Blood Program Lost Unless 250 Pints Replaced Friday At Armory

The residents of Iuka and North Tishomingo County will have an opportunity to donate blood this Friday when the Red Cross Bloodmobile will be at the National Guard Armory. Donations may be made between the hours of 12 noon and 6 p.m. Officials of the Tishomingo County Hospital state that these

donations are especially important to you and your family as well as each individual served by the County Hospital.

At the Tishomingo County Hospital alone, over 500 or more pints of blood are used a year. As the situation stands now, under the present blood program, blood used is of no cost to the patient, other than technical expense. However, without this special program, the hospital, and eventually the patient, would have to spend as much as \$10,000 a year for blood alone.

A replacement goal of 250 pints of blood must be reached Friday or this blood program will be lost and the hardship caused will be a great one.

Human blood is used to replace blood lost because of injury, childbirth, or disease; to treat shock due to injuries; for those undergoing surgery; for those severely burned, for anemia; in childbirth for both mother and infant; and to make blood derivatives to serve many new medical purposes.

Tax Collections

The City of Iuka reported a total of \$5,259.19 in Sales Tax Collections during the month of September, showing an increase in comparison with the July figure of \$4,426.19.

This report was taken from a recent issue of Mississippi Municipalities.

The Town of Tishomingo, collecting on the 1 percent rate, showed a total of \$628.79 during September, compared to \$614.54 in July.

Other nearby cities collecting on a 1 percent rate and their totals were: Baldwyn with \$3,513.01; Booneville with \$7,340.06; Corinth, a total of \$19,134.54; Belmont with \$1,845.24; Fulton with \$5,708.98 and Tupelo with \$42,370.00.

Methodist Will Hold County Wide Rally

Bishop Edward J. Pendergrass To Speak; Hundreds Are Expected

Methodists from all over Tishomingo County will gather this coming Sunday afternoon at the Tishomingo High School Gym to participate in the largest event in the history of Tishomingo County Methodism. Hundreds of people are expected to pour into the gym to hear Bishop Edward J. Pendergrass speak. This mass rally, being sponsored by the Tishomingo County Group Ministry, will officially begin at 2:30 P.M.

Bishop Pendergrass, now in his second year as the episcopal leader of Mississippi Metho-

dism, will be making his second visit to Tishomingo County on official business. Last year he presided over the District Conference held at the Iuka Methodist Church. Bishop Pendergrass served as pastor of The First Methodist Church in Orlando, Florida, before being elected to the episcopacy in July of 1964. Since taking over his duties as the leader of The Jackson area, he has gained nation-wide recognition for his splendid leadership of The Methodist Church in Mississippi.

Also on the program Sunday will be Rev. G. H. Holloman, District Superintendent of the New Albany District of The Methodist Church. Other principal figures that are on the program include: Hobson Tiffin of Belmont, President of the County Council, who will serve as Master of Ceremonies; John Trin, Mayor of the Town of Tishomingo, who will give the Welcoming Address; Larry Brewer, Vice-President of the County Council, who will give a short explanation of the purpose of the Group Ministry; and B. L. Mercer of Midway, Secretary of the County Council.

Among highlights of the rally will be special singing by a multi-voice choir composed of youth throughout the county and the baptizing of Miss Martha Jane Baker, infant daughter of Rev. and Mrs. Clay Baker of Tishomingo, by Bishop Pendergrass.

"We think this will be the largest gathering of Methodist people in the history of Tishomingo County," commented Rev. Berry Whitehurst of the Belmont Charge. "It has been a long time since the Methodist of Tishomingo County have participated in an event of this magnitude," added Rev. Harold Street, pastor of the Burnsville Charge.

The Methodist Youth Fellowship of Iuka will trick or treat for UNICEF tonight (Thursday) between the hours of 5 o'clock and 7:30.

