The injured were carried to the Booneville hospital where emergency treatment was administered. The three girls, all receiving severe cuts and bruises, were carried to the Baptist hospital in Memphis. Mr. Bentley, suffering internal injuries, was carried to a Tupelo hospital where surgery is to be performed.

According to her family, Miss Jaynes is showing much improvement from facial cuts and a slight concussion. The 8th grader at Iuka high school is a patient in Room 910, Baptist hospital, Memphis.

The accident was investigated by the Mississippi Highway Patrol.

Water, Sewage Rates Increased In Iuka

20% Increase On Water, Sewage
Increased 8%; Effective In Dec.

Beginning with the 2nd day of December, residents of the City of Iuka will be paying more for their water and sewer services.

An ordinance passed by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen at the regular November meeting, sets up the new rates.

Residential, commercial and industrial water rates are increased from \$2.50 for the first

4,000 gallons to \$3.00 for the first 3,000 gallons. Under the old rate, water users, inside the corporate limits, were charged \$4.00 for 10,000 gallons. Under the new rate, 10,000 gallons will cost \$6.50.

Water patrons outside the corporate limits will be charged \$4.00 for the first 3,000 gallons with an additional charge of fifty cents per 1000 gallons for the next 10,000.

Rates for greater consumption of water set forth in the ordinance published in this issue of your Vidette. The rate gradually decreases with greater consumption.

Sewer rates are increased from 25% of the water bill to 33-1/3% — a difference of 8-1/3%. However, no residential sewerage service shall exceed \$5.00 per month.

Commercial and industrial sewage charge will be one-third the water rate on the first 20,000 gallons of water and 25% of the water rate on the next 980,000 gallons of water with a maximum charge of \$25.00.

Mayor George Cutshall said that an increase in the water and sewer rates was necessary to retire the bonds voted on in an election held in November, 1964. Bonds voted in at that time amounted to \$450,000.00 and the money was intended for improvement of the water system, drilling new wells, creating a treatment plant, and extending and improving the sewage system including a disposal lagoon. Much of the work has been done.

Bond Sales Announced

Sales of Bonds for the Burnsville Waterworks and for the Fifth District Manufacturing plant in Golden are announced today.

The Burnsville Waterworks issue amounts to \$127,000 and bids for the purchase of the bonds will be opened on Dec. 7 in the office of the mayor and board of aldermen in Burnsville.

Industrial bonds for the Golden manufacturing plant expansion will be offered for sale on Monday, November 29 and bids will be opened in the Chancery Clerk's office in the courthouse. \$60,000 are offered.

NOTICE OF BOND SALE \$127,000

WATERWORKS SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS OF THE TOWN OF BURNSVILLE, MISSISSIPPI

Sealed proposals will be received by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Burnsville, Mississippi, at the Office of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of said Town until the hour of 7:00 o'clock P.M., on Tuesday, the 7th day of December, 1965, at which time said bids will be publicly opened for the purchase, at not less than par and accrued interest, of the above bonds of said Town.

The said bonds are to bear date of October 1, 1965, are to be of the denomination of \$1,000. each, and shall bear interest at a rate or rates to be determined pursuant to sale of said bonds, payable semi-annually on April 1 and October 1 in each year. Both principal of and interest on said bonds will be payable at the Office of the Town Depository of said Town or, at the option of the holder, at a bank or trust company in the Borough of Manhattan, City and State of New York. The said bonds will mature serially on October 1 in each of the years as follows:

Bonds maturing October 1, 1976, and thereafter, at the option of the Town, shall be redeemable, in whole or in part, in inverse numerical and maturity order, on October 1, 1975, or upon any interest payment date thereafter, upon not less than thirty days' prior notice, at par and accrued interest to date of redemption, together with the following premiums:

- 3% if redeemed on or before October 1, 1980
- 2½% if redeemed on or before October 1, 1985
- 2% if redeemed on or before October 1, 1990
- 1½% if redeemed on or before October 1, 1995
- 1% if redeemed thereafter prior to maturity.

