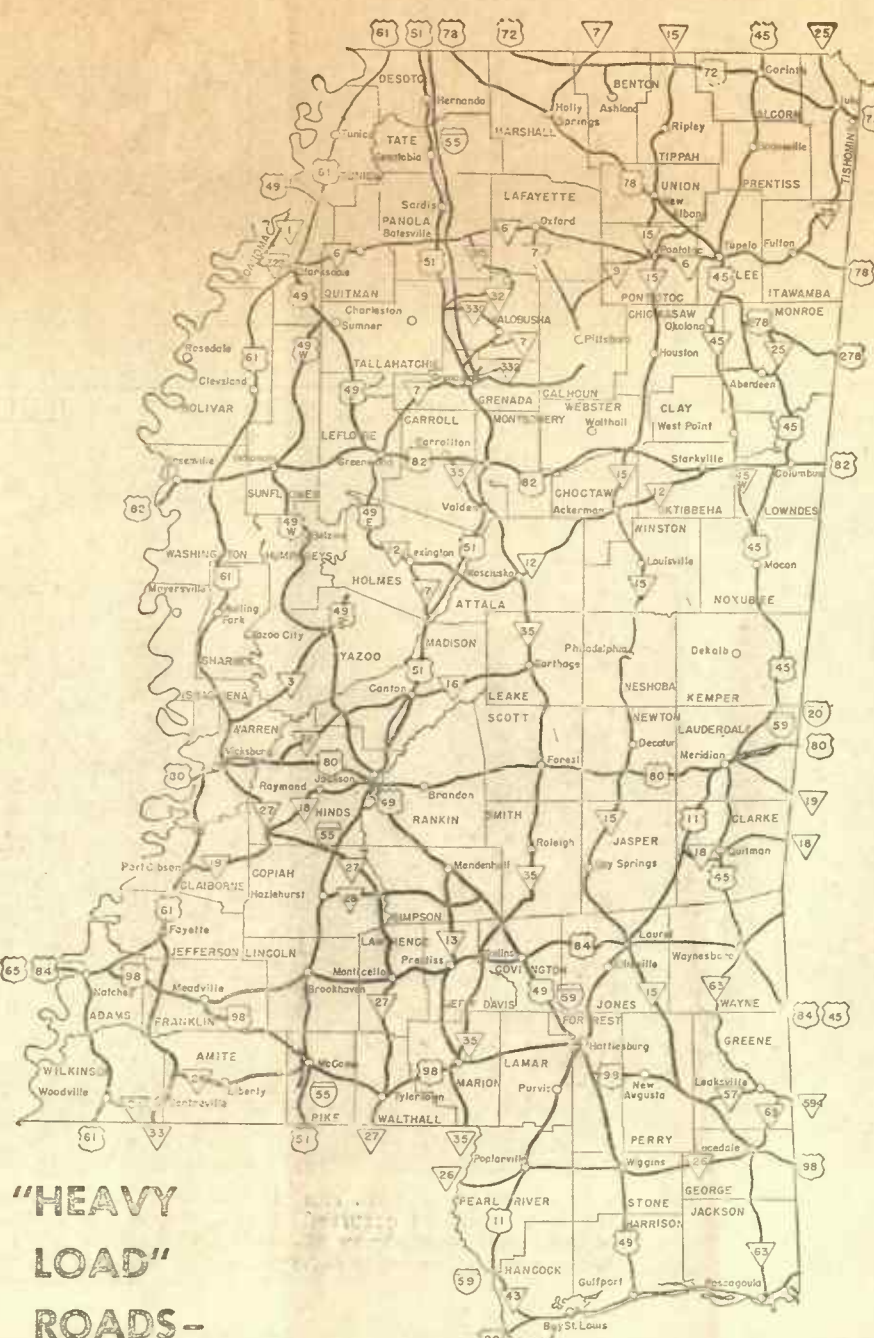

Use Dishwashing Detergent

To operate successfully, your dishwasher depends on very hot water, a suitable detergent and the striking force of the water. Your laundry detergent should not be used in your dishwasher. Even a low-sudsing laundry detergent generates some suds that cushion the striking force of the water, thereby hindering

satisfactory performance. Because dishwasher detergents do not normally touch hands or skin, they can be much stronger than laundry detergents, and are therefore much more capable of removing food stains.

