Driver of the Aberle car was Mrs. Aberle's husband, Richard, age 30, who was rushed to Memphis by McPeters ambulance service. He was reported in critical condition.

The long-time resident of Tishomingo County was a Baptist.

Iuka C of C Hears Wilhite Thursday Night; Reports

Members Told Of Four Goals In Community's Future

Sam Wilhite of Florence, Ala. told Iuka Chamber of Commerce members last Thursday night of the four goals a community should have in order to move ahead progressively.

Mr. Wilhite was the principal speaker at the regular quarterly meeting of the Iuka group. He is chairman of the Florence-Lauderdale Industrial Expansion committee and has been highly successful in promoting that section of northwest Alabama.

P. O. Beard presided at the meeting and gave a summary of the monthly directors meet-

ings. The Chamber voted to accept the new sign to be erected at the intersection of highways 25 and 72. A sample of the sign was offered on display at the meeting. Among other business was a report by J. R. Long on the Christmas parade. County Agent Percie Stricklin gave a report on the agricultural situation at the present time.

Mr. Wilhite said that the four goals an individual or a community must have to move ahead progressively are:

Vision, to see beyond the horizon; Faith in the future; Courage to meet situations as they arise; and Perseverance in pursuing projects that are worthy and worthwhile.

The speaker pointed out that different modes of transportation are positively necessary in this day of haste. He stated that present plans call for the enlarging of the Muscle Shoals airport to a size sufficient to accommodate jet planes. He further stated that all smaller communities will be performing a worthwhile service to provide airport facilities for "That's the way business will travel from now on," he said.

Sam Wilhite will be remembered as the office manager for the late Gov. Hugh White during his last term as the Chief Executive of Mississippi. Mr. Wilhite was also one of the organizers and first directors of the North Miss. Development Association.

Low Bidders Awarded Contracts

To Construct Water System For Burnsville

The three companies submitting lowest bids on the construction of a new water system for the town of Burnsville were Layne-Central of Memphis, Horton Bros. of Corinth, and the Chicago Bridge and Iron Company.

Layne-Central, submitting a low bid of \$14,600.00, was awarded the contract to dig the well.

Horton Bros. of Corinth was awarded the contract to construct the Distribution System and Treatment Plant. Their bids were \$14,200.00 to construct the Treatment Plant and \$58,098.35 for the Distribution System.

The Chicago Bridge and Iron Company, submitting a low bid of \$26,900.00, will construct the 100,000 gallon water tank.

All bids are subject to the approval of the Housing and Home Finance Agency of Atlanta which has given their consent to purchase the town's bonds.

Voters cast their ballots on Friday, September 24 in a special election held at the Burnsville City Hall to determine whether the town should issue its waterworks system revenue bonds in the maximum amount of \$127,000 to raise money for the purpose of constructing a complete water system for the town.

Sealed bids were opened by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Burnsville at a meeting held Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock at the Town Hall.

Slow Mails Discouraging

Many years have passed since postal service into Tishomingo county has been as poor as it is today.

With that statement we do not have reference to the local mail carriers, the post office employees or the postmasters in the county. Neither do we have reference to the haulers of mail on the various star routes.

But we do have reference to the number of times mail is left at the post offices; mail arriving from communities and cities in other counties nearby and mail coming from distant points.

Generally, first class mail from Atlanta, Ga., to this county is two and three days in making the trip. Formerly, the same mail would be here overnight. Mail from Nashville, Tennessee, to Iuka and other points in the county takes an unusually long time. Mail from Detroit, Chicago, New York, and other places is slow in arriving.

Fast, regularly dependable mail service is inductive to good business conditions. Economically, the area is dependent upon the mails for this is the method used for transferring records from one point to another. Some firms are large enough that they can and do provide private carriers. Genesco, operators of Tishomingo Shoe Company in Iuka, dispatches their records and messages to the home offices in Nashville almost exclusively by private carrier.

However, that firm is one of the largest in the nation. Small businesses can ill afford such a convenience. Instead, they have to depend on the mails.

For many years, Trains 35 and 36 were depended upon to leave mail regularly on their east and west trips across the country; and trains traveling the Illinois Central were equally as dependable in delivering mails on their regular north and south runs.

Mail service by trains into the county was recently discontinued, and with this came the one and only single delivery into the county. This one mail service daily is the malignant ulcer that will eventually undermine our economy unless a remedy is found.

Slow mails discourage business. Many people in the area report greater use of long distance telephoning in order to get goods on order for quicker delivery and to transact other business faster. This is an added expense.

We feel that there are ways to improve the county's mail service. We feel that improved mail service will be necessary for residents of the area to properly conduct business and have equal communication with other areas of the nation.

