Group Ministry Council Discusses Church Needs

7 Areas Of Concern Analyzed
At Meeting Sunday In Tish

An exploration of the
needs of the Methodist Churches
in Tishomingo County
and examination of teh ways
these needs could most ef-
fectively be met were the
main items on agenda at a
meeting of the Tishomingo
County Group Ministry
Council held Sunday. Repre-
sentatives of various Metho-
dist Churches in the county
were present or the meet-
ing at the Tishomingo
Church.

Seven areas of concern
were analyzed, these being
Education, Stewardship, Mo-
tivation and Inspiration,
Communication, Music, E-
vangelism, and a Church and
Community Worker.

It was the opinion of the
Education committee that
there was a need for a coun-
ty-wide Christian Workers
School along two lines. The
first would deal with the re-
gular grouping of children,
youth and adults. The other
would have to do with a gen-
eral study, such as a coun-
ty-wide study of different
Books of the Bible.

The Stewardship commit-
tee expressed the need for
a simultaneous county-wide
Every Member Visitation, a
county-wide Lord's Acre
Project, and a Stewardship
School.

The Motivation and Inspi-
ration committee suggested
a county-wide Methodist
newspaper, county-wide Com-
mission training, and coun-
ty-wide work, along the group
lines, such as WSCS, Metho-
dist Men and Youth.

The Communication com-
mittee suggested four ways
of communication in the
county, those being Letter,
Newspaper, Radio and Tele-
vision, and Personal Contact.

They also made a suggestion
that a radio program to be
sponsored by all the Metho-
dist Churches in the coun-
ty be started.

The Music committee sug-
gested training schools and
encouraged preparation for
the new Methodist Hymnal
which is due out in March.

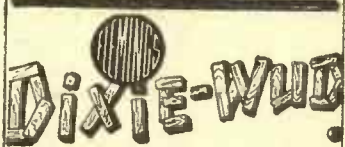

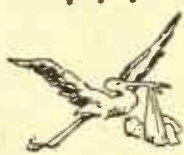

Forward — and Backward

We, your editors, have just completed 14 years in Iuka. Actually, our anniversary was July 31.

In these past 14 years, tremendous changes have taken place. There have been great strides in our standard of living; there has been factory payrolls and increased employment. School systems have done a complete change. The churches all over the county have been enlarged and new ones built in many congregations. Even the topography of the countryside has undergone great improvements with paved roads, new homes, fine farms and a host of other things that are entirely too numerous to mention.

New businesses have come into existence with a far greater volume of dollar turnover. In 1951, for example, the economy of the county was based on slightly more than a \$5 million gross. In 1964, the dollar turnover was in excess of \$12 million.

Naturally with all these changes has come tax increases since it takes money for the government to operate and give the services expected and demanded by the people. And along with tax increases has come postage increases. In 1951, first class letters were 2 cents; postals were a penny a piece.

Mail service into Iuka was 4 and five times a day with the same number of times going out.

While our standard of living has been going forward with more jobs, better payrolls, better homes, churches and schools, our mail service has been going backward.

Even with the Zip Code and increased postage rates our firstclassmail is slower coming in and going out than it was in 1951. Mail coming into Tishomingo county Post Offices is received early in the mornings and is sent out late in the afternoons—one time in and one time out each day is the service we are now getting.

There are upwards of 20,000 people who are served from the Post Offices and rural routes in Tishomingo county and it seems to us that so many people would deserve at least two mails in and two mails out daily.

Our Postmasters and all our postal employees in the county are doing a fine job and we have no complaint whatsoever on their performance. We do feel, however, that the Post Office Department has let the people down who live in the rural areas. If we were located in the far and wide-spread sections such as exists in some of the Western states, one mail service a day, or a week, would be understandable. But with 20,000 people served only once daily in a small area as ours seems to us unjust and unfair.

We sincerely hope the backward movement of our mails will not hamper and retard the forward movement of our growth and economy

THE GOLDEN YEARS

\$8,000 FOR AN APARTMENT IN SON'S HOUSE? . . . MAYBE

"We have about decided to spend \$8,000 to build an apartment onto the home of our married son, and then move into it for our retirement . . ."

But the man is worried about it. So is his wife. "I will be retiring early next year," he says. "My total income will be about \$340, and if I should die my wife would end up with about \$170 a month. We don't own a home, but we have savings of close to \$14,000."

