It is extremely gratifying to know that visitors to our county are highly observant of the growth and expansion that is and has been going on for the past several years.

We have reference to the visit of the R. H. Howards of Chicago

Mr. Howard is a native of Iuka, having lived here until about 20 years old when he migrated to Chicago in 1921. His family owned and lived in the home now occupied by Hiram Jones on the corner of Meigg and Main streets. The Howards still own the property and come back for visits from time to time.

He was in your editor's office Tuesday and it was truly heartwarming to hear him talk of the drastically noticeable changes that have taken place.

The Howards were here in 1956, again in 1962 and now at this time when Mr. Howard says the greatest changes are visible.

In 1956, he said, few changes had been made. "In 1962 I came back and I noted with pride the large shirt factory that would be a credit to any community and the expansion that was going on at the Shoe Plant. Also, the underpass viaduct for highway 25 was completed and new homes were bursting out all around.

"But the noticeable changes have taken place from 1962 to 1965," he continued. "This big and significant change has come about with the building of Consolidated Aluminum plant, the construction of Counce Chevrolet Co.'s big building where was formerly a weed covered hill; the many business buildings that have gone up on highway 25 south including the Chrysler-Plymouth business; also, the fine new churches and schools that mean so much to the area.

"In addition, streets have been opened up where I remember there were no streets. And there are unaccountable new homes on those new streets. I tell you," he said, "this community has certainly grown and we are indeed happy to observe this prosperous condition," he concluded.

Mr. Howard is seeing our community and area through eyes that are unaccustomed to the activity that has been going on. We who are here each day may not be aware of these changes since we see them come about from day to day and so slowly that change is not too perceptible.

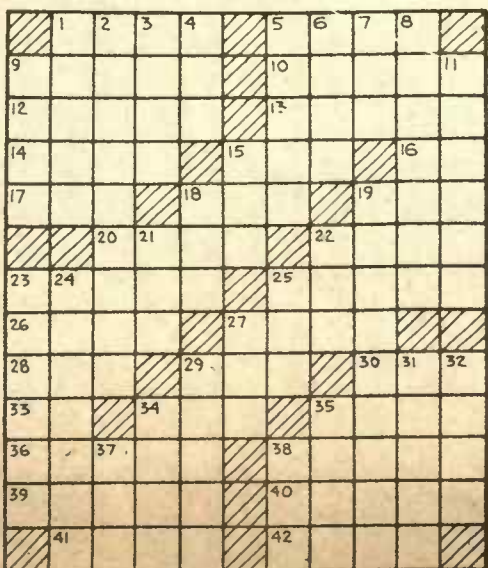
However, if we will stop for a few moments of recollection, we can visualize how Iuka looked ten years ago and we can see the growth Mr. Howard is talking about.

RETIRED WIDOW FINDS KEY TO GOOD LIFE IN SUBURBIA

"My husband passed away with a heart attack six years after he retired. It was pretty hard. I felt like walking the floor and wringing my hands. Instead I decided to paint the inside of my house.

"That surely is a good way to keep from crying—just try to cry with a brush full of paint splattering in your face from the ceiling.

"The ceiling needs doing again now. But I'll save it for some blue day next winter . . ."

Thus does a wonderful lady, Mrs. Walter Leach, keynote an attitude toward life that has brought her happiness in a neighborhood of children, dogs, and noise.

Retired people moving into the suburbs, then complaining about what their neighbors do, she said, have lost one of the greatest gifts a person can have — "an understanding heart."

