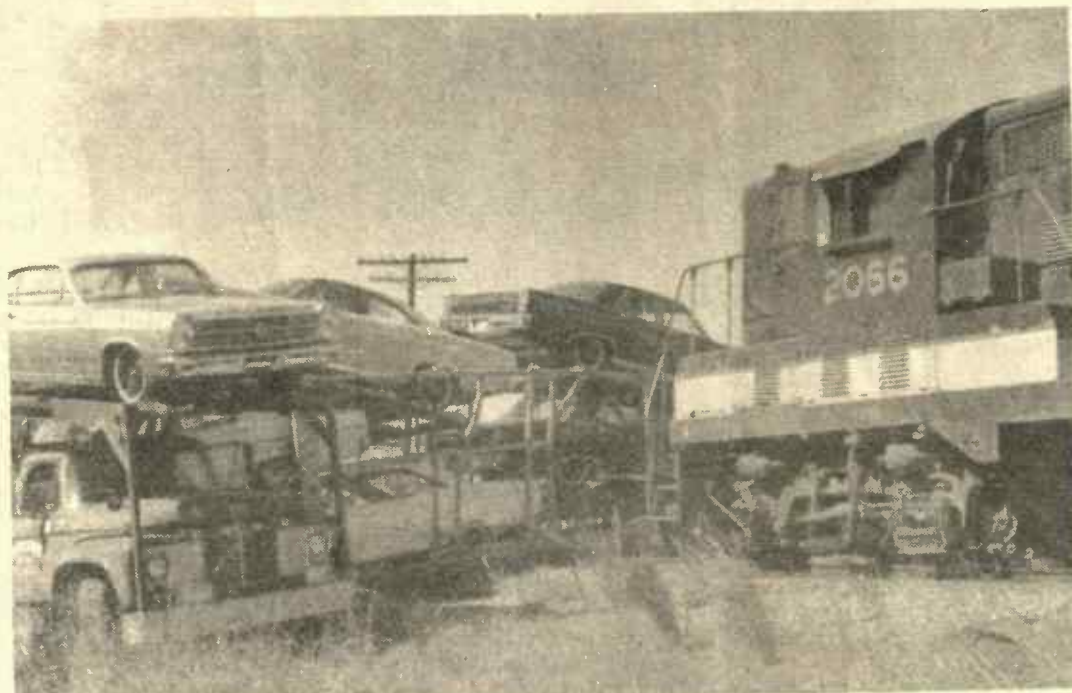

Funeral Services Held At Liberty Church For B. Ellis Wright, Banker

B. Ellis Wright, chief exe-
cutive officer of The Bank of
Belmont, died at the Northeast
Mississippi Hospital at Boone-
ville Saturday after suffering a
heart attack. Mr. Wright, who
was 77, had been ill for the past
week.

Funeral services were held
Sunday afternoon at the Lib-
erty Church of Christ with Bro.
W. W. Heflin, Bro. Paul Spears,
and Bro. W. C. Quillen officia-
ting. Interment was in the Bel-
mont Cemetery with Deaton Fu-
neral Home in charge.

Mr. Wright attended local
schools, Freed-Hardeman Col-

lege, and graduated from East-
man College at Poughkeepsie,
New York in 1911. He became a
member of the firm of Allen-
Wright Hardware and Furni-
ture Company of Belmont and
continued in this partnership
until 1930. At the death of his
father, B. F. Wright, in July,
1926, he was elected president
of The Bank of Belmont, which
bank also has a branch office at
Tishomingo. He served in this
position until 1961 when he
was promoted to chairman of
the board and chief executive
officer of the bank.

When the Northeast Missis-
sippi Junior College was orga-
nized in 1948, Mr. Wright was
asked to be a member of the
Board of Trustees and was still
serving in that capacity at his
death. He had served on the lo-
cal school board for a number
of years, was connected with
the Belmont Chamber of Com-
merce in various positions, and
was a member of the Board of
Aldermen for twelve years. Mr.
Wright had also served as Di-
rector of the Tishomingo Coun-
ty Red Cross. He was a member
of The Church of Christ.

Survivors are his wife, Mrs.
Wilma Waddell Wright; a son,
B. E. Wright; four grandchil-
dren, Gaines Griffin, David,
Alice Fisher, and Martha Ann
Wright; a sister, Mrs. L. P. Al-
len, and several nieces and ne-
phews.

Serving as pallbearers were

Fifth District Will Vote On \$60,000 Bond Issue

**MONEY WILL BE USED TO EXPAND
WINFIELD MANUFACTURING PLANT;
VOTERS URGED TO CAST BALLOTS
ON TUESDAY, NOVEMBER NINTH**

Qualified voters in the Fifth
District will go to the polls
Tuesday, November 9, and cast
ballots on a \$60,000.00 BAWI
bond issue.