Low Calorie Peanuts

Yes, scientists are working on processing a peanut that contains 75 percent fewer calories, yet retains its good flavor and high protein content. Through a simple process they are pressing 80 percent of the oil from the peanuts.

To do this they put shelled peanuts into a hydraulic press to remove most of the oil. The pressed nuts become flat and misshapen, but return to their original shape and size when soaked in water. Salt, sugar and other flavoring can be added during soaking. After nuts are dried, they are ready for eating.

Several manufacturers are now studying the possibilities of retailing this product developed by USDA scientists.

It's better to catch food drips before they reach the oven floor. Make it a habit to place a cookie sheet or strip of foil under pies and casseroles to catch juices and sauces that bubble over.

Banks Are Largest Lenders To Miss. Farmers; Credit Needs Increasing

Mississippi banks were serving farmers with more credit and other financial services than any group of lenders at the beginning of this year, according to R. A. McRee, Jr., President of Iuka Guaranty Bank, who represents the Mississippi Bankers Association as Tishomingo County Agricultural Key Banker. During 1964, the state's banks maintained their leadership in agricultural credit services.

Based on the 24th annual farm lending summary of the Agricultural Committee of The American Bankers Association, Mr. McRee reported that at the beginning of the year, Mississippi banks were helping farmers with \$139 million in loans, 20 per cent more than a year previous. This total included \$72 million in production loans and \$67 million in farm mortgages. At the same time, \$124 million in farm loans was held by life insurance companies; \$64 million by the Federal Land banks; \$44 million by Production Credit Associations; and \$17 million in nonreal estate loans plus \$38 million in real estate loans by the Farmers Home Administration. About 54 percent of the production credit extended by lending institutions to Mississippi farmers came from banks.

Mr. McRee said that bankers in Mississippi are conscious of the large capital investments required in agriculture today and are making a concerted effort through improved lending programs to meet these changing credit demands of the state's farmers.

The increased use of credit by farmers, according to Mr. McRee, has been accompanied by a substantial gain in the total assets of farm families. Therefore, in the aggregate, the equity position of farmers, contrary to public opinion, is being maintained at a satisfactory level.

Increase In Tuberculosis; 728 New Cases

Tuberculosis continues to increase in Mississippi, according to the State Board of Health.

Dr. J. T. Hamrick, Supervisor of Tuberculosis Control, said that 728 new cases were diagnosed and reported from January to July.

"If the trend established continues, we can expect upwards of 1400 new cases of tuberculosis in 1965," said Dr. Hamrick.

Last year 1300 new cases were found as compared to 947 in 1963; 747 in 1962; and 695 in 1961, an all-time low.

Dr. Hamrick states that the increase in this highly infectious disease is occurring in spite of marked improvement in all phases of the control program.

Everyone should have a tuberculosis test or an x-ray at least once a year, according to Dr. Hamrick. These services are available at the local health department, as well as from private physicians.

"We are seeing a tremendous amount of tuberculosis in older people. On the other hand, an unusually high number of children in the 5 to 9 year age group are victims also," reported the public health specialist.

School Officials Tighten Reigns In Need To Obtain Health Records

All students in the Iuka School System are required by the State Board of Health and by the Board of Trustees of the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District, to begin and complete the following schedule of immunizations:

3 polio shots, or, in lieu of this, 2 oral polio vaccines as administered by the County Health Department.

One positive vaccination every five years against smallpox.

