Chmn. Wagner Says Construction Of Tombigbee Canal Will Come; Will Be Boon To Transportation

Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Tennessee Valley Authority said here Tuesday that construction of the Tennessee-Tombigbee waterway would be an important addition to the nation's transportation network. Aubrey J. Wagner, TVA career man and highest ranking official, was featured speaker at ceremonies sponsored by the Yellow Creek Watershed Authority.

Mr. Wagner gave a brief summary of the achievements and progress made by the watershed authority and in his concluding remarks said:

"I have always said that the strength of the future must lie in industry. Our farmers are producing more than they ever did but, with fewer people doing the work. With the knowledge we have obtained from our various surveys, and with educational programs underway, we must now act to utilize our knowledge.

"A most important factor, and I must say a crucial one, will be the construction of the Tennessee-Tombigbee waterway to connect with the Gulf of Mexico at Mobile. It's bound to come. It will be of tremendous import to this area so I want to discuss it.

"From a national standpoint, the waterway from the Tennessee River to Mobile will be an important addition to our transportation network and to our national strength. Many states will benefit from this waterway and its construction will add immensely to our national strength.

"From a regional standpoint, the Tennessee-Tombigbee waterway will open vast new fields for industrial growth and will afford excellent sites for manufacturing plants. In addition to a great benefit to the Valley,

the Gulf area will also realize tremendous economic growth.

"For the people in the Yellow Creek area, the actual construction of the Waterway canal will be a real boon with many new jobs that most of the people have never known before. The mouth of Yellow Creek where the canal will join the main stream of the river will become a hub of transportation activity. Vast warehouses will have to be built to accommodate the interchange of freight from barges to truck lines and railroads.

"My advice to residents of the area is to plan now for construction of the waterway. After construction begins will be too late to start planning.

"Land along Yellow Creek is flat and will make excellent industrial sites. However, it will have to be built up above ordinary water level. This can be done during actual construction if arrangements are made to make best use of dirt that will be removed from the canal. Waterfront sites for industry should be planned and prepared for during time of construction.

"Mr. Wagner said that, in order for all this to be done, it will require an even greater local effort and participation. Government and civic leaders should become thoroughly informed as to the needs; requirements of different type industries should be determined and complete plans made to accommodate all kinds."

The speaker concluded by saying that individuals as well as groups will have to work hard at these various projects. "The cost will be rewarding," he said.

James Walker of Alcorn County, member of the Yellow Creek Watershed Authority Executive committee, served as master of ceremonies for Tuesday's program. W. C. Hamilton, executive director, gave a rundown on the activities in the area since formation of the Authority in 1958.

Others appearing on the program were J. H. Rogers who discussed agricultural activities in the area; Ray Stennett of Corinth who gave a report on business and industry; J. R. Long who talked on education; P. A. Weeklev whose subject was forestry; and R. T. Hobson who discussed recreation.

At noon, the gathering was served Brunswick stew.

In the afternoon Gene Triggs, Associate Director, Miss. Agricultural & Industrial Board, was one of the featured speakers.

Mr. Triggs said he was pleased with the progress that is being made toward the construction of a riverport and docking facilities on Yellow Creek. Construction of that riverport could very well be the actual beginning of the Tennessee-Tombigbee waterway canal to the Gulf.

Numerous TVA and Miss. State University personnel were present for the Yellow Creek Day meeting.