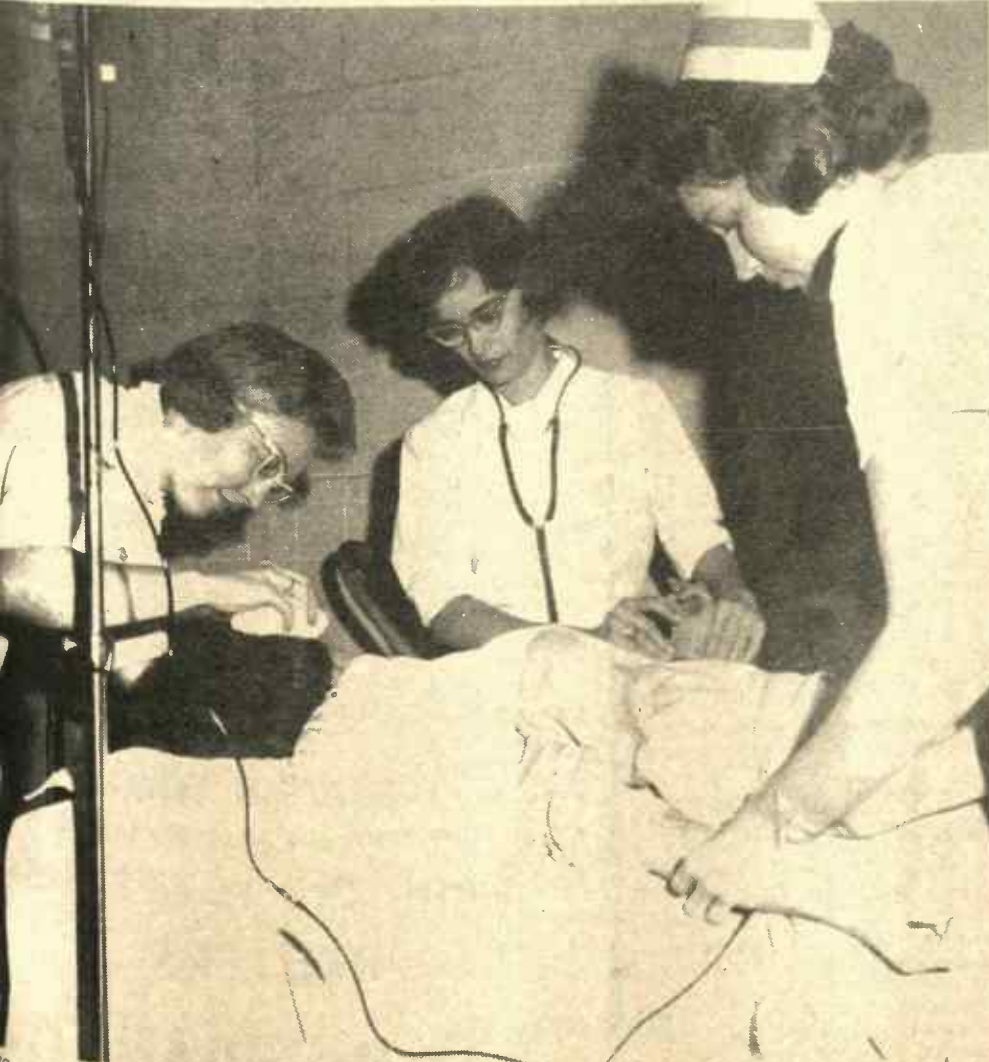
Applications Now Being Taken For LPN Classes

