Iuka School Reports Record Enrollment

With the 1965-66 school
term now in its second week,
H. L. Shook, Superintendent
of the Iuka Schools, reports
a record enrollment of 1,022
students attending classes to
date. Thirty of this number
are Negroes.

In the elementary school,
the number of students en-
rolled in each grade are as
follows: first grade, 98; sec-
ond grade, 84; third grade,
103; fourth grade, 113; fifth
grade, 73; and sixth, 97, mak-
ing a total of 568.

In the high school, stud-
ents enrolled in grades 7
through 12 are as follows:
seventh grade, 108; eighth
grade, 95; ninth grade, 60;
tenth grade, 64; eleventh
grade, 71; and twelfth grade,
56, the total being 454.

In the first four grades in
the elementary school, there
are 5 Negroes enrolled in
the first grade, 12 in the sec-
ond grade, 5 in the third
grade, and 8 in the fourth
grade, making a total of 30.

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Why Not Proceed With Airport?

Final approval for all grants of monies necessary to construct the Iuka Municipal Airport has come to pass and we can see no reason why work on the project should be delayed any longer.

All governmental agencies have willingly contributed funds needed for this facility with none of the public officials offering opposition. In the beginning, the City of Iuka bought the site for the airport. Later the Board of Supervisors issued bonds against the first three districts for the local cost, the State Aeronautics Commission came forth with its share of money, and last week, Sen. Stennis and Congressman Tom Abernethy notified the Editor of this newspaper that the Federal Aviation Agency has allocated \$47,201 in funds to be used for the Iuka Airport development and construction. Now, with the necessary money "in the bank," so to speak, there is no reason for further delay.

Possibly there are those in the community who can see no particular benefit from an airport. And in the same line of thought there are possibly some who can see no good in a country club or a Chamber of Commerce.

However, we must realize that it takes all these facilities and organizations to round out our community. If any service is left out, not provided, then our community is falling behind others that are providing all services and facilities found in a well-rounded community.

Probably all of us have been guilty at one time or another of saying and doing things that would retard, or stop the promotion of a worthwhile project. And, I'm sure, each of us felt justified in our talk and action. But we should bear this in mind: If a project or promotion continues to come up, then the chances are, it is needed. Worthy projects can be retarded and slowed down, but they can not be stopped.

The Iuka Airport will have a 3200 foot runway and will be large enough to accommodate twin-engined planes ordinarily used by industrial executives and many government officials. It will have the necessary taxiways and aprons and will be fenced in.

Industrial expansion of Iuka is a prime concern of all citizens and it is believed that an airport will serve as a further inducement to influence industrialists to locate their plants in or near our community.

With the need apparent and with the money available, we believe construction of the airport facility should progress at as rapid a pace as possible.