"On our \$340 income we could not rent quarters as nice as the \$8,000 apartment would be. My wife would fare worse on her \$170. Also we like the idea of being so close to our son and the grandchildren. Our worries lie in the fact we will be surrendering over half of our savings and we aren't sure we could ever get the money back, and in the warning that retired parents have no business living under the same roof with their children . . ."

Under the arrangements being discussed with the son and his wife, the parents would occupy the apartment free for life. They would not have to pay any utility bills. They would furnish the apartment with their own furnishings—refrigerator, stove, everything.

"Our son and his wife aren't looking for profit on our arrangement. And of course we aren't," the man says. "But there are definite advantages for both parties . . ."

This retired couple may have a splendid deal in the works. But before you, or anybody, makes such a deal, you should go down the following list and check off each item to your satisfaction . . . because few allowances are made for people who have lived for 65 years to be stupid:

1. Get a firm contract on construction of the apartment to make sure it will be built, no matter what, for the \$8,000 price, and will be completed by a certain date.
2. Kiss the \$8,000 good-bye, because when you have added improvements to somebody else's real estate title you seldom can make a legal claim against it.
3. Since you are, in effect, making your son \$8,000 richer, make sure any other children you have know what's up . . . and approve.
4. Do all you can to design the apartment as a first-floor addition to the side or rear of the house and not an upstairs arrangement. The stairs may not matter now, but they will in 10 years.
5. Make sure the apartment is complete within itself, with bath, kitchen etc., and that it is fully isolated from the son's family.
6. Is there any chance that the son might be transferred out of town on his job and want to sell the house? If so, don't take a chance with your \$8,000.
7. In this written agreement, have a clause guaranteeing your status in the apartment in case your son should die and his wife remarries. Naturally this is not going to happen—but it does. And new husbands don't think much of their predecessor's parents.
8. Have a general understanding with the son and his wife that both parties will come and go as they please, will look in on each other only on occasion, and will lead separate and independent lives.

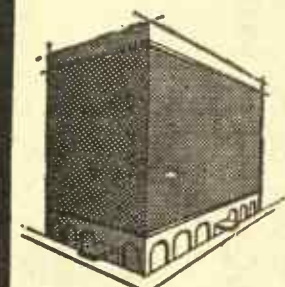

Chieftains Mash Mooreville-Chalk Up Number 22 In

Lomenick Leads War Party In 33-13 Victory Over Troopers; Substitutes Gain Experience

The Iuka Chieftains moved into Mooreville last Friday night hunting some Trooper scalps and came home with an armful, tagging the Troopers 33-13. The outcome of the game was never in serious doubt as the Chiefs took a commanding 13-0 1st quarter lead and the regulars took a rest. Coach Thorne substituted freely throughout the game, using the regulars somewhat sparingly. Quarterback Harold Lomenick got things rolling early in the game when he picked off a Trooper pass at the Iuka 45 yard line and scooted forty yards to the Mooreville 15. A couple plays later Lomenick faded and hit halfback Larry Parker with an air bomb and Parker went into the end zone untouched. Lomenick added the point after and it was 7-0 with 6:30 left in the first quarter.

The second Iuka strike of the night was set in motion just a couple of plays later when end Darryl Ramsey grabbed a Trooper bobble at the Mooreville 39. Lomenick hit the middle for five, then scampered to the ten as he picked up good blocking around left end. Halfback Joe Richardson drove to the one on the next play, but the next two plays lost 2 yards. On fourth down, Lomenick faded and hit Parker and points were added. Richardson added the extra point and the Troopers trailed 14-0.

In the second quarter, the Chiefs added another TD when Lomenick hit Parker with fifth TD pass of the year from the thirty yard line. The pass for the point after went incomplete. This score came after a good ground drive by Richardson and Lomenick had set the Chieftains in position.

The Troopers added six points to their side of the scoreboard late in the second quarter when quarterback Winford Parmer carried a bootleg into the end zone on a fourth and four situation from the twenty-four. Fullback Merle Smith caught Parmer behind the line on the point after and the score stood 20-6 at the half.