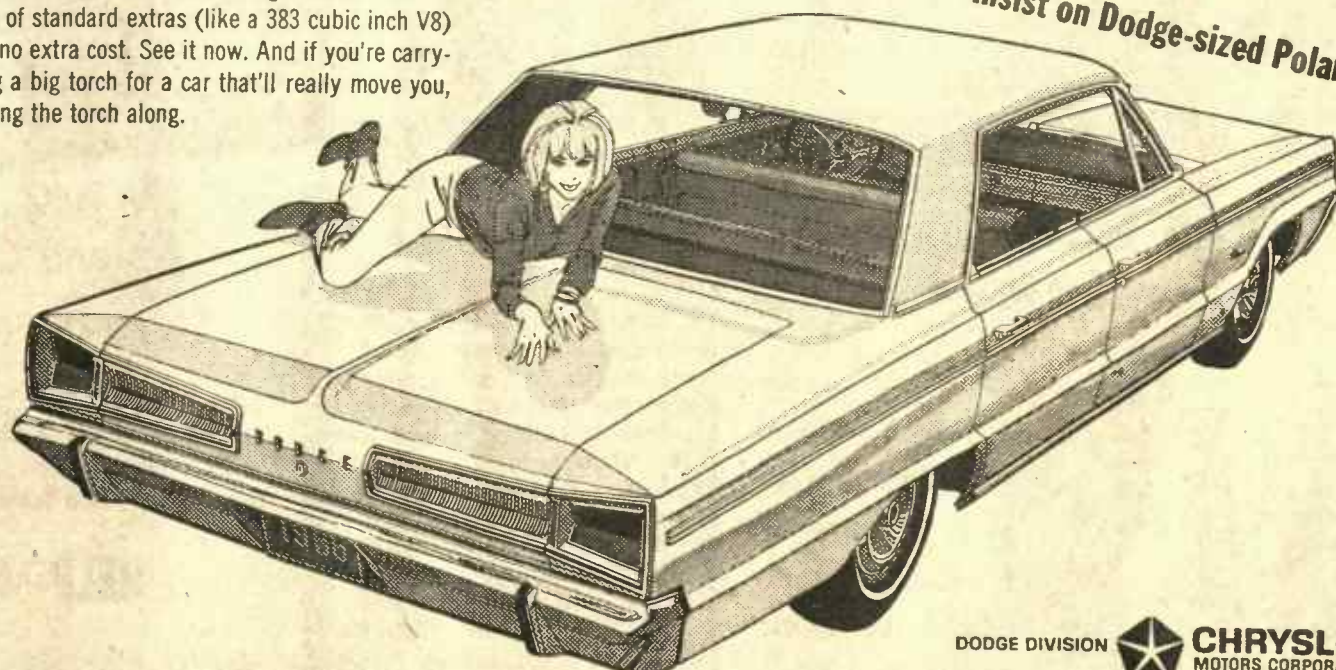

April Arrests Sentenced In District Court

U. S. District Judge Claude F. Clayton pronounced sentences Friday morning in Aberdeen on men involved in a moonshine operation captured by Tishomingo County law officers and Alcohol Tax Unit Agents in April of this year. They were Alcorn countians, Harry K. (Tommy) Bivins, 32,

of Corinth, and Harold Ray Troxell, 18, of Rienzi, who were both placed on probation for 18 months in connection with the 3-state illegal distillery move.

Jack Reed Newton, 39, of Clarksdale received three years in a penitentiary; and Donald Dawson, 29, of Sheffield, Ala., 18 months in a penitentiary.

Others sentenced, but taken into custody after the Tishomingo County incident, were Carl Douglas (Towhead) White, 33 year-old Corinth ex-convict who received three years in a penitentiary and Bobby Gene Vandiver of Alabama, who received two years in a peniten-

tiary. Terms will begin October 22.

Federal agents stated that the moonshine network covering locations in Mississippi, Alabama and Tennessee was in operation from March 2 to April 5 when the majority of the men were arrested at the still site in North Tishomingo County.

All Cotton Farmers Eligible For Loans That Plant Within Allotment

A new procedure for handling Price Support Cotton Loans to farmers in Tishomingo County, beginning with the 1965 Crop, provides that all cotton farmers who plant within their cotton allotment acreage will be eligible to put his cotton in the loan.

All Cotton Loans (pooling cotton) except those to Cotton Cooperative Marketing Associations (Mid-South Cotton Cooperatives and Mississippi Federated Cooperative) will be made solely by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service County Office in Iuka or approved Loan Clerks approved at banks in the county. Commodity Credit Loan Drafts will be issued to the farmer at the time loans are written.

Farmers may place cotton in the loan at the following places: Belmont Bank, Belmont, Mrs. Virginia Stephens and Mrs. Cleo C. Enlow, approved clerks. Tishomingo Bank, Mrs. Ann Scruggs, approved clerk. The First Nation Banks in Iuka and Burnsville, Eugene C. Bonds, Laura R. Stormont, Mrs. Edna V. Richardson, and Danny K. Lambert, approved clerks.

The County Office employees and approved Loan Clerks will collect a fee for preparing Form CCC-Cotton A at the following rates: 1 bale, 25c; 2 bales, 40c; 3 bales, 55c; 4 bales, 70c; 5 bales, 85c; 6 bales, \$1.00; and for each bale over 6 bales add 10c per bale (for example, 7 bales would be \$1.10 or 8 bales -1.20, etc.)

"All warehouse receipts and class cards will be kept in the county office," E. N. Allen, ASCS Office Manager, said.

"No warehouse receipt will have to be stamped by the

warehouse showing "Handling Fee Paid." All a farmer needs to pool his cotton at one of the places listed above will be: Warehouse Receipts, Green Class Card, and Marketing Card.

Important Note

Landlord and tenant must both sign the note. In case the landlord is gone and cannot sign the Note, it can be mailed to him for signature.