A combination of diphtheria-tetanus, or of diphtheria-whooping cough-tetanus vaccine. DWT immunizations are required thus: a series of 3 shots followed by a booster every 2 years until the child is 6 years old. If after entering school, the child has not had the DWT series, then he must take a series of two DT shots with booster every two years until he is 8 years old.

May Deny Privileges

Based upon state laws and regulations, the Board of Trustees of the Iuka Schools by orders entered upon their minutes in the August and November, 1962, meetings, the Superintendent is authorized and required to deny children, who refuse to submit to these immunizations, the privilege of attending school. They will, of course, be admitted upon compliance with regulations.

The Superintendent's office, according to H. L. Shook, has tried to be considerate and patient with parents in meeting these requirements; still, some health records have been most difficult to obtain. As the school system grows and the number of students increases, it is more necessary than ever to protect the health of all of the children by requiring the proper health record to be submitted promptly.

Parents will be given one notice at stated times during the year that a scheduled vaccination is overdue; if within 7 days a properly certified statement has not been received from a physician or the local health authorities that this vaccination has been taken, the child will not be allowed to attend school until he has complied or a properly certified and acceptable reason for delay, submitted.

Beginners' Health Records

Parents of beginners are hereby given notice that by September 30, their children must have had the following:

(1) 3 polio "shots" or 2 oral polio vaccines, should have been completed. If they have not, a beginning or proper continuation must be made during this period.

(2) A positive smallpox vaccination if none has been taken or if 5 years have lapsed since one was taken.

(3) (a) If the original series of DWT has been taken, then the required booster shot for the year, if due.

(b) If the original series of DWT has not been taken, as well as the required boosters, then the beginning D-T shots, which must be followed by the booster at the required time through age 8.

On or about September 30, parents of all pupils whose required shots have not been taken will be so notified. This will be the first and final notice. Seven days will be granted for these to be taken, after which the pupil will be excluded from school until such time as the Superintendent receives proper certification that the required vaccinations have been had.

7-Day Grace Period

Similar notice will be given in late December or early January to parents for whose children vaccination has in the meantime come due but has not been taken. One notice will again be given with a 7-day grace period, after which the child will be denied school attendance unless the required shots be taken.

Two similar notices will be given in the 2nd semester.

Exceptions to health requirements can be made on only two conditions:

(1) Submission of a doctor's certificate that the required vaccination would be dangerous to the health and safety of the child.

(2) Submission of the certificate of a recognized officer of the church to which and/or his family belongs that vaccination is contrary to the church's teaching and belief.

Emphasizing the growing need of adequate protection of children's health, school officials earnestly request full cooperation of all parents in this matter. It is a tremendous task to compile and keep updated health records of over a thousand children.

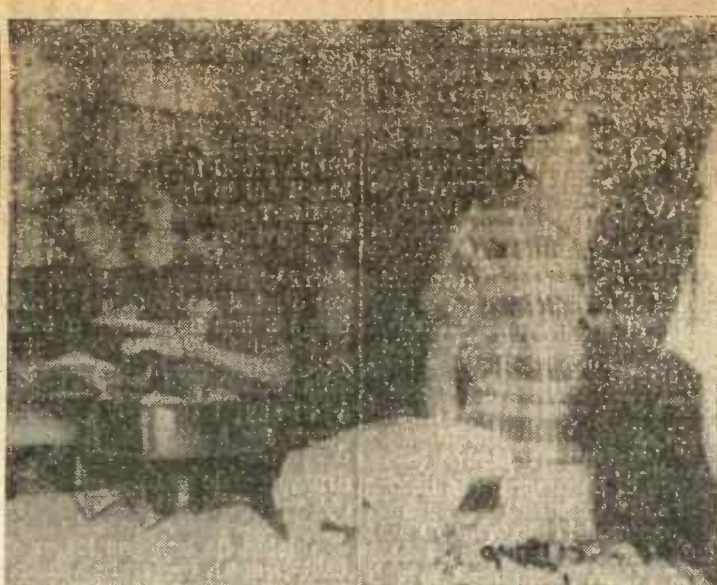

The annual fall sale of the Mississippi Yorkshire Association will be held in the Animal Husbandry Service Building at Mississippi State University on September 3.

