Land Acquired By Highway Dept. For Natchez Trace 3A

Trace To Intersect Highway 25
Two Miles South Of Tishomingo

The deed to Section 3A of
the Natchez Trace Parkway was
presented to Highway Commis-
sioner Roy C. Adams in cere-
monies held south of Tishomin-
go, Wednesday.

The deed includes land in an
area sixteen miles from the
Alabama-Mississippi State line
to the Tishomingo-Prentiss

County line and will cross High-
way 25 about two miles south
of the town of Tishomingo.

The presentation was made
by Robert Bell of Jackson, who
acquired the land for the High-
way Department. The deed will
be presented by Commissioner
Adams to Governor Paul B.
Johnson for his signature. The
Governor will then channel the
deed to the Federal Govern-
ment where it will be designa-
ted as property of the United
States. Here, the document will
be conveyed back to the Nat-
chez Trace Parkway Commis-
sion which will then begin con-
struction work.

The construction is expected
to be completed within the
next few months and will be
performed under the direction
of the Natchez Trace Commis-
sion which will also be respon-
sible for maintenance.

New Water System For Burnsville

Issue Approved By
Majority Of Voters

Qualified voters in the Town
of Burnsville voted for a com-
plete water system in a special
election held Friday, Septem-
ber 24, at the Burnsville City
Hall. A total of 133 votes were
cast, 101 for, and 32 against.

Voters cast their ballots to
determine whether the town
should issue its waterworks sys-
tem revenue bonds in the max-
imum amount of \$127,000 to
raise money for the purpose of
constructing a complete water
system.

Student Union Facilities Get Face Lifting

The Northeast Mississippi Junior College Board of Trustees has awarded a contract to S and S Construction Company of Corinth for remodeling the Student Center Building on the Northeast campus.

The \$40,000 contract calls for the construction company to furnish all labor, materials, equipment, and services required for the proposed alterations and additions to the center.

Remodeling plans for the project include installation of walnut panelling in the main dining room and grill of the Student Center, lowering of the present ceiling, and installation of new acoustical tile. Plans also call for a new 13-foot movable wall divider for use in providing a small lounge area and installation of recessed controlled lighting. Included is a general renovation of the private dining room in the Center and redecoration of the rest rooms.

Northeast President Harold T. White said that the work to

begin immediately will not interrupt service in the cafeteria and will probably be completed within 60 days.

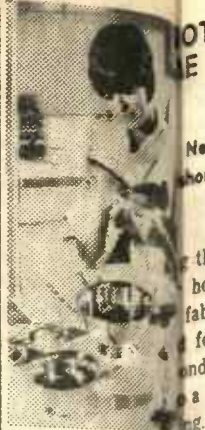

Additional Safety Devices Now Required For Water Heaters

All water heaters need protective devices in addition to the regular operating thermostat. They need to be protected against both excessive temperature and pressure. Many water heaters now in use DO NOT have adequate safety equipment.

Underwriters' Laboratories, on October 15, 1964, required that all water heaters it lists be equipped with a manually-reset, high-limit switch. This is a protective device to assure safe operation of your hot water heater.

(Underwriters' Laboratories approves almost all the electric equipment you buy, from major appliances to extension cords. Their

familiar mark of approval is UL APPROVED, and it simply means that the equipment meets minimum safety standards set up by the electrical industry.)

There are two types of safety devices now available which will meet most area's water heater installation requirements for adequate protection:

1. The installation of a temperature and pressure relief valve placed on top of the water heater tank or on the hot water line not more than six pipe inches away from the tank. Such valves should be B.T.U. rated and should bear the ASME and National Board stamp.
2. The installation of a listed pressure relief valve along with the UL approved high-limit switch. (This high-limit switch will be standard on UL approved models after October 15, 1965.)

Either of these types will offer the protection you and your family need.

We urge you to have your water heater checked by a qualified electrician or plumber to see if it is adequately protected. If it is not, we strongly urge you to take the advice of your electrician or plumber and use one of the two methods above to properly protect your water heater.

ance. If possible the second method is recommended for its reinforcing qualities.

