Shows Increase For 69 Service Establishments In County

County's 69 ser-
vices had total
of \$463 thousand in
increase of 33 percent
according to a re-
leased by the Bu-
reau of Commerce, U. S. De-
partment of Commerce. The last
census of business cov-
erages during 1958.
service trades in the cen-
sus included those
personal services to

individuals; miscellaneous busi-
ness services; auto repair and
other auto services; and other
repair services. Also included
were motion picture theatres;
other amusement and recreation
services; and hotels and motels.
The selected service trade es-
tablishments in the county em-
ployed 38 persons (exclusive of
proprietors) and had a payroll
for the year of \$62 thousand.
The state as a whole included
0.056 establishments with re-

ceipts of \$200.6 million.
From a report on Business,
Retail Trade, Merchandise Line
Sales, just issued by the U. S.
Department of Commerce, Bu-
reau of the Census, it was
found that automobiles and
trucks, with the fuel and acces-
sories needed to keep them run-
ning, accounted for 29.1 percent
of the total retail spending in
Mississippi during 1963.
Food purchases took 22.6%
of the 1963 retail spending in

the State, 19.5 for groceries to
be consumed at home and 3.1
for meals and snacks eaten out.
For every dollar spent on
men's and boys' clothing in the
State during the same year,
\$1.86 was spent on women's and
girls' clothing.

5th District Bond Issue Passes By Big Majority

Golden Manufacturing Plant
Assured Of Expansion

WILL CREATE UP TO 200 MORE JOBS

Voters in the Fifth Super-
visor's District went to the polls
Tuesday and strongly endorsed
a \$60,000.00 bond issue.

Seven hundred and seventy-
two voted for the proposition
with only 8 casting negative
votes.

The money will be used to en-
large the Golden manufactur-
ing plant where 200 additional

jobs will be available upon
completion of the expansion.

The Golden Manufacturing
plant is owned by the Fifth
District and is occupied by the
Winfield Manufacturing Co.
who has signed a lease to pay
enough rent money to retire the
bonds. The plant building was
formerly the Golden school.

Charles Bostick, chairman of
the Tishomingo County Elec-
tion Commissioners, released
the following figures as official
returns in Tuesday's election.
By precinct the vote was:

Almost 70% of the qualified
voters went to the polls and cast
ballots and of the 780 who vot-
ed, less than 1% were against
the proposition. This, according
to records of the BAWI, is one
of the best turnouts in an elec-
tion of this kind ever held in
the state.

L. E. Deaton, president of the
Belmont Chamber of Commerce,
stated that the election showed
unusually fine cooperation
amongst the residents of the
Fifth District. "We are all
mighty proud of the results of
the election," he said, "and we
shall continue to get more in-
dustry for more jobs for our
people."

Work on the expansion of the
Golden Manufacturing plant
will commence at an early date.

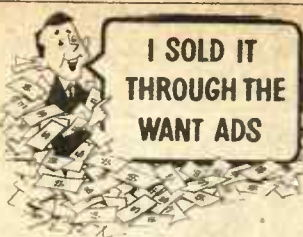

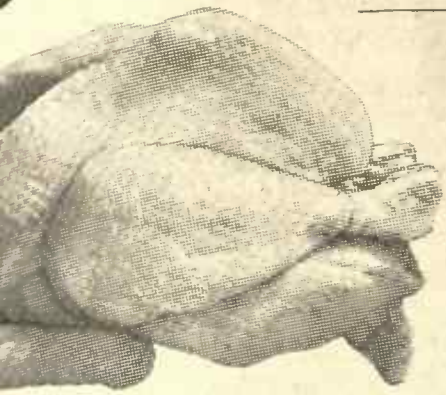

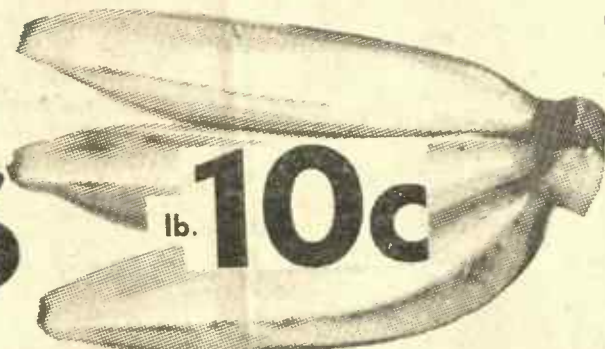

Short Cut For Water To Creek

Work Unit Conservationist
When water takes a short-cut from the hill to the creek, it follows the path of least resistance. The landowner who per-