Purpose of the bond issue is
to raise money to enlarge the
building at Golden occupied by
the Winfield Manufacturing Co.
The company has been doing
business in the former Golden
school building since August
1964, and just recently opened
additional plants in the gymna-
siums at Tishomingo and Pa-
den. A total of 287 people are
employed by the company at
this time.

Billy Martin, superintendent
of the Winfield Manufacturing
plant at Golden, states that his
company has grown to the ex-
tent that additional space in
one location is a must. "We
have had to move some of our

work to Tishomingo and Paden
and we're still overcrowded
here at the main plant," he
said. The company does not ex-
pect to discontinue use of the
Tishomingo and Paden build-
ings, but they do expect to in-
crease business and production
to a degree to use the addition
on the Golden building.

A labor survey was conducted
last May at which time an ade-
quate labor supply was indicat-
ed to warrant the enlarging of
the Golden building.

J. S. (Steve) South, president
of the Tishomingo County
Board of Supervisors and Sup-
ervisor from the Fifth District,
said that a strong and urgent
appeal was being made for all
voters to go to the polls and
cast ballots.

"A majority of the qualified
voters living within the Fifth
District must go to the polls
and vote," Mr. South stated.
"Also, two thirds of those vot-
ing must vote in favor of the
bond issue," he said.

All qualified voters living
outside the Town of Belmont
but inside the Fifth District
shall cast ballots at their usual
voting precinct, namely: Bel-
mont, East Belmont, Dennis,
Golden, and Cotton Springs. All
qualified voters living outside
the corporate limits of the
Town of Belmont shall cast bal-
lots at the City Hall in Belmont.

Polls will open at seven a.m.,
and shall remain open until the
hour of six o'clock in the eve-
ning.

rade.



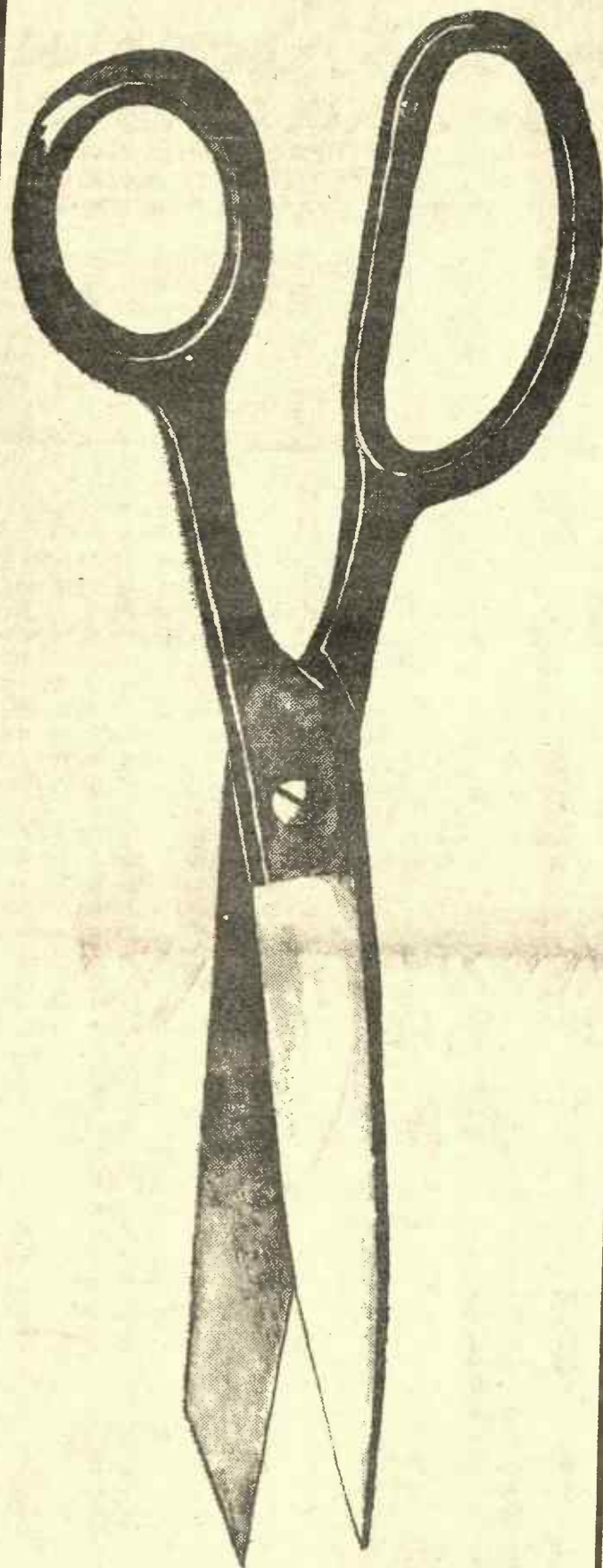

Frosted Grass Is Good Grazing

Even though Jack Frost ar-
rived October 25th, he did not
destroy all the value of our
summer pastures.