The County ASCS Office will be closed on Saturday but all the Banks will be open for business until 3:00 o'clock in the evening.

Critical Season For Home Fires

Fire and burns are the leading cause of accidental home deaths of children from one to 14 years of age, according to the National Safety Council.

Miss Susie Overstreet, health education specialist with the Cooperative Extension Service at State College, says, "We are approaching the most critical part of the year for home and farm fires."

"Most fires occur in early winter due primarily to use of faulty heating equipment and burning of leaves."

She states that it is important to have such equipment checked and repaired before it is first used. "Good fire prevention," says Miss Overstreet, is a combination of good housekeeping and having a good water supply."

Each family should get rid of rubbish such as old newspapers, magazines, boxes and scraps in every room—including the attic. Have a proper storage place for oily or paint covered rags, flammable fluids, partly used cans of paint and grease containers. This storage place must be outside the house and away from any important building.

All elements of the heating unit must be kept clean and in good repair. Proper inspection for fire hazards includes such things as pipes, chimney, flues, floor furnace, space heaters, fireplace, range and wiring.

In rural areas, be sure to have the water pump on a separate circuit from that of the house. Too many times the water pump is on the house circuit, and if the house catches fire it cuts off the water supply when you need it the most.

Accumulation of dry leaves and dead grass are additional fire hazards and should be burned under close supervision or moved away.

Since we are approaching the most critical time of the year for home fires, perhaps these few reminders will cause you to take caution and thus avoid a tragedy in your home, on your farm or in your business.

THE GOLDEN YEARS

"GIVE IT TO US STRAIGHT," SAYS MAN ABOUT TO RETIRE

It is suggested that business and institutions could stop some of the retirement problems they are having with employees if they would take the marbles out of their mouths and start talking English.

And if they sent their lawyers out of the room for a while. Ernest R. Bowden is somewhat indignant about the matter. He's an employee. He will retire in about 18 months. He'd be pleased to find out what his retirement benefits will be.

"I want you to just look at what one of the country's fine companies — not mine — is telling its employees about their pensions. Read it, if you can:

Based on 20 years of service or more where a man may retire at age 60 or a woman at age 55, and based on 15 years of service for a man or woman at age 65. Annual pensions come to one per cent of average annual salary for the five highest consecutive years of service, times years of company service, less one-third of Social Security benefit. (Social Security adjustment made at age 62 and after.)

"Can an employee now in his 60's figure that out when he or she probably never had even a high school education?" Mr. Bowden thinks not. "It sounds like something a college professor might write in a research paper for the Ford Foundation... or something a lawyer cooked up to impress somebody..."

Mr. Bowden wants to know why the smart boys with their

fancy computers can't figure out something simple that will let an employee know what his pension will be. "I could figure out that formula above, with an effort. I don't know about that 'five highest consecutive years'—why consecutive? I don't know why my pension should, in effect, knock out a bigger hunk of my Social Security every time the U.S. Congress raises it for me. Still, I could figure the formula, with an effort. Why must it be an effort?"

Mr. Bowden cites another bit of language a company gives its employees on the "Survivor's Option" on its pensions:

An employee may decide, prior to retirement on a Class A pension, to receive a lesser amount than his normal retirement payment and thereby qualify a named survivor (spouse or parent) for an annuity. This annuity would pay an amount of one-third the employee's actuarially reduced pension to the survivor for life.

"That word 'actuarially' is the joker here," according to Mr. Bowden. "Who knows what it means? Anyway, why make things so tough? All an employee wants to know is how much pension he's going to get, or how much a spouse might get. And he had rather not have to go get a college degree to find out."

GS Financial Campaign Starts With Appointment Of Chairman

The Prairie Girl Scout Council opens its annual Finance Campaign October 6 with the appointment of Karl A. Swenning as chairman for the Iuka District. This is Mr. Swenning's second year to serve in this capacity.

The announcement is made by R. W. Reed, Jr., of Tupelo, President of the Prairie Girl Scout Council. Mr. Reed stated, "We are proud to have a man of Mr. Swenning's stature and ability to head the local fund drive. Mr. Swenning did an outstanding job last year and we are fortunate to have him serve again in this capacity. Both he and Mrs. Swenning have been prominent in community affairs since coming to Iuka and at present are members of the Board of Directors of the Prairie Girl Scout Council."

The scouting program in Iuka and Tishomingo is growing at a rapid rate. At present there are 5 troops with 93 girls and 27 adults registered. These girls and their leaders are carrying out a varied and well-balanced program of camping, citizenship, nature, arts and crafts, music, dramatics, health and safety, homemaking, and international friendship.