mits water to take this course is following the path of least resistance too. Where this occurs, over a long period of time, the land becomes eroded, gullied and even mutilated and the landowner becomes poorer. Check your fields to see if there are any places where the hill water is taking a short cut to the creek. If you find such places, now is the time to do something about it. This may be done by mending broken terraces or by rearranging the rows on a field.

Bush-hog cotton stalks and leave them on the surface of land during winter. This will help to hold the valuable top soil in place and help to save you dollars.

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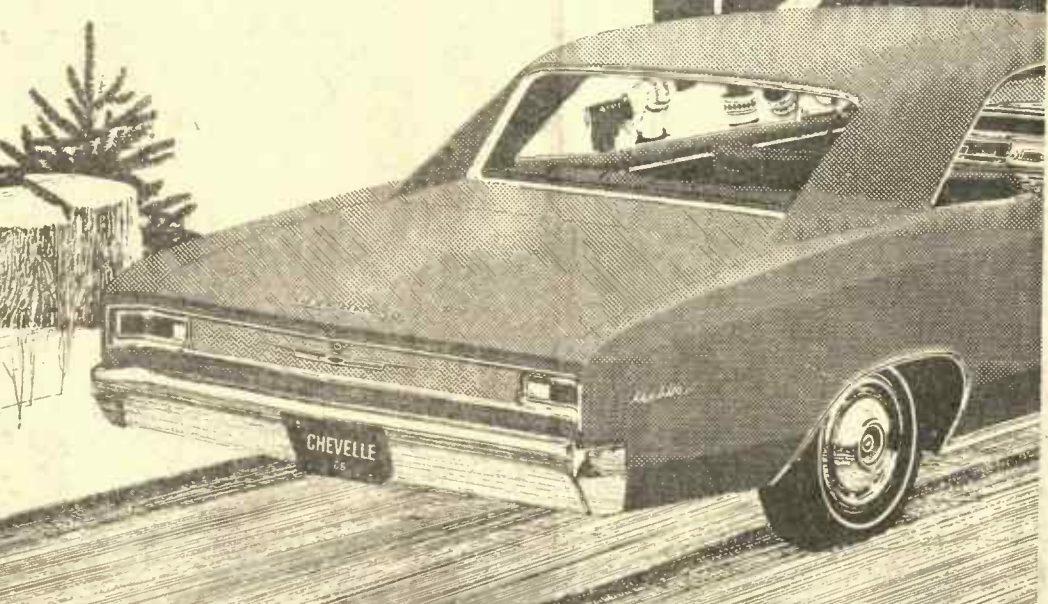
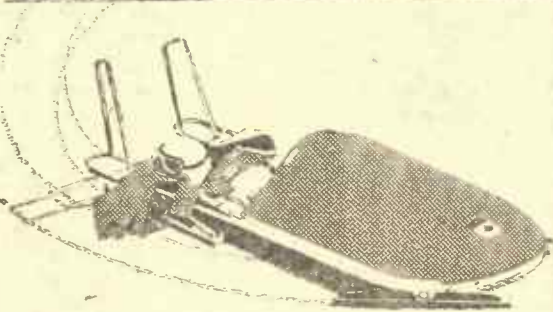

"Challenge Polio" Film At Thursday Study Club

The Thursday Study Club met Thursday afternoon, October 28th, at the Tishomingo County Electric Power Office for the program presented by Mrs. Clyde Middleton, program chairman.