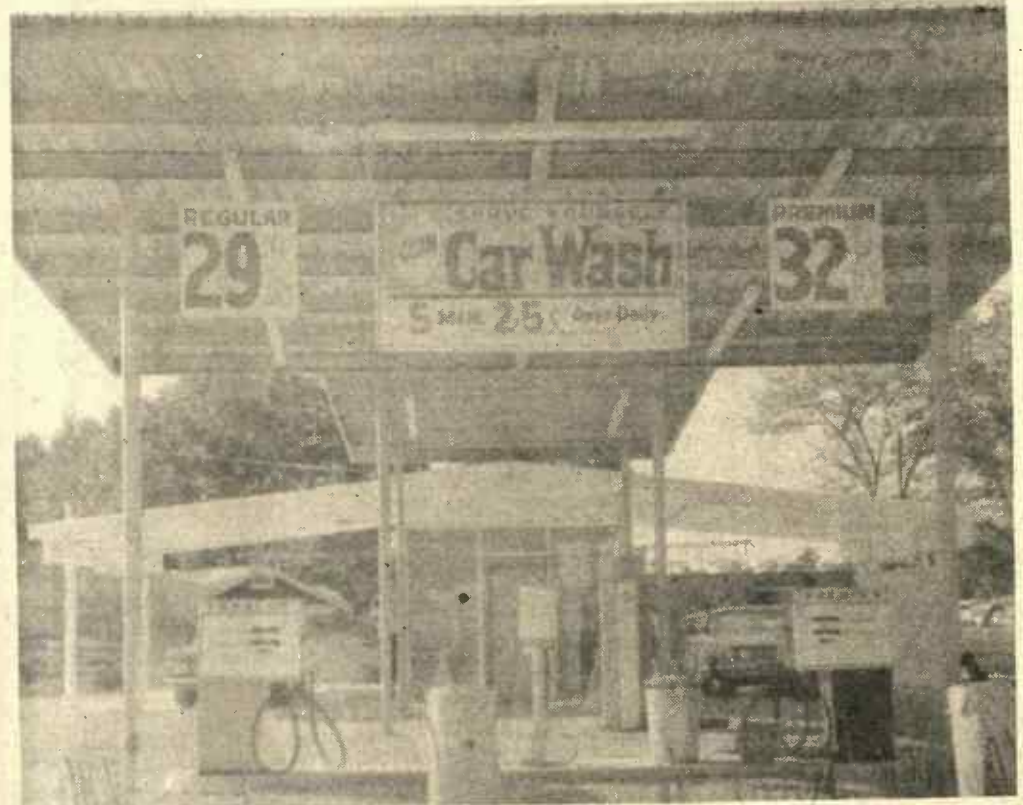
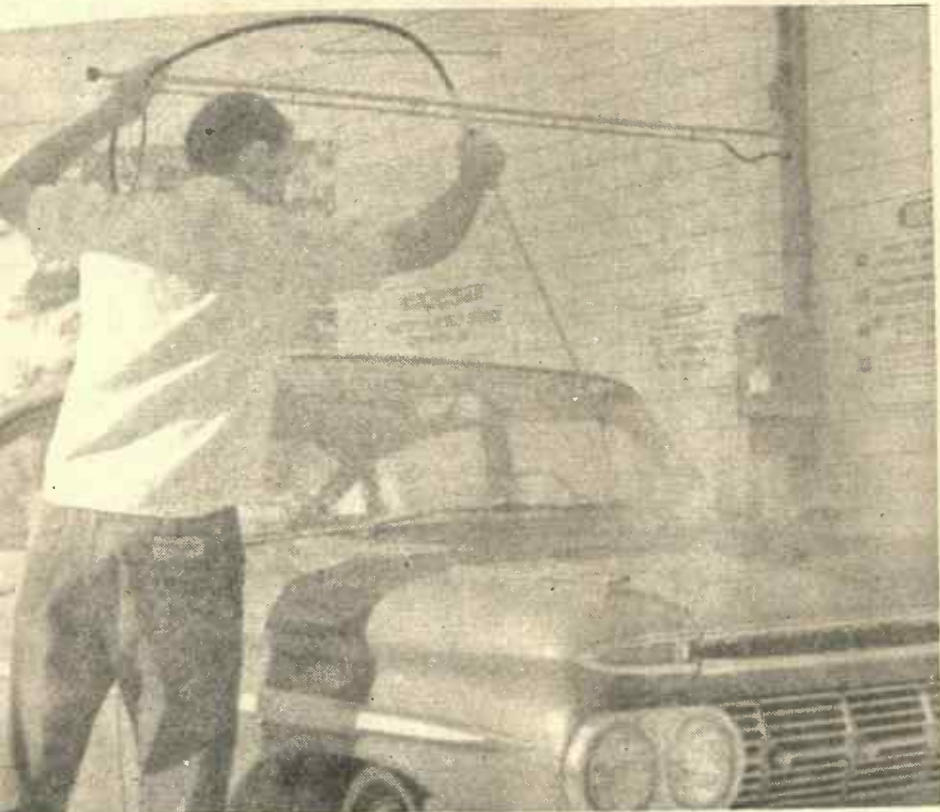