On heavy fabrics, reduce bulk by using a lining fabric for facings. Understitch facings for a sharper edge. You may substitute a braid trimmed edge. Reinforce buttonholes with the strips of lightweight fabrics. Hem tricot-bonded garments through lining only.

Use either steam or dry iron for pressing, with heat setting suitable for outer fabric. Use dry or damp press cloth.

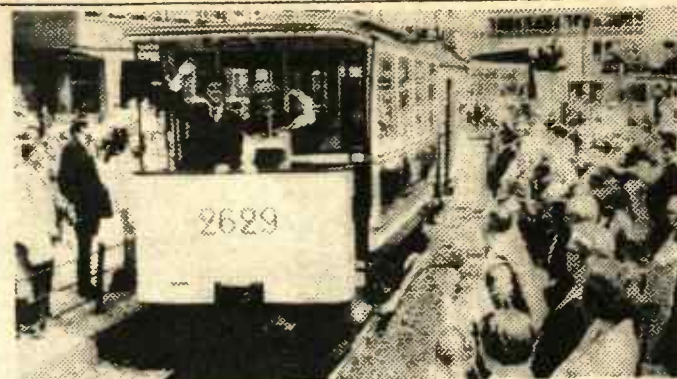

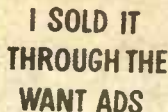

Thin Pines For Better Growth

Thinning your pine trees helps prevent stagnation of growth.

In young trees, where the stand is thick, pines will naturally thin themselves out. However this natural process of thinning gradually slows down as the pines mature and diameter growth practically stops. When this occurs, the stand of pines is said to be stagnated.

Thinning of pine trees is necessary for another reason. In some stands a number of trees will grow much faster than the others. These with fast growth tend to shade out the slower growing pines. The landowner must remove these pines that are being shaded, as well as the broken topped trees, crooked and doubled trees in order to get a better overall growth per stand of pines.