Mrs. Middleton gave a very interesting introduction to the film "Challenge Polio," which covered the rehabilitation of all disabled people from polio, birth defects, arthritis, etc.

Pertinent information included the names and location of all ten rehabilitation centers located in Mississippi. Tupelo was listed as the nearest to Tishomingo County, an amputee clinic.

Mrs. Middleton pointed out the fact that 135 thousand people were rehabilitated in the United States in 1964. Of this number, 1,838 were in Mississippi or 79 persons per one hundred thousand population, giving up the rank of 20th in the nation. All rehabilitation centers are operated with funds from the Federal and State Governments with the Federal Government giving seventy cents on each dollar used.

In closing, Mrs. Middleton stated that several of the rehabilitation centers named worked closely with business, civic and industrial groups in the towns where they are located. Thus, the needed rehabilitation training and jobs are provided for these people that they may become productive, self-supporting citizens.

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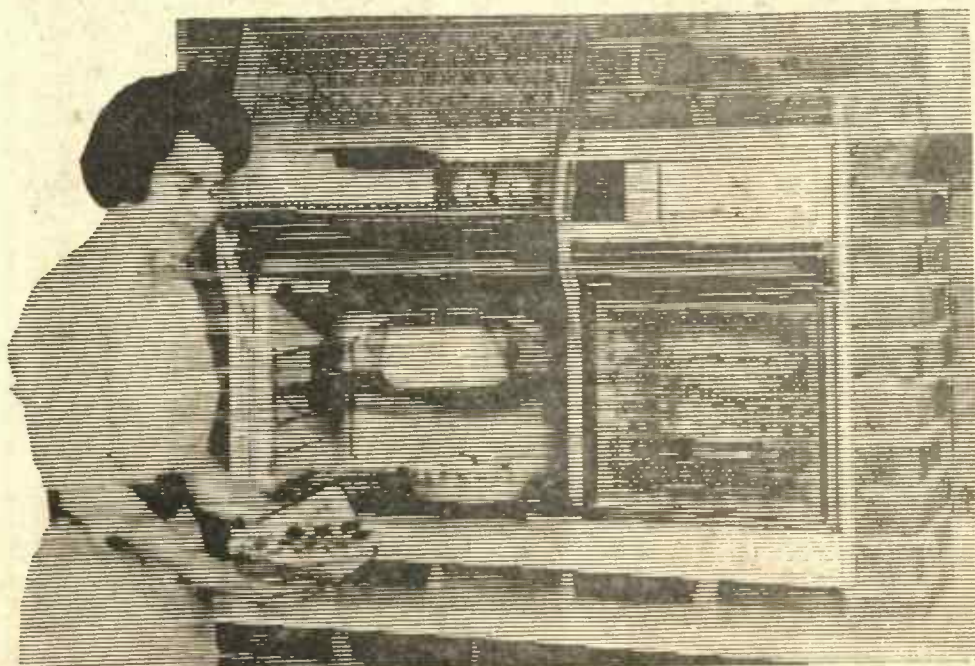
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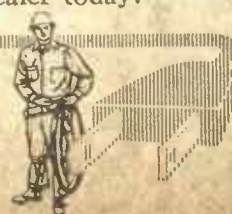

Veterans' Day

Today—Thursday, November 11—is Veterans Day.

Since 1918, this day has been a national holiday, for on November 11, that year, an Armistice was signed ending World War I.

From 1918 to 1946, the national holiday was known as "Armistice Day" and was recognized by the Federal Government, all State governments and all patriotic organizations as a day to pay homage to Americans who had fallen in battle during World War I.

In 1946, name of the day was changed to "Veterans Day" and was re-dedicated to American soldiers who had fallen in all battles in all wars in which the United States had ever been involved.

Today, in Iuka, Tishomingo, Mississippi, and in many, many, of both large and small communities throughout America, this day will be commemorated and shall be kept in remembrance of those who died fighting for our country.

World War I was fought to end all wars. World War II was fought to save the world from Nazi and Japanese enslavement. The Korean war was a "police action" to halt Communist aggression—but Americans fought, bled, and died, the victory being a divided Korea.