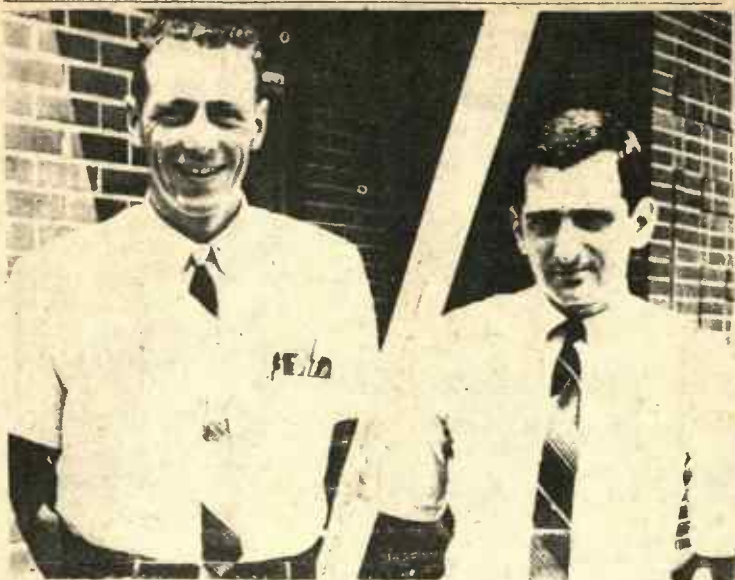

NOTES FROM HOME ECONOMIST

Plumbers get more calls to open clogged drains than for any other service, and most of these are in the kitchen.

Yet, with just a little care, most clogging of drains can be prevented.

Liquid fats in dishwasher and other wastes are the cause of most stoppages. As they go down, they hit the cooler pipe

and are solidified, forming a film of grease on the pipe wall. This film is gradually built up. Coffee grounds and bits of food add to the accumulating layer until the pipe becomes impassable.

To avoid clogging, wipe fat from greasy foods, such as bacon off your dishes before you put them in the dishwasher. Don't ever pour excess grease down the drain. Pouring hot water down the drain once a day helps keep it clean. So does the regular use of a commercial cleaner.

Built-In Nutrition

When you see the word "enriched" on a sack of flour or meal, you know it means built-in nutritional benefits.

In the enrichment process, essential B-vitamins, thiamine, niacin, and riboflavin plus the minerals calcium and iron are added for building and maintaining your family's good health. Four or more servings of enriched grain products each day will meet your family's requirements for these nutrients.

Laundry Heating Pad Cover. Always launder the removable slipcover on your heating pad in hot sudsy water after use by an illness of a member of the household. Pressing it with a hot iron is an added precaution.

Remember that germs can be transmitted by a heating pad as easily as by soiled sheets or pillow cases.

Be Sure To Eat Breakfast

The exact foods you eat for breakfast aren't the important thing. What's important is that you eat a good breakfast. To eat a good breakfast, you need to choose foods that give you protein, vitamins and minerals materials to build and repair your body and keep you healthy. You need foods that provide fuel for body energy. And, you need food that tastes good.

