Airport Funds Made Available By Federal Gov't.

Congressman Thos. G. Abernethy, in a telephone conversation to the editor of The Vidette, reports today that the Federal Aeronautics Agency has made a grant of \$47,201.00 for construction of the Iuka Municipal Airport.

With the acquisition of this money, final plans to build the Iuka Airport are expected to go forward.

June-July Sales Tax Collections

The City of Iuka reported a total of \$4,426.19 in Sales Tax Collections during the month of July, showing a slight decrease in comparison with the June figure of \$5,686.54.

This report, taken from a recent issue of Mississippi Municipalities, showed the Town of Belmont being the only Municipality in the area with an increase over the June collections. Belmont collected a total of \$1,742.80 in July, compared to the June figure of \$1,441.44, an increase of approximately \$300.00.

The Town of Tishomingo, collecting on the 1 percent rate, showed a total of \$614.54 during July, compared to \$744.78 in June.

Other nearby cities collecting on a 1 percent rate and their totals were: Baldwyn with \$3,579.85 in July and \$4,825.73 in June; Booneville, \$7,346.39 for July and \$9,720.88 in June; Corinth, a total of \$19,751.86 for July and \$21,875.41 in June; and Fulton, \$4,170.15 for July and \$6,000.80 in June.

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Voter Registration

Recently, Mississippians have read and have heard a great deal about voter registration. Certainly, we have all heard of the federal examiners (registrars) that have invaded our State.

Northeast Mississippi is fortunate in that no federal registrars have been sent into this area and possibly will not be here, the reason being the high proportion of the population that is white.

For this reason, Northeast Mississippians have a real opportunity to become a more potent political force in future statewide elections. Many politicians, in years to come, probably will cater to and will woo the vote of the hordes now being registered and qualified to vote in the Delta and South Mississippi regions. And naturally, the same politicians will seek the support of Northeast Mississippians. Being the predominantly white section of the State, we will have an opportunity to be the determining area in deciding the outcome of State-wide elections.

However, this can be done only if residents of Northeast Mississippi become registered and qualified to vote. As it now stands, there are thousands of good, sound solid people who are not registered to vote. They have not fully realized the responsibility of being good citizens. They have not used the privilege and have not exercised the right to vote.

It is highly important that we follow the admonitions and wishes of Governor Paul B. Johnson who has been urging all white people to register and be qualified in every way to cast a ballot.

We owe it to ourselves to use the great American privilege of going to the polls and voting. We have the secret ballot and there is almost always a choice in candidates for voters to choose from. We should express our choice in each election.

If a person fails to vote, then those men who are elected to office are not his representatives because the non-voter had no part in placing them in office.

It is, in many cases, the habit of Americans — and Mississippians are no exception — to fuss and gripe about the public officials failing to perform their duties. But how can a person, who does not vote, feel that he should criticize the public office holders if he did not use his own personal right to vote for or against the office holder.

As good citizens we should register and do whatever is necessary to become eligible to vote. In addition, we should speak to our relatives, friends and neighbors and urge them to become qualified to cast a ballot.



PUT THIS IN A COMPUTER AND SEE WHAT YOU'LL GET

It's about time for somebody to knock down the notion that only highly educated young people are now fit to run the world.

Ralph W. Smathers, a recently retired executive, thinks he can do it.

"A lot of inane conversation," he says, "is leading the country to believe that the technological developments of recent years have left people in their 50's and 60's hopelessly behind. Some business spokesmen, and even a U.S. cabinet officer, have implied that the older people have such meager and such outmoded education they had just about as well get on out of the way and let the college kids take over."

"Well, that's pretty cute when you consider that most of the whiz-kids are taking their orders from oldsters who never looked inside a computer — and don't have to."

Mr. Smathers says a good many young intellectuals think the technological revolution is new, and that they discovered it. "While as a matter of fact the man who is now age 65 has been traveling with it all his life."

"Take the delivery man with his horse and dray. Think what a crisis he faced when the gasoline truck came along. But he adapted to the contraption and survived. Just as the blacksmith adapted to the garage, and the buggy salesman to the used car lot."