Offered will be 40 open gilts and 15 top boars. A show of hogs will be held at 10 a.m. and the sale will begin at 1 p.m.

Quality Pork
Not only good tasting, today's pork is a real good meat. It has more lean and less fat. It has 22 percent more protein, 57 percent less fat and 36 percent fewer calories!

Pork helps tone the nervous system as it contains thiamine. A 3 1/2-ounce serving of pork can provide an adult with 70 percent of his daily thiamine needs and 40 percent of his daily protein needs.

Today's pork meets the requirements of many low cat diets.

Many of the improvements in pork are direct results of the trend toward producing lean, meatier hogs. Keep it up!

Liming Pasture
Want good pastures? If yours are low in lime content, you must apply lime to get the right mixture of grass and clover or even just have good grass.

On land that has not been limed lately, put out a ton to the acre. If you will lime 20 to 25 percent of your land each year, you can get over the whole place in five years. This is economical.

Now while land is dry enough for trucks to get over the pastures is a good time to put out the lime. If you do not know whether or not your land needs lime, try a soils test.

Soybean Weed Control
Heavy infestation of coffeebeans or cocklebur in soybean fields can cause serious reductions in bean yields. Moderate to heavy stand of coffeebeans will reduce yields of soybeans eight to 21 bushels per acre.

For control of coffeebeans a 2, 4 - D impregnated wax bar is recommended. Six bars are attached to the boom on a tractor or highboy and applied to coffeebeans that are growing 12 to 18 inches above the soybeans. Adjust the bars to run two or three inches above the soybeans and do not allow them to touch the soybeans at any time.

When using the bars, avoid quick stops and fast turning. When moving from field to field, remove the bars from the boom. Reasons for this is that bars may be damaged by excessive shaking or jolting, especially on hot days.

For more information on use of the 2, 4-D bars, see your local County Agent.

Use In Social Security Benefits is \$75,000 More In County Annually

Amendments to the Social Security Law which President Johnson signed into law will immediately increase the amount of Social Security benefits paid to Tishomingo County residents by \$75,000 annually.

Hugh Tigrett, Social Security District Manager, said the increase in Social Security benefits will be first in the September, 1965, check and the October 3, and the January through the April checks.

The check representing payments will be made to each of the beneficiaries retroactive to the date of payment for January, 1965. August will average \$52,000 in Tishomingo County. Tigrett pointed out that this money will be paid immediately and, therefore, have some effect on the economy of this area.

Persons shown above the age of 65, who have increased in September, subsequent months will receive major changes in Social Security Law. These changes are:

Child beneficiaries between 18 and 22 who are in school attendance will be added to Social Security benefits. In addition, the child attains age 18 if regularly enrolled in school. Benefits will continue until the child's 22nd birthday.

New law permits widows new benefits at age 60. Widows with dependent children would take advantage of this change.

Amount of work needed to qualify has been reduced for people over age 72. Women over 72 can qualify with as little as 3 years of coverage.

Change which liberalizes disability requirements will benefit for a substantial number of men and women. This change, disabled persons had to be under a permanent disability. The change provides that a worker can now qualify for monthly benefits provided he is under a disability which has lasted or can be expected to last for a continuous period of not less than 12 calendar months.

Tigrett emphasized that people presently receiving Social Security benefits need not contact the Social Security Office about the 7% increase. This increase will be made automatically by the Social Security Administration. However, widows who wish to start their benefits at age 60, child beneficiaries between age 18 and 22, people over 72 who did not have enough work under Social Security to qualify under the old law but who have some work should get in touch with the Social Security Office and file a claim for these benefits. Also he pointed out that anyone who felt he met the new disability requirements and had not already done so should contact the office and file a claim.