Today, American soldiers are fighting and dying in Vietnam. And while there is complete peace and serenity here in Tishomingo county, Mississippi, some of our local boys are in Vietnam living in dread for their lives. They are now on the battlefield in that far country, living under conditions which few of us can understand. Only combat veterans of previous wars can know what it's like to sleep on the ground (when it's possible to sleep) night after night, and only combat veterans of previous wars can know the knowing pangs of hunger for nourishing hot food, and it is only the soldier who has been in a foreign country that knows the loneliness that is ever present when away from friends and loved ones.

Today, we should honor these soldiers and all American soldiers who gave their lives that we may have peace just as we know it here at home in Tishomingo county.

We know that most Americans will honor and respect those patriotic men. However, there are some in this country who are not content with freedom and peace as we know it. There are all sorts of demonstrators who protest American actions in times of war.

In World War I, there were the "slackers"—those who evaded the military conscription in devious ways. In World War II, there were the "draft dodgers"—men who, in many instances under false pretenses, were exempted from Military duty. And in the Korean "police action" many draft dodgers hid behind their mother's or sisters' skirts to keep from going into the service and doing his duty as all patriotic men should do.

Today, the draft card burner has been spotlighted in the news as the ultimate in demonstrations in objection to the American policy in Vietnam. We have no sympathy for this type demonstrator. Due to his lack of patriotism, we believe he should be banished from this country, never more to enjoy the benefits of freedom; never more to have the opportunity to stage his asinine demonstrations against the government that afforded him more freedom than any other nation has ever known.

We, personally, are thankful for these freedoms. And we believe all other true Americans appreciate them just as much as we do. We can show our appreciation by paying respect to those valiant soldiers who gave their all that we continue to be free. Today is the day set aside for this purpose. Let's do it.

THE GOLDEN YEARS

YOUR CHILDREN DON'T WANT YOUR FAMILY HEIRLOOMS?

You have reached the retirement years. You have heirlooms, other family treasures and mementos you have collected over your lifetime. You are very proud of them... certainly they should be preserved and passed along in the family.

But your children, all married now, don't take a fancy to old-fashioned stuff. They prefer the plastics and twin beds to the burl walnut and four-poster. They think the family Bible and old family portraits a bit gauche in their way of life.

What do you do in a situation like this? The Walter W. Davenports, who retired a couple of years ago, have been giving it some thought. In talks with their lawyer and with library and museum people they have gotten one unanimous piece of advice: Just see that the heirlooms aren't lost because sooner or later, even if in a generation from now, somebody in the family will appreciate them... and treasure them as an invaluable inheritance.

How, then, to insure they aren't lost after the Davenports pass on? The Davenports have done this: — Set up in their wills a provision that \$500 from their estate will be deposited in a local bank, and the interest from it used to pay for a large safety box in the bank. In the box they will place all family papers, photos, mementos, etc., which will remain there until, in the bank's judgment, some family member proves a genuine appreciation for them. At which time the \$500 will be distributed to heirs;

— Made an agreement with their local Historical Society that upon their deaths their bedroom furniture, with marble-top washstand and dresser and four-poster bed, and three of the most treasured living-room chairs—all brought over from the old Country by the family—will be loaned for a period of 20 years to a memorial home in the country that has been restored for the public. At the end of 20 years the furniture is to be turned over to any member of the family who, in the opinion of the Historical Society, will treasure it;

— Donated \$250 to the local Public Library for a glass-enclosed display case in which, after Mrs. Davenport's death, the choice pieces of her glass collection will be placed on loan. For ten years or until some member of the family, acceptable to the Librarian, comes to repossess them.

— Informed their children what they are doing, and left for the executor of their estate a written account of where everything is.