It has been found that frost-
ed grass has a great deal of nu-
trients in it and furnishes good
grazing for beef cattle. It also
affords protection for the soil
and prevents erosion.

Some SCD cooperators have
set aside certain areas of their
grasslands to be grazed after
frost. This is like having extra
hay that did not have to be cut,
stored and then fed to the cat-
tle.

Whenever possible, leave this
grass for your cattle to graze
instead of burning it off. Rem-
ember that it gives extra pro-
tection for the soil against ero-
sion.

Cotton Ginning Report Released

The total for Mississippi was
711,283 bales, compared with
713,188 bales for last year.

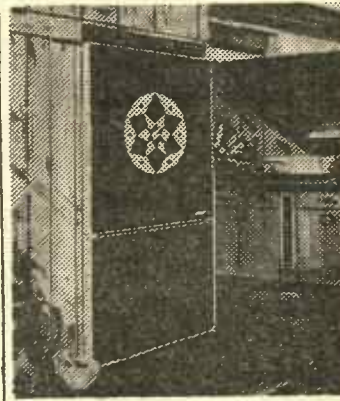

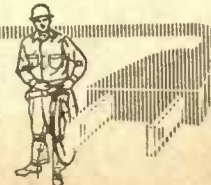

The blood drawing was held from 12 to 6 p.m. Friday, and during that time 339 donors offered their blood. Of this 339 donors, 46 were rejected leaving a total of 293 from which blood was actually drawn. All these donors were given credit cards, and also the 46 who offered to contribute but were rejected.

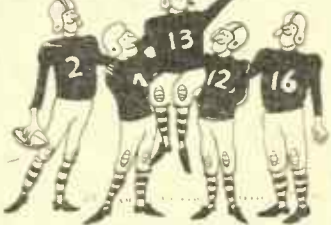
In addition to the blood donors, there were countless civic-minded men and women who gave assistance in various ways. There were groups including the civic and women's clubs, that came out and helped as units.

Refreshments including 350 cups of coffee, 12 46-ounce cans of fruit juices, 15 dozen donuts, 2 trays of brownies, 3 cases of Cokes, 25 dozen cookies and gallons of milk were furnished by some of the business establishments and ladies in the community.

Going the "extra mile" in giving blood were 2 groups of employees: Consolidated Aluminum Company and employees of the Tishomingo County Electric Power Association warehouse. More than a third of the total number of employees of these 2 groups gave blood and by doing so, earned a 100% coverage for their firms.

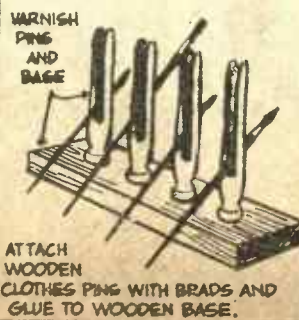

CHECK YOUR PRIDE AT 65 — IT WILL BE CHANGING SOON

When you retire you begin moving almost immediately into a life that is separated, as if by a wall, from the life you have always known. The process is a slow one, but it is very real. In five years or so you look back over the wall and find it difficult to believe that the old life, or you — or something — has changed so much.

Arthur W. Russell, a businessman who retired three years ago, urges everybody of retirement age to learn this lesson. "Because even if you keep your physical body where it is," he says, "your mind, your interests, your spirit, move. The life and people surrounding your old job start closing the books on you. And you start closing the books on them, but the trouble is that you don't know you're doing it. "You'll have a better retirement if you can make yourself know it."

Mr. Russell says your weaning from the old job may take two years, may take five. He concedes that a few people, usually men, are never fully weaned and hang around moping over their old job until they die.

"To tell most men and women at retirement time that in five years they will look back at their old job-life and wonder how it ever worried them, how they ever loved it, how they ever hated it — not one of them would believe you. But this is what will happen. And if only they can realize this at the time they retire they can get a head start on the blessings that lie before them."