Bids will be considered on the following basis:

- (1) All maturities in the years 1969 to 1975, inclusive.
- (2) All maturities in the years 1976 to 1980, inclusive.
- (3) All maturities in the years 1981 to 1985, inclusive.
- (4) All maturities in the years 1986 to 1990, inclusive.
- (5) All maturities in the years 1991 to 1995, inclusive.
- (6) All maturities in the years 1996 to 2000, inclusive.
- (7) The entire issue.

Said bonds shall be secured by and payable from a pledge of a fixed amount of the revenues derived from the operation of the waterworks system, as now or hereafter constituted.

Said bonds shall be registrable as to principal only.

Bids for combined blocks less than the entire issue will be accorded preference over bids for individual blocks, except where the sum of such individual blocks results in a lower net interest cost for the maximum number of maturities. For the purpose of determining the lowest bidder, calculations of net interest cost will exclude the bid of the Housing and Home Finance Agency.

The Housing and Home Finance Agency has entered into an agreement with the Town of Burnsville, Mississippi, pursuant to which it proposes to buy these bonds at an interest rate of 4% per annum, provided bids are not received from other bidders for the entire issue or for any of the above designated blocks of bonds on terms indicated below:

In the event any other bidder or bidders offers or offer to purchase all of said bonds at an interest cost of not more than 4% per annum, or any portion of the bonds in blocks as specified at an interest cost of not more than 4% per annum, the bonds or any such portion thereof will not be purchased by the Government.

Bidders are requested to designate in their bids the price they will pay for bonds bearing interest at a rate or rates likewise to be designated in their bids in multiples of one-eighth of one per centum (1/8 of 1%) or one-tenth of one per centum (1/10 of 1%). The interest rate shall be the same on all bonds maturing in any one year, the same for each year on any bond, and shall be represented by one coupon for each installment. The difference between the lowest and highest interest rate shall not exceed one per centum (1%).

Proposals should be addressed to the Mayor and Board of Aldermen; should be plainly marked "Proposal for Bonds"; and should be filed with the undersigned on or prior to the date and hour hereinabove specified. Each bid must be accompanied by a cashier's check, certified check, or exchange, payable to the Town of Burnsville, Mississippi, in the amount of two per centum (2%) of the principal amount of bonds bid for, as a guarantee that the bidder will carry out his contract and purchase the bonds if his bid is accepted. If the successful bidder fails to purchase the bonds pursuant to his bid and contract, the amount of such good faith check shall be retained by the Town and shall be paid into the Treasury of said Town of Burnsville.

The Mayor and Board of Aldermen reserve the right to reject any or all bids submitted.

These bonds are offered subject to the unqualified approval of the legality thereof by the law firm of Charles and Trauernicht of St. Louis, Missouri. The Town will pay the legal fees and will pay for the printing of the bonds and the cost of the validation thereof.

CROSSWORD PUZZLE

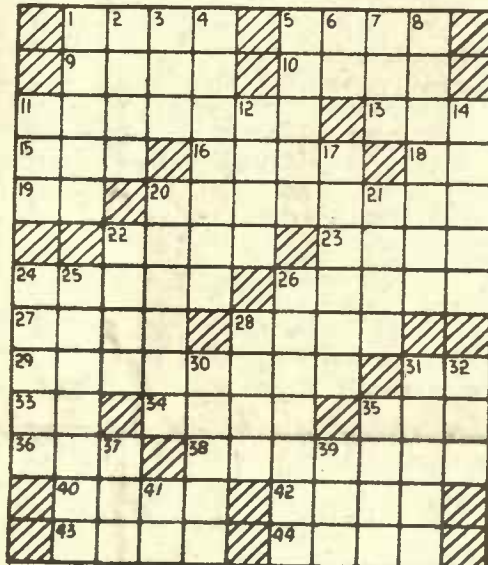

"I know all the allures of closing the books on a city you have known too long and heading into the sunshine," she says. "I slept with them for three years before my husband retired." And then we sold out, packed up, and took off.

"Everything was perfect for the future, except for one small item: my husband's health. Nothing—his old company, his pension, our doctor, our religious faith, Social Security — guaranteed that my husband wouldn't grow ill. But he did. Five months and two days after we staked out a claim in our retirement paradise . . ."