Early in the third quarter Lomenick displayed fine running form as he moved the ball from his thirty-five to the Trooper one. After two illegal procedure penalties, Lomenick found himself with a first and twenty situation at his thirty-five. He faded to pass, rolled around left end and behind good blocking carried the mail to the Trooper 41. After another illegal procedure penalty, Lomenick tried

right end and scampered to the twenty-six. Failing to complete a pass, Lomenick then stuck to the ground and carried to the one. Richardson carried it in for the tally with 8:30 remaining in the third quarter. The EP fell short but the Chiefs led 28-6.

Coach Thorne began substituting freely at this point and the reserves put some more experience under their belts. One deep Trooper penetration was stopped when Turrell Berryhill recovered a Mooreville fumble.

Coach Thorne will go with his usual line-up in Friday night's encounter. Leading the offense will be quarterback Harold Lomenick, halfback Larry Parker, and halfback Joe Richardson. Heading the defense will be fullback Merle Smith, guard Sidney Robinson, and the interior of the Chieftain line.

Fans should not be too surprised if they don't see a wide-open game. The Chiefs may be saving some from their bags of tricks to display when they encounter arch-rival Belmont. If Coach Thorne can grab a quick lead, fans may be able to see some of the younger talent perform. But this may be presupposing just a little too far. Every coach likes to play them one by one, as they come.