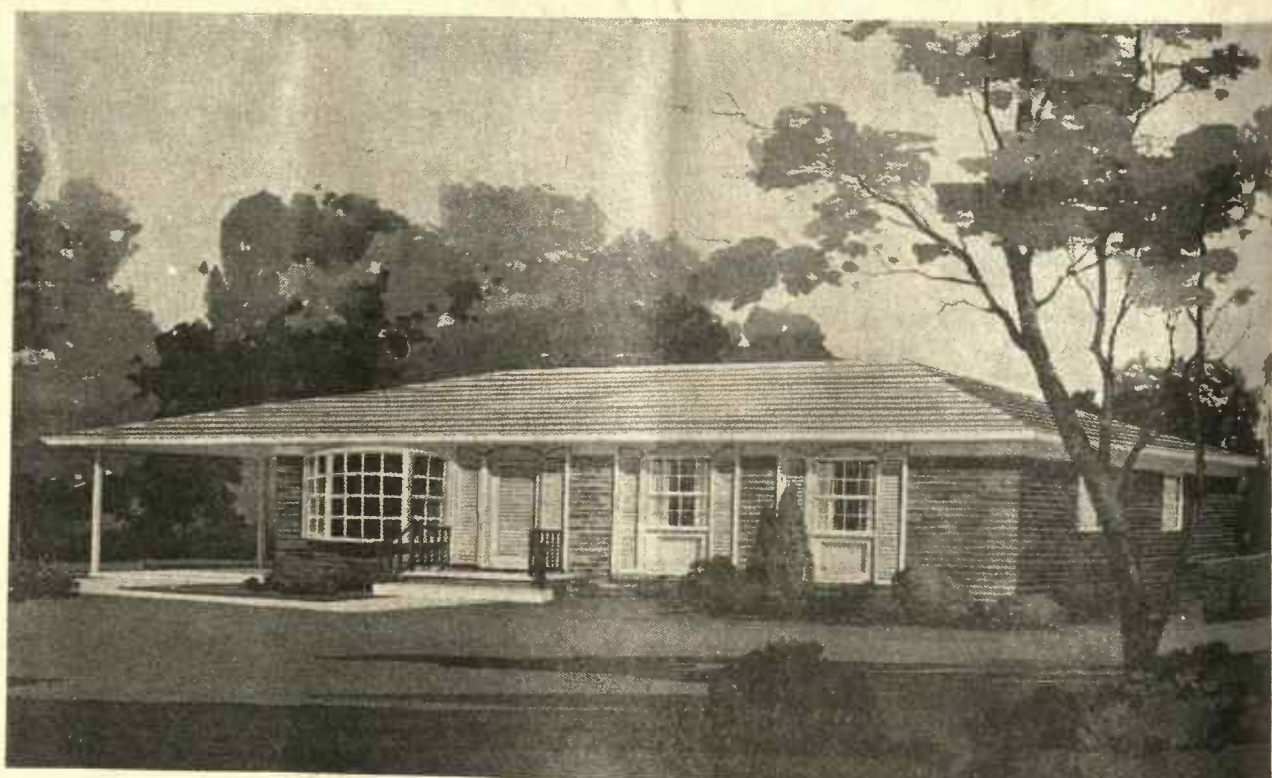

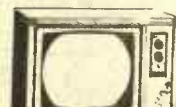

AUTO OWNERS:

1966 Automobile License Plates will be on sale at the Sheriff's Office during the month of October, but should not be placed on the vehicle until November 1.

You are required to have the following information when you buy a Tag: Make, Year Model, Body Type, Motor Or Serial Number, And from whom the Automobile was purchased. In order to receive the proper Tax Exemptions in the State of Mississippi, it is necessary for you to have a Mississippi License Plate for your Automobile.

If you are a resident citizen of Mississippi even though you work in an adjoining state, you are required by law to purchase Mississippi Tags as Mississippi has a reciprocal agreement with adjoining States for the owner of motor vehicles in either State to purchase License Plates in the State where they live and then permitting the owner to use the automobile in commuting to and from work.

If you do not have the required information in regard to the description of your Automobile, the clerks in the Sheriff's Office will be glad to help you in any way they can to secure sufficient information to purchase a tag.

County's 1963 Retail Trade Reported

Tishomingo County's 178 Retail Establishments had \$10.9 Million in sales in 1963, an increase of 38 percent from 1958, the U. S. Bureau of the Census has reported after tabulating data gathered from all firms in the 1963 census of business. The last previous business census conducted by the Census Bureau, an agency of the U. S. Department of Commerce, was in 1958.

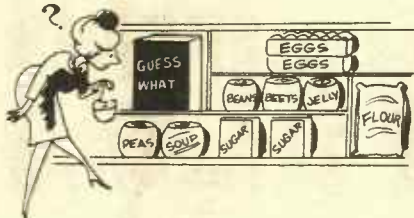
Retail trade in the county meant jobs (exclusive of proprietors) for 256 men and women and a yearly payroll of \$535 thousand.

In volume of business the county's food stores had sales of \$3.2 Million, an increase of 46 percent from 1958. In other retail business—the county's eating and drinking places had sales of \$189 Thousand, and Gasoline Service Stations had sales of \$742 Thousand.

For the state as a whole, the Census Bureau reported 19,167 retail establishments with sales of \$1,914.2 Million, up 29 percent from 1958.

Figures on number of establishments and sales volume for major types of retail establishments in each county are provided in the printed report.