"And nobody went around claiming these 'victims' of technological progress were outdated and should be cast aside..."

Mr. Smathers believes the changes a person now 65-years-old has lived through in his or her lifetime are about as profound as

those taking place now. "They didn't have all the electronic tubes and flashing lights, and were not so complex," he says, "but they were dramatic. And we learned to conquer them."

"The person now in the 60's has gone from the horse and wagon to the train, to the automobile, to busses, to flying machines, to super-highways, and to jets. What transition!"

"That same person has gone from oil lamps to electricity, from gramophones to television, from ice boxes to freezers, from pasteboards fans to air conditioning, from crepe de Chine to nylon, from stovewood to gas."

"And do you remember the bookkeeper with his green eyeshade, his bottle of ink, and fine Spencerian hand? Reflect on the drama that typewriters and office machines brought to him. And what about the hand-set printer when the linotype came along?"

"Don't tell me any nonsense about people who have conquered all these things not being able to conquer a computer."

A fallacy in the yak-yak about anybody past age 45 now being outdated, according to Mr. Smathers, is the idea that a modern man has to understand the technological changes. Some people do, in order to build and operate them. But everybody else just uses them. "Probably fewer than one per cent of all people understand a modern eight-cylinder auto, or the workings of an electric light. But does it matter? We know where to buy them and get them repaired... and we know how to use them..."

Nice Place For Leisure Time

Thanks to assistance of the Soil Conservation Service in planning of a recreational area, employees of Belmont Blue Bell have no worry of where to spend their leisure hours, where to have their barbecues, or various plant gatherings.

In 1954, at the wish of Plant Superintendent Murray Adams, SCS workers began with establishing the area on a 70 acre tract of land a few miles west of Belmont.

According to Hiram A. Jones, Work Unit Conservationist, a large earthen dam was constructed to impound about 7 acres of water to be used for swimming, boating and fishing. He noted that the local SCS also obtained fish for the pond.

Lespedeza Bi-Color was planted in an area near the dam for quail food. Mr. Jones continued. Adding a note or beauty to the landscape, wild flowering shrubs were left in the surrounding woods and den trees were also left for squirrels.

Over a period of time, a club house was constructed and outside barbecue pits were built, thus providing an excellent place for plant social gatherings.

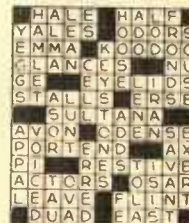
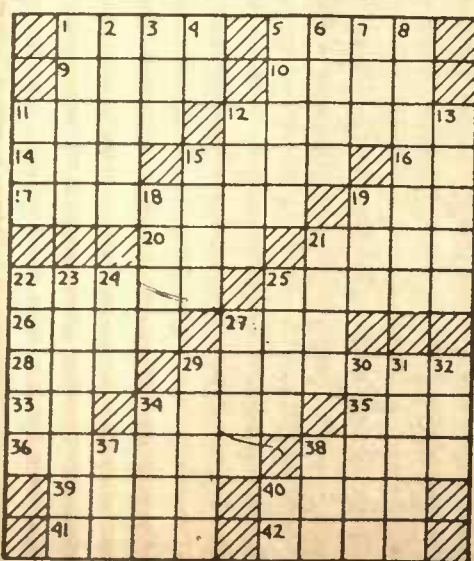

