Golden Water Association Applies For Water Distribution System

Northern District Public Ser-
vice Commissioner, D. W. Sny-
der of Eupora, today announced
the filing of an application by
the Golden Water Association,
Inc. for a certificate of public
convenience and necessity to
construct, operate and maintain
a water distribution system in
the community of Golden. The

estimated \$130,000.00 project is
scheduled for hearing before
the Commission on the October
Docket.

Commissioner Snyder also
states that engineering and fea-
sibility studies, maps and other
materials have already been
submitted to the Commission
for its study and evaluation.
The association is also asking
the Commission to approve a
schedule of rates, terms and
conditions under which it will
operate.

The filing of this application
brings the total number to 190
water companies and associa-
tions operating or have applied
to operate under the jurisdic-
tion of the Public Service Com-
mission.

As of this date, the Commis-
sion has issued 20 such certifi-
cate to municipalities in the
state.

The Golden Water Associa-
tion, Inc. is headed up by Presi-
dent E. R. Warren.

were \$51,603 above July 1964.

\$388,247,000. This was .3 per-
cent above July 1964. Sales for
the first seven months of the
year were \$2,735,517,000. This
was 2.3 percent below same
period last year.

Mt. Gilead Church Destroyed By Fire; One Of Oldest In County

The Mt. Gilead Baptist Church
was completely destroyed
by fire early Friday morning.
This was the second of two
churches in Tishomingo County
destroyed last week by fires of
undetermined nature. The Sha-
dy Grove Church burned on
Tuesday afternoon, August 17.

In addition to the church, all
Sunday School records, song
books and materials were des-
troyed.

The Mt. Gilead church was
organized in December 1844 and
is one of the oldest churches in
the county. The first building
stood near the old cemetery. It
was constructed of logs. This
building was destroyed by fire.

The faith of its forefathers was
undoubtedly by their loss and
soon erected a new building
nearby. This house of worship
was used until 1941, at which
time the church had expanded
and a larger building was need-

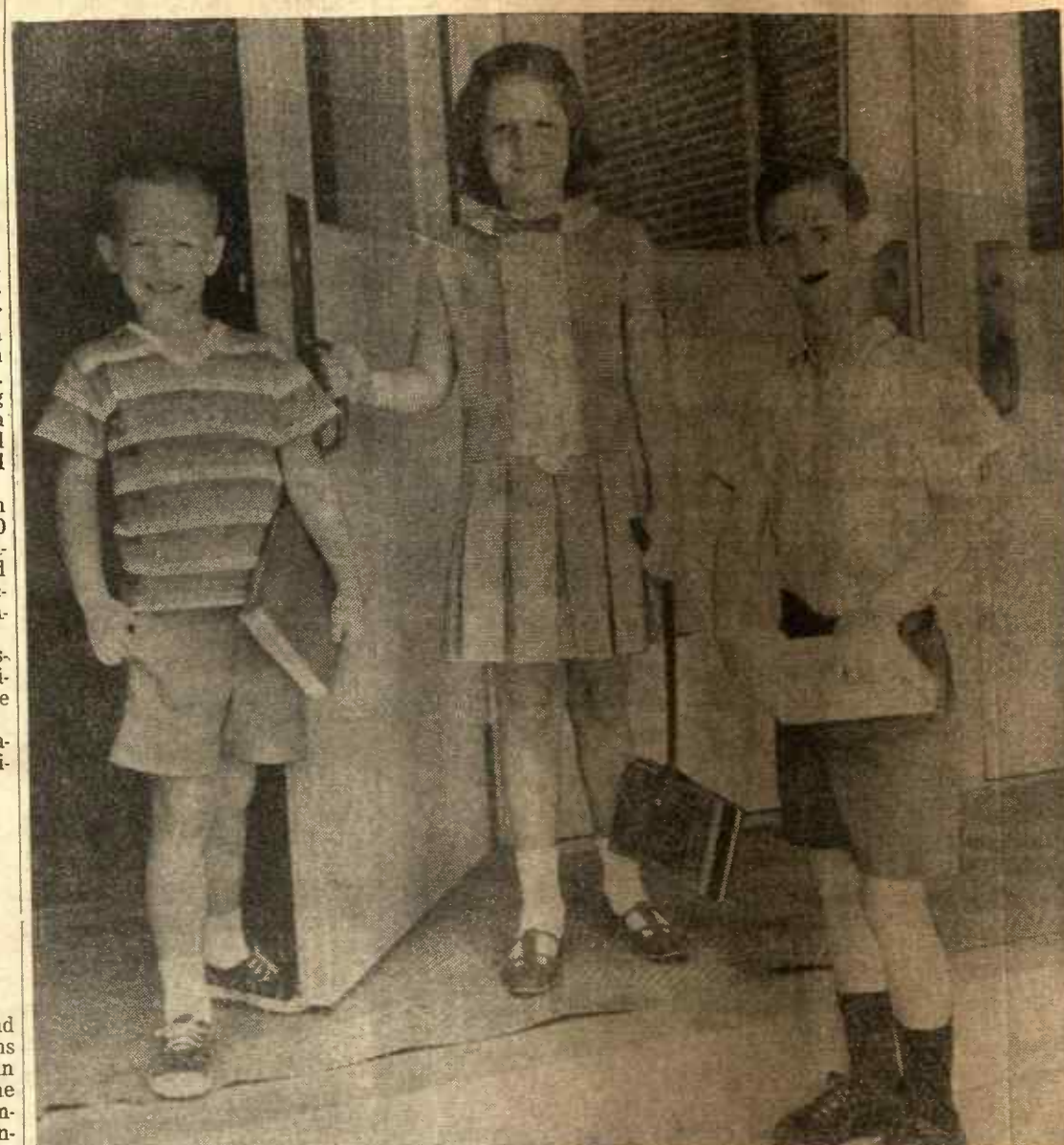
ed. A concrete block building
was erected and used until Au-
gust 20, 1965 when this build-
ing was destroyed by fire.