To give your breakfast toast a different taste, you may want to try Orange Cinnamon Toast:

Combine 2 tablespoons orange juice concentrate with 1/2 cup sugar, 2 teaspoons cinnamon and 2 tablespoons melted butter. Toast 6 slices of white bread on one side, under the broiler. Turn bread, brush

with orange mixture, and toast until lightly browned, about 4 minutes. Serve while hot.

Medicare Informational Kits Go To Residents of This County

Note: This is the first of a series of columns on health insurance, Social Security, and Medicare. District Manager in Tuscaloosa, Mississippi, telling what Medicare means to you and your family.)

le in Tishomingo County are over 65 and drawing Social Security benefits will receive in the mail a Medicare Informational Kit. It contains a booklet explaining to the older persons health services they receive under the Basic Hospital Insurance Plan and what additional supplementary protection is available under the Voluntary Insurance Plan.

included in the kit will be enrollment card for the voluntary medical insurance. It is a punch card with the name and social security number of

the person on it and it is an extremely simple form to complete. The beneficiary will be asked to mail it back in a postage free envelope indicating whether the supplementary medical insurance that will cover doctor bills and other medical services is desired. This can all be done by mail.

All the people over 65 on the social security rolls will not receive their Medicare Kits in the mail at the same time. Some people will receive their kits this week and some every week continuing until sometime in November. These kits are being mailed out according to the last digit of the beneficiary's social security number and will result in one social security beneficiary receiving his kit and his neighbor not receiving his until several weeks later. This will not, however, affect anyone's rights to these benefits since they have until March 31, 1966, to enroll in the Voluntary Insurance Program.

People over 65 who are still working should go to the Social Security Office and file as soon as possible. Even if they cannot collect monthly social security benefits, because their earnings are too high, they will be eligible for hospital benefits and medical insurance.

People 65 or over who have never worked under social security or who have not worked long enough to qualify for social security benefits will need to apply for both hospital benefits and the voluntary medical insurance. However, those who

are on old-age assistance need take no action until they get further information on how to sign up from their Welfare Agency or the Social Security Office.

Next Spring the Social Security Administration will mail to each person on the rolls a health insurance card which he can use like a Blue Cross card when he goes to the hospital. If he has enrolled in the medical insurance plan the card will show that he is eligible for the payment of these services too.

People already having health insurance coverage should not, because of this new law, cancel any hospital or medical insurance they now have. None of the hospital or health insurance provisions of the new law give any protection whatsoever until July, 1966.