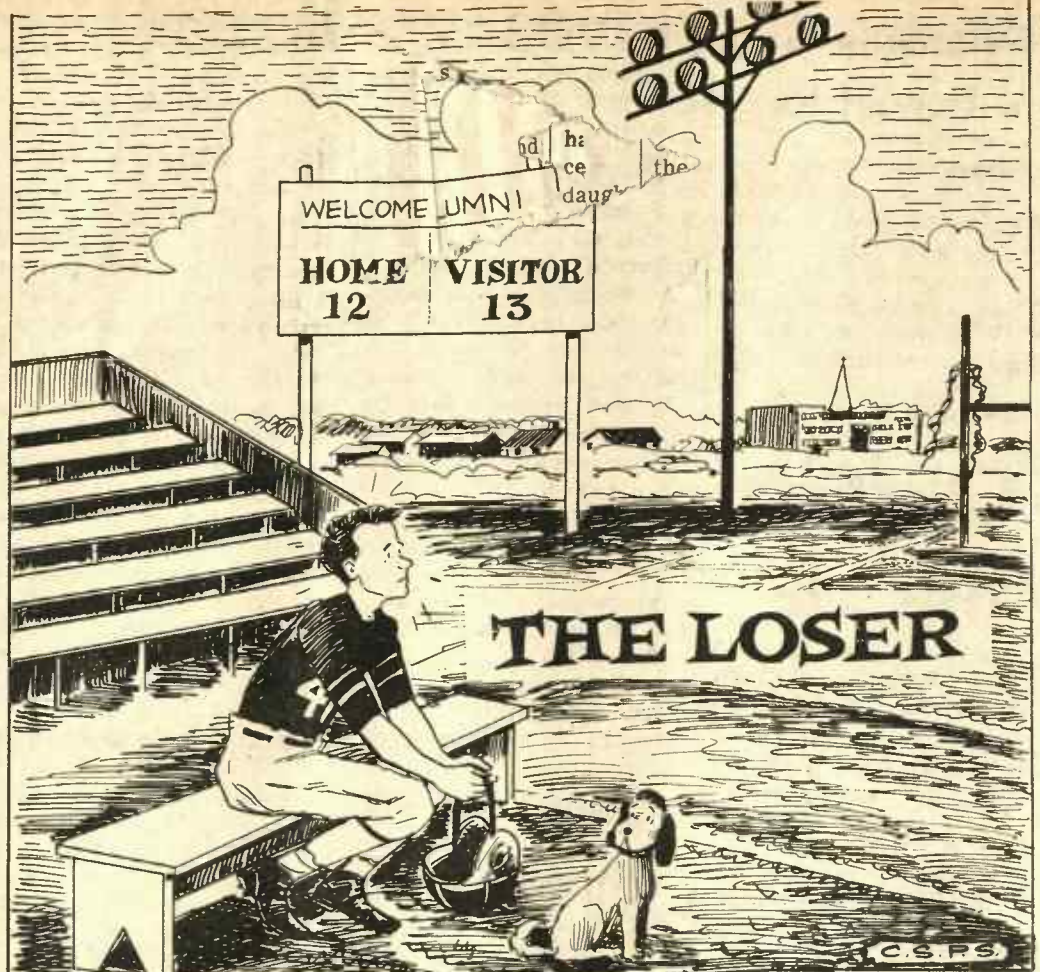

IN RETIREMENT, WIFE FINDS A NEW CAUSE TO BE JEALOUS

Wives, ranging as they do from shrews to sweethearts, aren't always fun to come home to in retirement.

Some husbands, in fact, had rather the Army would draft them. This week a husband spoke out on the matter:

"My name must remain anonymous for obvious reasons," he said. "But my problem surely is not mine alone. Thousands of other husbands must share it."

"I found on retirement, after a strenuous career, that I was too close to the every-day activities at home. I had looked forward to retirement, hoping it would furnish me the leisure and freedom of mind to read, keep up with current affairs, listen to discussions . . . and thus update myself in my general education."

"However, things have not worked out well. It seems that while I prepared myself for what I wanted to do in retirement, and how I would use the spare time, my family did not. This particularly applies to my wife, who feels frustrated that she cannot share with me a new life of serenity that my financial security has produced."

"She keeps asking: 'What do I get out of your retirement?' And she stresses the fact that her daily duties have not changed. She naturally feels her sense of responsibility in managing the home, but when I offer to take over some small chores she shrugs me off. She says I am not capable of doing housework, and that I would only make her job worse."

"What can be done about this endless jealousy of a wife . . . and the friction it causes at home?"