Buses have been used to transport mails and we believe an arrangement to use buses to deliver mails to the post offices within the area would be beneficial and will afford those daytime deliveries of items that would otherwise not be deliverable to the addressee until the next day. (There is only one mail service into the county — at about 8 o'clock each morning.)

Two and three deliveries can be made daily by buses that travel regularly from Memphis to Birmingham, Chattanooga, Atlanta, and vice versa, and making connections with all points of the nation. First class mail dispatched by bus would arrive at the local post offices and could be worked up in time for business to be done on effects of that mail that day instead of having to wait an additional 24 hours.

We feel that this area is as important to the economy of the nation as is any other area. We feel that our people are as important as any other in the nation, and being equal in all respects, we feel that our mail service should be as equal as any other area. The Post Office Department owes it to us to give us this service.

SO A COTTAGE ON A LAKE IS YOUR MEAT AFTER 65?

As you continue trying to master the art of retiring — an art that still eludes most people — you come eventually to a cottage on a lake.

Such a cottage is a popular retirement idea these days, what with all the lakes that have been created around the country in recent years. From about age 55 on, many people start pricing lake lots, or contracting for shell houses they can complete themselves, or buying established cottages that are for sale.

Should YOU follow the parade? Here is an autumn appraisal of what retirement to a cottage on a lake is like, based on talks with a hundred or so retired people that are trying it:

— It is a chic thing to do. There's little doubt that friends back in the city and former-fellow workers at the company will envy you.

— It is a less expensive life than the city, partly because everything is informal but mainly because there is little to spend money for except a Ferris Wheel ride at some nearby County Fair.

— You won't have much fun fishing, nor will you catch much to brag about. The lakes are being fished to death. Even the fish the states are hatching to restock the lakes are biting the dust before they're four inches long.

— In summer, swarms of vacationists will be milling about you because lakes have become a major lure. In the spring you will like the excitement of this influx; by late August you'll be pretty sick of it.

— Vacationists bring boats with them, usually with motors attached. All summer they roar back and forth, often with yelling kids riding water skis behind

them. It's noisy, but you get conditioned to it by mid-July and don't notice. Nights are quiet.

— You will find that a lake area usually gets as hot as a frying pan in summer, and your inclination will be to stay indoors from about 10:30 to 4 each day and let the young folks take over. In the fall you will feel great relief as the vacationists depart and then, except in the hot climates, you will enter a lonely winter of isolation. You won't like it much.

— You'll not have as many deadbeat houseguests, from the city as is generally supposed. A few, but not many. In fact, during the winters, you'll wish you had more.

— In general, the lakes of recent times are well removed from urban areas. Your cottage, most likely, will be out of touch with civilization except for some nearby rural town and the small businesses that grow up around lake resorts.

— Doctors will not be inclined to ride down your rutted road at night to make house calls. If, indeed, there is a doctor around.

— Retirement cottages on a lake are usually not very good houses. Many are jerry-built, or do-it-yourself projects of amateurs.

— About boats. They are synonymous with lake life. But you don't get them with trading stamps. They cost. They also don't pull very easily up the hill to your basement in the fall. Not after age 65. Maybe you can ride in a neighbor's boat. Buying him some gas, or something.

ance and washability. Flat
paints soiled and stained more
easily than either gloss or semi-
gloss paints.

The "one coat" variety of
paint did well in soil resistance
and washability, as did rubber-
based and casein paints.

Wallboard material with gloss

paint baked on a pressed wood
base proved the most resistant
to staining and easier to wash.
But it wasn't considered as at-
tractive as many other finishes.

The so-called washable wall-
papers, although attractive,
proved poorest in stain resist-
ance and washability of all ma-
terials tested. Wallpapers could
be made more stain resistant
and easier to wash by applying
a coat of lacquer.

Plastic, aluminum tile, lami-
nated plastic and ceramic tile
rated high in stain resistance.

Consider the use of the room
as you choose your wall finish.
In some areas attractive design
will be more important than
cleanability. In utility areas,
stain resistance may be of
prime importance.

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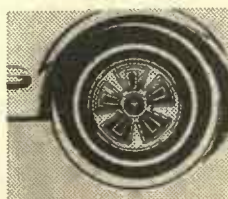

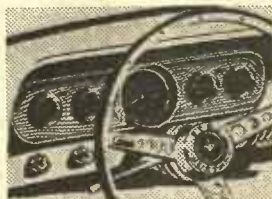

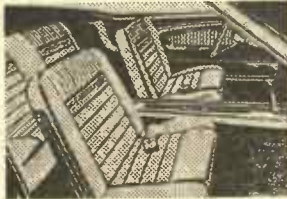

Bread 'N Butter Plays Made By Lomenick - Parker Combination

The person that wrote the script for this one had to be from Hollywood. Nowhere else could you find a script writer with the ability to write like they played last Friday night. It was one of the most exciting contests played in a long time and you weren't sure who would win till the final gun had sounded and the 14-13 score was in Iuka's favor.