Beginning July 1, 1966 people age 65 or over will have hospital insurance protection under Social Security. This insurance will be financed through additional Social Security taxes and will provide in-patient hospital services, post hospital extended care, home health services and out-patient hospital diagnostic services. Also beginning July 1, 1966, the law will provide for a voluntary medical insurance plan supplementing the hospital insurance. This phase of the law will cover physicians' services, home health services and many other medical and health services, both in and out of medical institutions. The supplemental plan for medical expenses is strictly voluntary. However, it will cost each person \$3 per month to participate in this plan. Social Security beneficiaries who enroll in this plan will have their \$3 deducted from their Social Security check.

In commenting on the hospital and medical insurance benefits now provided under the Social Security Law, Tigrett reminded people over 65 that no payments under this law will be made before July 1, 1966. Between now and that date, but not before September 1, 1965, the Social Security Administration will issue the necessary identification cards for the hospital insurance benefits and also give everyone an opportunity to enroll for the medical insurance benefits.

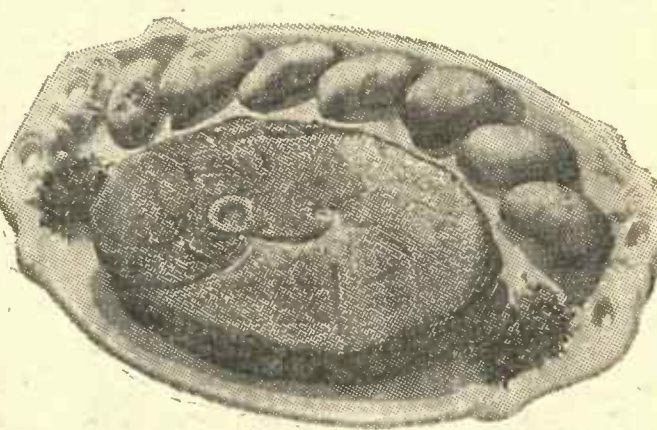

NOTICE TO SCHOOL PATRONS OF IUKA SPECIAL MUNICIPAL SCHOOL DISTRICT

The Board of Trustees of the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District, in their regular meeting on July 13, 1965, voted unanimously to revise the original plan of compliance with the Civil Rights Act of 1964 to include four grades for initial desegregation, and to add four grades each year thereafter so that complete desegregation may be achieved by the fall of 1967, thus meeting minimum requirements laid down by U. S. Commissioner of Education, Francis Keppel. The plan has been approved by the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.

These excerpts from the plan give the more significant details for public information:

'The Board of Trustees proposes the desegregation of Grades 1, 2, 3 and 4 for the Session 1965-66. After the initial desegregation of (these grades) the Board then proposes the desegregation of Grades 5, 6, 7, 8 in 1966-67, and Grades 9, 10, 11, 12 in 1967-68, thus accomplishing total desegregation by the target date of 1967. The type of the desegregation plan selected is 'Freedom of Choice', with the clear understanding that once a grade area is opened to desegregation, freedom of choice will continue in that area each subsequent year. No child who is entitled to transportation under the School Laws of the State of Mississippi will be denied, on the basis of race, color, or national origin, the privilege of riding a bus to the school of his choice.

The Board of Trustees gives unqualified assurance that in submitting freedom of choice to the patrons of the school district... school personnel will bring no pressure or threats to bear to influence decisions. No pupils residing in the district will be required to attend public school out-of-district; permission to do so will not be denied on the basis of race.

Parents, guardians, or persons in loco parentis, of pupils in Grades 1, 2, 3, 4, will receive by mail notice of registration, specific instructions as to procedures, and a form by which to indicate the choice of a school for 1965-66. These grades will be registered on Wednesday, August 25, between the

hours of 8:00 and 11:30. School buses will run on this date, but for this occasion, pupils of no other grades will be allowed on the buses or on school grounds. Only the parents of pupils in the first and second grades will be permitted to accompany their children for registration.