Mr. Russell points out that he knew three men, who were retiring about the time he was, who

had opportunities to move into fine retirement jobs. All turned them down. "The jobs were not quite up to status . . . and all the men had the idea that the old job-life was looking at them over the wall — and cared. Well, the old life wasn't looking. It was busy. And it didn't care, though it no doubt hoped the men were finding a happy life."

"This is ego stuff, of course," Mr. Russell continues. "And the vanity of man being what it is, a little of it is all right. But the essential point here is that the men miscalculated themselves — in a little while they wouldn't care if the old life cared. They wouldn't be looking back to see if the old life looked."

"In two years, or at most in five, they would have set up their emotions in their other world. And retirement courses they could have pursued at the time they retired — but couldn't pursue later — would now be comfortable and good. What anybody in the old life thought just wouldn't matter . . ."

Mr. Russell believes that a proud \$15,000-a-year executive, who naturally would like to pattern his retirement in the image of his old job, could be comfortable working in a brickyard at \$75 a week five years later. "It's the wonderful and unending adjustment factor of the human being. People at 65 ought to have more faith in it. And pattern their future on how they'll be regarding things in 1970 instead of right now."

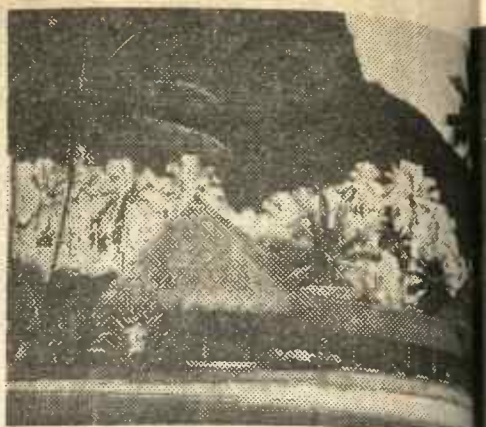

NOTES OF HOME ECONOMIST

by Nellie R. Horton

Have you considered a lavatory in a bedroom. Think of how wonderful it would be in the bedroom of your teenagers, for all the personal grooming they do.

You and Pop would likely enjoy having a vanity lavatory in your bedroom or in a bedroom closet.

There are good reasons for the bedroom lavatory. First, it takes the strain off the bathroom - an important factor in most homes today. It lets you and the girls dress and groom in one place. The teenagers can take all the time they need without tying up the bathroom

while the rest of the family waits their turn.

A second reason is that short of having a private bath for each bedroom its the most convenient arrangement possible. And third, it provides maximum privacy for guests.

Basically, the vanity or countertop lavatory is a dressing table with running water. It provides space for toilet articles on top and is usually equipped with storage facilities underneath.

Twisted Cord On Egg Yolk

Next time you break an egg, look at the twisted cord on each side of the egg yolk. This white cord-like material is called chalaza (kuh-lay-zuh). It is a normal part of each egg. Its purpose is to anchor the yolk to the layer of thick albumen. Prominent chalazas indicate high quality eggs.

Some users, mistakenly thinking that chalazas are evidence of fertile eggs, diligently pick them out. This is not necessary as the chalazas are normal, wholesome parts of the egg white and are composed of high quality protein.

German Coffee Cake

Sift together 2 cups flour, 3/4 cup sugar, 1/4 teaspoon each nutmeg and cinnamon, a teaspoon salt, and 4 teaspoons baking powder. Cut 1/4 cup shortening into dry ingredients until mixture resembles cornmeal. Add 3 eggs and a cup of milk, stirring until smooth.

Pour into greased 8 x 10 in. baking pan and cover batter with a cup of finely chopped apples. Sprinkle brown sugar generously over apples, bake 30 minutes at 350 degrees. Serve oven-hot.

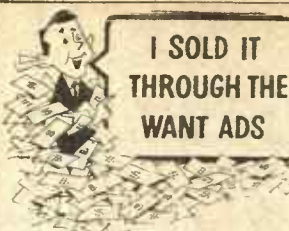

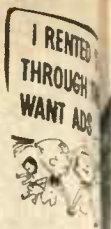

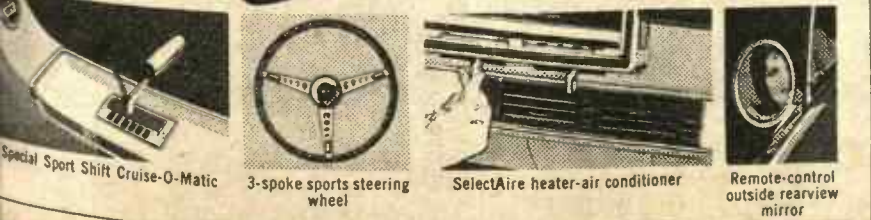