In the beginning, according to Mrs. Buckner, things went pretty much by the rule book. The costs of moving and getting settled were above their estimates; neighbors, merchants, and the Welcome Wagon came calling and pleased them. There were welcoming letters from a bank, a laundry, and door calls by the newspaper delivery boy and a dairy. Then began the slow, patient — and sometimes disheartening — process of learning the town, and trying to get acquainted with people and make some friends.

"My husband's illness began with pains," Mrs. Buckner continues. "They grew worse. Finally we called on a local doctor, and he apparently suspected cancer. He arranged for my husband to go into a hospital."

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI, SETTING WATER AND SEWER REVENUE RATES

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Iuka at the regular November, 1965, meeting held on the second day of November, 1965, as follows:

SECTION I. That from and after the date of this ordinance, the residential, commercial and industrial water revenue rates within the corporate limit of said city shall be charged as follows:

\$3.00 for the first 3,000 gallons
.50 per 1,000 gallons for next 10,000 gallons
.40 per 1,000 gallons for next 10,000 gallons
.30 per 1,000 gallons for next 10,000 gallons
.20 per 1,000 gallons for next 10,000 gallons
.15 per 1,000 gallons consumed thereafter

SECTION II. That from and after the date of this ordinance residential, commercial and industrial water revenue rates for patrons without the corporate limits of said city shall be charged as follows:

\$4.00 for the first 3,000 gallons
.50 per 1,000 gallons for next 10,000 gallons
.40 per 1,000 gallons for next 10,000 gallons
.30 per 1,000 gallons for next 10,000 gallons
.20 per 1,000 gallons for next 10,000 gallons
.15 per 1,000 gallons consumed thereafter

SECTION III. That from and after the date of this ordinance the residential sewage revenue rates shall be charged at the rate of thirty-three and one-third per cent (33-1/3%) of the water revenue rate with a maximum charge of \$5.00.

SECTION IV. That from and after the date of this ordinance the commercial and industrial sewage charge shall be thirty-three and one-third per cent (33-1/3%) of the water rate on the first 20,000 gallons of water consumed and twenty-five per cent (25%) of the water rate on the next 980,000 gallons of water consumed with a maximum charge of \$25.00.

SECTION V. That this ordinance shall take effect from and after the second day of December, 1965.

SECTION VI. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this ordinance shall be held

invalid, the section, provision or other part thereof shall be null and void.

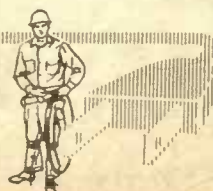

using a commercial tenderizer to help you tenderize the meat. Properly tenderized, many of the tougher cuts of meat provide goot eating at low cost.

Remember, tenderizers act slowly at refrigeration temperatures, speed up at room temperatures and stop completely at high temperatures reached during cooking. If you sprinkle tenderizer on cold meat and start cooking immediately, you get little or no tenderizing action.

Cotton Referendum

Tuesday, November 23, is voting day on the cotton referendum. You will have the opportunity to vote on two separate things on two separate ballots. One will be on marketing quotas for the 1966 crop and the other on whether or not farmers will be permitted to sell or lease all or part of their cotton allotments for transfer outside the county.

If more than one third oppose the proposal on transferring acreage, then there will be no transfer of sold or leased acreage outside the county in 1966.

Voting places will be open November 23 from 8 a.m. until 6 p.m. Check with the county ASCS office for location of the polling places.

Soybean Day

Weed Control

Don't let weeds steal your profits, either on pastures or row crops. They can be controlled. Check with your county agent for details.

Now is the time to begin the weed control program on pastures as dock and thistle are coming up thick in many areas of early planted small grains and ryegrass.

Where these are growing and no clover or other legume is growing with the cereal, you can kill dock and thistle with three-fourths pound of 2,4-D per acre.

Fruit Tree Planting

Early winter is the best time to plant pecan and fruit trees. By planting early you give the roots a chance to become acclimated to the new areas in which you plant them. Soil gets a chance to settle and get rid of air pockets.

Also in ordering plants early from a reliable nursery you have a better chance of getting the varieties and sizes of trees you want.

For more information on planting fruit trees, see your county agents.