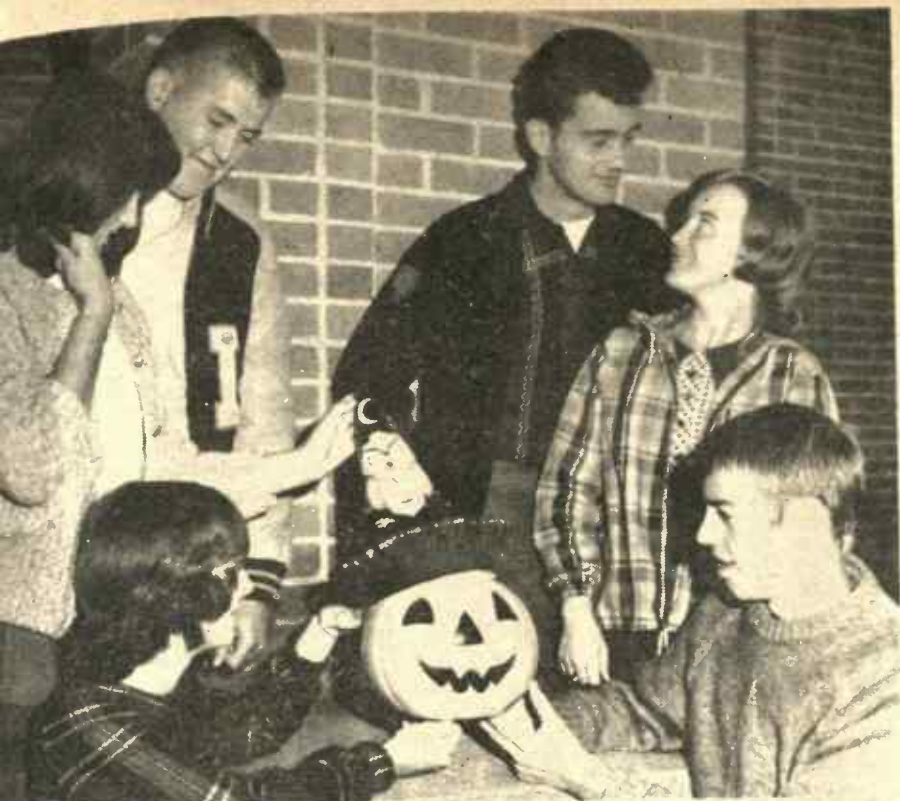

Chieftains Win Homecoming Game

Defeat Smithville With 12-0 Score

Stout Iuka Team Defense Proves Difference; Large Crowd Attends

A pair of anxious Indian war parties met at Chieftain Stadium last Friday night to match strength and skill. When the dust had settled and the leaders sat down to smoke the peace pipe, the Iuka Chieftains were proclaimed Chiefs over the Smithville Seminoles.

All that says that Iuka defeated Smithville 12-0 in their annual homecoming game played before a large crowd at Chieftain Stadium. Halfback Larry Parker scored both of Iuka's touchdowns, the first one from one yard out on the first play of the second quarter and the last on a 18 yard pass from quarterback Harold Lomenick with 1:06 remaining in the 3rd quarter. Both attempts for the extra points we wary and it ended 12-0.

The Chiefs covered 91 yards in 13 plays for their first score, with fullback Merle Smith punching for good yardage, along with Lomenick. Parker capped it with his one yard plunge. The second scoring drive covered 65 yards in 12 plays with the payoff being the 18 yard pass-run play of Lomenick and Parker. Smith picked up good yardage on this drive also, carrying the pigskin to the three before a holding penalty set the Chiefs back to the 18.

Iuka's stingy defense proved too much for the Seminoles. The Chiefs defense, led by guard Joell Cornelison and center Cliff Daniel, allowed the visiting redskins only two first downs the entire night, one in each half. All told, the Chiefs had possession on eighty of the downs. The Seminoles could muster only 25 efforts offensively. The alert Chief defense snatched off three loose Seminole passes, which stopped any serious threats the visiting Indians might have mustered. Smithville did drive as far as the Iuka four in the first half,

but the clock ran out and they were caught napping.

Fullback Merle Smith proved to be the workhorse for the Chiefs in this one. Smith, a 145 pound diminutive fullback, toted the mail 24 times for 99 yds. and a 4.1 clip. He often delivered the goods at a crucial time when short yardage was needed.

Quarterback Harold Lomenick hit on 7 of 19 pass attempts, that were good for 92 yards and one touchdown. He also had one intercepted by halfback Wayne Mason of Smithville that set up the Seminoles only scoring threat.

Pre-game festivities included the crowning of Miss Sybil Reynolds as the 1965 Homecoming Queen of Iuka High School. Her court consisted of Patricia Berryman, Becky Thornton, Dianne Cutshall, and Edna Earl Daugherty. Miss Linda Evans, the 1964 Queen, crowned Sybil in a ceremony that took some luster from the game itself. Probably the most exciting thrill that the homecoming crowd received was when team Co-Captain Larry Parker kissed Miss Reynolds with the traditional embrace.

Fees Will Increase Nov. 1

The fee for certified copies
of birth and death certificates
will be increased effective Nov-
ember 1, according to the State
Board of Health, the official a-
gency responsible for filing and
certifying such records in Mis-
sissippi.

Dr. A. L. Gray, State Health
Officer, says the increase
comes on the advice and appro-
val of the Mississippi Budget
Commission and is in keeping
with charges in other states.

The fee for certifying, verifi-
ing, or searching for a birth or
death record will be \$2.00, be-
ginning November 1.

However, if additional copies
of the same record are request-
ed at the same time, the cost of
each additional copy is \$1.00.

In the event a search fails to
find the record filed with the
State Board of Health, the ap-
plicant is notified what steps
to take to secure a delayed cer-
tificate.

Dr. Gray states that the fee
for a delayed birth certificate
will be increased on November
1 to \$5.00.

'65 Registration At Northeast Sets All-Time High Record

According to figures released
from the office of Mrs. Joan B.
Rakestraw, registrar, the North
east Mississippi Junior College
has more than 1100 students en-
rolled for the fall term in the
academic, vocational-technical
and evening programs.