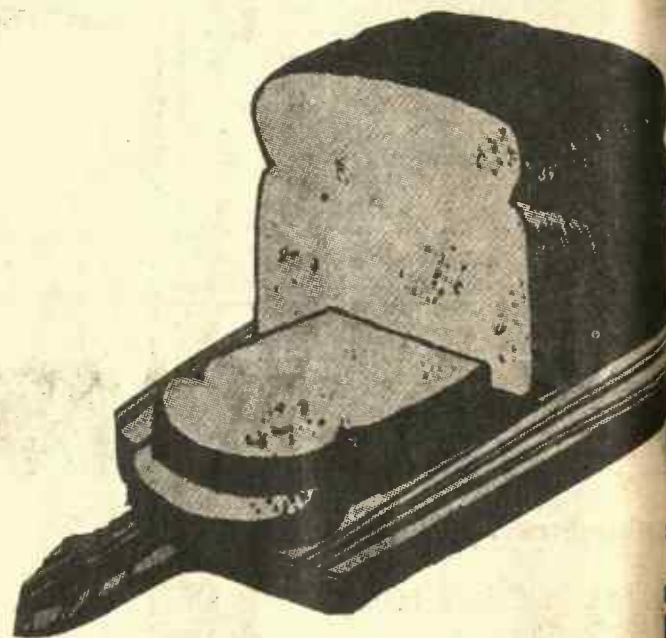

Additional Safety Devices Now Required For Water Heaters

All water heaters need protective devices in addition to the regular operating thermostat. They need to be protected against both excessive temperature and pressure. Many water heaters now in use DO NOT have adequate safety equipment.

2. The installation of a listed pressure relief valve along with the UL approved high-limit switch. (This high-limit switch will be standard on UL approved models after October 15, 1965.)

Either of these types will offer the protection you and your family need.

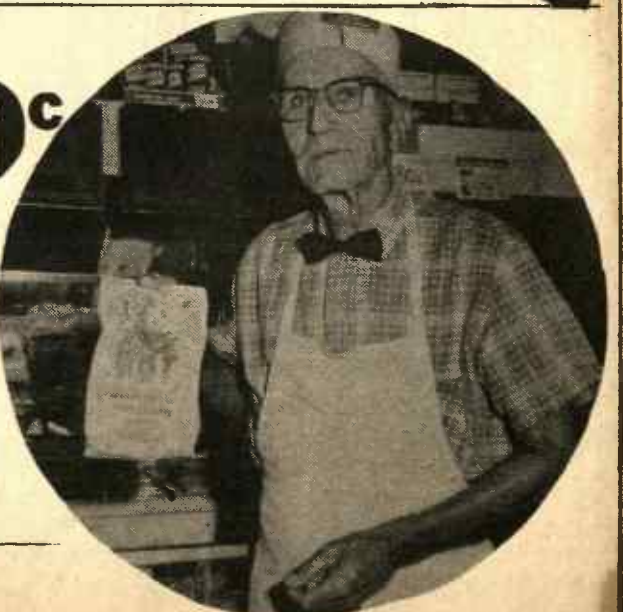

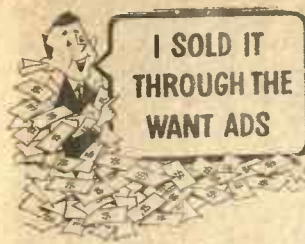

Tupelo, Mississippi, telling what the social security amendments of 1965 mean to you and your family.)

The Social Security Amendments of 1965 include several provisions especially for women, and it's important for women to know what they mean.

Besides health insurance for the aged, there are many major changes in the old-age, survivors, and disability insurance program. Of these changes, three affect women directly, and the others all have a "woman's angle."

The three provisions that apply most directly to women are: payment of reduced benefits to widows as early as the age of 60; wife's and widow's benefits for divorced women who were married at least 20 years before the divorce; and benefits for women 72 or older who were not eligible for benefits before this because they or their husbands had not worked long enough under social security.

What do these and other changes in the social security law mean to women in Tishomingo County? They mean that a large number of widows no longer have to wait until they reach 62 to start receiving social security benefits.

They also mean that some divorced women may get wife's benefits, and that some surviving divorced wives may receive widow's benefits even after they are no longer caring for their former husbands' children. Many women in Tishomingo County who are 72 or over

may be eligible for special benefits of up to \$35 a month. If a woman is 73 and her husband is 76 or older, they may be able to get these benefits with as little as 3/4 of a year of work credit under social security.

Finally, I'd like to remind waitresses, beauticians, and other service workers that they will soon get social security credit for their cash tips. The new law requires that tips amounting to \$20 or more in a month be reported to the employer, and that the social security tax on them be paid. This change goes into effect January 1, 1966.