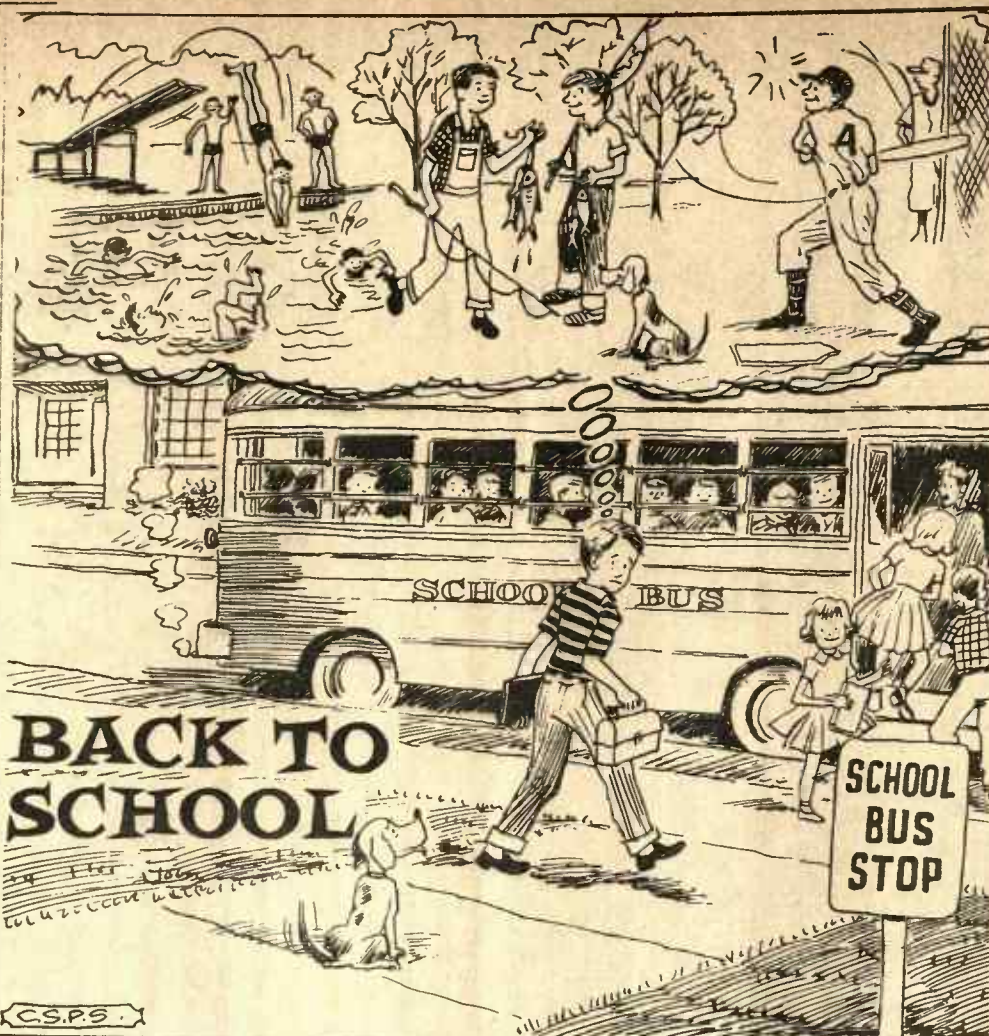

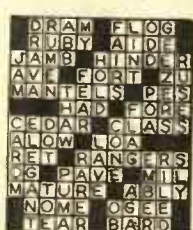

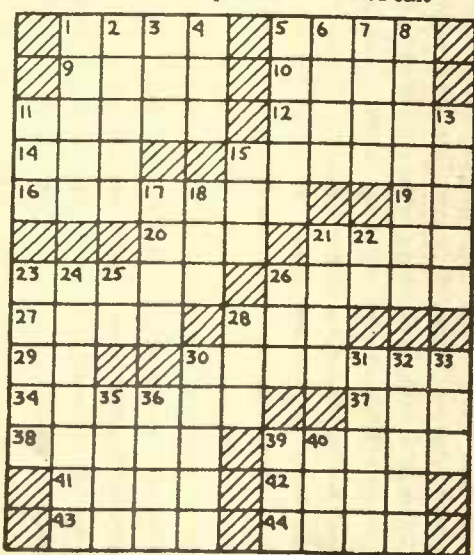
CROSSWORD PUZZLE

You have already produced your cotton for this year. Now it is time to harvest it with all the quality possible.

Producing, harvesting and ginning high quality cotton is necessary if cotton is to maintain and increase its market.

Make every effort to harvest your cotton clean and dry so that it will not have to be overheated or overginned.

Before harvest, clean up turnrows and field borders—even if your cotton is clean, if the pickers are run over grassy turnrows it can be classified "grassy." If weeds are a problem in the field, remove them by spot chopping.

Cooperate with your ginner by allowing him to group trailers according to trash and moisture content. Don't rush the ginner. Allow him plenty of time to the best possible job of ginning your cotton.

Milk Production

During 1964 Mississippi dairymen on a production testing program set a new high in herd averages—8,316 pounds of milk and 337 pounds of fat. Here are some of the reasons:

Increased use of silage in fall and winter feeding, high grain feeding, harvesting and feeding higher quality hay and earlier planting of fall and winter grazing crops.

Delectable Dishes

Luncheon favorite bound to win over guests uses toast buttered and spread with deviled ham. Top with canned, drained asparagus spears and a hot cheese sauce.

Frozen filet of sole is easy enough to broil or bake. Serve with another frozen food accompaniment: heated shrimp soup as a sauce with sieved hard-cooked egg garnish.

Macaroni and peas with celery and mayonnaise is an old fashioned favorite, but it can be rediscovered if you add to it slivered canned tongue.

Turkey goes easily into hash with chopped cooked potatoes and a binder of mushroom soup. Place in muffin pans, make a hollow with the back of a spoon and break an egg in each. Bake in a moderate oven until eggs are set. It will take only about 15 minutes if the hash is heated first.

Add some herbs to your vegetables when they cook to see how wonderful they taste! One-half teaspoon of rosemary can be added to four cups of shredded carrots, for example. Try mint with peas, too.

2 tablespoons mayonnaise

are balancing numbers of cows with the available feed supplies. They are culling low producers from herds, using better milking practices and using better bulls through artificial breeding.

Farm Records

Good farm records can be the best "road map" to successful farming that you can have.

Profit margins are narrow and small "leaks" can result in a loss rather than a profit for the year. Good records before they cause trouble, leaks before they cause trouble.

Records come in mighty handy at income tax time. It is not too hard generally to keep up with income, but expenses are another matter. And every bit of expense forgotten is likely to mean more income tax to be paid.

Good farm records are also helpful in obtaining needed financing. For more information on farm records, see your local county agent.

Lime

One of the reasons clovers or other legumes fade out of grass pastures is because the lime gets low.

Two good areas to check now for lime needs are the fescue area and the bermuda and wild winter pea area.

Apply the needed lime any time the spreaders can get over the pasture.

The North Alabama State Fair at Florence is offering \$10,157 in prize money this year, C. H. Jackson, Fair Manager, announced today.