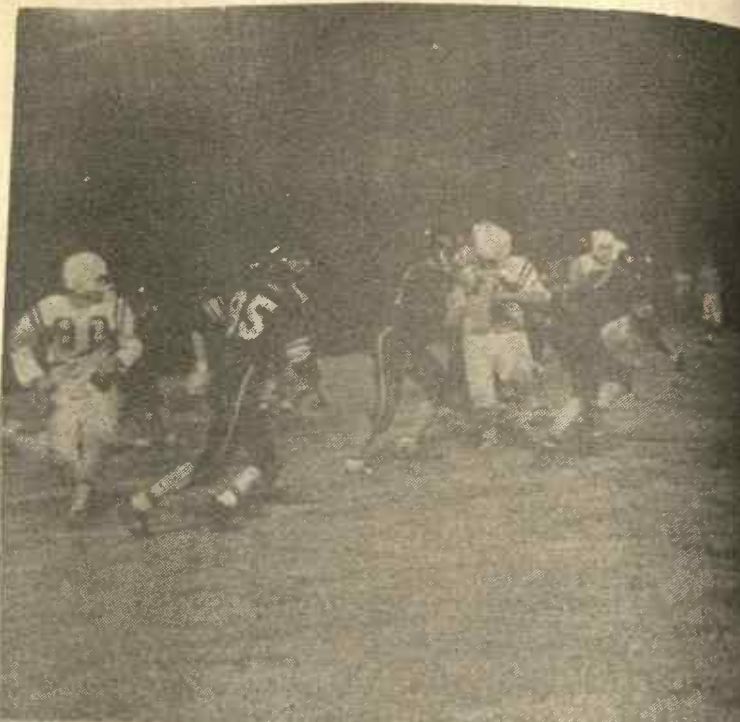

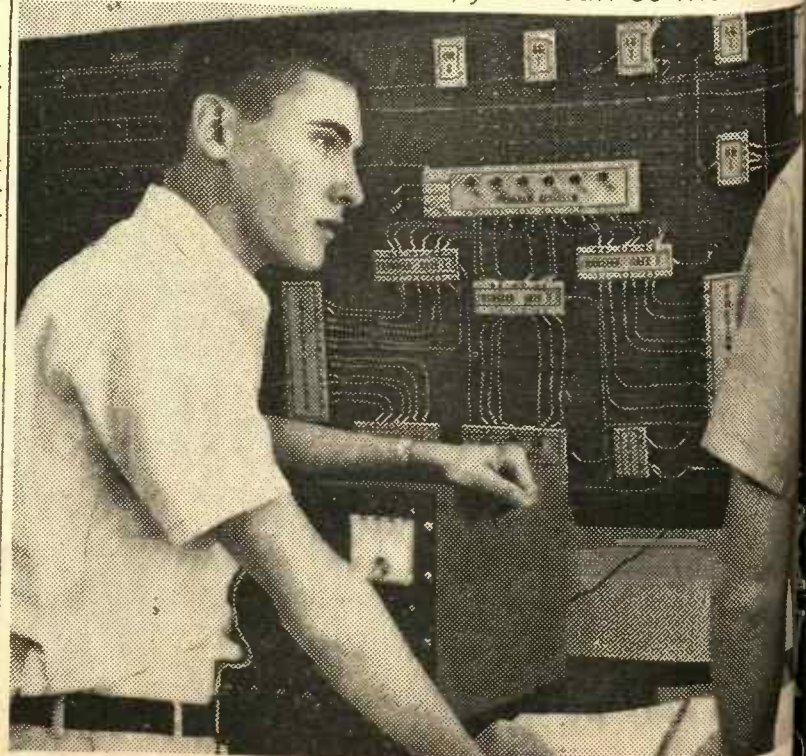

Cotton Insects

If you are thinking about
adding a phosphate insecti-
cide to a defoliant be sure
to read the precautions on
the label.

Certain defoliants when
mixed with certain insecti-
cides can be highly inflam-
mable and cannot be mixed.

Phosphate insecticides can
be mixed with phosphate de-
foliants and arsenic acid de-
foliants but not with chlo-
rate defoliants.

Get a copy of Extension
publication 462, "Chemical
Cotton Defoliation." Ade-
quate precautions are listed
on page 10.

Do not graze fields nor
feed gin trash from fields
treated with aldrin, aramite,
BHC, bidrin, chlorobenzilate,
DDT, demeton, dieldrin, di-
syston, endrin, ethion, guth-
ion, heptachlor, kelthane,
methyl trithion, thimet (pho-
rate), strobane, TDE, thio-
dan, toxaphene or trithion.

There are no restrictions
on grazing fields following
application of malathion.

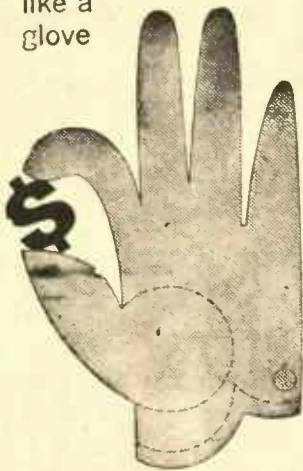

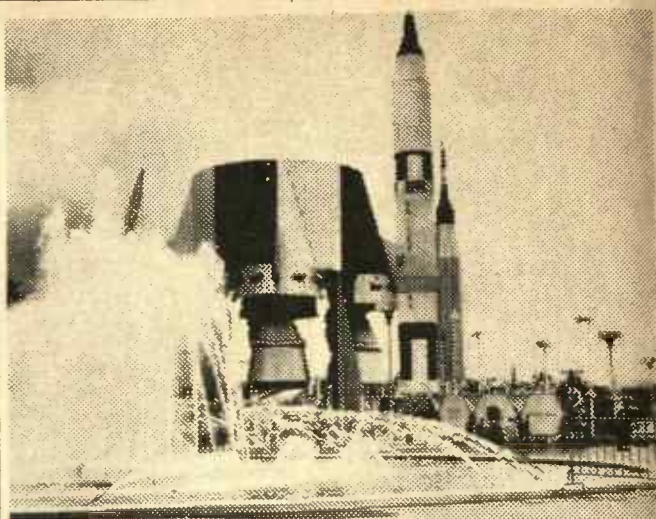

The Tishomingo County Tuberculosis Association announces that Mrs. Leon Phillips will again serve as the Christmas Seal Chairman for 1965.

The campaign, sponsored by the Lucy Rowe Study Club, does not start until November 16, but prior to that, mailing lists must be brought up-to-date, committees organized and preparations for Christmas Seal letters for mailing to families in Tishomingo County.

"The Christmas Seals have been messages of help and health in Tishomingo County for sixty years—the United States began the Christmas Seal program back in 1904," Mrs. Phillips said. "Volunteers who assist in the campaign are a fine example of people helping people. Our state has shown an increase in new cases of tuberculosis during the past five years. This past year, Mississippi reported the largest number of new cases of the last decade with 1266 new cases registered on the public health book. Through June 30, 1965, 728 cases were already reported—the public health specialists estimate upwards of 1400 cases by the end of this year."

Tishomingo County volunteers have already pledged their efforts and talents in supplying health education programs in school and civic organizations, increasing the case-finding and patient services and in gaining more support for tuberculosis functions such as medical education projects and research.