Further information about these and other changes in the social security law is available at your social security office. The people there will be glad to answer any questions you may have and provide you with explanatory material about any of the new changes.

The TV screen is much brighter than a movie screen. You therefore need more light in the room than in a movie theater. When the light in the room is almost the same intensity as the television screen, you'll have the least eye strain.

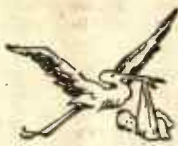

Capitol Records has several albums out paying tribute to one of its greatest stars, the late Nat King Cole. In The Nat King Cole Song Book, the Hollyridge Strings and Stu Phillips offer a musical tribute with instrumental versions of some of his biggest and most unforgettable hits: Nature Boy, Mona Lisa, Too Young, Ramblin' Rose, The Christmas Song, Answer Me, My Love, Those Lazy, Hazy-Crazy Days of Summer. Somewhere Along the Way, Pretend, It's Only a Paper Moon and others.

Nat first organized his trio in 1937 but it wasn't until 1943 that the group became one of the most popular threesomes in the country. Between 1944-48 the King Cole Trio was repeatedly named best small combo in the country in magazine polls. In Capitol's release on Nat King Cole Trio, all the songs but one feature the group that consisted of Nat on piano, Oscar Moore on guitar and Johnny Miller on bass.

These men recorded the group's first great nationwide hit, Straighten Up and Fly Right in 1943.

The songs on the LP date back to '43. Gee Baby, Ain't I Good to You, Embraceable You, Body and Soul, The Man I Love, I'm Through With Love, You Call It Madness, Smoke Gets in Your

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Eves, I'll Never Be the Same. These Foolish Things, Moonlight in Vermont and For All We Know. Both albums are well worth having to remember an era of good music and real talent. In Red Roses for a Blue Lady, Wayne Newton follows his single

hit with an album of the same name that contains 10 other songs in addition to the smash title tune. Also following a single success, Peggy Lee does an album based on her solo hit, Pass Me By with interpretations of several other recent hit songs.

Little Mountain Park To Be Renamed After Former Mississippi Congressman Jeff Busby

The scenic Little Mountain Park on the Natchez Trace Parkway in Choctaw County, Mississippi, will be renamed Jeff Busby Park in honor of the late Mississippi Congressman who worked tirelessly for the Parkway's establishment, according to Secretary of the Interior Stewart L. Udall.

Secretary Udall said the renaming of the park had been suggested by Representative Thomas G. Abernethy of Mississippi, who credited Mr. Busby with initiating the effort in Congress to create a Natchez Trace Parkway over the Tennessee-Alabama-

Mississippi route made famous during the United States' early years as a nation.

Mr. Busby's represented Mississippi's Fourth Congressional District from 1923 until 1935. The park being renamed after him lies about 40 miles south of where he lived, in Houston, Mississippi.

Secretary Udall directed the National Park Service to erect an interpretive sign at the entrance to the area. After completion of the marker, appropriate ceremonies will be held at a future date to which the public will be invited to participate.

Jeff Busby Park is located on the Natchez Trace Parkway 12 miles south of U. S. Highway 82 intersection and about 75 miles south of the Parkway headquarters and visitor center at Tupelo, Mississippi. The 200 acre park, 604 feet in elevation, is the second highest point in Mississippi and is considered to offer more scenic value than any other spot on the Parkway in Mississippi. From the crest, a scenic overlook offers a view characterized by sheer slopes stretching away to the valleys and distant ridges, where the density and height of pine and hardwood forests are striking characteristics.

While the Natchez Trace Parkway was not established formally until May 18, 1938, initial construction funds were allocated under authority of the Emergency Appropriation Act of June 19, 1934. Construction was begun in 1937. When completed the Parkway will extend 450 miles from Natchez, Mississippi, 14 in Alabama, and 45 in Tennessee. The target date is 1970 for completion

of the entire Parkway, which will have 101 miles in Tennessee, 33 in Alabama, and 316 in Mississippi. The total cost will be approximately \$112,700,000.