building this week.

Court Jury Dismissed Until Friday Morning

9 Criminal Cases Disposed Of,
12 Carried Over To Next Term

In the August term of Circuit
Court in progress at the Tisho-
mingo County Courthouse, nine
criminal cases have been dispos-
ed of and 12 continued to the
next term.

Following a short session on
Wednesday morning, the Jury
was dismissed by Circuit Court
Judge N. S. Sweat, Jr., until
Friday morning. Special venire-
men are in the process of being
selected for the case of the
State vs. Billy Dean Hubbard
which has been set for 9 A.M.
This case concerns the hit and
run accident which caused the
death of a Memphis Negro on
March 14.

Related cases, which have al-
ready come before the court are
those of the State vs. Douglas
Gray and Jessie Ray Harris,
charged as accessories to man-
slaughter. Both of these cases
were continued until the next
term of court.

Other Criminal cases disposed
of by the court since convening

on Monday, August 16, include
the following:

State vs. George Crawford, Jr.,
on a charge of assault and bat-
tery. Crawford entered a plea
of guilty. The court sentenced
him to six months in jail, in ad-
dition to a fine of \$500. The
fine and court cost was suspend-
ed pending his good behavior.

State vs. Ben Hill, in which
Hill was charged with posses-
sion of whiskey. The jury reach-
ed a decision of not guilty.

State vs. Holbert Caldwell, in
which Caldwell was charged
with assault and battery with in-
tent to kill and murder. The
jury rendered a verdict of not
guilty.

State vs. Tommy Scott Goza,
in which Goza was charged with
burglary and larceny. Defend-
ant, entering a plea of guilty,
drew a sentence of 1 year,
which was suspended indefinitely.
He was placed on probation for
1 year.

State vs. Atha Wayne Russell,
charged with burglary and lar-
ceny. Russell entered plea of
not guilty. The jury reached a
verdict of one year, indefinitely
suspended, with one year proba-
tion.

State vs. Jimmy Yarbrough,
charged with grand larceny.
Yarbrough entered a plea of
guilty and received a sentence
of 2 1/2 years, which was sus-
pended indefinitely. He was
placed on probation for three
years.

State vs. Tommy Wayne Ep-
person, charged with burglary
and larceny on two separate
charges. The sentence was in-
definitely deferred on good be-
havior of the defendant.

Most important of the Civil
Suits brought before the court
was that of Hugh Gregory
Sparks vs. Malone & Hyde and
Herman Little. This case end-
ed in a mistrial.

Recent Changes In Social Security Law Means Easier To Obtain Benefits

(Editor's Note: This is the second of a series of columns by Hugh Tigrett, Social Security District Manager in Tupelo, telling what the social security amendments of 1965 mean to you and your family.)

It will be easier for many residents of Tishomingo County to qualify for social security disability insurance benefits as a

result of the recent changes made in the law.

In the past, a person has been considered disabled only if his impairment was expected to be of long continued and indefinite duration. Now a person can receive disability benefits if his disability impairment is expected to last 12 months.

There is no change, however,

in the degree of impairment which is considered disabling and no change in the amount of work required for benefits. The disability work requirement generally is that a person must have social security work credit for 5 out of 10 years just before he became disabled.

Beginning in September 1965, benefits may be paid to persons who have been disabled for 6 months or longer, even if they expect to recover from their disabilities. All claims filed after June 1965, and those not yet decided as of July, will be considered under the law.

Another change in the law permits a person who has started receiving retirement benefits to become eligible for monthly disability payments if he becomes disabled before reaching age 65. Previously, a person who had reached age 62 and started receiving retirement benefits could not become eligible for disability payments even if he became disabled before reaching age 65.

Retirement benefits started before age 65 are reduced to take into account the fact that they will be paid over a longer period. If a person qualifies for disability benefits after he has started receiving reduced old-age benefits, his disability payments also will be reduced to take into account the months he receives the other benefits. If there is a reduction in the disability payment for this reason, it will generally be less than the reduction in old-age benefits. Payments under this provision can first be made for September 1965.

Anyone who has a question about this or any other provision of the social security law is in-

vited to write or phone the Social Security District Office, located in Tupelo. The telephone number is 842-6211. A representative from the Social Security Office visits the City Hall in Iuka every Monday morning. He can also answer any questions you may have on any of the new changes in the Social Security Law.