Of this number, 845 are aca-
demic students, including 562
freshmen and 245 sophomores.
Entering college for the first
time are 402 students; 132 are
returnees and 28 are transfers.
Sophomore returnees number
241 with 4 transferring from
other schools. There are six
special students or those taking
less than 12 hours.

According to Hale Aust, voca-
tional-technical coordinator, 43
students are registered in his
program. There are 30 vocational
students and 13 technical
students in day classes alone.

A total of 223 students have
enrolled for evening classes. Of
these, 63 are academic and 160
are vocational students.

Enrollment figures from the
five-county area of the college
show Alcorn County with 166
day students as compared with
163 a year ago; Prentiss County
with 201 as compared with 195;
Tippah with 104 as compared
with 95; Tishomingo with 108

as compared with 90; and Un-
ion with 175 as compared with
141.

There are 18 out-of-district
students and 34 out-of-state
representing Alabama, Arkan-
sas, Illinois, Ohio, and Tennes-
see. There is also one foreign
student from Nicaragua.

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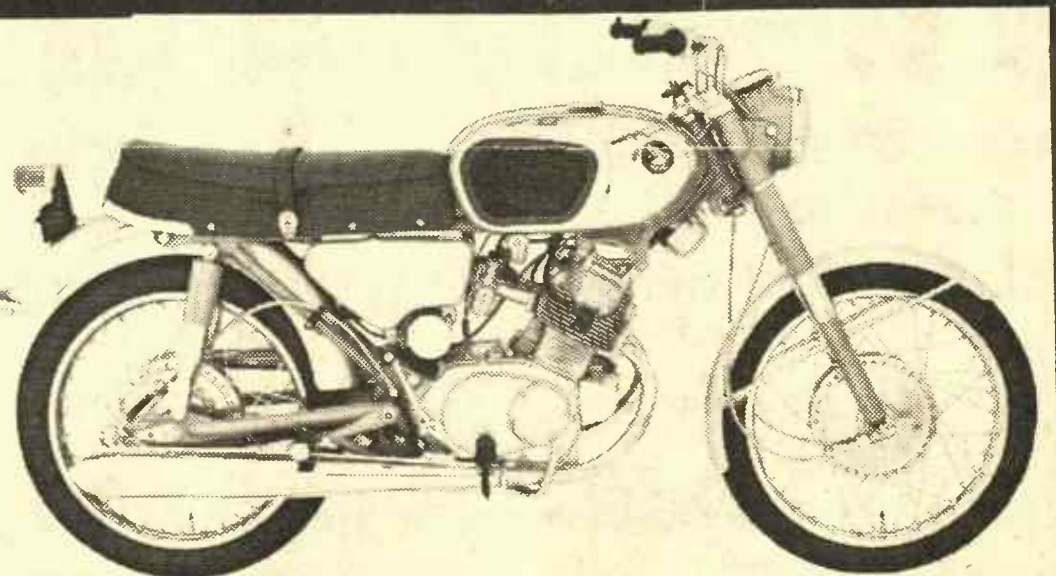

Forestry Notes

Miss. Forestry Commission
This is the time of year when many landowners are looking ahead and planning another year's activities. They are giving serious thought to how they should invest their time, money and efforts in managing their land.

The alternative that is often

overlooked is "tree planting." A recent study of older plantations in the Tennessee Valley shows that the average long-time yield of a pine plantation is about \$15 per acre per year. If there is no higher use for the land in the immediate future than growing trees, then it seems logical that it would be to the landowner's best interest to plant it to seedlings, protect it from fire and other injury, and manage it so that he might

expect maximum returns from the future tree crop.

Considering that pine will grow on land not best suited to crops, it is economically unsound to let this land lie idle.

Since pine will produce good cash returns on land not suited for agriculture, consider how a tree crop may be of value to you. Plan to plant your idle acres this season.

Poultry Management

Damp or wet litter in the poultry house can mean trouble. It makes for a bigger dirty egg problem and promotes diseases.

Keep litter dry by good management. Make sure of the drainage—floor should be higher than surrounding ground. Avoid water spillage. Stir litter frequently.

Don't Burn Broomsedge

Once upon a time farmers thought it wise to burn off broomsedge fields. They thought that it made the grass come up earlier and grow better.

But now we know better! We know that broomsedge is not good grazing, but there is a lot of bermuda, dallis and lespedeza growing down in the sedge that would be killed out by fire. This will make grazing later next spring.