Guard Joell Cornelison blocked a field goal attempt by Hamilton's Gary Oliver with 2:29 left in the game that went a long way in determining the outcome. Oliver, kicking from the 15 yard line, was in good field position and could have put the ball between the uprights. He already has one field goal to his credit for the year. This put the lid on Hamilton's last scoring threat for the night and gave the Chief's possession of the ball at a crucial time.

Iuka drew first blood late in the first period when quarterback Harold Lomenick hit halfback Larry Parker with a pass from the 16 yard line. Parker ran over or through three Lions on his trip to the end zone. Lomenick then hit Ronnie Brown with the extra point pass and the Chiefs led 7-0. Two long pass from Lomenick to Parker set up this TD. Lomenick-Parker was good from the Iuka 44 to the Lions 30 and then from the Lions 35 to the 11.

Halfback Jerry Whitaker sprinted 67 yards for the first Lion score with 4:48 remaining in the first half and Oliver converted to give the Lions a 7-7 tie at halftime. Whitaker, who

had several thrilling runs in the game, went up the middle on a quick-opener and then cut left and outraced the Chieftain secondary for the TD.

Hamilton took the second half kickoff and didn't give up control of the pigskin till they had moved out front 13-6. Covering 62 yards in 13 plays, the Lions Jerry Whitaker, Donnie Whitaker, and fullback Gerald Pounders for short yardage. Oliver's attempt for the conversion was wide, following the score by Jerry Whitaker from two yards out. The third quarter ended with the Lions leading 13-7.

Fullback Merle Smith recovered a Lion fumble on the Hamilton 33 to set up the next Iuka touchdown. On this series, Lomenick threw incomplete, then hit Parker with a well-timed pass at the 18. Smith powered to the 14, then Lomenick ran to the 8. Smith picked up one and then the Lomenick-Parker combination worked to the 1. Parker scored on a line-drive to knot the count 13-13. On the same play, Parker bullied his way into paydirt for the crucial EP and the Chieftains led 14-13.

Confusion seemed to play the major role from this point, as several penalties were chalked up against both squads. Jerry Whitaker scored again for the Lions from Iuka's 20 but an offside penalty nullified the run. Cornelison then came on to block the field goal attempt and put the Chieftains out of trouble for the night. The Chieftains were forced to punt on this series, but Parker intercepted a loose Lion pass with

27 seconds left and the Chiefs just waited it out.

The Chiefs put the second effort into this one, and that spelled the difference between the two clubs. Hamilton put on the most potent forward passing attack the Chiefs have faced this year, but Iuka's secondary defense held up dispute the loss of halfback Joe Richardson via injury early in the game. Center Cliff Daniel and end Darryl Ramsey played good defensive ball, along with Cornelison. Smith carried an unusual load for the offense, due to Richardson's injury. Smith consistently picked up a crucial three or four yards in the Chiefs scoring drives. But it was the Lomenick-Parker combination that gave the Chiefs their bread and butter plays.

Such trees can be protected with a lightning rod installed on the tree with a ground cable running down the trunk in moist soil. During an electric storm, its best to stay inside a dry building, away from open fireplaces, windows, and open doorways.

Forest Fire Situation Critical

Leaves And Litter In Woods Extremely Dry

Area Forester Larry Brewer reports that the forest fire situation in Tishomingo County is becoming critical due to the present dry weather. "Even though the number of acres burned to date has been relatively low,

the possibility of a "blow up" situation developing is highly probable," Brewer said. "Leaves and litter in the woods are extremely dry."

According to Brewer, practically all of the recent fires have been caused by hunters and careless burning of debris. "We should remember that an accidental fire can cause just as much damage as a deliberately set fire," he continued.

