Pickwick Lake River Port

Some talk has been done as to the best location to establish and build the Tishomingo County River Port.

If you will recall, a meeting was held last year at which a river port was discussed for the first time. The meeting was in the Iuka National Guard Armory and attracted men of influence from a wide area in Mississippi.

At that time, sites mentioned were one on Yellow Creek just north of North Cross Roads and one on the west bank of Bear Creek near the Alabama state line and just inside Mississippi.

Further meetings of groups of interested Tishomingo county business and civic leaders with a like group from Alcorn county and the Executive board of the Tombigbee River Watershed Authority committee brought the project to the point of employing a concern to conduct an economic and feasibility survey.

Representatives of this survey company were in Tishomingo county last week and visited the two sites. They did not disclose their preference, however, it is apparent that each site has its advantages and disadvantages.

Among some of the advantages of the Bear Creek site is the fact that a railroad spur could be easily and cheaply constructed over a short distance from the Southern railroad. Also, it has been said, the site on Bear Creek would place the facility in closer proximity to Iuka which will, of necessity, be the mailing address for the river port. Among some of the disadvantages are fluctuations in water level in the Bear Creek area at all times during the year. According to TVA engineers, a barge landing area would have to be dredged out in order to afford deep enough water to accommodate all size barges. Other disadvantages is the lack of space for possible expansion. As was stated before, the Bear Creek site is only a few yards from the Alabama line. If expansion were desired southward toward the state line, this would of course involve another state government. And even though friendliest conditions exist, when two state governments are involved in a single project, lots of red tape and time are necessary before anything can be done. It is a known fact that few projects concerning two state governments are really big successes.

Among the advantages of the Yellow Creek site are an abundance of deep water where only the docking facilities will have to be built. No dredging will be necessary. Also, TVA owns about 150 acres of land that could be used as a part of the site. Other land needed is also available. With the docking facility on Yellow Creek, the project will be entirely Mississippi and will not involve another state, neither during construction nor in possible future expansion. It is true that a railroad would require more money to build to connect into the trunk lines at Corinth. But it seems to us that the civic and business leaders of that city and county would welcome an opportunity to tie their community to the Tennessee River with port facilities.

Whatever site the survey team decides upon, the river port will be of inestimable economic benefit to an extremely large area in Northeast Mississippi. Main purpose of the riverport is to lower high freight rates now paid by every manufacturer, wholesaler and retailer in the area. These high freight rates are naturally passed on to the consumer who pays the final check. Also, experience of other areas shows that where good riverports are in operation manufacturing and industry are adding immensely to the economy of those areas with more and bigger payrolls.

It will be to the advantage of every community in every county in Northeast Mississippi to put their shoulder to the wheel and help build this port facility on Pickwick Lake.