To get rid of broomsedge, apply phosphate and potash this fall, then nitrogen next spring. Graze the area heavily and you have broomsedge on its way out.

Sod Seeding

Sod seeding gives the cheapest grazing of any planting method known. But you will be cheating yourself if you try to get by with little or no fertilizer!

One acre per cow planted this month will give enough good late winter and early spring grazing. Plant 100 pounds of small grain and 25 pounds of ryegrass to the acre. Using a 60-60-60 fertilizer mixture per acre should give good returns.

For extra grazing, more nitrogen can be applied in the early spring.

Sod seeding is good to use on

solid clover stands, which will give a good grazing mixture. It can also be used to plant winter peas in bermuda grass.

Sod seeding also improves pastures. It thickens up thin sods and renovates heavy sods.

Protein Supplement

Extra protein is vital for wintering beef cattle. Lots of farmers are using protein meal mixed with salt (two parts meal and one of salt). This is fed free choice, with the salt serving as an intake regulator.

Drain Wet Lands In Dry Weather

The time to tackle the job of draining wet land areas is during dry weather.

Usually the land that is wet has a growth of bushes or trees

that must be removed before a drainage ditch can be surveyed and time to clear the ditch. The less often the ditch is cleared, the more the ditch will have gained from the problem. If you have a problem, come to the Soil Conservation District in Iuka and let them help you.

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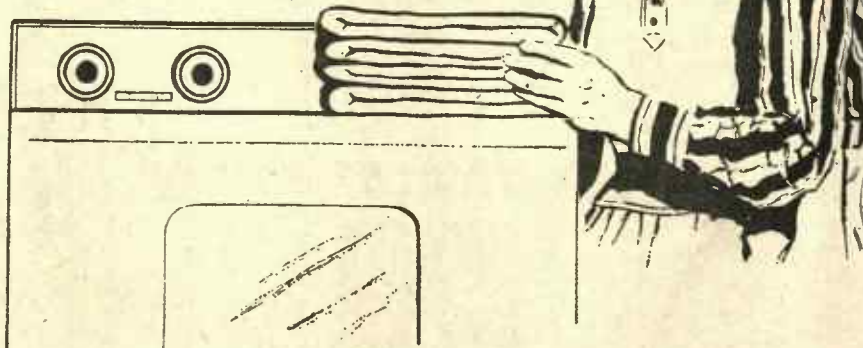

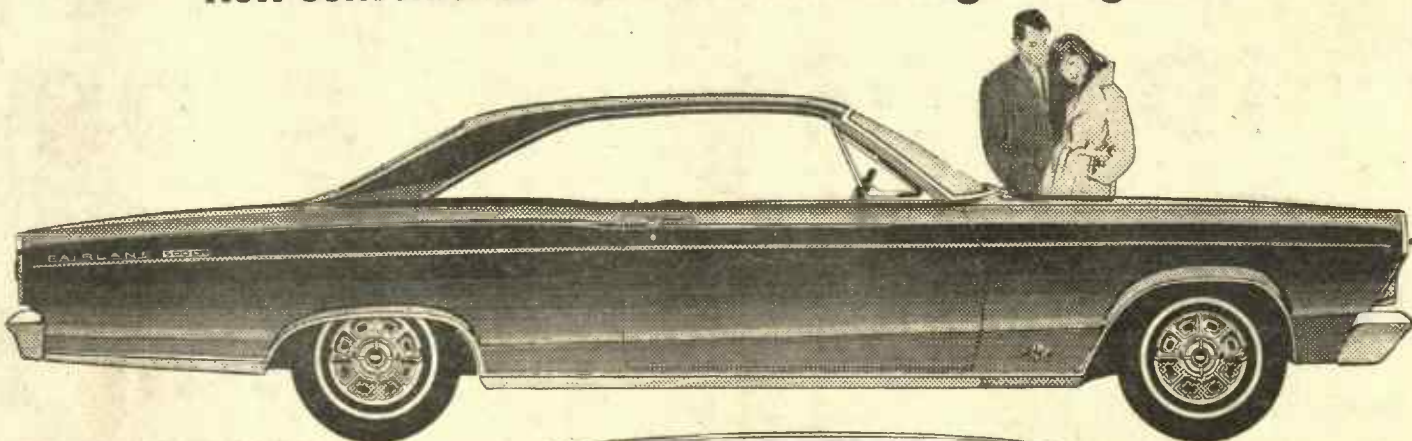