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Mighty Chieftains Crush Saltillo Cats

**Tigers Loose by 12 - 0 Defeat
By Iuka With Capacity Crowd**

Five pass interceptions and one offensive pass play spelled the difference in the Saltillo Tigers and the Iuka Chieftains last Friday night as Iuka stopped the Tigers 12-0. Quarterback Harold Lomenick hit halfback Larry Parker on a 63 yard pass play late in the third quarter and then Lomenick picked off a desperation Tiger pass and returned it 17 yards for another score late in the fourth quarter to account for what was otherwise a defensive show.

The Tigers led in every department except two, but those two made the difference between the clubs. Saltillo, going into the game undefeated in Highland Conference play, gave signs of a potent offense only to be checked by a tough Iuka defense. The Tigers had 13 first downs to Iuka's 6 and led in rushing 137 yards to Iuka's 82, but the Chiefs rode the arm of Lomenick for 143 passing yards and a TD which would have been sufficient.

The two clubs fought on even terms in the first half as neither team could muster a scoring drive. The Chiefs went as far as the Tiger 29 on one series, while Saltillo mustered drives that carried them to the Chiefs 20, 25 and 18 only to have them stop there. A recovered fumble stopped the first Tiger drive, while the Tiger ends dropped two passes in the open to stall another and guard Paul Barnett stopped quarterback Bobby Hankins from picking up a first down on a fourth and two situation on the last Tiger drive. The Tigers dominated the first half of play picking up 6 first downs to Iuka's 3, rushing for 150 yards to Iuka's 65, and controlling the pigskin on 25 plays to the Chiefs 19.

The second half belonged to the Chiefs however, and except for one play it was all defense. The Chieftain line held the Tigers to a minus 13 yards rushing in the second half and combined this with five timely interceptions to pave the way for victory number eight. Quarterbacks Lonnie Neaves and Bobby Hankins did manage to complete 7 of 14 passes in the second half, but the interceptions stopped the drives from reaching the critical zone.

Iuka's only moment of glory offensively came with 3:45 left in the third quarter when Lomenick faded to pass on his own 37, found Parker open going from left to right, fired and completed his third pass of the second half. Parker picked up one good block, and then outran the Saltillo secondary the

remaining 55 yards to score standing up. Fullback Merle Smith's try for the point after fell short and the score stood a 6-0.

Saltillo had a scoring drive going previous to this score, but Parker made the first of two interceptions for his night's work at the Iuka 16 to stop the Tiger threat. Saltillo came right back after the Chiefs score and marched into Chieftain territory again but Parker grabbed another loose pass and returned it from the Iuka 38 to Saltillo's 49. Lymon Montgomery of Saltillo picked off one of Lomenick's tosses just two plays later to set the Tigers on the glory road again. This drive carried as far as he Iuka 20 with a first down situation. But tackle Jimmy Gray and guard Paul Barnett teamed to throw Hankins for an 11 yard loss on one play and guard Jimmy Gross smothered him with a 14 yard loss on the next one for a 4th and 35 situation.

After the exchange of punts, Saltillo again entered Chieftain territory going as far as the 32 before guard Joel Cornelison intercepted a Neaves pass to stop the threat. A Lomenick to Parker pass from the mid-field trip carried to the Saltillo 5, but end Roger Lamphere intercepted for the Tigers to quench the drive. Three plays later, Lomenick picked off a short Tiger pass in the flat and scattered unhampered the 17 yards to paydirt. Parker attempted a pass for the EP, but it fell short leaving the final tally 12-0.

Social Security Disability Laws Given Change

The Social Security Amendments of 1965 made several important changes in the disability provisions of the Social Security Law. Hugh Tigrett, District Manager, pointed out that one of the most important of these changes provides that disability payments are no longer limited to people with permanent disabilities.

Under the old law, a person could not receive disability benefits unless his impairment was a permanent one or one which was expected to continue for a long and indefinite time. Now, Tigrett pointed out, a person may be eligible for benefits if his disability is expected to last twelve calendar months. This means that even if you are expected to recover and return to work, you may receive payments while you are severely disabled.

Any Tishomingo County person who is disabled to the extent that they are unable to work should get in touch with the Social Security Representative who visits Iuka every Monday to see if they can qualify for disability payments under this new law.