Well, a man could go back about ten years and start over. It might take this long to condition a wife to her husband's retirement, especially if she is inclined to be jealous of the benefits—exclusively his own—that he will get at 65. This jealousy is far more prevalent than most husbands suspect. Many very good wives quietly burn in resentment over the one-sided blessings of retirement.

In the main, the husband is to blame when friction moves into his marriage after retirement. The pension of HIS. The Social Security is HIS, and his wife shares in it only because she has him. The retirement is HIS, as tribute at the retirement party, his gold watch, and service certificate prove. The husband who comes home with this small-boy complex—as many do—is going to run into a buzz-saw. Because the woman who married him as an equal to share, and who thinks that over the 40 or so years of their marriage she has contributed some overshoes, some meals, and a bit of tender-loving-care to HIS pension, is going to rebel, even if silently, at the proposition that she is to be the underprivileged partner of his retirement.

So for ten years or so before retirement a smart husband would start talking in terms of OUR pension, OUR retirement, and making plans for retirement that—as all their previous life together—includes them both . . .

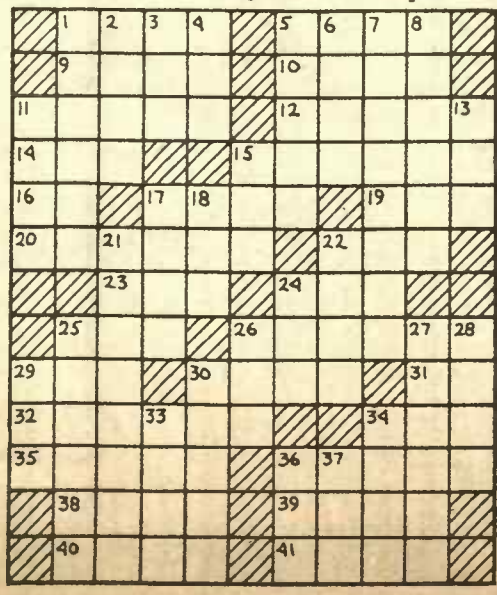

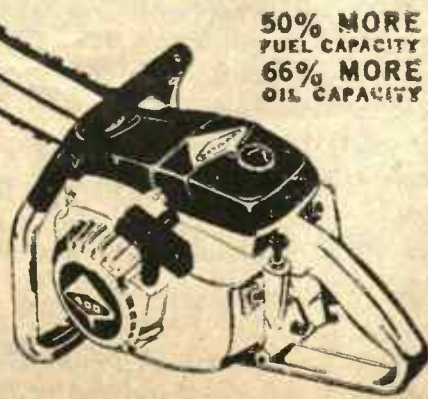

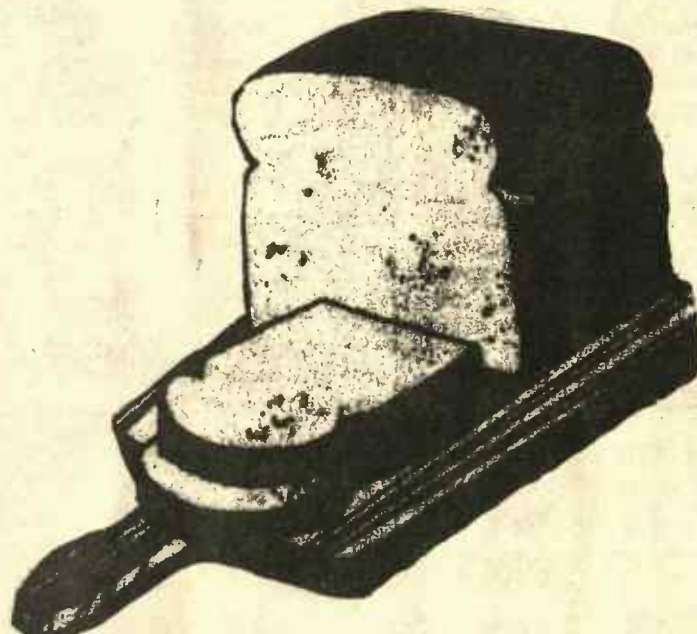