If any parent of children in the desegregated grades 1, 2, 3, 4, should fail to receive said notice and instructions, he is urged to notify Mr. Shook's office at once.

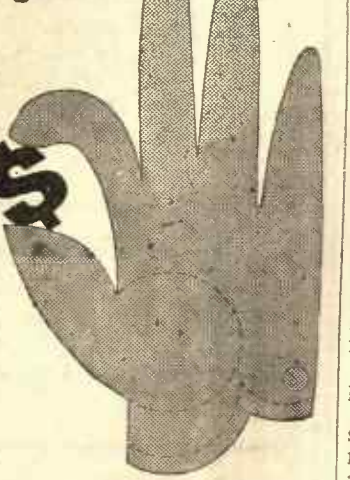

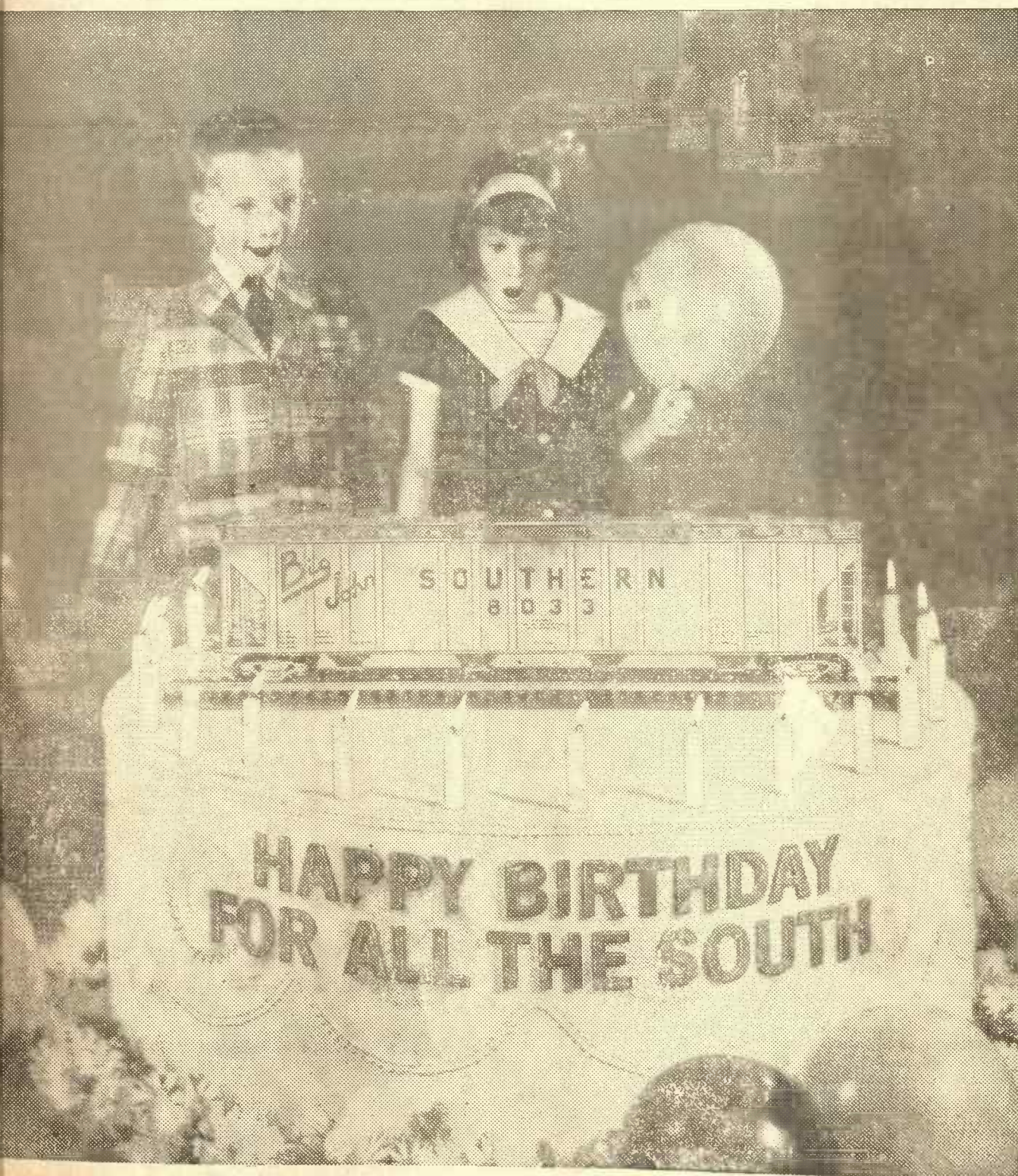

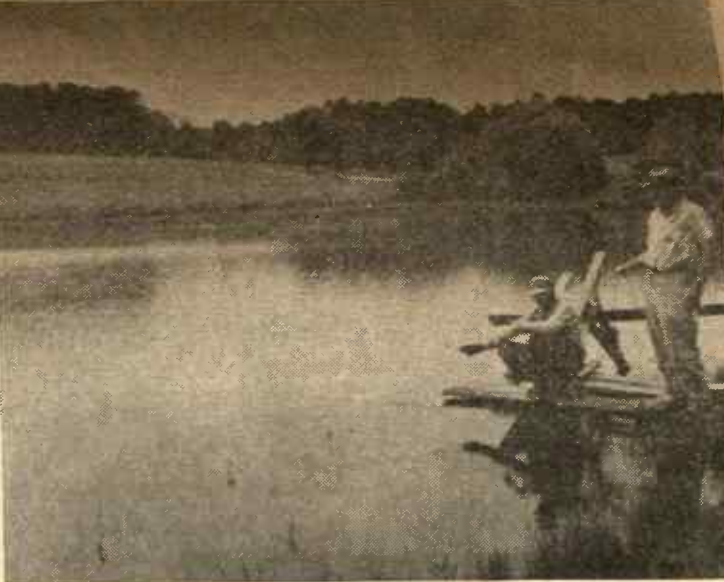

Overnight Delivery On Parcel Post Offered By Post Office Department

A new Scheduled Service system which provides overnight delivery of ZIP Coded parcel post five days a week between some 600 offices in 75 counties centered in and around Memphis, overlapping into Mississippi, Arkansas, covering more than 37,000 square miles, was announced today by Postmasters throughout Tishomingo County.

Principal cities in the area are Memphis, Jackson, and McKenzie in Tennessee; Greenville, Grenada and Tupelo in Mississippi; Jonesboro and West Memphis in Arkansas and Sikeston in Missouri. Some 2 1/2 million people will be served by the new program.

Deputy Assistant postmaster General A. C. Hahn discussed details of the plan recently in Memphis in a ceremony to commemorate the fourth anniversary of the Memphis Mail User's Council.

Mr. Hahn emphasized that the success of the program depends to a large extent on precision timing in the transferring of bulk mails at major cities thru out the Memphis area. The Memphis system forms the southern nucleus for an eventual nation-wide tie-in of scheduled service areas which will result in dependable scheduled delivery for parcel post from coast to coast, he stated.

Extensive testing has assured the success of this dramatic new program, which in effect offers first-rate service for 4th-class mail. Mailing deadlines for this service will be 5 p.m.

The Post Office Department

found through extensive study that one of the major problems of the parcel post service has been the lack of dependability of delivery. For many mailers, it is often more important to know when a parcel is going to be delivered than it is just to get it there in a hurry. For these reasons, the Post Office Department developed the concept of Scheduled Service.

In the Scheduled Service area, ZIP coded parcels will be transported to the destination post office overnight and will be delivered to the addressee on the next day of scheduled parcel delivery. In most cases, this will mean next-day parcel service, the postmasters explained, because parcel post deliveries are made five days out of the week.