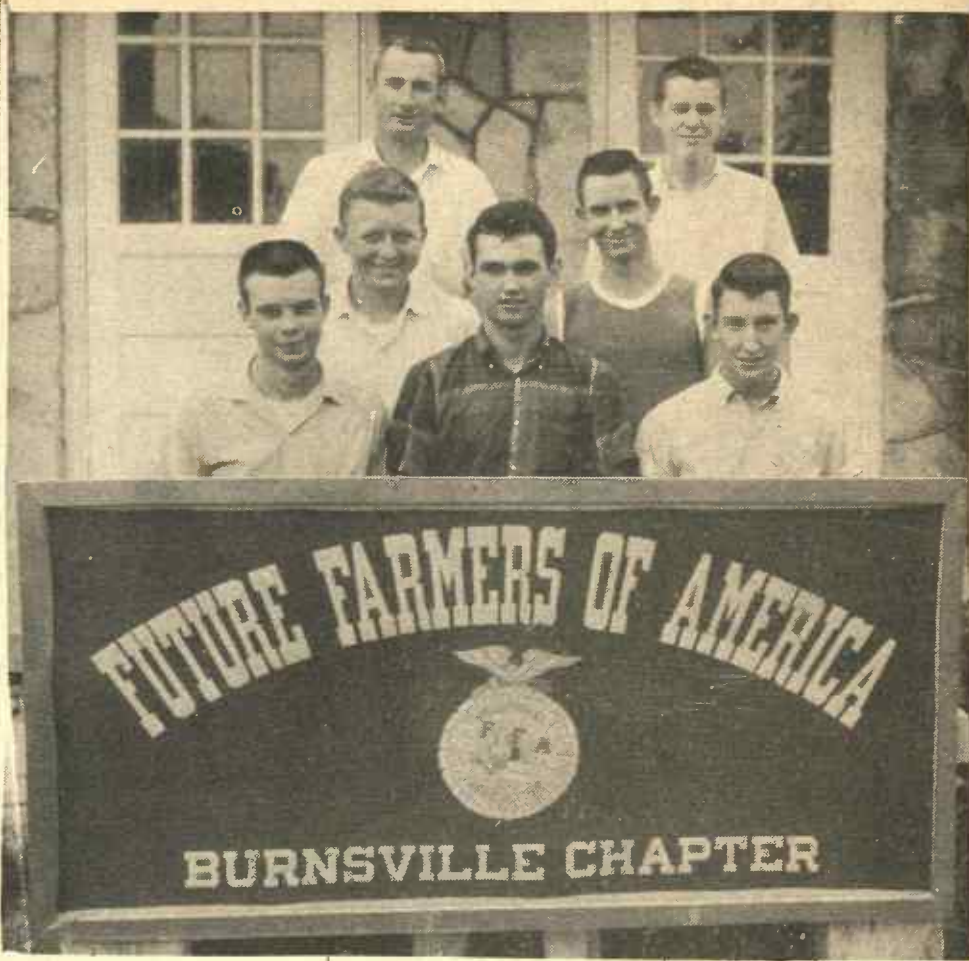

Displaying an effective air attack with a stubborn defense, the Chieftains took the lead for the first time with 5:54 left in the game and then added another touchdown for insurance.

The Mustangs scored first midway through the opening quarter after recovering a Chieftain fumble at the Chieftain eleven. After trying a quick-opener up the middle that failed to gain, halfback Charlie Gardner scooted around right end for the distance and the Mustangs led 6-0. The attempt for the extra point fell short and there was 5:57 left in the first quarter.

Iuka began their scoring drive with the recovery of a Mustang fumble on the Iuka thirty. Quarterback Harold Lomenick found halfback Larry Parker open down the center on a fifteen yard pass play and the Chieftains were rolling with first and ten at the Chieftain's forty-five. Lomenick faded to pass, tucked the ball under his arm and scattered to the forty-one in Mustang territory. A penalty brought the ball back to the forty-six. Lomenick again faded back, this time finding Parker open down the middle, connected with him. Parker was finally stopped on the Mantachie sixteen. Finding the air defense to his taste, Lomenick again took to the lanes. Parker was the receiver again in a play that put the ball on the Mustang four with first and goal. Parker, behind good blocking, swept right end and went into the end-zone standing up. The Chieftains lost their chance to go into the lead on the extra point try when a fake-kick-pass play found Lomenick with his knee on the ground when he received the snap. With 1:20 remaining in the half, the game was even again.

The second half opened with both clubs matching tough defenses. The third quarter found either club failing to muster a scoring drive. The Chieftains defense came into being as a unit to be reckoned with during the third quarter, allowing the Mustangs to cross their forty only once during the entire second half.

With 9:30 left in the game, guard Paul Barnett smashed through to recover a Mustang bobble at the Mantachie forty-two. The Chieftains were ready to roll. Lomenick faded left to pass, cut back around the right end and scampered to the twenty-six. A plunge lost one, and the Chieftains were penalized back to the thirty-two for being off side. Lomenick to Parker was good for ten. On third and six, Lomenick faded to pass, took his time and then found his favorite target wide open right down the