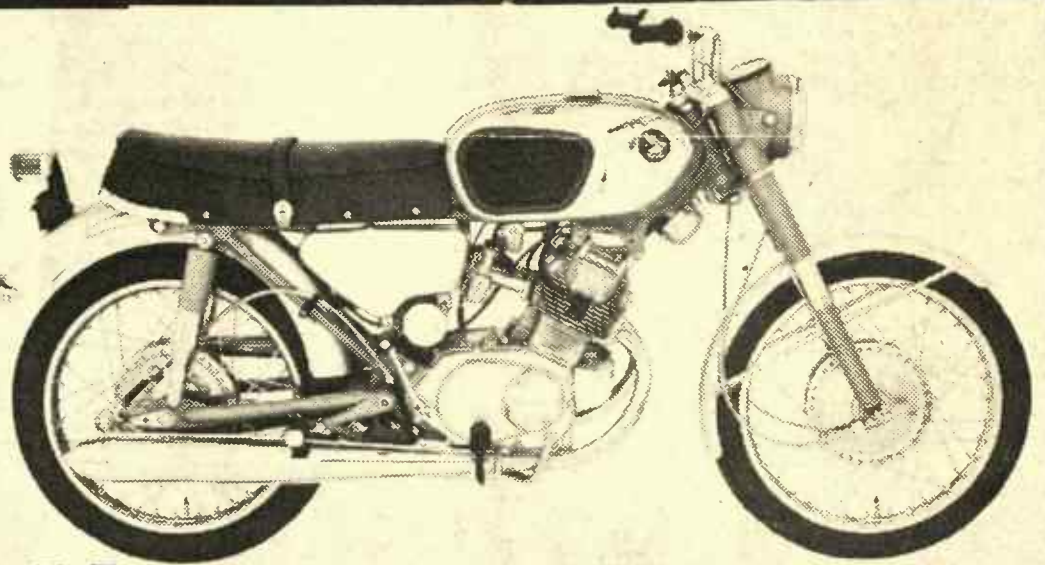
In concluding, the forester stated that several fires have been caused by hunters trying to smoke squirrels out of hollow trees. "Hunters such as these who show no sense of responsibility for preserving game and natural resources or

respect for the rights and property of others make it extremely difficult for the true sportsman," Brewer said.

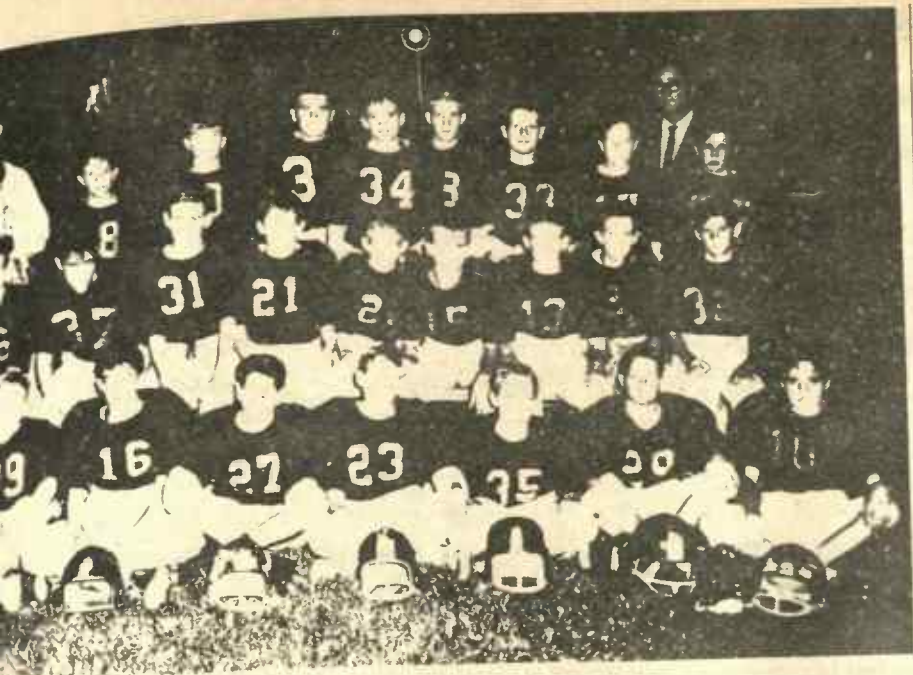

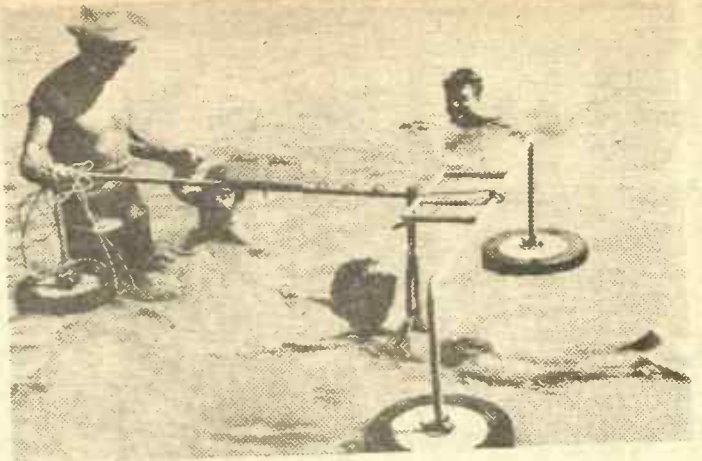