The area, open to the public in 1960, includes a campground, several paved parking loops for house trailers, a picnic ground, and modern comfort stations. Various interpretive devices are located within the park, as well as hiking and nature trails. A private concessioner operates a gasoline station where picnic or camping supplies may be purchased.

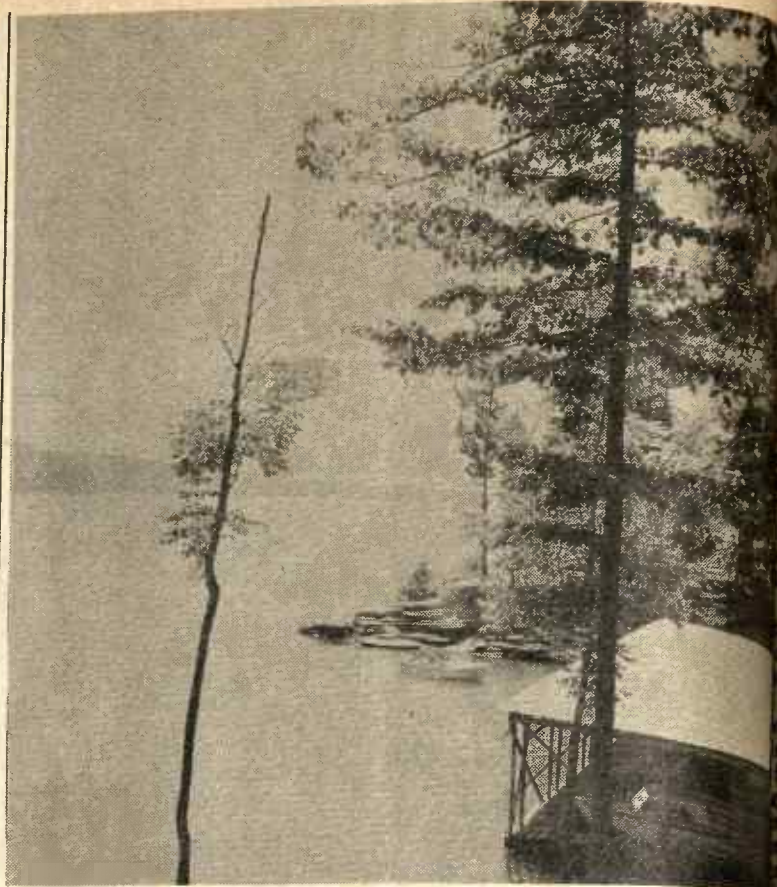
Mr. Busby's interest in the proposed historical Parkway began in his hometown of Houston, Mississippi, in the summer of 1933, some forty miles north of the Park area. After investigating the historical background of the Natchez Trace, he became convinced that a survey of the Old Trace was needed. Early in 1934 he offered 2 resolutions in the House, one authorizing the appropriation of \$50,000 to investigate the history of the Old Trace and identify its location, and the second to authorize the appropriation of \$25,000,000 for construction of the Parkway. Thsu Congressman Busby was the first member of the Tennessee, Alabama, and Mississippi delegations to suggest or propose the Parkway, and was instrumental in generating support for his project among Congressional delegations, State and municipal officials, and newspapers.

Today, about 5 million visitors are enjoying the Parkway principally because men like Congressman Busby and others envisioned such a development along the old Natchez Trace.

Searches For Jet Passengers

He is serving aboard the destroyer USS Parle which operates out of Chicago.

Coast Guard and Navy vessels, aircraft, and men from 13 units in a tri-state area picked up the search almost immediately after the crash was reported.