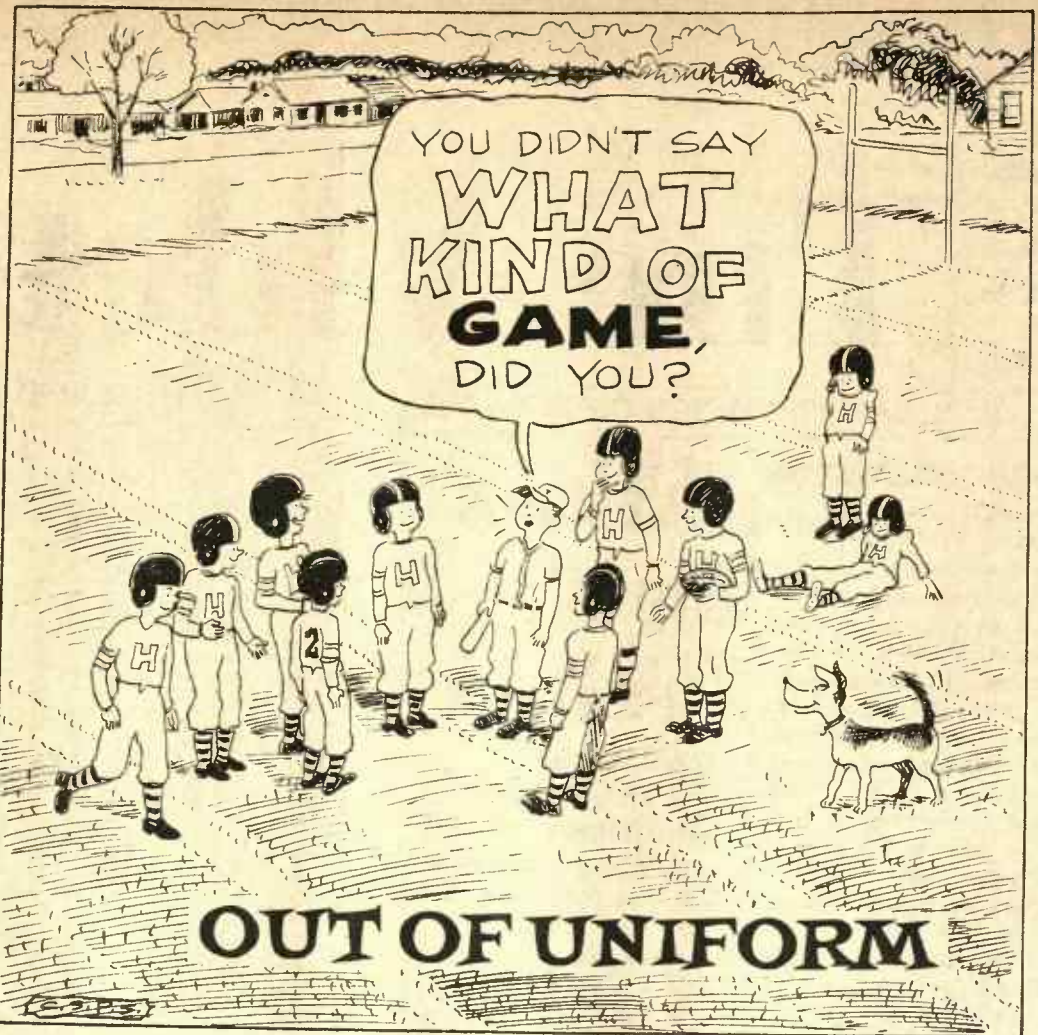

INFLATION: WHAT IT CAN DO TO YOUR RETIREMENT INCOME

Now comes a man with a retirement budget of \$7,120 a year who sees a serious threat to his security.

It's another case of the more you've got the more you worry, but the man makes a good point—inflation.

"I agree," he says, "that a couple retiring on about \$7,000 a year can live as well today as they could on a salary of \$15,000." But he expects to live for 13 more years and is concerned over what the \$7,000 will buy 10 years from now.

Here is the man's retirement budget:

Shelter	\$ 960
Food	1,040
Clothing	520
Automobile: depreciation only	550
Hospital-medical	300
Taxes	750
Miscellaneous	3,000
(Spending money, auto expenses, barber, hairdresser, vacation trips, presents to wife and family, new household items that wear out, etc.)	
Total	\$7,120

"Washington admits that we have had inflation of about 1 1/2 per cent per year for the past 30 years," he says, "and we can expect to have a 'Controlled Inflation' of 1 1/2 to 2 per cent in the future.

"Let's assume the insurance actuarial figures are correct and that all men who reach age 65 have a life expectancy of 13 years. Let's assume, using my budget, that I have a frozen in-

come of \$7,120 a year. If my taxes of \$750 a year remain constant, I will have \$6,370 to live on.

"But if we have 2 per cent inflation a year, then in 13 years from now I will need \$8,173 to live as well . . . and with taxes will need \$8,823 as compared to my present \$7,120 . . ."

The man has figured this somewhat apart from the norm. A 2 per cent gain on a base 1965 figure, for 13 years, would make his \$8,173 figure only \$8,026. But his point still holds — before he lives out his life he is going to lose about 25 per cent of the value of his retirement income.

There are compensating factors for him, and for all others at age 65. The \$520 item for clothing. A man and his wife just aren't going to continue spending that much (about \$43 a month) as they move on past 65. The \$550 item for auto depreciation. The couple buying a new, good, standard car around age 65 are probably through with that business because such a car will last them about as long as they'll want to drive. The miscellaneous item of \$3,000, or \$250 a month, is a lot of miscellaneous. Most people find their desire for spending money, vacation trips, gift-giving, and new furniture goes into decline by age 70.

Actually, the declining wants of a 65-year-old couple would more than offset the effects of 2 per cent inflation on a \$7,120 a year income.