One of the four professional workers on the staff of the

Prairie Girl Scout Council, Mrs. J. E. Thomas, lives in Iuka. She is available to help in all phases of the program. Mrs. Thomas is responsible for directing the Gypsy Jaunts, Brownie Revels, and Compoee held annually in the Council.

All money collected in the name of Girl Scouting remains in the council and no part of it goes to the national organization. The money collected will return in service, the organization and maintenance of troops and the training of leaders in all phases of the program, materials and program aids, and most of all, in the opportunity for girls and leaders in Tishomingo County to participate in council-wide and national activities.

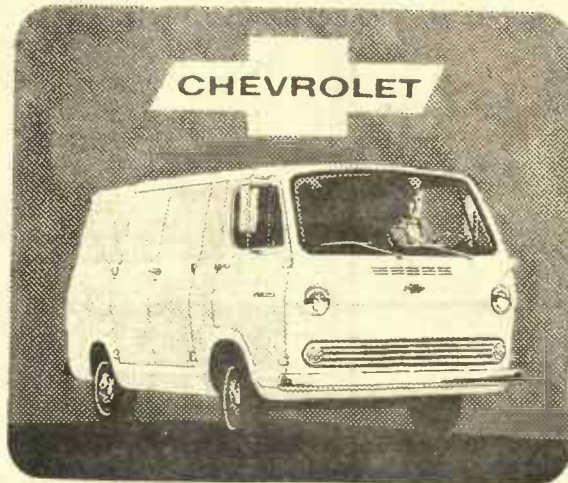

Belmont and Saltillo Win Again; Cards To Meet Chiefs Thurs. Night

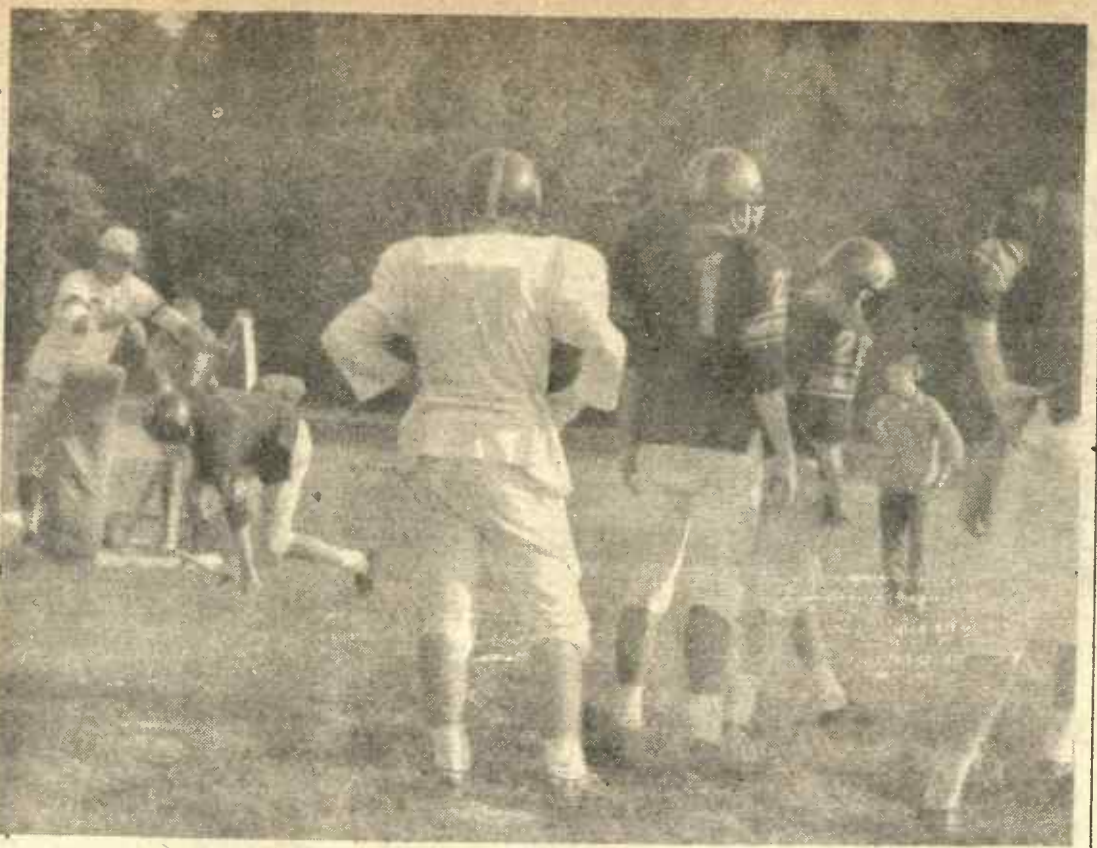