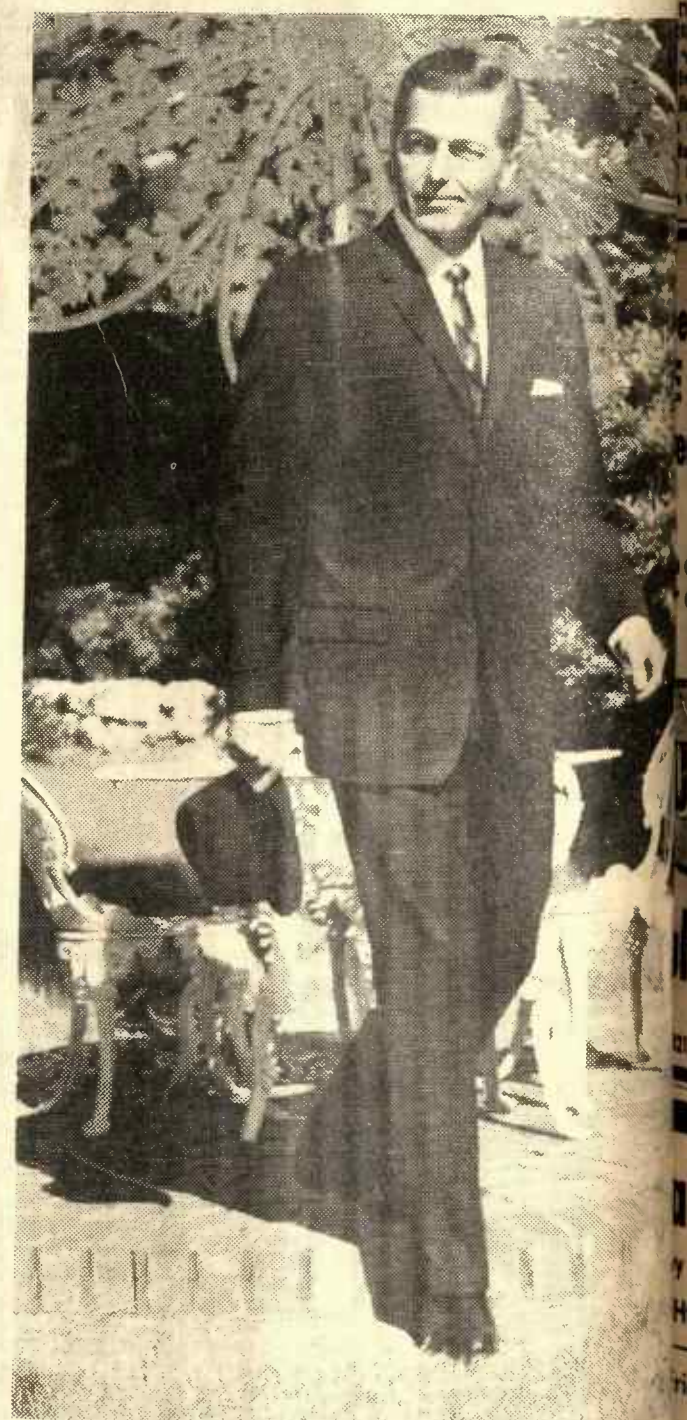
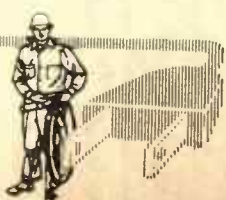

sissippi State University.

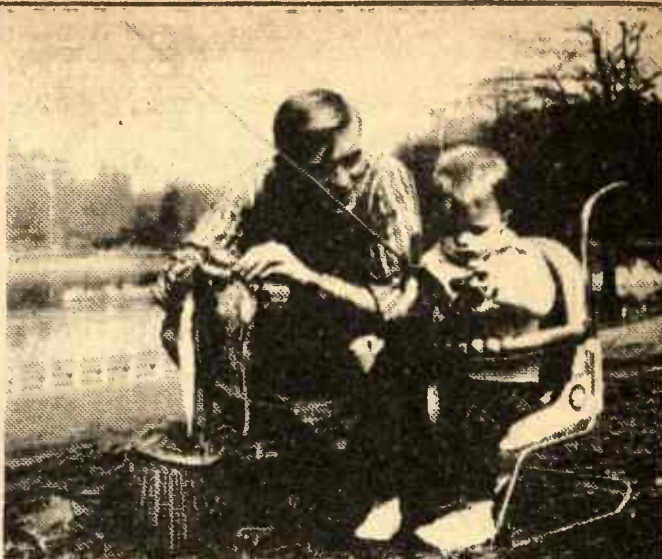