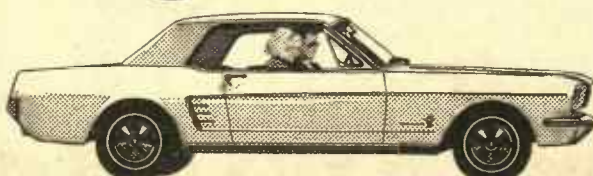

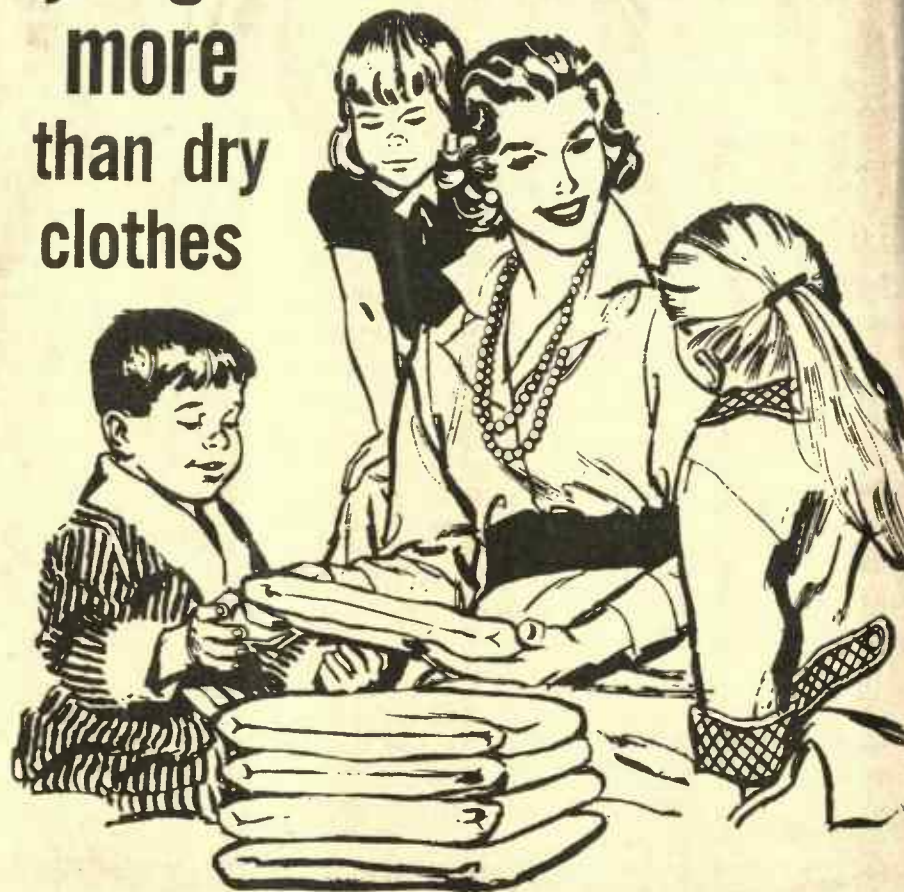

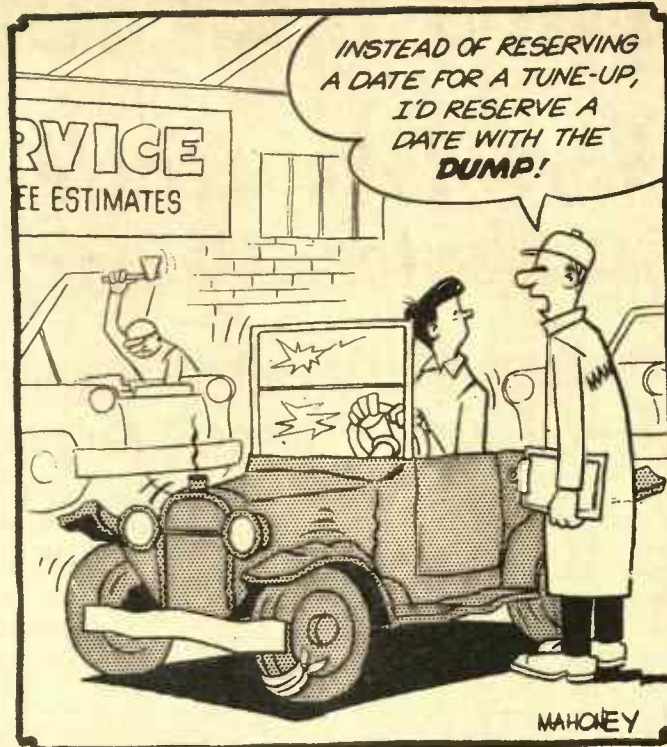

Student Union Face Lifting

The Northeast Mississippi Junior College Board of Trustees has awarded a contract to S and S Construction Company of Corinth for remodeling the Student Center Building on the Northeast campus.

Included is a general renovation of the private dining room in the Center and redecoration of the rest rooms.

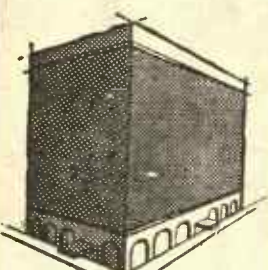

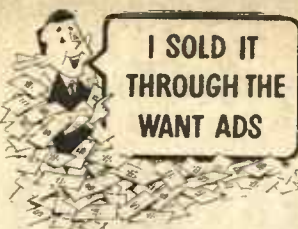
